The longer this examination process has gone on the stronger my view that to build such a large station here is ridiculous.

This is not an emotional response although I have strong feelings about it.

I think that rationally the negatives outway the potential gains that EDF argue for.

This project will cause people to loose work : on farms, in the tourist industry.

It will cause anxiety for everyone going about daily life, from shopping to medical appointments etc. And the added stress from noise, pollution from dust and fumes will shorten lives. Recently I was delayed attending a local funeral by road works on the A12 It took 20 mins to cover 2 miles. This was a glimpse into the future as our roads are not going to cope with the volumn of extra traffic. Tourist will simply stay away which will mean economic disaster for businesses. Construction workers will not make up the lost revenue in the wider community.

It will cause ecological damage to a sensitive area and destroy plant and insect life on Sizewell Beach that can not be replaced after 10-12 years. All at a timewhen we have been reminded how depleted the natural world is in GB.To build such a project ignores the value of this heritage area. The wildlife can not speak out...our bird species have declined and we are rapidly reaching the point of no return unless we protect these areas.EDF have gone some way but to threaten the nesting ground of march harriers which paintaking work at Minsmere over years many have protected from extiction.

I cannot understand why EDF did not fully check out the water situation sooner. It is rather last minute to decIde they need to costruct a desalination plant. There are new homes going up in every village, the water shortage will only increase. This will increase the cost.

Then there is the issue of funding and the possibility of a levy on every bill to pay for it at a time when some house holds are struggling.

And I have not mentioned the problems of housing the work force, the eroding coastline which might see Sizewell AB+C on an island.

I do not think generations to come will thank us leaving such a legacy. Objectors in this area have thought through the issues and are far from being nimbyies and it.

In conclusion I think this far too big a project and it is the wrong place to construct it and it will more than likely be technologically out of date by completion. It will not fix our energy need in a quick way.
