#### 1 Introduction

1. This document is applicable to both the East Anglia TWO and East Anglia ONE North DCO Applications (the Applications), and therefore is endorsed with the yellow and blue icon used to identify materially identical documentation in accordance with the Examining Authority's procedural decisions on document management of 23<sup>rd</sup> December 2019 (PD-004). Whilst this document has been submitted to both Examinations, if it is read for one project submission there is no need to read it for the other project submission.

#### 1.1 Background

- 2. This Statement of Common Ground (SoCG) has been prepared by East Anglia TWO Limited, East Anglia ONE North Limited (the Applicants) and the Suffolk Coast and Heaths Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB) Partnership in relation to the East Anglia TWO project and the East Anglia ONE North project (the Projects). It identifies areas of the East Anglia TWO and East Anglia ONE North Development Consent Order (DCO) applications where matters are agreed or not agreed between the parties.
- 3. The Applicants have had regard to the guidance for the examination of applications for development consent (Department for Communities and Local Government, 2015) when compiling this SoCG.
- 4. This SoCG has been structured to reflect topics of the Applications which are of interest to the AONB Partnership. Topic specific matters agreed, not agreed and actions to resolve between the Applicants and the AONB Partnership are included within this SoCG.
- 5. The tables presented below represent the SoCG with the Applicants and the AONB Partnership in respect of the following topics (each of which includes matters pertaining to the Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) and DCO):
  - Offshore Seascape, Landscape and Visual Amenity; and
  - Onshore Landscape and Visual Amenity.
- 6. Throughout the SoCG the phrase "Agreed" identifies any point of agreement between the Applicants and the AONB Partnership. The phrase "Not Agreed" identifies any point that is not yet agreed between the Applicants and the AONB Partnership.
- 7. The matters considered within this SoCG apply only to AONB Partnership's remit, which encompasses the area within and views from the boundary of the Suffolk Coast and Heaths AONB (the AONB). Matters that are not yet agreed will be the subject of ongoing discussion between the Applicants and the AONB Partnership



to reach agreement on each matter wherever possible, or refine the extent of disagreement between parties. The notes column of the SoCG tables provides commentary on these matters.

#### 1.2 The AONB Partnership

- 8. The AONB Partnership was formed in 1993 and is comprised of public, private and voluntary organisations committed to conserving and enhancing the natural beauty of the Suffolk Coast and Heaths AONB. The AONB Partnership's role is to oversee delivery of the AONB Management Plan. It meets at least twice a year to discuss significant issues in the AONB, and delivery of the Plan. The AONB Partnership consists of: Suffolk County Council (SCC), Essex County Council, Babergh District Council, East Suffolk Council (ESC) (formerly Suffolk Coastal District Council and Waveney District Council), Tendring District Council, Ipswich Borough Council, Country Land and Business Association, The Crown Estate, Defra, Historic England, Environment Agency, Forestry Commission, Haven Gateway Partnership, National Farmers' Union, National Trust, Natural England, Royal Society for the Protection of Birds, Suffolk Association of Local Councils, Community Action Suffolk, Suffolk Coastal Business Forum, Suffolk Coast Limited, Suffolk Farming & Wildlife Advisory Group, Suffolk Preservation Society, Suffolk Coast Against Retreat, and Suffolk Wildlife Trust.
- 9. The Applicants are developing separate SoCGs with a number of member organisations which represent the views of these organisations.
- 10. The AONB Partnership's views in this SoCG have been informed from AONB team and chairmen knowledge before consultation and agreement with all members of the AONB Partnership. Furthermore, it draws on two reports commissioned by the AONB from Alison Farmer Associates:
  - AFA Report; and
  - AFA Seascape, Landscape and Visual Amenity (SLVIA) Review.
- 11. These works were commissioned to inform the AONB Partnership of the expected impacts of the Applicants' proposals. Individual AONB Partnership organisations are expected to agree their own SoCG with the Applicants and for avoidance of any doubt, this SoCG relates to the AONB Partnership and does not reflect the views of individual members of the AONB Partnership who may agree their own SoCGs.

#### 1.3 The Development

- 12. The key offshore components of each project will comprise:
  - Offshore wind turbines and their associated foundations;



- Offshore platforms up to four offshore electrical platforms and their associated foundations supporting some of the windfarm's electrical equipment, and up to one construction, operation and maintenance platform and associated foundations that may cater for personnel and activities required during the construction phase and operation and maintenance of the windfarm;
- Sub-sea cables between the wind turbines and offshore electrical platforms (inter-array), between separate offshore platforms (platform link cables) and between offshore electrical platforms and the landfall (export cables);
- Scour protection around foundations and on inter-array, platform link and export sub-sea cables as required; and
- Potential for one meteorological mast and its associated foundations for monitoring wind speeds during the operational phase of the windfarm.
- 13. The key onshore components of each project will comprise:
  - The landfall site with up to two transition bays to connect the onshore and offshore cables;
  - Up to six onshore cables, up to two fibre optic cables and up to two distributed temperature sensing cables installed underground (some or all of which may be installed in ducts) and associated jointing bays installed underground;
  - Onshore substation; and
  - Electrical cable connection between the onshore substation and National Grid substation.
- 14. National Grid infrastructure will also be required to connect each project to the national electricity grid. Key components of the National Grid infrastructure which is common to both Projects will comprise:
  - National Grid substation;
  - Cable sealing end compounds and a cable sealing end (with circuit breaker) compound; and
  - Realignment of the existing overhead lines; including the reconstruction or replacement of up to three existing overhead pylons in proximity to the National Grid substation and the addition of up to one new pylon in close proximity to existing overhead pylons.

#### 1.4 Summary of Agreed, Not Agreed and Outstanding Matters

15. **Table 1** provides a summary of the matters agreed, not agreed and those which are outstanding between the Applicants and the AONB Partnership for each of



the relevant SoCG topic areas. For further information on matters that are outstanding / under discussion which the Applicants and the AONB Partnership are working to address during the examination period, refer to the Notes column of *Table 3* and *Table 5*.

#### 2 Statement of Common Ground

16. A summary of the consultation undertaken to date with the AONB Partnership and the matters agreed or not agreed between the Applicants and the AONB Partnership (based on discussions and information exchanged between the Applicants and the AONB Partnership during the pre-Application and post-Application phases of the Applications) are set out below for each of the SoCG topic areas.

#### 2.1 Seascape, Landscape and Visual Amenity

- 17. The offshore components of the projects have the potential to impact upon seascape, landscape and visual amenity. *Chapter 28 Seascape, Landscape and Visual Amenity* of the Environmental Statement (ES) (APP-076) provides an assessment of the significance of these impacts.
- 18. In particular, an assessment of the project alone effects of each Project's offshore infrastructure on the special qualities of the AONB are described in *Section 28.7.3.2* and summarised in *Table 28.10* of each Project's ES (*Chapter 28* (APP-076)). A full assessment of effects on AONB special qualities is provided in *Section 28.2.2* and *Table A28.3* of *Appendix 28.4* (APP-559).
- 19. Visual effects on viewpoints within the AONB are assessed in full in **Section 28.2.1** within **Appendix 28.5** (APP-560) and summarised in **Chapter 28** (APP-076), **Section 28.8.3.2** and **Table 28.11**.
- 20. An assessment of the cumulative effect of the construction and operation of the Projects' offshore infrastructure on the special qualities of the AONB is provided in **Section 28.2.2.2** of **Appendix 28.7** (APP-562) and summarised in **Section 28.9.1.3.2** of **Chapter 28** of the ES (APP-076).
- 21. **Table 2** provides an overview of consultation undertaken with the AONB Partnership regarding seascape, landscape and visual amenity. Further details on the stakeholder engagement process for seascape, landscape and visual amenity can be found in the **Consultation Report** (APP-029).



- 22. The Applicants have been progressing matters raised by the AONB Partnership within their Relevant Representation (RR-083) and submitted the *Applicants' Comments on the Relevant Representations* (AS-036) in response to Procedural Decision 11. Following this, a workshop on SLVIA was held on the 30<sup>th</sup> of July with the AONB Partnership, Natural England, and the Councils.
- 23. The Relevant Representations submitted by the AONB Partnership, and subsequent engagement, has confirmed that there are some outstanding matters remaining. A number of these matters are aligned with those presented in SoCGs with Natural England, the Councils, and the AONB Partnership has deferred their position to these organisations for some statements. As a result of this, the Applicants see benefit in further engagement on SLVIA matters with the AONB Partnership, Natural England, the Councils.
- 24. A key step with regard to progressing these outstanding matters is the Natural England response to the *Applicants' Comments on the Relevant Representations* (AS-036), which Natural England will submit to the Examining Authority at Deadline 1. This submission will take account of the engagement and progression of matters between Natural England and the Applicants since submission of the *Applicants' Comments on the Relevant Representations* (AS-036). This is particularly relevant to agreement on matters where the AONB Partnership has deferred to Natural England and the Councils.



- 25. Following submission of written representations to the Examining Authority at Deadline 1, the Applicants intend to continue engagement on the outstanding matters with the AONB Partnership, Natural England, the Councils, and intends to submit an updated SoCG with the AONB Partnership to the Examining Authority at Deadline 3.
- 26. The Applicants are also preparing a note on the Statutory Purpose of the Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB) to address a number of comments raised by the AONB Partnership. This note will be submitted into the Examination at Deadline 2.
- 27. The Applicants' position in relation to outstanding agreement areas in **Table 3** reflects paragraphs 24 and 25 above.
- 28. **Table 3** presents the matters agreed, not agreed or in discussion between the Applicants and the AONB Partnership in relation to seascape, landscape and visual amenity.

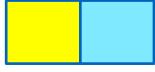

- 30. An assessment of the Project-alone construction effects of the onshore infrastructure on the special qualities of the AONB are described in each Project's ES, in *Chapter 29* (APP-077), *Section 29.5.3*, *Section 29.6.1.1* (Landfall), *Section 29.6.1.2* (onshore cable route) and *Section 29.6.1.3* (onshore substations).
- 31. An assessment of the Project-alone operational effects of the onshore substations on the special qualities of the AONB are described in each Project's ES, in *Chapter 29* (APP-077), *Section 29.6.2.2* (*paragraph 184, Table 29.10*).
