Additional Land Requirements Consultation (16th January – 13th February 2018)

Thank you for your letter dated 22nd December 2017, where following advice from the Planning Inspectorate you noted your intention to undertake a targeted consultation on additional land requirements on a statutory basis for the purposes of s47 (people living in the vicinity of the land), s42 (prescribed consultees including people with an interest in the land) and s48 (publicity) of the Planning Act 2008. The Isle of Anglesey County Council (IACC) understand that Horizon intends to carry out this process in accordance with the stage 3 process of the SOCC (version 3 May 2017), and requests confirmation that we are content for the consultation to proceed.

In your letter it is noted that to meet your schedule to submit the Development Consent Order (DCO) Application at the end of March 2018, the authoring of the documentation will be substantially completed by the 6th February, to allow for translation and printing, and that comments received after week commencing 8th January 2018 are therefore unlikely to be able to be reflected. For the proposed consultation process to be meaningful, and therefore adequate, there must be an opportunity for those being consulted to influence the project, and for changes to be made in response to the representations received. Prior to formally responding, the IACC requested that Horizon outline how the responses to the proposed consultation would be taken into account and utilised to inform and influence the final DCO Application.

You subsequently confirmed that you have a team in place to review comments and feedback as soon as they are received, and once analysed will disseminate the information to the relevant technical teams to address and make changes to the DCO Application as necessary. You have also noted that given the limited scope of the proposed changes to the Order Limits and the targeted nature of the


consultation, the number of responses is likely to be relatively low and you therefore will be able to deal with the responses appropriately in the time available.

The IACC also referred Horizon to its letter of [10 April 2017] responding to the draft updated SOCC, where concerns with consultation periods being limited to 28 days were raised. In accordance with the concerns outlined in this letter the IACC requested that Horizon outline why the consultation period is also being limited, and why a longer duration is not possible. In response you have confirmed as outlined above that given the targeted nature of this consultation as described and the relatively small volume of consultation materials being issued for consideration, you believe that a 28 day consultation period is reasonable, commensurate with the scope of matters being consulted on, and in accordance with relevant DCLG guidance on pre-application process.

As you have noted the Consultation Report submitted with the DCO application will set out how Horizon has addressed the responses to all the consultations undertaken, including describing any changes made in response to this specific consultation. Given the issues noted above the IACC will be giving this aspect of the consultation report careful consideration to ensure that the responses to this consultation have been properly considered. We would therefore suggest that the actions taken in response to this consultation are set out in some detail when finalising the consultation report.

Following your response to the issues noted above I can confirm that the IACC are content for Horizon to proceed with the consultation.

- To create or enhance wetland sites across Anglesey that, as well as compensating for any potential impact construction may have on the Tre'r Gof Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI), which is within the site boundary, would also enhance and improve the wetland ecology elsewhere on the island. Horizon is currently looking at a number of sites between Cemaes and Amlwch and to the north of Llangefni
- For two new ecological mitigation areas to reduce the effects of the site clearance plans on wildlife, and minor changes to our connection to the national grid sub-station within the Wylfa Newydd Development Area
- The confirmed order limits (the boundary of all the land needed to carry out the works) for the new sections of A5025 between Horizon's site and Valley, and minor refinements to the boundaries of the proposed Off-Site Power Station Facilities at Llanfaethlu and Logistics Centre at Parc Cybi.



Could Cosco still have eyes for Gener8?



CHINA COSCO TABLED a rival all-cash bid for Gener8 Maritime prior to the New York-listed owner's announcement of a merger with Euronav, it has emerged.

Lloyd's List can exclusively reveal the Chinese state conglomerate submitted the bid while Euronav was in talks with Gener8 last year.

Gener8 considered both offers before deciding to proceed with Euronav, according to well-placed sources.

The news comes amid speculation that Chinese interest may still remain to buy the company.

According to some industry insiders, there is renewed interest from Chinese interests, understood to be Cosco Shipping Energy Transportation, and a willingness from some gener8 shareholders to reconsider the original offer.

An official from Cosco Shipping said he was unaware of any bid.

Cosco signs VLCCs deal with Sinochem

COSCO Shipping Energy Transportation has signed an agreement with Sinochem Oil to charter in five very large crude carriers as part of its efforts to expand fleet.

No details of the ships were offered, but data from Lloyd's List Intelligence shows state-owned Sinochem has five VLCCs in its fleet.

Ocean freight rates firm ahead of Chinese New Year

OCEAN freight rates will remain firm ahead of Chinese New Year but face downward pressure in March, according to analysts.

The World Container Index, a composite of container freight rates on eight major routes to/from the US, Europe and Asia, fell 0.2% this week to \$1,407.58 per 40 ft container, said Drewry.

1. Notice is hereby given that Horizon Nuclear Power Wylfa Limited (the "Applicant") of Sunrise House 1420 Charlton Court, Gloucester Business Park, Gloucester, GL3 4AE proposes to apply to the Secretary of State under s37 of the Planning Act 2008 for an order granting development consent ("DCO") for the construction, operation and maintenance of a new nuclear power station and other development, at Wylfa, Anglesey ("Wylfa Newydd Project").
2. The Applicant is part of the Horizon Nuclear Power Limited group of companies and is wholly owned by Hitachi, Limited, the headquarters of which is in Tokyo, Japan.
3. The application for the Wylfa Newydd Project is anticipated to be submitted in the first half of 2018.
4. The Wylfa Newydd Project is a Nationally Significant Infrastructure Project for the purposes of the Planning Act 2008 and requires development consent under that Act. Horizon proposes to apply for a DCO for the Wylfa Newydd Project which would include the following principal elements:
 - Power Station: the proposed new nuclear power station, including two UK Advanced Boiling Water Reactors (UK ABWRs) to be supplied by Hitachi-GE Nuclear Energy Ltd., supporting facilities, buildings, plant and structures, and radioactive waste and spent fuel storage buildings;
 - Other on-site development: including landscape works and planting, drainage,

surface water management systems, public access works including temporary and permanent closures and diversions of public rights of way, new Power Station Access Road and internal site roads, car parking, construction compounds and temporary parking areas, laydown areas, working areas and temporary works and structures, temporary construction viewing area, diversion of utilities, perimeter and construction fencing;

- Marine Works comprising:
 - Permanent Marine Works: the Cooling Water System, Cooling Water System intake and outfall, Marine Off-Loading Facility (MOLF), breakwater structures, shore protection works, surface water drainage outfalls, fish recovery and return system, fish deterrent system, navigation aids and dredging;
 - Temporary Marine Works: temporary cofferdams, a temporary access ramp, navigation aids, temporary outfalls and a temporary barge berth;

6. Horizon also intends to bring forward applications for planning permission under the Town and Country Planning Act 1990 for works

which support, but which will not form part of the DCO application. These include applications for:

- (a) A visitor and media reception centre
- (b) Other related and enabling works as needed to support delivery of the Project

7. The proposed DCO will also seek various other powers including provisions permitting the compulsory acquisition of interests and rights in land, the temporary use of land, interference with rights and the closure or diversion of streets and other public rights of way including the permanent closure of Cemlyn Road.
8. The proposed development is "EIA development" for the purposes of the Infrastructure Planning (Environmental Impact Assessment) Regulations 2009. An environmental impact assessment is being carried out and an environmental statement will be submitted with the proposed application. The environmental statement will provide a detailed description of the Project and its likely significant environmental effects.
9. In accordance with Regulation 10 of the Infrastructure Planning (Environmental Impact Assessment) Regulations 2009 the Applicant has previously made Preliminary Environmental Information (PEI) available together with a non-technical summary of that information (as part of its Stage One, Stage Two and Stage Three pre-application consultations). Notice is hereby given that Horizon Nuclear Power Wylfa Limited (the "Applicant") of Sunrise House 1420 Charlton Court, Gloucester Business Park, Gloucester, GL3 4AE proposes to apply to the Secretary of State under s37 of the Planning Act 2008 for an order granting development consent ("DCO") for the construction, operation and maintenance of a new nuclear power station and other development, at Wylfa, Anglesey ("Wylfa Newydd Project").
2. The Applicant is part of the Horizon Nuclear Power Limited group of companies and is wholly owned by Hitachi, Limited, the headquarters of which is in Tokyo, Japan.
3. The application for the Wylfa Newydd Project is anticipated to be submitted in the first half of 2018.
4. The Wylfa Newydd Project is a Nationally Significant Infrastructure Project for the purposes of the Planning Act 2008 and requires development consent under that Act. Horizon proposes to apply for a DCO for the Wylfa Newydd Project which would include the following principal elements:
 - Power Station: the proposed new nuclear power station, including two UK Advanced Boiling Water Reactors (UK ABWRs) to be supplied by Hitachi-GE Nuclear Energy Ltd., supporting facilities, buildings, plant and structures, and radioactive waste and spent fuel storage buildings;
 - Other on-site development: including landscape works and planting, drainage,

surface water management systems, public access works including temporary and permanent closures and diversions of public rights of way, new Power Station Access Road and internal site roads, car parking, construction compounds and temporary parking areas, laydown areas, working areas and temporary works and structures, temporary construction viewing area, diversion of utilities, perimeter and construction fencing;

- Marine Works comprising:
 - Permanent Marine Works: the Cooling Water System, Cooling Water System intake and outfall, Marine Off-Loading Facility (MOLF), breakwater structures, shore protection works, surface water drainage outfalls, fish recovery and return system, fish deterrent system, navigation aids and dredging;
 - Temporary Marine Works: temporary cofferdams, a temporary access ramp, navigation aids, temporary outfalls and a temporary barge berth;

- (b) Other related and enabling works as needed to support delivery of the Project.
7. The proposed DCO will also seek various other powers including provisions permitting the compulsory acquisition of interests and rights in land, the temporary use of land, interference with rights and the closure or diversion of streets and other public rights of way including the permanent closure of Cemlyn Road.
8. The proposed development is "EIA development" for the purposes of the Infrastructure Planning (Environmental Impact Assessment) Regulations 2009. An environmental impact assessment is being carried out and an environmental statement will be submitted with the proposed application. The environmental statement will provide a detailed description of the Project and its likely significant environmental effects.
9. In accordance with Regulation 10 of the Infrastructure Planning (Environmental Impact Assessment) Regulations 2009 the Applicant has previously made Preliminary Environmental Information (PEI) available together with non-technical summary of that information (as part of its Stage One, Stage Two and Stage Three pre-application consultations). Longlining for Patagonian toothfish from the Falkland Islands

The 59.5m longliner CFL Hunter was custom-built for Consolidated Fishing Ltd last year specifically to fish for MSC-accredited Patagonian toothfish.

Working four-week trips from the Falkland Islands, the state-of-the-art vessel fishes down to 1100m

in the frequently stormy waters of the Southern Ocean.

Majestic albatross, orcas and storm petrels are among the wide range of wildlife that regularly accompanies the longliner.

In addition to using a specialised umbrella longline system that keeps

OBE for NFFO president


NFFO president Tony Delahunt has been awarded the OBE in the New Year honours for his services to the fishing industry.

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Students drafted in to plug NHS gaps

Exclusive Safety concerns as undergraduates volunteer on short-staffed wards and A&E

Medical students are being urged to help relieve the NHS winter crisis because hospitals are so short-staffed they are struggling to cope with the surge in patients, the Guardian can reveal. Despite their lack of

experience, undergraduates are being asked to volunteer in A&E units and on wards reeling under the weight of extra demand caused by the cold weather, an outbreak of flu and people suffering serious breathing problems.

They have been told to expect to fit cannulas - tubes inserted so patients can receive medication - take blood and run errands, all work usually done by healthcare assistants or ward clerks.

The British Medical Association said that asking students who had not qualified in medicine to assist with, in some cases, severely ill patients was

"a desperate measure" that could put patients at risk and exploit undergraduates who agreed to help.

The disclosure also led to warnings that hospitals could face legal difficulties if students made mistakes and concern that their presence on wards could disguise the depth of NHS understaffing.

Medical schools are asking fourth- and fifth-year students for urgent assistance at "hard-pressed" nearby hospitals and GP surgeries, according to emails obtained by the Guardian.

Dr Andrew Hassell, head of Keele

University's medical school, wrote to students recently to enlist support in tackling the NHS's "national crisis".

"We're sure you don't need us to tell you about the extraordinary situation the whole of the NHS is facing this winter," wrote Hassell, who is also a senior figure at the NHS trust that runs hospitals in Stoke and Stafford.

"As the medical school for this area we think we should be doing whatever we can to support local services while maintaining student learning. We are sure you will want to be part of our collective effort at this time of national

crisis," he said in the email, sent last week. He added that he had already contacted the medical director (most senior doctor) at his own trust and at the Shrewsbury and Telford Hospital NHS Trust "to ask them to let us know if there's anything we can do to help".

Hassell told students: "Do volunteer to help in any way possible, providing it's within your competence. This applies to students in hospitals and in GP [general practice]."

On 4 January, two days after the seriousness of the winter crisis led NHS bosses to







We've identified land on the western side of the Wylfa Newydd Development Area (WNDA) as potential ecological enhancement areas, to help reduce the potential impact of our work:

- **Pen Carreg** – providing an alternative habitat and an access corridor for animals displaced from the WNDA during our Site Preparation and Clearance (SPC) works
- **Mynydd-Itel** – to create a site for small reptiles and other wildlife moved from the WNDA

Work has already been undertaken at both sites to make sure these habitats are ready for species during the SPC phase of works, scheduled to start in spring 2018.

The sites will be leased and managed by Horizon, after which new landscaping within the WNDA will be sufficiently established to accommodate all these local species.



New wetland habitats across Anglesey

We are proposing to create or enhance wetland sites across Anglesey that, as well as compensating for any potential impact we may have on the Tre'r Gof Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI) within the Wylfa Newydd Development Area (WNDA), would also enhance and improve the wetland ecology across the island.

We've been working closely with Natural Resources Wales (NRW) and Isle of Anglesey County Council to formulate a proposal to compensate for any impact we might have on the Tre'r Gof SSSI. Our proposal is two-fold: to create new areas of fen habitat (wetland), and to enhance existing areas of wetland.

The proposed locations comprise three sites with a total potential for approximately 14 hectares (ha) of new fen. In addition, these sites have the potential for a further 20ha of enhancement of existing fen.

The three sites are:

- **Tŷ Du**
- **Cors Gwawr**
- **Cae Canol-dydd**

We will establish valuable new wetland sites on Anglesey, enhancing the wetland ecology for the flora and fauna of the island and improving connectivity between existing fen areas, including parts of the Anglesey Fens Special Area of Conservation (SAC).

These proposals are for the long term, and are part of our fundamental commitment to be environmentally responsible and a good neighbour on Anglesey for the lifetime of our project.

TŶ DU

Tŷ Du is an 8.1 hectare (ha) plot of land between Cemaes and Bull Bay, approximately 2.7km east of the Wylfa Newydd Development Area.

Much of the site was previously fen habitat but it is now of poor quality and covered in scrub. It is proposed to cut and clear the existing scrub to restore the site, and then maintain its condition through appropriate grazing.


This would bring beneficial effects for the important and notable species associated with the fen habitats including plants and birds. There may also be the potential to create features that benefit water voles, reptiles, amphibians and marsh fritillary butterfly where appropriate.

Works will be small scale, mainly with the use of hand tools such as strimmers and chainsaws. All works will be undertaken in daylight hours.

There would not be any significant adverse effects to the Llanbadrig – Dinas Gynfor SSSI, and no effects on public rights of way, as the footpath that runs along a part of the site is relatively open so unlikely to be impacted by scrub clearance works.

We also propose to create two new wetland fen sites north west of Llangefni and west of Talwrn.

There would be benefits to the important and notable species associated with fen habitats including numerous plant, invertebrate and bird species. There may also be potential to incorporate features beneficial for water voles, reptiles, amphibians and marsh fritillary butterfly into the scheme where appropriate.

The small-scale nature of the works will not differ substantially from normal agricultural activities, and will only take place during daytime working hours. It is estimated that approximately 20,000m³ of topsoil would be stripped from each site. The topsoil would be stored in stockpiles on the higher and drier areas of the site that are not suitable for fen habitat, or taken off site for use elsewhere.

The sites would then be continually monitored and managed via sensitive grazing to keep the fen habitats in optimal condition. Together, these sites would better connect currently isolated habitats of the Anglesey Fens Special Area of Conservation (SAC).

CORS GWAWR

Cors Gwawr is a 20.5 hectare (ha) area of land located approximately 3.2km east-north-east from the centre of Llangefni, and approximately 250m east of the village of Talwrn.

The majority of the land has been drained in order to be used as pasture. The site is bounded by two Sites of Special Scientific Interest (SSSIs), Cors Bodeilio to the northeast, and Caeau Talwrn to the west.

It is proposed to create new fen and to enhance the existing areas of poorly managed fen, which would be restored through a combination of vegetation clearance, replanting and reseeding, and grazing.

New fen would be created by removing the upper topsoil layer from approximately 8.4ha of the site to a depth of approx. 30cm to uncover the underlying marl. This would include removing a small area of existing scrub.

Areas of the site which are higher and less suited to fen creation would be managed as neutral grassland.



CAE CANOL-DYDD

Cae Canol-dydd is located approximately 2.2km north-east from the centre of Llangefni, and approximately 1.3km west of the village of Talwrn. As at nearby Cors Gwawr, the proposals at Cae Canol-dydd are a mixture of new fen creation, existing fen enhancement and secured management of retained fen.

An area of pasture would be stripped off the top layer of topsoil (up to a depth of approximately 30cm) to establish new fen habitat, linking the existing fen areas. The existing Caeau Talwrn SSSI pocket would be managed to keep optimal fen conditions in the southern half and to enhance fen conditions in the northern half.

Cae Canol-dydd is located approximately 2.2km north-east from the centre of Llangefni, and approximately 1.3km west of the village of Talwrn

Ecological mitigation and enhancement areas next to site

Land on the western side of the Wylfa Newydd Development Area (WNDA) has been identified as ecological mitigation and enhancement areas. These are required primarily to reduce the potential impact of the proposed Site Preparation and Clearance (SPC) works on protected and notable species.

Horizon proposes to enhance the ecological quality of two areas of land adjacent to the western boundary of the WNDA:


- **Pen Carreg** – providing an alternative habitat and an access corridor for animals; and
- **Mynydd-Ithel** – creating a site for common lizards and adders moved from the WNDA

Work has already been undertaken at both sites to make sure the habitats are ready to receive animals from the WNDA during the SPC phase of works, currently scheduled to commence in spring 2018.

The sites will be leased and managed by Horizon for a period of 15 years, after which new landscaping within the WNDA will have sufficiently established to accommodate local wildlife.

SITE FEATURES

PEN CARREG

A total of four shallow 'scrapes' have been created; two measuring approximately 20 metres by 5-10 metres, and two measuring approximately 5 metres by 5 metres, all with scalloped/rounded edges to give a natural appearance.

Further wetland enhancement has included the creation of an area of open water in an existing area of dense swamp.

Eight wildlife refuges have been created, along with 30 smaller piles, to create a range of sheltering habitats for a variety of different animals.

Approximately 8,000 shrubs typical of the area have been planted to enhance existing field boundaries and create new hedgerows, improving habitat connectivity and maximising the diversity of habitats across the site.

Areas will be sown with seeds and green hay collected from local species-rich meadow.



MYNYDD-ITHEL

Ten reptile refuges have been created each measuring approximately 4 metres by 2 metres and no more than 1 metre in height. They have been constructed from a mixture of logs, brash, grass cuttings, stone and topsoil/turf (recovered from the site wherever possible), and blended into the surrounding landscape.

30 smaller piles of logs, brash and stones (recovered from the site wherever possible) were placed adjacent to field boundaries at appropriate locations around the site to provide smaller refuges for reptiles and other wildlife.

Approximately 1,600 shrubs typical of the area have been planted to enhance existing field boundaries and create new hedgerow and scrub habitat for use by reptiles and other wildlife.



Off-Line Highway Improvements

The A55, A5 and A5025 are the main routes from the mainland and the Port of Holyhead to Wylfa Newydd. These roads are critical to the successful delivery of the construction phase of the Project.

We have worked with Isle of Anglesey County Council to identify a range of improvements to the existing A5025 (On-Line) and the need for additional new sections of highway (Off-Line).

We have proposed the following new sections of road:


- A5/A5025 Valley junction improvements
- Llanfachraeth bypass
- Llanfaethlu road straightening
- Llanrhuddlad to Cefn Coch road straightening
- Power Station Site access

We have now confirmed the order limits (the boundary of all the land we'll need to undertake the works) for the proposed Off-Line Highway works. The latest refinements do not amend the extent of the proposed road construction itself, but are needed so other elements such as drainage can be accommodated and accessed.


We will apply for the Off-Line highway improvements as part of our Development Consent Order (DCO). Once approved, we expect to start these works soon after grant of the DCO and they will take around 18 months to complete.

The extent of the order limits and the indicative alignment of the highway is shown on the following pages.










OFF-SITE POWER STATION FACILITIES


We have identified the need for a minor amendment to our Off-Site Power Station Facilities site at Llanfaethlu. The amendment involves the addition of an area of around 5 by 5 metres on the northern edge of the site to accommodate the storage of refuse containers.

LOGISTICS CENTRE - PARC CYBI


The amendment involves the addition of an area of some 0.12 hectares on the north western corner of the site to accommodate the provision of surface water drainage to the existing attenuation pond located between the amended site and the Dwr Cymru/Welsh Water water treatment facility.

Two further changes to the Order Limit are associated with the existing National Grid Substation immediately to the south east of the Existing Power Station. These amendments are to the existing generator bay and are required to implement necessary connection works. There will be no changes to the existing scope of works as a result of these amendments.




Our connection to the national grid inside the Wylfa Newydd Development Area

..... NEXT STEPS

Since the close of the third stage of pre-application consultation in June 2017, Horizon has continued to consult and engage with both statutory and non-statutory bodies. This work is helping us to shape our DCO application.

Horizon has established a systematic process for the receipt, recording, coding and analysis of all responses received during consultation. We are reviewing all of the responses and considering any potential refinements to our Project proposals.

As part of the application for DCO, we are required to submit a Consultation Report, which will outline all feedback received and how we have taken it into account. The matters raised in consultation will be shared throughout our organisation and with our technical consultants to inform the final proposals that we submit as part of our DCO application later this year.

In late 2017, we submitted applications to Isle of Anglesey County Council to clear and prepare our site ready for construction, and to improve existing sections of the A5025. A decision on these is expected in the first quarter of 2018.

We have also applied for the first of a number of environmental permits we'll need, and we'll submit a number of others in parallel with our Development Consent Order (DCO). Later in 2018, we also expect a decision on our Nuclear Site Licence application to the Office for Nuclear Regulation.
