

This consists of a construction workforce of between 8,000 and 10,000 workers, along with facilities management staff and operational staff. Based on an assessment of the labour market and available skills, approximately 2,700 (25%) of the peak workforce is expected to already reside within the Daily Construction Commuting Zone (DCCZ) and, therefore, are considered to be home-based. The local contribution ranges from 90% for off-site services, security and clerical staff, to 7% of supervisory and managerial staff. Horizon's Jobs and Skills Strategy also includes targeted measures to further enhance opportunities for local people to access relevant education and training, delivering transferable construction skills to support the Wylfa Newydd Power Station construction and for the future. Work is currently being undertaken by Horizon to look at the skills required locally with a view to increasing training to close any identified skills gaps. In no way can it be considered to be a condition of the planning consent. It is simply a condition of Land and Lakes business plan. It is apparent by the representations I have had that there is a real concern among Holyhead residents that housing around 2500 contractors approximately 15 miles from their place of work is a folly of great magnitude. In the first instance there is no contractual obligation on any worker to reside in this complex. If it were the case there is no obligation on any worker to use transport provided, ie park and ride. While I acknowledge that there is also a plan to carve up our countryside to "straighten roads" because they are unsuitable for large vehicles that may be delivering equipment to Wylfa, this is still one of the most hazardous roads on Anglesey and has had many RTA's including several fatalities.
