THERE ARE THREE ELEMENTS TO OUR PROPOSALS:

- A power upgrade to Wheelabrator Kemsley (K3), which is currently under construction
- Increasing the tonnage throughput of K3
- Constructing and operating Wheelabrator Kemsley North (WKN)
 - a new waste-to-energy facility

Our K3 facility is located to the east of the DS Smith Kemsley Paper Mill. WKN would be located on land immediately adjacent to K3, which is currently being used as a parking and laydown area for our K3 construction operations.

DS Smith are currently seeking a Development Consent Order for K4 - a replacement gas fired Combined Heat and Power facility within the paper mill site. That application is currently being examined by the Planning Inspectorate and is separate to our K3 and WKN proposals.

Kent County Council granted planning permission for K3 in 2012.

We started building the facility in 2016 and expect it to be operational in late 2019. The facility would operate under an environmental permit granted by the Environment Agency in 2011.


Through the environmental permit application process, we demonstrated how we would operate the facility to meet strict environmental standards relating to air quality.

Under its current consent, K3 could process up to 550,000 tonnes of post-recycled waste each year and has a gross electrical generating capacity of 49.9MW.

It would supply electricity to the grid as well as steam to DS Smith Kemsley Paper Mill. This would help reduce the Mill's reliance on fossil fuels and its overall carbon footprint.



THE WHEELABRATOR KEMSLEY (K3) POWER UPGRADE



HOW IT WORKS

- 1 A crane places the post-recycled waste into a feed hopper. The fuel then drops down a feed chute onto the grate.
- The action of the moving grate turns the waste to allow it to burn fully.
- Hot gases produced in the process pass through a water boiler where the water is converted to high pressure steam.
- 4) If we receive permission to optimise K3 we will then de-restrict the flow of that steam to our turbine.
- We will also re-configure our central control systems so the facility can operate at its newly-optimised level.
- The turbine we install will use the increased flow of steam to generate even more clean power.
- Part of the steam we produce will then be piped directly for use by DS Smith, to help reduce the Mill's reliance on fossil fuels and overall carbon footprint.
- The low carbon electricity we produce will be exported to homes and businesses via the National Grid distribution network.

We have undertaken a technical review and have identified an opportunity to optimise the operation of K3.

Our power upgrade would allow K3 to generate up to 75MW (gross) without any change to the basic design, size or look of the facility. The power upgrade would allow K3 to generate power for 52,000 more homes than is currently the case. This would bring the equivalent homes powered by K3 to over 156,000.





We have identified the need for the K3 facility to have more flexibility.

We are therefore seeking to increase the tonnage throughput of K3 by an additional 107,000 tonnes of post-recycled waste each year.

The increased tonnage throughput would equate to up to a further 34 HGVs per day arriving at and leaving K3. There are no physical changes proposed to the design, size or look of the facility.

In addition to the Development Consent Order application, we will be applying to the Environment Agency to vary our existing environmental permit.

Through this application to the Environment Agency, we will demonstrate that the proposed tonnage throughput increase will not impact our ability to adhere to strict environmental standards for air quality.









Waste-to-energy plays an important role in providing treatment capacity for waste that cannot be recycled, and our Kemsley site is ideally placed to provide much needed clean, renewable baseload energy.

Wheelabrator Kemsley North (WKN) would be a new waste-to-energy facility built on land adjacent to our existing Wheelabrator Kemsley (K3) facility. It would be able to process up to 390,000 tonnes of post-recycled waste a year and have a generating capacity of up to 42MW (gross) which means it would produce power capable of supplying more than 87,000 homes.

We have not yet decided on the final design for WKN, and would seek approval from Kent County Council for the final design should our Development Consent Order application be granted. The construction of WKN would take approximately 40 months, during which it would create hundreds

of construction jobs. WKN would create between 35 to 50 jobs once operational.


All of our facilities use advanced air quality controls and performance monitoring technology. Our facilities meet and exceed the stringent standards for air quality, set by the European Union and covered by the Industrial Emissions Directive.

They are regulated under Environmental Permits issued by the Environment Agency and we would follow this process for WKN. WKN would need approximately 125 HGVs per day to operate and we are carefully modelling the impact of those HGVs on the surrounding road network, alongside our K3 proposals.





Our proposals would increase the generating capacity of our Wheelabrator Kemsley (K3) facility and provide for Wheelabrator Kemsley North (WKN), a new waste-to-energy facility.

Our Wheelabrator Kemsley (K3) power upgrade and tonnage throughput increase proposals and our proposed Wheelabrator Kemsley North (WKN) waste-to-energy facility are separate projects and we will be seeking consent for them via a single application for one Development Consent Order.

Our application will be made to the Planning Inspectorate who will examine it and make a recommendation to the Secretary of State for Business, Energy & Industrial Strategy, who is responsible for determining the application.

Kent County Council and Swale
Borough Council will be consultees,
alongside other bodies such as the
Environment Agency and Natural
England. The examination will be
primarily a written process but will
include hearings held by the Planning
Inspectorate.

We will update our website when we submit our application and will publicise locally when the application is accepted.

Interested parties will have the opportunity to register with the Planning Inspectorate if they want to be involved in the examination process, which can take up to six months. Wheelabrator Kemsley (K3) and Wheelabrator Kemsley North (WKN) Waste-to-Energy Facilities

November 2018



1 INTRODUCTION

- 1.1 Wheelabrator Technologies Inc. (the Applicant) intends to make an application to the Secretary of State (SoS) for Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy for a Development Consent Order (DCO) to seek a power upgrade and tonnage throughput increase to the permitted Wheelabrator Kemsley waste-to-energy plant (K3) and a new waste-to-energy plant on adjacent land called Wheelabrator Kemsley North (WKN).
- The Planning Act 2008 states that the construction or extension of a generating station of more than 50 Megawatts (MW) is considered within Section 14(1) (a) of the Act to be a 'nationally significant infrastructure project' and as such requires an application for a DCO to be made to the Planning Inspectorate and approved by the SoS for Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy.
- Planning permission was granted under the Town and Country Planning Act 1990 by Kent County Council in 2012 for a sustainable waste-to-energy plant (K3). Construction of the plant began in August 2016 and is expected to be completed with the plant operational by late 2019. As consented the K3 facility will have two 102MW thermal lines, be capable of processing 550,000 tonnes of waste per annum and have a generating output of 49.9MW. The proposed DCO application will seek consent to permit the facility to operate to an upgraded power generation level of 75MW and to process an additional 107,000 tonnes of waste per annum. This project is a Nationally Significant Infrastructure Project (NSIP) by virtue of it being an extension to an onshore generating station in England with a generating capacity of over 50MW under Section 14(1)(a) and 15(2) of the Planning Act 2008.
- Development Consent is also being sought for a proposed new waste-to-energy plant, Wheelabrator Kemsley North (WKN), which would be a single 125MWth line facility capable of processing 390,000 tonnes of waste per annum, with a generating capacity of 42MW. WKN is not therefore an NSIP by virtue of its generating capacity. Instead Wheelabrator Technologies Inc. (WTI) made a formal application on the 1st June 2018 to the SoS for Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy under Section 35 of the Planning Act 2008 for a direction as to whether the development, together with any matters associated with it, can be treated as development for which a DCO is required. The SoS issued their direction on the 27th June 2018 confirming that WKN can be treated as development for a which a DCO is required, as there are clear benefits to K3 and WKN being assessed comprehensively through the same DCO process and the removal of the need for separate consents to be sought.
- 1.5 K3 and WKN will therefore be subject to a single DCO application for both facilities to the SoS for Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy via the Planning Inspectorate.
- 1.6 Both K3 and WKN are developments of a type listed in part 10 Schedule 1 of the Infrastructure Planning (Environmental Impact Assessment) Regulations 2017 (hereafter the EIA Regulations) with a capacity exceeding 100 tonnes per day.
- 1.7 All development of a type listed in Schedule 1 of the EIA Regulations constitute EIA Development and the application for the K3 and WKN DCO is therefore required to be accompanied by an Environmental Statement (ES), prepared in accordance with the EIA Regulations.
- This document provides a summary of the developments proposed and the <u>preliminary results</u> of the EIA undertaken to date. Members of the public can comment on this 'Preliminary Environmental Information' ("PEI") through a dedicated page on the Applicant's website, via email, letter or using the feedback forms at the forthcoming public exhibitions. Details on how to do so are provided at the end of this document. Members of the public who register themselves as interested parties with the Planning Inspectorate (PINS) by the relevant deadline after the acceptance of the formal application will also be able to make comments on the final ES (details provided at the end of this document).

2 PROPOSED DEVELOPMENT SITES

Wheelabrator Kemsley (K3) Site

- 2.1 The K3 site is located on land immediately to the east of the Kemsley Paper Mill, located to the east of Kemsley, a residential suburb in the north of Sittingbourne in Kent. It lies adjacent to the Swale Estuary, with the Isle of Sheppey beyond. To the south of the site beyond K3 lies a capped former landfill site which lies adjacent to the confluence between Milton Creek and the Swale Estuary. The site lies in proximity to the A249 which links to both the M2 and M20 motorways to the south and with the Isle of Sheppey to the north.
- 2.2 The site benefits from planning permission (KCC/SW/10/444) granted in 2012 for the construction of a sustainable waste-to-energy plant and the site is at an advanced stage of construction and programmed to become fully operational in late 2019. A full EIA of the facility was undertaken and submitted as part of the application pursuant to permission KCC/SW/10/444. See Wheelabrator Kemsley (K3) for further details on page 5.

Wheelabrator Kemsley North (WKN) Site

- 2.3 The WKN site is located immediately north of the permitted K3 facility which is currently under construction and immediately to the east of the Kemsley Paper Mill. The WKN site is currently being used by WTI as a laydown and parking area for the construction of the adjacent K3 facility. The site has been cleared of vegetation and laid to concrete or hardcore with a perimeter fence. The site has extant permission for an Incinerator Bottom Ash facility permitted by Kent County Council (KCC/0265/2016). WTI no longer wish to build this facility and instead wish to replace it with a new waste-to-energy plant the subject of this application.
- To the east of the site lies the Swale Estuary with the Isle of Sheppey beyond. Immediately to the north of the site lie the Kemsley Marshes beyond which lies the Kemsley Paper Mill effluent treatment works and a jetty operated by Knauf for the import of gypsum by barge.
- 2.5 The sites lie within the ward of Kemsley (0.8km to the south west) and Milton Regis (2.6km to the south west). Sittingbourne is situated approximately 2.6km south of the site.




Figure 1: Site location plan showing indicative red boundary

2 PROPOSED DEVELOPMENT SITES




Figure 2: Sensitive sites/areas/receptors in proximity to the sites

- 2.6 The sites lies in proximity to a number of sensitive areas and sites which could be potentially affected by the K3 and WKN proposals which will be assessed within the EIA. The main sensitive sites/areas are listed below and their location illustrated in Figure 2:
 - The Swale Special Protection Area, Special Site of Specific Interest and Ramsar site designated for its grazing marshes, estuarine habitats and the assemblage of breeding and overwintering birds it supports.
 - 'Castle Rough' a Medieval moated site (Scheduled Monument).
 - Local residents in the Kemsley area of Sittingbourne.
 - The A249 and local highways network.
 - The River Swale.
 - The Saxon Shore Way Public Right of Way which runs along the sites eastern boundaries.

It should be noted that this is not an exhaustive list but identifies the main sensitive sites/areas only.

3 WHEELABRATOR KEMSLEY (K3)

- Planning permission was granted under the Town and Country Planning Act 1990 by Kent County Council in 2012 for a sustainable waste-to-energy plant (K3). Construction of the plant began in August 2016 and is expected to be completed with the plant operational by late 2019. As consented the K3 facility will have two 102MWth lines, be capable of processing 550,000 tonnes of waste per annum and have a generating output of 49.9MW.
- 3.2 The facility when operational will process post-recycled waste to produce electricity and steam consequentially reducing the disposal of waste to UK landfill. Steam generated by the facility will be piped to the adjacent Kemsley Paper Mill for the paper production process. The facility will employ approximately 50 full time members of staff and will operate in accordance with an Environmental Permit issued by the Environment Agency which sets limits on emissions to air, water and land and is continually monitored by them.

Wheelabrator Kemsley (K3) Proposed Development

- As identified previously, K3 benefits from planning permission (KCC/SW/10/444) granted in 2012 for the construction of a sustainable waste-to-energy plant and the site is at an advanced stage of construction and programmed to become fully operational in late 2019.
- The proposed application seeks a DCO to allow the permitted K3 facility to operate to an upgraded power generation level of 75MW (an additional 25.1 MW) and to process an additional 107,000 tonnes of waste per annum ('the K3 Proposed Development').
- These are purely operational changes to the facility and do not require any changes to the built form (design, size, shape or appearance) as permitted (KCC/SW/10/444 as amended) or to the layout of the site.




Figure 5: Process diagram illustrating how K3 will be modified to increase power output

- The ability to increase the power output from the facility is consequential to improvements to the efficiency of in plant technology since the original application was made. The operational change to the plant would be facilitated by de-restricting the flow of steam to the turbine and reconfiguring the central control system. The key processes of the K3 plant and the mechanism by which the power upgrade will be facilitated is set out in Figure 5 below.

An increased tonnage throughput allows WTI in the event of increased availability (the amount of time the plant can operate between routine maintenance) or changes in the composition of the waste received, to generate as much energy as they are permitted to do so and increase the overall efficiency of the plant. This increase in waste throughput will generate an additional 34 HGV visits to the site per day.

Wheelabrator Kemsley North (WKN) Proposed Development

- The proposed application seeks Development Consent to construct and operate a new waste-toenergy plant, Wheelabrator Kemsley North (WKN) ('the WKN Proposed Development'). The facility would comprise a single 125MWth line facility capable of processing 390,000 tonnes of waste per annum, with a generating capacity of up to 42MW.
- 4.7 An illustrative plan showing how the layout of the facility will likely be arranged is shown in Figure 7. The plant will essentially comprise a series of interlinked buildings, the key buildings of which will be as follows:
 - Fuel reception and storage facilities, consisting of a tipping hall, shredder, storage bunker and cranes;
 - Combustion system housed within a boiler hall comprising a single combustion line and associated boilers;
 - A steam turbine and generator housed within a turbine hall;
 - A bottom ash handling system, including storage hall and ash collection bay;
 - A flue gas treatment system, including residues and reagent storage silos and tanks;
 - A stack and associated emissions monitoring systems;
 - A cooling system comprising air cooled condenser (ACC) units; and
 - Other associated supporting facilities.
- As with the adjacent K3 facility all waste will be brought to the site in HGVs or in Refuse Collection Vehicles via Barge Way from the north of the Paper Mill. Once arriving at the site, the HGVs access the facility via a weighbridge and then manoeuvre on site and enter the tipping hall.




Figure 6: Process diagram showing how WKN will operate

- 4.9 The WKN facility will then combust the waste imported to the site to generate hot gases that in turn are used to produce steam and ultimately electricity. The key waste-to-energy processes are illustrated in Figure 6 overleaf.

WKN - Hours of Operation

4.10 The facility, as with the adjacent K3 plant, will operate 24 hours per day, 7 days per week with programmed offline periods for maintenance.

WKN - Access and Transport

4.11 The additional waste will be brought to the site in HGVs or in refuse collection vehicles via Barge Way from the north of the Paper Mill. It is estimated that there will be on average 125 HGVs per day Monday to Saturday associated with the operation of the plant including waste delivery, IBA removal and deliveries of process inputs.

WKN - Chemical Storage

The Proposed Development will use a number of raw materials during the combustion and processing operation including hydrated lime, solid urea, activated carbon and low sulphur diesel. All chemicals will be stored in fully bunded areas.

WKN - Wastewater and Drainage

- Water used in the waste-to-energy process is continually recycled such that the facility is not a regular net consumer of water. Any excess process water is stored safely on site and utilised as and when required. No process water is discharged to the Swale.
- The onsite surface water drainage network for the site will be split into two separate drainage systems.

 The first drainage system will collect clean surface water runoff (for example from building roof areas) and store it in the lagoon.
- The second drainage system will collect 'dirty' runoff (for example from the waste bunker) and store it in the 'dirty' water tank. This 'dirty' water will then be used in the process as required (for example for ash quenching) and will not be discharged into the Swale. The clean water will be stored in the lagoon and used to top up the 'dirty' water tank as and when required. If the lagoon has reached the maximum acceptable capacity it will be discharged at a controlled rate into the Swale Estuary.

WKN - Employment

4.16 It is anticipated that during the operational phase, the Project will generate between 35 and 50 full-time permanent jobs.

WKN - Construction of the Proposed Development

- 4.17 The entire site preparation and construction programme is anticipated to take approximately 40 months from commencement to take over. This will comprise the following key stages:
 - Civil engineering works (month 0-38) the physical works associate with constructing the facility
 - Process works (month 12-38) mechanical and electrical installation, fit out and commissioning of the plant
 - Commissioning of the facility (month 30 40)
- 4.18 With the exception of construction using the concrete slip-forming method, construction using constant pour methods for concrete laying and internal process works relating to mechanical and/ or electrical equipment installation, construction activities shall only take place between 07:00 and 19:00 hours Monday to Friday inclusive and 07:00 and 16:00 hours Saturday and Sunday with no construction activities to take place on Bank or Public Holidays subject to any prior written variation as approved by the Waste Planning Authority. The designated route for delivery of construction plant and materials is via Barge Way.
- 4.19 A designated construction laydown area is proposed north east of the site adjacent to the Knauf Jetty as shown on Figure 1 on page 3.

5 ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT ASSESSMENT

What is the purpose of EIA?

- The purpose of Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) is to identify the likely significant effects of a proposed development, positive or negative, to some aspect of the environment whether natural or man made. Both the sensitivity of the environmental receptors being affected and the magnitude of the impact inform the significance of the effect. The findings of the EIA are then presented in a document known as an Environmental Statement (ES).
- The significant environmental effects of the K3 Proposed Development during operation and future decommissioning of the facility, and construction, operation and future decommissioning of the WKN Proposed Development requires assessment in the ES by appropriate technical experts.
- 5.3 Where feasible, mitigation measures have been proposed to avoid/reduce an adverse effect identified. A reassessment of an effect with this mitigation in place is then undertaken to determine its significance post mitigation. Any significant environmental effects remaining after mitigation are reported and represent the likely residual effects of the proposed development on the environment (if any).
- 5.4 Where identified, significant residual effects are required to be taken into account in the application decision making process by the SoS. If consent is granted mitigation measures are secured by requirements within the DCO to ensure they are implemented and legally enforceable.

What issues have been assessed?

- A formal scoping opinion request was made to PINS in August 2018 to seek to agree the scope of the issues to be included in the EIA in consultation with the relevant consultees i.e. Kent County Council (KCC) Highways, the Environment Agency, Natural England etc. A copy of the formal scoping opinion is publicly available on PINS website: https://infrastructure.planninginspectorate.gov.uk/projects/southeast/wheelabrator-kemsley-generating-station-k3-and-wheelabrator-kemsley-north-wkn-waste-to-energy-facility/
- 5.6 Consequently it was agreed that the following topic areas need to be assessed within the EIA, a summary of the preliminary results of which is provided within this document:
 - Traffic and transport (K3 and WKN Proposed Development)
 - Air Quality (K3 and WKN Proposed Development)
 - Greenhouse Gases and Climate Change (K3 and WKN Proposed Development)
 - Noise and Vibration (K3 and WKN Proposed Development)
 - Human health (K3 and WKN Proposed Development)
 - Ground contamination (WKN only)
 - Water Environment (WKN only)
 - Ecology (K3 and WKN Proposed Development)
 - Landscape and Visual Effects (WKN only)
 - Archaeology and heritage (WKN only)
 - Cumulative effects (K3 & WKN Proposed Development and other proposed or permitted development in the local area)
- 5.7 Where a particular environmental feature, or component of it, has not been included within an EIA, this is not to suggest that there will be no associated effects; rather that these are not considered to be among the potentially significant effects.

6.1 The EIA will assess a range of potentially significant environmental effects utilising the professional experience of a range of competent experts and the Scoping Opinion of the SoS and relevant consultees. The findings of the EIA will be presented in the final ES. The summary below provides a commentary on the assessments undertaken to date including the likely significant environmental effects envisaged (where possible at this stage), any mitigation measures proposed to reduce or offset these effects and the likely residual effects of the development on the environment. Members of the public are advised that this information is preliminary at this stage pending the full results of the assessments which will be provided in the final ES submitted with the application to the SoS. Please see the end of this document for information on how you can comment on this Preliminary Environmental Information and the final ES once submitted to the SoS.

What has been assessed?

- A scoping checklist of environmental features and their components was utilised to identify those aspects of the environment or components of them that have the potential to be subjected to likely significant environmental effects and therefore should be included in the EIA during the scoping process.
- A formal Scoping Opinion request, which included the results of the checklist assessment, was made to the SoS in August 2018 to agree the scope of the EIA in consultation with the relevant consultees i.e. KCC, the Environment Agency, Natural England etc.
- 6.4 The EIA will be produced in accordance with the SoS's formal Scoping Opinion and subsequent consultation undertaken during the completion of the EIA.

Method of assessment

- The specialist assessments follow generally similar methodologies. Desk and/or field studies will be undertaken to establish the existing situation at the site(s) and surrounding area. The effects of the K3 and WKN Proposed Developments are then established using a method that compares the sensitivity /importance of an aspect of the environment with the likely size of the predicted change to establish the degree of effect (negligible, slight, moderate, substantial, very substantial). Typically if an effect is determined to be of moderate significance or above then it is deemed to be a significant effect for the purpose of the EIA Regulations.
- The degree of an effect determines the resources that should be put in place to avoid or reduce an adverse effect. Where appropriate mitigation measures have been proposed to avoid/reduce a significant adverse effect. The significance of an effect with this mitigation in place is then re-assessed to determine its significance post mitigation.
- Any significant environmental effects remaining after mitigation are reported and represent the likely residual effects of the proposed development on the environment.
- 6.8 All methodologies are undertaken in accordance with current guidance and best practice.
- 6.9 A summary of the preliminary assessments of the specialist environmental topics is provided overleaf.

Traffic and Transport

- 6.10 There are no construction vehicle movements associated with K3 Proposed Development. During operation it is estimated that it will produce an average of 34 addional HGV deliveries per day as a result of the additional 107 tonnes of waste. There will be no additional operational staff.
- 6.11 WKN is estimated to produce an average of 125 HGV deliveries per day when operational; 50 staff over three shifts are expected to be employed when fully operational. During WKNs construction period there is expected to be a maximum of 45 HGV deliveries and 480 construction staff per day. The majority of construction and operational staff vehicle movements will not occur during the peak hours of the highway network.
- 6.12 K3 will be assessed for operation only and WKN will be assessed for both construction and operational scenarios. Additionally, a cumulative assessment will be undertaken to assess the impact of both developments. Access for the vehicles associated with the construction and operation of the two developments would be via the A429, Swale Way and Barge Way. Highway capacity assessments are being undertaken to determine the effect of these vehicle movements along the adjacent highway network.
- 6.13 There are currently approximately 20,000 vehicle movements per day along Swale way, 2,000 of which are HGVs. Thus, the traffic associated with the operation of the two developments represents only a small proportion of current traffic flows on the adjacent highway network (approximately 2%) and the relative change in traffic flows as a result of the vehicles would be difficult to perceive. The sensitivity of receptors along the adjacent highway network are deemed to be low / negligible and initial assessments indicate that the effect of the vehicles would be negligible.
- There is expected to be a number of abnormal and indivisible loads required to deliver large items of plant in connection with the construction of WKN. The escort and management requirements will be agreed with the highway authorities as part of obtaining permission to enable their movement on the highway via the Motor Vehicles (Authorisation of Special Use) General Order (HMSO,2003).

Air Quality

- The impacts of emissions from the K3 and WKN Proposed Development on human health and sensitive nature conservation sites in the local area will be assessed using an atmospheric dispersion model. This will include an assessment to determine a suitable stack height for WKN to ensure adequate dispersion of pollutants. Emissions will be modelled at the concentration limits in the Industrial Emissions Directive (IED). The predicted contributions will be added to existing background concentrations and the total pollutant concentration will then be compared with the relevant Environment Assessment Levels. The impact of K3 and WKN emissions will be also assessed individually. The models will be run for five years of hourly sequential meteorological (weather) data to allow the impacts to be assessed for a wide range of conditions. The cumulative impacts of K3, WKN and other cumulative projects will also be considered.
- 6.16 The impacts of traffic-related emissions from vehicles movements generated by the developments on human-health will be assessed.
- 6.17 Concentrations of nitrogen oxides, sulphur dioxide, ammonia, nutrient nitrogen deposition rates and acid deposition rates at the Swale Special Protection Area and Ramsar, Medway Estuary and Marshes Special Protection Area and Ramsar, Thames Estuary and Marshes Special Protection Area and Ramsar, Queensdown Warren Special Area of Conservation and Outer Thames Estuary Special Protection Area will also be predicted and compared with the relevant critical levels and loads.

6.18 Whilst still subject to the final assessment, it is likely that the air quality effects associated with emissions from K3/WKN will not be significant as the optimum stack height will be determined as part of the assessment.

Greenhouse Gases and Climate Change

- 6.19 The main impact on climate change from both the K3 Proposed Development and the WKN Proposed Development would be their direct greenhouse gas emissions when operational from combustion of waste.
- 6.20 The proposed changes to K3 would increase its efficiency (the amount of electricity generated per tonne of waste) and therefore reduce its greenhouse gas emissions intensity, i.e. reduce the amount of greenhouse gases emitted per megawatt-hour of electricity generated.
- 6.21 Operation of the WKN Proposed Development would cause greenhouse gas emissions from waste combustion, transport and pollutant control systems but would also avoid some greenhouse gas emissions from alternative waste treatment and energy generation sources that are replaced. The greenhouse gas emissions of the K3 and WKN Proposed Developments will be quantified in the Environmental Statement and set into the context of the UK's energy, waste and climate change policies to assess the net impact.
- 6.22 Over the course of the K3 and WKN Proposed Development's lifetime, changes in climate could also pose risks to it or could increase the vulnerability of other parts of the environment it affects, such as local ecosystems. The main risk is from flooding, which will be assessed in the Water Environment chapter of the Environmental Statement including a suitable precautionary allowance for increased rainfall in the future, following the Government's guidance on flood risk.

Noise and Vibration

- 6.23 Work on the noise and vibration assessment is underway. Survey data to establish baseline noise levels has been gathered from previous projects at the Site and is considered sufficient and representative without further baseline measurement.
- Noise and vibration during construction of the WKN Proposed Development will be controlled by adherence to an appropriate Construction Environmental Management Plan (CEMP) which will stipulate appropriate construction methods to minimise construction noise. There will be no construction working outside of the normal working hours as previously adopted for K3 without the express written permission of the local planning authority (Swale Borough Council).
- Noise levels are not anticipated to increase as a consequence of the K3 Proposed Development. A pro-rata estimation of the increase in associated vehicle movements suggests that any noise increase from waste vehicle movements would be less than 2 dB. Additional noise from the operational plant of WKN would be similar in character and magnitude to that from K3. Cumulative operational noise emissions from K3 and WKN will be controlled to acceptable levels in accordance with industry guidelines and World Health Organisation guidance, by selection of appropriate plant, by design and, where necessary, by acoustic mitigation.
- 6.26 The effects of noise on the ecology of the area will be considered within the ecology chapter, with appropriate noise predictions provided to the ecologist to inform their assessment.
- 6.27 Vibration during operation of the facility will be controlled at source, and off-site vibration is likely to be negligible. There would be no change to the existing K3 vibration emissions.

Human Health

- 6.28 The human health assessment will draw from and build upon outputs from the wider technical disciplines to assess the potential human health effects (both adverse and beneficial) that would be directly attributed to the proposed developments.
- 6.29 The approach and specific health assessment protocols applied are dependent on the nature, duration, magnitude and degree of community exposure to construction and operational activities and hazards which could potentially influence health.
- 6.30 The main health determinants considered within the assessment for the K3 Proposed Development comprise changes to air quality, transport and potentially some change in noise associated with waste deliveries to the site. Each health determinant will be assessed within a defined section of the ES to objective thresholds set to be protective of the environment and health; the Human Health chapter will then further assess the health determinants to set any potential risk in context.
- 6.31 The WKN Proposed Development requires construction and operation impacts to be considered. The health determinants to be assessed for both phases comprise changes in air quality, noise, transport and employment opportunities.
- 6.32 For both the K3 and WKN proposed developments, the significance of effect on human health will be considered in the context of a generally low socio-economic status in the area and comparably high allage all-cause mortality rate (i.e. local communities are considered relatively sensitive to both positive and negative changes in environmental and socio-economic conditions). At this stage, a preliminary assessment of each health determinant indicates that the magnitude of impact on local communities is not sufficient to quantify any measurable change in health outcomes. This is consistent with the Public Health England (formerly Health Protection Agency) position on Energy from Waste facilities (Health Protection Agency, 2010), and will be further tested within the final ES.

Landscape and Visual Effects

- 6.33 The K3 Proposed Development does not require any change to the built form or layout of the permitted scheme, therefore no adverse effects on landscape, townscape or visual resources are anticipated. The following section therefore focuses on the WKN Proposed Development. A preliminary Zone of Theoretical Visibility (ZTV) of the development has been generated to establish the study area based on preliminary scheme information.
- 6.34 Information on landscape, townscape and visual resources within the relevant study area has been collected through a detailed desktop review of existing studies and data sets and field-based surveys and analysis.
- 6.35 The WKN application site currently comprises laydown and parking areas for the construction of K3 and has been cleared of vegetation. Large scale industrial buildings and chimneys at the DS Smith Paper Mill form the western and southern site boundaries, separate the location from the residential districts of Sittingbourne. This urban area is defined as the Sittingbourne Industrial Commercial townscape character area. The Industrial/commercial character area has a poor quality and condition due to the extensive industrial buildings and infrastructure and the presence of disused and derelict land resulting in a low value. There are no designated landscapes which lie within the site area.
- 6.36 The site is currently not visible in views from the majority of the settlement of Sittingbourne due to industrial development on the edge of the town and the restored landfill mound to the south. To

the east of the site the channel of the Swale and low- lying landscape of the Isle of Sheppey allow more open, longer distance views. Key receptors of potentially high sensitivity and susceptibility to change in view as a result of the proposals include walkers using the Saxon Shore Way long distance footpath (ZU1/2) beside the Swale and Milton Creek. The greatest number of visual receptors with views towards the site would be the occupants of vehicles travelling on Swale Way.

- 6.37 Twelve candidate viewpoint locations have been defined and photography undertaken to inform the visual impact assessment. Viewpoints have been agreed through consultation with Kent County Council/Swale Borough Council.
- 6.38 The new buildings and infrastructure which form the proposed WKN, although large in scale, would form an extension of the existing character of neighbouring development at DS Smith. The townscape character of the site would be of low sensitivity to change through development. Significant adverse effects on townscape character during construction or operation during the day or at night, would be unlikely.
- 6.39 The surrounding landscape character areas of the Swale and Isle of Sheppey are generally in good condition and have an intrinsically high value. There would be no direct effects on these rural and wild landscapes and their sensitivity to change through the indirect influence of the new WKN would be medium or low. Significant adverse effects on these landscape character areas during construction or operation during the day or at night would also be unlikely due to the similar nature of the proposals to the established industrial context.
- There are unlikely to be any significant adverse effects during construction and operation on views gained by visual receptors at individual locations within the study area as a result of the proposals. The proposed buildings and structures would generally be visible in front of or in the backdrop of existing large scale industrial buildings at the paper mill. The tops of flue stacks are likely to be the only visible element, beside other stacks in views from the south and west. There will be no locations where new industrial buildings or structures at the proposal site would be seen in a view that does not already contain views of large areas of existing industry.
- 6.41 There is the potential for significant sequential effects on walkers using the Saxon Shore Way long distance path which follows the coastline and estuary landform within a valued and designated landscape, passing relatively close to the proposed WKN. Receptors would have the opportunity to gain a series of views of the development for a distance of several kilometres as part of a walk, leading to the potential for an accumulation of effects which may be significant. Further assessment work will be undertaken to establish the potential for these significant effects.

Biodiversity

- The effect of the K3 and WKN Proposed Developments on ecology will be assessed following goodpractice guidelines (Chartered Institute of Ecology and Environmental Management 2018) along with PINS Advice Note 10: Habitats Regulations Assessment Relevant to Nationally Significant Infrastructure Projects. The 2 km area surrounding the proposed WKN/K3 site includes the following designated sites:
 - The Swale Special Protection Area (SPA), Ramsar and Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI)
 - The Swale Marine Conservation Zone (MCZ);
 - Elmley Island National Nature Reserve (NNR); and
 - Milton Creek Local Wildlife Site (LWS).

- 6.43 Further internationally-designated sites within 10 km of the site boundary:
 - Medway Estuary and Marshes SPA, Ramsar;
 - Thames Estuary and Marshes SPA, Ramsar;
 - Outer Thames Estuary SPA; and
 - Queendown Warren Special Area of Conservation (SAC).
- The K3 Proposed Development has the potential to change the emissions, and hence potential effects from gaseous concentrations of oxides of nitrogen, ammonia, sulphur dioxide as well as deposition of both nutrient nitrogen and acid on nearby designated sites. Effects from emissions to air on these sites will be assessed following Environment Agency guidelines and using data from the Air Pollution Information System (APIS) website to define the site-relevant critical loads/critical load functions, as appropriate.
- 5.45 The WKN site is currently under temporary use as the laydown for K3. Although the WKN site currently benefits from permission to construct an Incinerator Bottom Ash (IBA) Facility which has elements of habitat creation associated with it, this will not now be constructed. Therefore, upon completion of K3, the original intention was to restore it back to rough grassland, scrub and rubble piles (i.e. the habitats it comprised pre-development). Extensive survey data exists from the original K3 application that included the WKN site demonstrating that the site supported reptiles, the nationally-rare plant annual-beard grass (also an interest feature of The Swale and Medway Estuary and Marshes Ramsar sites) and various species of breeding birds. On this basis, therefore, the ecological baseline for the WKN site will be the restored habitat of grassland, scrub and rubble piles.
- A large area of reedbed lies to the immediate north of the development site/south of the laydown area which has been used by breeding marsh harrier every year (surveys have been undertaken 2009, 2012, 2016 & 2018). During the original K3 application, there was sufficient uncertainty regarding the effects of construction activity on the marsh harrier that, in discussion with Natural England and the Royal Society for the Protection of Birds (RSPB), it was agreed that a new 1 ha reedbed would be created at Harty Fen on the Isle of Sheppey such that, should marsh harrier abandon the Kemsley reedbed due to construction disturbance, there would be alternative breeding habitat available nearby. The reedbed was built in 2011 and handed over to the RSPB in 2012.
- 6.47 The proposed laydown area comprises bare, made ground with an area of dense scrub and small patches of rough grassland. Surveys of the grassland for reptiles are being undertaken in autumn 2018. Initial results indicate a small population of common lizards is present in this area. The construction of WKN will result in the loss of the grassland/scrub/rubble habitat under the footprint of the building and associated infrastructure with associated effects on the fauna and flora these support. Once built, power generating stations such as K3 and WKN do not produce significant noise nor do they result in significant visual/activity disturbance with the majority of activities taking place within sealed buildings. There may be construction disturbance effects, however, particularly to The Swale SPA/ Ramsar/SSSI and associated sites. These will be avoided/mitigated through appropriate timing of works and the use of visual screens, as described for the original K3 application.
- 6.48 Since there is some overlap between the WKN and K3 sites, a comprehensive ecology mitigation strategy, updating that already produced as part of the original K3 application would be produced. This will set out the new areas of habitat creation associated with the WKN site, in addition to those already established for K3. It will provide details of both creation and on-going management/monitoring and describe how the development will deliver a net gain for biodiversity.

Ground Conditions

- 6.49 The ground conditions of the K3 site were assessed as part of the original application for the facility and addressed by virtue of planning conditions attached to that permission which have been discharged. In the absence of any change in built form associated with the K3 Proposed Development there is no potential for further ground condition related effects.
- 6.50 The effect of the proposed WKN development will be assessed following UK best practice, principally based around the Environment Agency and DEFRA document 'CLR11 Model Procedures for the Management of Land Contamination'. It is anticipated that, although the WKN site is located adjacent to the wider Paper Mill site since the 1930s, any contamination present at the site associated with the mills industrial history will be limited in extent. The Ground Conditions Chapter of the EIA will primarily focus on the potential for contamination to be present within the WKN development area and to determine potential effects of contamination, if present, to impact on human health, local groundwater and surface water resources and on the local sensitive ecological receptors.
- 6.51 The shallow geological stratum underlying the site is generally of a low sensitivity with regard to groundwater contamination, however the study will include an assessment of the potential effects during the construction and operation of the waste to energy plant might have on groundwater quality.
- 6.52 The nearby Swale and Milton Creek are both sensitive receptors both in terms of surface water quality and as nature conservation areas and the study will therefore include an assessment of potential effects the construction and operation of the waste to energy plant might have on these receptors.
- 6.53 It is anticipated that through the implementation of industry best practice methodologies during and post construction, impacts on human health, groundwater, surface water and sensitive ecological receptors are likely to be minimal.

Water Environment

- 6.54 The flood risk and drainage strategy for the K3 facility as permitted was assessed as part of the original application for the development. In the absence of any change to the quantum of the impermeable surface of the site and no proposed changes to the drainage regime there is no potential for further significant effects associated with the K3 Proposed Development.
- The effect of the WKN Proposed Development will be assessed following UK best practice, Institute of Environmental Management and Assessment (IEMA) Guidelines for Environmental Impact Assessment (2004) and the Design Manual for Roads and Bridges (DMRB), Volume 11, Part 10, (November 2009). Whilst the DMRB is not specific to the assessment of hydrology and flood risk, it provides an accepted approach to the assessment of development impacts. In addition, the assessment has been undertaken in line with National, Regional and Local planning policy requirements.
- 6.56 Determination of the baseline conditions at the application site has been established through a review of literature and data from publicly available sources including; the EA, British Geological Survey (BGS). Medway Drainage Board, and Kent County Council (KCC).
- 6.57 The Water Environment Chapter of the EIA will primarily focus on flood risk and the potential impacts on water quality and quantity as a consequence of the Proposed Development during the construction, operation and decommissioning phases.

- 6.58 The tidally dominated Swale is approximately 50 m to the east at closest orientation to the Proposed Development and has been classified by the EA as the main risk of flooding.
- 6.59 A comparison between EA flood model outputs and the profiled site ground level indicates that the entire Proposed Development lies within Flood Zone 1 (FZ1), with low probability of flooding (assessed as Land having a less than 1 in 1,000 annual probability of river or sea flooding). The construction access road is located within Flood Zone 3 (FZ3), and has a 'high' probability of tidal flooding.
- 6.60 The nearby Swale and Milton Creek are both sensitive receptors both in terms of surface water quality and as nature conservation areas, therefore the study will include an assessment of potential effects construction and operation of the Proposed Development might have on these receptors.
- 6.61 It is anticipated that through the implementation of industry best practice methodologies and appropriate drainage measures during construction, operation and later decommissioning phase, impacts on flooding and surface water, and interrelated sensitive ecological receptors are likely to be slight and not significant.

Archaeology and Heritage

- 6.62 The K3 Proposed Development will not require any changes to the built form or layout of the K3 facility as permitted and therefore no likely significant effects on archaeology and built heritage will result from the K3 Proposed Development.
- 6.63 A desk assessment undertaken in connection with the WKN Proposed Development has revealed that there are no statutorily designated heritage assets (e.g. Scheduled Monuments, Listed Buildings) within the application site.
- The closest designated asset is Castle Rough, a Scheduled Monument (SM) (HER number TQ96NW10, list entry number 1013368). The SM is located some 460 metres southwest of the proposal site. It is low lying and not visible from any distance away. The closest listed building to the built part of the proposed development is Little Murston Farmhouse, located some 1.4 kilometres southeast of the proposal site and listed at Grade II (list entry number 1061035). There are a number of other designated assets within the study area. There is no evidence that the proposed development would have a significant effect on any of them.
- Recent archaeological work in the area, including on the Sittingbourne Northern Relief Road, has indicated that the higher ground of the Kemsley Ridge has the potential to contain remains from the prehistoric through to the medieval periods, with further activity taking place in the lower lying marshlands now represented by areas of alluvium. There is also the potential for remains from later periods. No archaeological remains were observed on the surface within the proposal site, part of which has recently been used as a laydown area.
- The nature of the 20th century land-use within the proposal site and the associated ground disturbance suggest that the potential for the survival of previously unidentified sub-surface archaeological remains of national importance, or of sufficient importance to warrant preservation in situ, is unlikely. It is likely that any archaeological deposits within the proposed construction footprint have been damaged, possibly removed, and that the potential for the survival of archaeological remains is low.

7 CUMULATIVE EFFECTS

- 7.1 Schedule 4 of the EIA Regulations states that an ES should provide a description of the likely significant effects of the development on the environment resulting from inter alia -
 - 5(e) The cumulation of effects with other existing and/or approved projects, taking into account any existing environmental problems relating to area of particular environmental importance likely to be affected or the use of natural resources.
- 7.2 Cumulative effects can occur where more than one individual impact may lead to a more significant effect when considered in combination. The ES will therefore consider the potential cumulative effects of the K3 and WKN Proposed Development in combination with other developments within the local area.
- 7.3 All large-scale development within 3km of the site(s) and all large energy, industrial and mixed-use schemes for the purposes of the air quality and landscape and visual impacts (i.e. of a similar type to the proposed development and therefore most likely to result in significant effects) within 10km of the site(s) have been identified for assessment in the ES. This includes sites subject to planning applications and relevant allocations in Swale Borough Council's development plan. A list of these developments is provided below and their location identified on Figures 9 and 10.
 - 1. SW/11/1291 Anaerobic digester and associated ground profiling and landscaping.
 - 2. SW/14/0224 Solar farm, comprising the erection of solar arrays of photovoltaic panels, inverter and transformer sheds, fencing, site storage cabin, combined DNO and EPC switchgear housing, internal gravel access road, and associated equipment.
 - 3. 14/500327/OUT Up to 8000m2 of Class B1 and B2 floor space and all necessary supporting infrastructure including roads, parking, open space, amenity landscaping, biodiversity enhancement and buffer to proposed extension to Milton Creek Country Park. Detailed approval for Phase 1 including (i) vehicular and pedestrian access to Swale Way; (ii) 30 space (approximately) informal car park to serve extension to Milton Creek Country Park; Change of use of approximately 13.31 ha of Kemsley Marshes as an extension to Milton Creek Country Park with footpath connections to the proposed informal car park
 - 4. 14/501181/COUNTY KCC Regulation 13 Scoping opinion as to the scope of an environmental impact assessment for a proposed combined heat and power plant at Ridham B
 - 5. 15/500348/COUNTY Install advance thermal conversion and energy facility at Kemsley Fields Business Park to produce energy and heat, including construction of new buildings to house thermal conversion and energy generation plant and equipment; construction of associated offices; erection of external plant including storage tanks; and erection of discharge stack (KCC planning application KCC/SW/0010/2015 refers).
 - 6. 15/510589/OUT Outline application for access matters reserved for construction of Business Park (Use Classes B1(B), B1(C), B2 and B8) (research and development, light industrial, general industrial and storage or distribution) (up to a maximum of 46,600sqm), including associated accesses (including alterations to existing northern relief road), parking and servicing areas, landscaping, bunds, surface water storage areas, and related development.
 - 7. 16/501228/FULL Construction of a new baling plant building within an existing waste paper storage yard.

7 CUMULATIVE EFFECTS

Wheelabrator Technologies is seeking the public's views on its proposals for a power upgrade and tonnage throughput increase for Wheelabrator Kemsley (K3) and for a new waste-to-energy facility, called Wheelabrator Kemsley North (WKN).

Wheelabrator Kemsley (K3) was granted planning permission in 2012 and is now under construction, with the facility expected to be operational by late 2019.

We consulted with the public in 2017 regarding proposals for a power upgrade which would allow K3 to operate more efficiently to generate an increased amount of clean, renewable baseload electricity.

Since that consultation, we have been reviewing our options for the site. Alongside the power upgrade proposal, we will now be seeking consent for the K3 facility to process additional waste each year.

We are proposing to construct a new wasteto-energy facility which would be called Wheelabrator Kemsley North (WKN). WKN would be located on the land immediately adjacent to K3.

Before we submit our application, which we expect to be in Spring 2019, we are seeking views from local residents and businesses.

This leaflet explains how you can find out more and make your views known. The consultation period will take place between Thursday 1st November and Thursday 10th January 2019. We look forward to explaining our proposals to you.

What do our proposals involve?

K3 Power Upgrade

K3 currently has consent to generate up to 49.9MW gross clean, renewable baseload electrical output, enough to power over 100,000 homes, by processing up to 550,000 tonnes of post-recycled waste per year.

The proposed upgrade would enable the facility to generate up to 75MW gross clean, renewable baseload electrical output and would be achieved by optimising the efficiency of the existing technology within the facility, allowing it to deliver higher amounts of clean, renewable baseload energy without altering its basic design or size. The additional clean, renewable baseload energy generated through the power upgrade would be sufficient to power more than 52,000 homes.

K3 Tonnage Throughput increase

This would permit K3 to process an additional 107,000 tonnes of post-recycled waste each year in the event that there is an increase in the amount of time K3 can operate between routine maintenance. This will also allow us operational flexibility to manage the waste received.

WKN

WKN would be a new single line waste-toenergy facility capable of generating up to 42MW gross clean, renewable baseload electrical output by processing up to 390,000 tonnes of post-recycled waste per year. Alongside K3, WKN would also provide clean, renewable baseload electricity to the national grid. WKN will be designed to ensure optimal operational efficiency across the K3 and WKN facilities.

The WKN facility would be constructed immediately adjacent to the existing K3 facility. WKN would be capable of producing enough clean, renewable baseload energy to power more than 87,000 homes. Together, K3 and WKN would be capable of generating enough clean, renewable baseload electricity to power more than 240,000 homes.

Both the K3 proposal (power upgrade and tonnage throughput increase) and the WKN facility will require a Development Consent Order (DCO) from the Secretary of State.

Even before construction on its waste-to-energy plant at Kemsley is completed, power company Wheelabrator Technologies is looking to expand the site.

But more than that, the company is planning a complete a new second one next door.

The firm was granted permission for its first plant next to the Kemsley Paper Mill, known as Wheelabrator Kemsley (K3), back in 2012.

Building work is under way, having started in August 2016, with an opening date set for next year. That plant was to provide a gross electric output of 49.9 megawatts (MW).

Now the company wants to expand that plant to increase production by more than half to

In addition, it wants to build a new plant to be known as Kemsley North (WKN) with a generating capacity of 42MW.

The firm says that between them the plants would produce enough clean energy produced from waste to power more than 240,000 homes.


At the same, it will be diverting from landfill more than one million tonnes each year of post-recycled waste - that is waste from which all the recyclable elements have already been removed.

The waste will be driven to the plant in large lorries and refuse collection vehicles.

Wheelabrator Technologies will be holding three public exhibitions to allow residents to meet the project team and find out more about the proposals.

The company, which has 23 'power-producing assets' in the United States and the UK, is applying for permission under a Development Consent Order - a

The plans also propose a 50-hec-


tare country park, based around the historic Binbury motte and bailey castle.

Contractors on town's regeneration project pull up cable Beer with us...Pub has to

close after losing power

Publican Malcolm Winskill is wringing his hands.

He has already seen business at his Fountain of Ale pub plummet as a result of the lengthy Sittingbourne town centre regeneration works. But on Thursday his power was cut off causing him to close the pub completely and lose half-a-day's business.

He said: "The roadworks have had a drastic effect on us. People just haven't been able to get to the pub.

"Then to have someone dig through our electric cables is just too much."

Mr Winskill had to call out UK Power Networks to affect a cure after contractors lifting out a tree



The pub is already facing disruption from roadworks

pulled up his power cable. UK Power Networks was able to restore his supply around 5pm.

He said: "We are a fledgling business. We only opened in July last year, but year-on-year our takings are 20% down, which is a disaster."

The regeneration project is

being carried out by a consortium called Spirit of Sttingbourne, which includes Swale Borough Council and a number of developers.

A Spirit of Sittingbourne spokesman said: "While removing a tree stump as part of our regeneration works, our contractors uncovered an electric cable running through the stump.

"UK Power Networks came onto the site and assisted with the removal of the stump in a controlled operation to disconnect the cable, mistakingly believing the cable powered local street lights.

"The cable was not expected to have powered local properties, and there was therefore no advanced warning of the disconnect. We sincerely apologise for any inconvenience caused by this localised cut in power."

Meanwhile, the Spirit spokesman said traffic lights which replace the former station roundabout in St Michael's Road have been installed and are working.

The £57 million town centre

regeneration of Sittingbourne will eventually see a multiplex cinema, restaurants, hotel, multi-storey car park, new homes and shops. A new public square will link the new additions and it's hoped 400,000 visitors will come to the town every year.

Five sites failing air quality tests

Air quality in five key points across the borough remains below acceptable standards, Swale Borough Council has learnt. But there is hope for the future.

The council currently tests the quality of the air at five locations: East Street and St Paul's in Sittingbourne, plus sites at Newington, Teynham and Ospringe.

A recent report showed all five exceeded the annual average concentrations permitted for nitrogen dioxide by as much as 54% in the case of East Street. The nearest to complying with the national standard is Newington, where the 51 receptors showed an average exceedance of 8%.

However, there is good news down the road.

Modelling work carried out by independent consultants Phlorum used new traffic data, having allowed for the borough's Local Plan. It predicts the amount of pollutants at all five locations will decline over time, and that by 2020 three of the five will be below permitted levels, with pollution at the two remaining areas of East Street and Ospringe also much reduced.

But the council said it wants to make "a clear statement that we cannot wait for improvements that will come naturally from reductions in vehicle emissions."

So it has prepared an Air Quality Action Plan. Many of the measures it wants to see adopted will fall under the remit of Kent County Council. They include a new HGV "clean air corridor" and a Swale Freight Management Plan, with a key action being better enforcement of parking restrictions at key pinchpoints on the A2 to reduce congestion.

But other measures will be in Swale's gift including setting up a car share club, finding better ways of enforcing travel plans on new developments, providing more electric vehicle charging points, and considering the possibility of using the taxi and bus licence system to encourage more green vehicles.

The plan is expected to be approved today (Wednesday).

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

The three rooms to be occupied by the President were intended for the exclusive use of the Kaiser or any member of the Imperial German family who-might honour the Hamburg-America Line with his patronage, and though never actually occupied by a Hohenzollern, except for one night in port in Germany, they were known as the "Kaiser's Suite." Fifty luxurious State rooms have been prepared for members of the Presidential party, and the powerful radio installation will keep the ship in constant touch with both sides of the Atlantic.

THE PEACE CONFERENCE

Opinions regarding the President's Speech to Congress are largely influenced by political sympathies, but there seems no gainsaying that the assemblage was not very enthusiastic, and that those of his friends who looked for a sensational speech were disappointed. The President has taken considerable risk in determining to go to Europe to explain his fourteen points, and there is a disposition to withhold final judgment on the wisdom of the step until the actual results of the forthcoming Peace Conference in the way of agreements relating to reparation from the enemy, and, more particularly, as to safeguards for the future peace of the world, which Americans naturally hold to be more important than anything.

In view of the President's expressed conviction that his presence is desirable abroad, there is no tendency here to criticise him unduly for failing to agree with the general opinion of his countrymen that his presence is more important at home, but considerable displeasure is expressed by the Republicans that, military reasons being absent, the President failed to take Congress fully into his confidence regarding his plans, terminating with a proposal to the legislators that, with his programme outlined, they should vote upon his propositions.

The American delegates at the Peace Conference will not be left entirely free if the resolution introduced by the Republican Senator Knox is adopted, which permits the Senators to lay their opinions before the Peace Commissioners "for their information and guidance." Mr. Knox's resolution is regarded as the opening gun of a fight to confine President Wilson to a discussion of the best means of concluding peace. It forbids American delegates from discussing freedom of the seas and the League of Nations, on the ground that such matters can be left to the future, when peace has been concluded.

I write on behalf of Wheelabrator Technologies Inc. (WTI), who intend to apply to the Secretary of State under Section 37 of the Planning Act 2008 ("the Act") for a Development Consent Order (DCO) relating to the K3 and WKN waste-to-energy facilities in Kemsley, Sittingbourne, Kent.

DHA, on behalf of WTI, carried out S42 consultation regarding the K3 and WKN proposals in November/December 2018. Further consultation is now being carried out to clarify that consent is being sought in respect of K3 for the construction of a 75MW generating station, in circumstances where that generating station has already been constructed as a 49.9MW generating station under a planning permission granted under the Town and Country Planning Act 1990.

This letter explains the context behind this reconsultation and how comments can be made.

K3

WTI are currently constructing the Wheelabrator Kemsley waste-to-energy facility (K3), which was granted planning permission in 2012, on land at Kemsley, to the north of Sittingbourne in Kent. K3 currently has consent to process up to 550,000 tonnes of waste per annum and has a consented generating capacity 49.9MW.

WTI have identified that the generating capacity of K3 can be increased to 75MW through internal alterations to optimise plant efficiency and that the facility is able to process an additional 107,000 tonnes of post-recycled waste per annum.

The 2018 consultation and publicity sought views from interested parties on an application for consent for that power upgrade and increased tonnage throughput, without any construction works being required.

However in order for the K3 project to be properly categorised and consented under the Planning Act 2008 the applicant is now required to seek consent for the construction of K3 at its total generating capacity of 75MW (49.9MW consented + 25.1MW upgrade), together with the separate proposed total tonnage throughput of 657,000 tonnes per annum (550,000 consented + 107,000 tonnage increase).

As the K3 facility is currently being constructed and will be operational by the end of 2019, the effect in reality of the proposed application would remain the K3 facility generating an additional 25.1MW together with being able to process an additional 107,000 tonnes of waste per year.

WKN

As part of the same DCO application WTI are seeking development consent for the construction and operation of a new waste-to-energy facility, 'Wheelabrator Kemsley North' (WKN), on land adjacent to K3.

The proposals in respect of WKN remain the same as those consulted on in November/December 2018. WKN would have a gross electrical generation capacity of 42MW and be capable of processing up to 390,000 tonnes of post-recycled waste per annum. The Secretary of State for Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy issued a direction on 27th June 2018 that the WKN development is nationally significant and is therefore to be treated as a development for which development consent is required.

S42 Consultation

Section 42 of The Act requires the applicant to consult various prescribed bodies and statutory undertakers about the proposed application, together with directly affected and adjoining local authorities. For the purposes of the consultation under Section 42 the following documents are provided on the enclosed USB:

- The Preliminary Environmental Information Report, which provides a non-technical summary of the ES for consultation purposes and which explains the approach being taken to the K3 and WKN application;
- A draft Plan set to illustrate the location and extent of the proposed development, including Site Location Plans, Key Works Key Plans and plans/drawings illustrating the design and scale of K3 and WKN;
- The draft Development Consent Order being prepared to accompany the application.

The documents are also available at the project website: https://www.wtikemsley.co.uk/ Hard copies of the application documents are available on request for a reasonable charge, via the contact details below. Any representations or responses received will be reported within the Consultation Report submitted as part of the DCO application.

As the proposed development requires Environmental Impact Assessment the applicant is required, by Regulation 13 of the Infrastructure Planning (Environmental Impact Assessment) Regulations 2017 ("the EIA Regulations"), to send prescribed consultees a copy of the notice



publicising the proposed application under S48 of The Act. This Section 48 Notice is therefore enclosed and will be placed in the Sittingbourne News Extra, Sheerness Times Guardian, Medway Messenger, the Gazette and the Daily Telegraph.

Thank you for consulting Natural England on the following documents submitted for the consultation under Section 42:

- 1. The latest draft of the Development Consent Order;
- 2. The latest drafts of the Environmental Statement chapters;
- 3. The Preliminary Environmental Information Report;

Natural England has considered the latest documents submitted against the range of our interests in the natural environment. As such, our comments focus mainly on ecology, air quality, water quality, hydrology, and disturbance (noise, light and visual) to ecological receptors. This letter addresses the points raised in our DAS response letter from Alison Giacomelli dated 10th January 2019.

It is Natural England view that the points raised in the response have been addressed by the additional information provided in the latest draft Environmental Chapters. Based on the presumption that there is no overlap between the construction of the K3 and the WKN facilities.

Should the timeline for the K3 construction slip and subsequently overlap with the WKN construction then K3 can no longer be considered part of the baseline but should be reassessed as part of an updated in combination assessment.

This will also be covered by the statement of common ground to be agreed at a later date.

Wheelabrator Kemsley Generating Station (K3) and Wheelabrator Kemsley North (WKN) Waste to Energy Facility DCO

Thank you for contacting us on 27 July 2019 regarding a proposed application for a Development Consent Order (DCO).

The proposed DCO relates to a new consent under the Planning Act 2008 for the revised electricity generating capacity for energy-from-waste facility K3 (granted planning permission at a lower capacity by Kent County Council in 2012) and for Wheelabrator Kemsley North (WKN), a proposed new energy-from-waste facility, which would be located immediately adjacent to K3.

We wrote to you on 16th January 2017 (our ref: PA00460255) regarding an EIA screening/scoping opinion in relation to a power upgrade of K3, Kemsley Generating Station. In that letter, we recommended that this application should be supported by a thorough assessment of the potential impacts of the scheme upon the Historic Environment.

We said that the proposed development is likely to be visible across a large area and could, as a result, affect the significance of heritage assets at some distance. In particular, we drew your attention to the presence of Castle Rough scheduled monument (National Heritage List no 1013368), which lies c.500m south-south west of the proposed development site, noting that it may be inter-visible with the proposed buildings.

This development could, potentially, have an impact upon designated heritage assets and their settings in the area around the site. In line with the advice in the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF), we expect the Preliminary Environmental Information Report (PEIR) to contain a thorough assessment of the likely effects that the proposed development might have upon those elements which contribute to the significance of these assets.







The PEIR (dated July 2019) gives insufficient regard to setting-related effects in relation to individual assets. There is no record of whether the Historic England guidance on setting assessment has been followed. Castle Rough Scheduled Monument is described as "not visible from any distance away"; however, no consideration is evidenced as to whether the proposed development, when constructed, would be visible from the asset. There are listed buildings to the east that may experience the proposed development in long views; however, no consideration of those possible views or the nature of the assets' significance and whether it might be affected has been presented in the PEIR.

The PEIR and 2018 draft Environmental Statement and Desk Based Assessment discuss the presence of known heritage assets and include a figure indicating their location, but do not assess the significance of those known assets or present information about them in a clearly readable, tabulated form, such as a gazetteer. There is no evidence provided that the Significance Criteria described in the 2018 draft Environmental Statement have been used. These are standard practices which we would expect to see in the Environmental Statement. Their absence leads to the risk that an insufficiently robust understanding of the significance of the historic environment is demonstrated.

Historic England advice

Significance

The closest designated heritage asset to the proposed development is Castle Rough (National Heritage List Entry no. 1013368), a medieval moated settlement site, consisting of a waterlogged moat defining an island on which the buildings of a manor would have stood. Moated sites form a significant class of medieval monument and are important for understanding the distribution of wealth and status in the countryside, being interpreted as prestigious aristocratic and seigneurial residences. Castle Rough is a site of particular importance because although its medieval buildings no longer exist above ground, most of the remainder of the site survives intact to a great extent. This has preserved a wide range of features in addition to the moat itself, including a barbican gate, which has not been identified at any other Kent moated site. The moat and interior island have considerable archaeological potential for the recovery of settlement evidence, organic artefacts, and for retrieval of evidence of the environment in which the monument was constructed.

The significance of the moated site is further informed not only by the physical evidence within the immediate settlement area, but also by an understanding of the rural or semi-rural surroundings in which it would have been constructed and used. Although much industrial development has taken place in the wider landscape surrounding Castle Rough, the site currently sits within a pocket of green-space, separated from the industrial activity on the Kemsley ridge by the natural valley topography and the immediate surrounding green space to the west. It is also buffered







by the Kemsley marshes to the east. The historic function and position of Castle Rough, at the interface between the valley uplands, the marshes, and estuary beyond, can therefore still be interpreted and understood.

Several listed buildings also have settings within which the proposed development may be perceptible. These include the Grade II listed buildings 'Kingshill Farmhouse' (National Heritage List Entry No. 1258073) and 'Barn Adjoining Cattle Shed Immediately North of Kings Hill Farmhouse' (National Heritage List Entry no. 1243080). These eighteenth-century historic buildings are located approximately 1.8km to the north-east of the proposed development, across flat marshland and The Swale. Similarly, another eighteenth-century Grade II listed building, 'Little Murston Farmhouse' (National Heritage List Entry no. 1061035) is located approximately 1.4km across low-lying ground to the south-west. The significance of these assets, and the interests that contribute to that significance, are not explained in the PEIR or 2018 draft ES and DBA.

Impact

It is our view that, as reported, this application has potential to result in harm to the significance of designated heritage assets, including a scheduled monument and Grade II listed buildings, primarily through changes to their setting. The harm would relate to the construction of large modern buildings within views from those assets. We note, however, that the evidence base presented in relation to setting and views lacks detail, and that full assessment and reporting would establish whether any harm would take place.

The PEIR refers to an impact assessment of setting-related impacts that was carried out prior to the Environmental Statement published in 2010. It should be noted that this assessment was carried out prior to production of Historic England's guidance on setting and as such should be revisited as part of this application.

Policy

Under the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) it is a core planning principle to conserve heritage assets in a manner appropriate to their significance, so that they can be enjoyed for their contribution to the quality of life of existing and future generations (para.184 NPPF). When considering the impact of a proposed development on the significance of a designated heritage asset, great weight should be given to the asset's conservation. No other planning concern is given a greater sense of importance in the NPPF. The more important the asset, the greater the weight should be (para.193 NPPF).

Significance can be harmed or lost through alteration or destruction of the heritage asset or development within its setting. As heritage assets are an irreplaceable resource, any harm or loss should require clear and convincing justification (para.194 NPPF). The onus is therefore on you to rigorously test the necessity of any harmful







works.

You should aim to achieve sustainable development, seeking economic, social and environmental gains jointly and simultaneously through the planning system. The planning system should play an active role in guiding development to sustainable solutions. (para.9 NPPF). Achieving sustainable development involves contributing to protecting and enhancing our natural, built and historic environment (para.8 NPPF). Your authority should therefore also seek to improve proposals so that they avoid or minimise harm to the significance of designated heritage assets, whether through changes to the asset or to its setting.

Any harm or loss should require clear and convincing justification. An application should demonstrate that all less harmful alternatives have been carefully considered. If a proposal cannot be amended to avoid all harm, and the harm is less than substantial, this can be weighed against the public benefits of the proposal (para.196 NPPF).

The significance of a heritage asset is determined not only by the physical fabric of a place but also by its appearance, its associations with other places and its relationship with its surroundings. Setting is the surroundings in which an asset is experienced and it embraces all of the surroundings in which the asset can be experienced. Historic England's recommended approach to assessing the effect of development within the setting of heritage assets can be found at the following web address:

Position

It is our view that the PEIR provides insufficient information regarding the significance of the heritage assets, and historic environment in general, in the vicinity of the proposed development. In addition, the PEIR provides insufficient information to provide a robust understanding of the likely effects of the proposed development on the setting and views of heritage assets.

If it is found that the proposed development would result in harm to any heritage assets, opportunities should be sought to deliver benefits to the historic environment, to mitigate that harm.

Recommendation

We may be in a position to support the application if the following actions were satisfactorily undertaken:

1. The Environmental Statement and supporting documents should provide an







assessment of the significance of the assets within the study areas, and justify those assessments with baseline information and descriptions, and present that information in an accessible format (i.e. a gazetteer).

2. An appraisal of the effect of the development on the setting of assets within the study areas should be undertaken and reported on in the Environmental Statement and supporting documents, in accordance with Step 1 of Historic England's guidance on the setting of heritage assets. Following that, a full description and impact assessment should be carried out, and reported, for any assets whose settings are capable of being affected by the proposed development in any way.

Re: Proposed application by Wheelabrator Technologies Inc. for a Development Consent Order – The Wheelabrator Kemsley (K3) Generating Station and Wheelabrator Kemsley North (WKN) Waste to Energy Facility, Sittingbourne, Kent

In introducing itself, Minster-on-Sea Parish Council on the Isle of Sheppey in Kent, is the closest elected tier of local government to the community representing the interests of approximately 17,000 residents. To summarise its position, the Parish Council has serious concerns about this application and it asks that you recommend refusal of Wheelabrator Technologies Inc.'s application for a Development Consent Order (DCO) on the following grounds: -

Firstly, the impact on traffic flow is important. The Swale Way / A249 dumbbell roundabout (known as the Grovehurst roundabout)) is currently regularly gridlocked at extended peak periods with queues stretching back to the Swale Way / Barge Way Roundabout and at times as far back as the DS Smith main entrance for over half a mile. The Swale Way / A249 dumbbell roundabout is at the evening peak, for traffic that is travelling northbound on the A249 wanting to access the Grovehurst Roundabout is regularly queued back onto the A249 main carriageway which also presents as a serious safety hazard.

Allowing this application would be in direct conflict with Highways England advice that it will not support any further significant sources of traffic generation (on the A249 corridor) until the Stockbury M2 / A249 Junction 5 upgrade is completed (Taken from Planning Reference: 17/505711/: Land at Wises Lane, Borden, Kent ME10 1GD also Planning Ref: 19/501921/FULL: Land At Belgrave Road Halfway Kent ME12 3EE and press article

https://www.kentonline.co.uk/sheerness/news/roads-chiefs-put-brakes-on-plans-for-new-

housing-206252/ Furthermore, there is no consideration in its review of committed developments of the enormous Aldi Southern Region Distribution Centre which is now operational and providing the requirements for 120 Aldi stores throughout the south and southeast. (An Aldi store on average has 3 HGV Aldi deliveries per day noting that 100% of this HGV traffic will pass through the Stockbury M2 / A249 Junction 5.) Neither does it consider the Morrisons' Warehouse which is alleged to accept a vehicle every two minutes.

Secondly, the impact on the Grovehurst Roundabout which is a single carriageway dumbbell roundabout will be substantial. This is because it has a lower capacity than a single lane circular roundabout and half the capacity of a two- lane circular roundabout. (The capacity of a roundabout varies based on entry angle, lane width, and the number of entry and circulating lanes. As with other types of junctions, operational performance depends heavily on the flow volumes from various approaches. A single-lane roundabout can handle approximately 20,000–26,000 vehicles per day, while a two-lane design supports 40,000 to 50,000.) Although there is a plan to update this roundabout, with no funding currently in place, this could take several years to achieve. Therefore, allowing this application will result in total gridlock. For example, traffic approaching the Grovehurst Roundabout from the D.S. Smith facilities themselves and traffic travelling north along the A249 route is already gridlocked at peak periods. This proposal will exacerbate the existing problem unless significant improvements are made to the highway network. The Parish Council estimates that over the year, one million and forty-seven tonnes of waste will be carried by approximately 200,000 per annum additional heavy goods vehicles (HGVs) movements and this very significant number of HGVs and cars will descend upon this area due to their involvement with these proposals. This is in direct conflict with Paragraph 32 of the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) which makes it clear that: "Development should only be prevented or refused on transport grounds where the residual cumulative impacts of development are severe". To mitigate this effect, it is suggested that the DCO should not be applied for until the proposed upgrading of the Grovehurst Roundabout is completed. If this application is permitted, the opportunity to travel along these routes within a reasonable timescale will be severely compromised or in the worst-case scenario even lost.

Thirdly, the Parish Council is also seriously concerned about the environmental impact of, what appears in effect to be the doubling of the current level of waste coming into the area,

with both the expansion to the existing Generating Station and the introduction of the WKN facility. Not only will the increased capacity of the facility lead to substantially more waste delivery traffic, with a corresponding increase in HGV exhaust pollution, but the disposal of the products of burning – bottom ash and flue dust – will generate yet more traffic locally. Flue dust in particular is a hazardous waste product and constitutes around 8% of the raw waste input. The only licenced site in Kent for flue dust disposal is at Norwood Farm Landfill on the Isle of Sheppey, a mere 3 miles from the proposed WTE plant. The applicants have outsourced their flue dust disposal, without revealing its destination, but the likelihood of it being anywhere other than Norwood Farm is highly improbable. Allington WTE plant, Maidstone, already uses it as the most cost-effective option. Use of Norwood Farm would produce an additional 8000 20-tonne HGV movements per annum (to and from the Sheppey site) along already heavily congested roads, with all the extra vehicle pollution that would entail for local residents. Fugitive emissions of toxic fumes, regularly reported from WTE plants elsewhere, would be carried directly towards Sheppey on the prevailing south-westerly winds - so constituting another potential hazard to the residents of the same area within which the flue dust would be disposed of.

In addition to the above, the Parish Council has concerns over the future capacity of the two plants, currently the 49.9MW site is capable of disposing of 550,000 tons of waste each year. The plans include a 25.1MW increase to the current Generating Station, but only to dispose of an additional 107,000 tons of waste each year. The WKN facility will produce up to 42MW, but again will dispose a maximum of 390,000 tonnes of waste each year. It seems obvious from the maths that since both facilities will be built to significantly increase waste disposal in the future, the current proposals do not include any details of possible future expansion. Bearing this in mind, there are concerns that should demand continue to outstrip supply, then both sites could quickly be required to take on additional waste disposal. This is seriously concerning and must be addressed as a priority.

The Parish Council asks why an application for the 75 MW CHP was not applied for from the onset when it constitutes a Nationally Significant Infrastructure Project (NSIP) where an application for a DCO is required? The K3 CHP plant was clearly designed and constructed to be able to operate at an output level of 75MW from its design inception. The Parish Council also questions the applicant's failure to provide a proper report on the Traffic Flow Data for the K3 – 75 MW CHP which is imperative if you are to properly understand this application

and its effect on the highway network. In its place are separate spreadsheets which are confusing and not at all transparent as the process should be. Further questions could also be asked about the environmental impact with no information supplied on continuous or periodic monitoring. The percentage of refuse collection vehicles, flue ash and bottom ash waste also needs to be known. Here, there are concerns that the periods for waste deliveries will have a knock-on effect on the Grovehurst A249 Junction and M2 junctions as most of the deliveries are scheduled to take place during peak periods.

For all these reasons and more Minster-on-Sea Parish Council asks you to refuse permission of the DCO. The proposal provides no solution to the negative effect on the highway network and the consultation that underpins it is simply not fit for purpose due to its failure to provide adequate and transparent information on Traffic Flow Data.

PHE notes that we have replied to earlier consultations as listed below and this response should be read in conjunction with that earlier correspondence.

Request for Scoping Opinion 07 August 2018

Our understanding is that the applicants have identified that the generating capacity of K3 can be increased to 75MW through internal alterations to optimise plant efficiency and that the facility is able to process an additional 107,000 tonnes of post-recycled waste per annum. Therefore, the applicant wishes to seek consent for the construction of K3 at its total generating capacity of 75MW (49.9MW consented plus 25.1MW upgrade), together with a separate proposed total tonnage throughput of 657,000 tonnes per annum (550,000 consented plus 107,000 tonnage increase).

PHE has assessed the submitted documentation with reference to the recommendations provided in our scoping response. It is noted that the promoter has scoped out the effects of electric and magnetic fields (EMF) in the Environmental Impact Assessment, this would be reasonable on the basis that additional cabling to connect to the Paper Mill substation remains within the boundaries of the Generating Plant and Paper Mill sites.

Reference the email dated 29 July 2019 from DHA Planning to Royal Mail inviting a consultation response under section 42(1) (a) of the Planning Act 2008, Royal's Mail's consultation response is set out below.

Royal Mail- relevant information

Under section 35 of the Postal Services Act 2011 (the "Act"), Royal Mail has been designated by Ofcom (the independent communications regulator) as a provider of the Universal Postal Service.

Royal Mail is the only such provider in the United Kingdom. Its services are regulated by the Communications Industry Regulator, Ofcom.

In respect of its postal services functions, section 29 of the Act provides that Ofcom's primary regulatory duty is to secure the provision of the Universal Postal Service. Ofcom discharges this duty by imposing regulatory conditions on Royal Mail, requiring it to provide the Universal Postal Service.

By sections 30 and 31 of the Act (read with sections 32 and 33) there is a set of minimum standards for Universal Service Providers, which Ofcom must secure. The conditions imposed by Ofcom reflect those standards. There is, in effect, a statutory obligation on Royal Mail to provide at least one collection from letterboxes and post offices six days a week and one delivery of letters to all 29 million homes and businesses in the UK six days a week (five days a week for parcels). Royal Mail must also provide a range of "end to end" services meeting users' needs, e.g. First Class, Second Class, Special Delivery by 1 pm, International and Redirections services.

Royal Mail is under some of the highest specification performance obligations for quality of service in Europe. Its performance of the Universal Service Provider obligations is in the public interest and should not be affected detrimentally by any statutorily authorised project.

Royal Mail's postal sorting and delivery operations rely heavily on road communications. Royal Mail's ability to provide efficient mail collection, sorting and delivery to the public is sensitive to changes in the capacity of the highway network.

Royal Mail is a major road user nationally. Disruption to the highway network and traffic delays can have direct consequences on Royal Mail's operations, its ability to meet the Universal Service Obligation and comply with the regulatory regime for postal services thereby presenting a significant risk to Royal Mail's business.



Potential impacts of the scheme on Royal Mail

Royal Mail has seven operational properties within 10 miles of the proposal site, as identified below with individual distances:

The location, nature and scale of the proposed new generating station and waste to energy facility may present risk of construction and operational phase impact / delays to Royal Mail's road based operations on the surrounding road network.

Also, in exercising its statutory duties Royal Mail vehicles use on a daily basis all of the local roads that may potentially be affected by additional traffic arising from the construction and operation of this proposed new generating station and waste to energy facility.

Royal Mail wishes to ensure the protection of its future ability to provide an efficient mail sorting and delivery service to the public in accordance with its statutory obligations which may be adversely affected by the construction and operation of this proposed new generating station and waste to energy facility.

The approach and content of both the Traffic and Transportation section of the PEIR and the Traffic and Transport chapter of the draft ES (Chapter 4) look generally adequate to Royal Mail. It is noted that the new generating station is expected to produce an average of 34 additional HGV deliveries per day as a result of the additional 107 tonnes of waste with WKN adding a further 125 HGV deliveries per day. If these estimates are accurate then the impact on Swale Way and the surrounding highway network should be insignificant.

Notwithstanding this, Royal Mail asks that the Traffic and Transport chapter of the final ES includes information on the needs of major road users (such as Royal Mail) and acknowledges the requirement to ensure that major road users are not disrupted though full consultation at the appropriate time in the DCO and development process.

Royal Mail wishes to be fully pre-consulted by the applicant and its contractors on any proposed road closures / diversions/ alternative access arrangements, hours of working and the content of the revised and extended Construction Traffic Management Plan. The final version of the ES should acknowledge the need for this consultation with Royal Mail and other relevant local businesses / occupiers.

Royal Mail's position on the scheme as at January 2019

In order to address the above, Royal Mail requests that:

- 1. Wheelabrator Technologies Inc's forthcoming DCO application offers a requirement that Royal Mail is pre-consulted by Wheelabrator Technologies Inc or its contractors on any proposed road closures/ diversions/ alternative access arrangements, hours of working and the content of the final Construction Traffic Management Plan.
- 2. The forthcoming DCO application offers a requirement that the final Construction Traffic Management Plan includes provision for a mechanism to inform major road users about any works affecting the local network (with particular regard to Royal Mail's distribution facilities in the vicinity of the DCO application boundary as listed above).

The above requests, as made by Royal Mail at the section 42 consultation stage of another NSIP proposal have been agreed and actioned by the developer to the satisfaction of Royal Mail, resulting in no further action by Royal Mail as a statutory consultee.

Royal Mail is able to supply information on its road usage / trips if required.

Thank you for providing Kent County Council (KCC) with the opportunity to comment on the documents submitted as part of the consultation under Section 42 of the Planning Act 2008. The County Council notes that this is a further consultation, following an amendment to the description of development.

The comments raised by the County Council in response to the previous consultation dated 10 January 2019 (Appendix 1) continue to be of relevance and should be considered by the Applicant accordingly. To avoid duplication, the County Council has not repeated those comments within this response.

The County Council has reviewed the documents for this consultation and would raise the following comments.

Highways and Transportation

The County Council, as Local Highway Authority raises the following comments, in conjunction with those raised within the response dated 10 January 2019.

Baseline conditions

The traffic and junction counts were completed on neutral dates in March 2017 and June 2016. Whilst the counts were acceptable at the time of the original application, a significant period of time has now elapsed. As the application description has been amended, up to date base data is required, as the evidence needs to be relevant to the current application.

This is particularly pertinent in respect of the movements relating to the original K3 application, which must now be assessed against current conditions.

The crash data submitted includes information up to 2017 and as such is now outdated. The Transport Assessment (TA) will need to be amended to include information and data up to the 2019 date of submission.

Future Assessment

The Transport Assessment includes a 2031 - end of Swale Borough Council Local Plan assessment, along with a 2021 interim assessment to account for construction traffic. These assessments remain appropriate and updates due to the change in the proposal description are not considered necessary.

Site Location & Policy Compliance

The Transport Assessment includes the correct location and details of the surrounding highway network. However, it fails to mention that there is an operating dockyard and redundant railway siding within one mile of the application site. In order to comply with the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF), development should seek to encourage sustainable travel, lessen traffic generation and its detrimental impacts, and reduce carbon emissions and climate impacts. There is a clear opportunity to deliver the large quantities of waste via rail or water. The fact that the surrounding highway network is over capacity at both the M2 J5 and Grovehurst junctions adds significant argument to seeking alternative means of waste delivery.

Without investigations on the use of the available and alternative methods of delivery, it is considered that the application does not fully comply with the NPPF.

Development proposal

Access – The route of access is unchanged and no assessment is required to ensure suitable geometry can be achieved.

Trip Generation

The newly submitted Preliminary Environmental Impact Report (PEIR) provides some clarity as to the expected trip generations from the development however further details are required. This can be summarised as follows:

K3 HGVs – 416 HGV movements have been referenced in the recently submitted PEIR. The TA should be updated to demonstrate the expected times of arrival and departure along with supporting evidence.

K3 Staff – Whilst it is mentioned that an estimated 50 staff will operate the site, details of their make-up and expected trip generation do not appear to have been submitted in this consultation.

WKN HGVs (operational) – 250 HGV movements have been referenced in the recently submitted PEIR. The Transport Assessment states that the additional 390,000 tonnes of waste per annum would generate the additional 250 HGV movements per day.

WKN Staff (operational) - An estimation of staff numbers ranges between 35 to 50 over three shift periods. A total of 42 car movements are therefore expected, representing the 84% travelling by car, however only 37 car movements appear to be accounted for in the TA. An explanation of this is required.

WKN Construction - The Transport Assessment demonstrates that a peak of 482 staff would be on site during months 24-40 of construction with 90 associated HGV movements. The County Council requests evidence from the existing K3 construction programme to evaluate that the level of HGV movements for that application are robust. Further to that, KCC requests that the hourly number of deliveries is demonstrated through traffic count evidence for one week. The information will provide evidence that the assumptions that have been made are justifiable

Census data has been used to calculate the mode share of staff transport. The assessment carried out assumes 84% of staff would travel by car. This allows 409 staff accessing the site per day by car. This is considered a fair assumption. The assessment shows that no staff are arriving during the peak hours.

Summary on trip generation

The cumulative impact of the K3 and WKN operation generates an anticipated 666 HGV two way movements per day. Additional staff movements, yet to be clarified, will also be expected.

The construction of the WKN site brings forward a further 90 two way HGV movements and 409 construction staff trips.

Junction Assessments

The consultation suggests that the volume of development generated traffic represents only a small proportion of the current traffic flows on the adjacent highway. This statement is disputed. Taking account of the currently submitted base movements of 2000, clearly the development generation of 666 represents a substantial impact on the volumes of HGVs. In addition, the completed counts as submitted would have included K3 construction HGVs, which would need be deducted and thus increase the overall development impact.

Updated 2019 junction assessments will need to be submitted.

The development will be expected to provide appropriate mitigation to any junction found to be operating above capacity as a result of cumulative development impact. This should be expected to be proportionate to the full amount of movements relating to the new application title.

It should also be anticipated that the use of Grampian conditions to constrain movements until mitigation is secure may also be appropriate.

Minerals and Waste

As Minerals and Waste Planning Authority, it is understood that the revised consultation arises from advice from the Planning Inspectorate that the description of the development should be revised to enable the project to be properly categorised and determined under the Planning Act 2008. Consent is now being sought for:

The construction and operation of a 75MW waste-to-energy facility, the 'Wheelabrator Kemsley Generating Station' ("K3"), and for the construction and operation of a 42MW waste-to-energy facility, 'Wheelabrator Kemsley North.

The consequence of this change is that the proposal will not be assessed as a power upgrade and increased throughput without the need for any construction works required, but rather as a consent for the construction of K3 at its total generating capacity of 75MW, together with a separate proposed total tonnage throughput of 657,000 tonnes of waste per annum.

The supporting information states that whilst the consent sought for the K3 development has altered, in respect of the practical effect of the DCO in environmental terms, the project remains unchanged. The DCO sought would allow K3 as consented and currently being built to operate to an upgraded power generation level of 75MW (an additional 25.1MW) and to process 657,000 tonnes of waste per annum (an additional 107,000 tonnes), above and beyond that permitted under its existing planning consent. The practical effect of the consent sought would not result in any additional external physical changes to K3 as permitted and the layout and appearance of the facility will remain as per its consented design.

Within the County Council's response to the original consultation (Appendix 1), attention was drawn to a number of concerns regarding the Draft Environmental Statement. In particular, there is a conflict between the DCO and the Council's adopted waste strategy, which is predicated upon the principle of net self-sufficiency and the Waste Hierarchy. These views remain pertinent in respect of the revised description of the development and KCC will be requesting that the Planning Inspectorate gives very careful consideration to the Council's concerns in assessing the merits of the DCO proposal.

The County Council as Waste Planning Authority considered the planning merits of the planning application for the K3 proposal with a feedstock of 550,000 tonnes a year and 49MWof energy. In granting conditional planning permission, the County Council was satisfied that the application was in accordance with planning policy and that it constituted sustainable development. The Waste Planning Authority has not considered the merits of the increase in waste feedstock, nor the planning merits of the new Wheelabrator Kemsley North plant.

Air Quality

Part of the A2 corridor, mainly Ospringe to Faversham, is declared as an Air Quality Management Area (AQMA). This AQMA has recorded the third highest levels of Nitrogen Dioxide (the main pollutant from vehicle exhausts) in the County. Therefore, from a strategic air quality perspective, the Applicant will need to have clear mitigation in place to demonstrate that the development will not have a negative impact on air quality.

KCC would welcome further opportunity to engage throughout the progression of the DCO. If you require further information or clarification on any matter in this letter, then please do not hesitate to contact KCC.

Re: Proposed application for the granted of a Development Consent Order (DCO) for Wheelabrator Kemsley Generating Station and Wheelabrator Kemsley North Waste to Energy Facility

Thank you for providing Kent County Council (KCC) with the opportunity to comment on the documents submitted as part of the Statutory Consultation under Section 42 of the Planning Act 2008, which includes the Preliminary Environmental Impact Report (PEIR), draft Environmental Statement (ES) and draft Development Consent Order (DCO), relating to the proposed Wheelabrator Kemsley Generating Station and Wheelabrator Kemsley North (WKN) Waste to Energy Facility.

The County Council has reviewed the documents and for ease of reference, provides a commentary structured around the published documents, under the chapter headings used within the reports.

Draft Environmental Statement

<u>Chapter 2 Site Description and Proposed Development</u>

The County Council is concerned that the proposal as set out in the DCO is in conflict with the Council's adopted waste strategy, which is predicated upon the principle of net self-sufficiency and the Waste Hierarchy. In assessing the merits of the DCO proposal, attention is drawn to this conflict and the applicant is asked to consider the implications upon waste planning policy in the County and also to note the concern regarding the conjoining of the two plants into one DCO proposal. These concerns will be shared with the Planning Inspectorate, should the proposal be submitted as a DCO application.

KCC is the Waste Planning Authority for Kent and so is responsible for planning the management of waste within the County. In July 2016, KCC adopted the Kent Minerals and

Waste Local Plan 2013-30 (KMWLP) that sets out the strategic and development management policy framework to be used in determining planning applications for waste management facilities in Kent. This policy framework is predicated on an approach of 'net self-sufficiency' and the management of waste in accordance with the Waste Hierarchy. This approach was found sound following independent examination by the Planning Inspectorate.

The KMWLP commits KCC to preparing a Waste Sites Plan, which would identify and allocate land considered suitable for waste development to accommodate specific types of facilities to meet the evidenced capacity gap identified in the adopted KMWLP. As part of the work to develop the evidence base for the subsequent Waste Site Plan, a review has been undertaken to confirm the predicted capacity gap for waste arising in Kent. This reassessment indicates, amongst other matters, that with the commissioning of the original consented 550,000 tonne facility at Kemsley (referred to as K3), 'net self-sufficiency' for the management of non-hazardous residual waste will be achieved and maintained to the end of the Plan period (2031).

As a result, there is no evidenced need for further waste capacity in Kent to 2030. In terms of its waste plan making responsibilities, KCC now proposes to remove the commitment from the adopted KMWLP to prepare a Waste Sites Plan. Draft proposals for modifications to the KMWLP were published in early 2018 and objections were received from Wheelabrator Technologies Inc (WTI) - the proposer of this DCO application. According to WTI predictions, future requirements for waste management would still justify the preparation of a Waste Sites Plan, and therefore the County Council should include the allocation of land at Kemsley, which WTI promoted in response to the Call for Sites conducted in 2017. KCC has considered the representations made by WTI and is unpersuaded that evidence exists to justify allocation of the site and the provision of additional waste capacity within the County.

The County Council is intending to publish its Pre-Submission Draft of the Early Partial Review of the Kent Minerals and Waste Local Plan for public consultation in early 2019 (Regulation 19) prior to submission to the Secretary of State for examination in the Summer. It will be a matter for the Inspector examining the Early Partial Review to establish the merits or otherwise of providing additional waste capacity within the County as proposed by WTI. As such, the DCO proposal appears to potentially undermine the Local Plan process.

The DCO proposal being considered at Kemsley ('K3' and 'WKN' taken together) would result in approximately a further half million tonnes of waste (497ktpa) recovery capacity being built in Kent. This is far in excess of the requirements indicated by the adopted Plan and by the latest Waste Needs Assessment for Kent to maintain net self-sufficiency to 2031 i.e. throughout the Plan period. Once the original consented capacity at Kemsley of 550ktpa is taken into account (SW/10/444), this identifies no additional need for 'Other Recovery' capacity. Provision of this additional 497ktpa of capacity is likely to mean that management of waste will be locked into incineration for the next 25 to 30 years at least, thus compromising its management by methods further up the Waste Hierarchy – for instance, by being prevented in the first place or recycled/composted. This would be contrary to national and local policy on waste management.

The additional capacity may also draw waste in from beyond the boundaries of Kent. This could result in a substantial imbalance being created between waste planning areas and

disrupting the move towards net self-sufficiency being pursued by authorities around the wider South East. This supports the achievement of the Waste Framework Directive proximity principle for mixed waste.

Whilst the DCO proposal seeks to conjoin the planning consideration of the two waste plants, there is no justification for considering the applications for the K3 facility upgrade and the new free-standing Energy from Waste (EfW) facility WKN as a single DCO application in the manner proposed. The reasons presented in the Secretary of State's (SoS) initial decision do not appear to amount to legitimate grounds to circumvent the established mechanism through which such applications ought properly to be considered. In this regard, it should be noted that the County Council has demonstrated a capability of assessing applications positively in the past - having granted permission to Kemsley K3, an EfW facility at Allington and an EfW facility at Ridham dock. KCC understands that the reasons put forward by the applicant to conjoin the two developments into one DCO application are:

- They are on the same site, which is understood to mean both K3 and WKN are located on land owned by the same company i.e. WTI; (KCC however notes that there is no connection between the two proposals, nor a direct connection between WKN and the adjacent Paper Mill, unlike for K3 which is to supply steam to the Mill)
- If the applications were made separately, they would be made at the same time;
- The applications are being considered at the same time as a separate DCO application (K4) for a gas fired powerplant; (KCC however considers that it should be noted that this proposal has no relationship with WKN, and is not located on the land owned by the promoter of these schemes, WTI)
- There would be benefits to K3 and WKN "being assessed comprehensively" at the same time - through the same streamlined process and in a consistent manner by the same decision maker, avoiding duplication of work and reducing the burden on the local planning authority; and
- Consideration of any likely significant environmental effects will be simplified.

None of the above criteria justify that the WKN proposal is one that should be considered 'nationally significant'. Similarly, the energy output of the WKN proposal falls below the threshold for a DCO application. This proposal should therefore fall to the County Council to determine on the basis of its individual merits by KCC as the local planning authority for the area.

It should also be noted that the first-ever National Infrastructure Assessment for the United Kingdom, published by the National Infrastructure Commission in July 2018, favours increases to recycling rates for both household and commercial waste (the waste streams targeted by the proposed developments), bolstered by separate food waste collection, over express support for expansion of EfW capacity. This follows extensive modelling of scenarios involving the development of EfW capacity. It should also be noted that the Government's Resource & Waste Strategy is due to be published by Defra before the end of the year and this will be informed by the National Infrastructure Assessment.

As recognised in the submitted documentation, the County Council granted planning permission for an EfW facility with the capacity to produce 49.5MW (application reference SW/10/444). This plant is the subject of the K3 proposal, as it seeks to increase the waste feed tonnages with a resultant increase in power output. The County Council has also positively determined a number of non-material amendments and Section 73 applications in relation to the baseline planning permission. In doing so, the County Council imposed a number of planning conditions, so as to render the development acceptable in planning terms. Given the inter-relationship of the K3 plant with the planning permissions granted by the County Council, this response encloses copies of the relevant reports to Planning Applications Committee and planning decisions (Appendix 1-18) to aid the Inspector on the matters that were considered during the planning application process and how they were resolved.

In light of the above, the County Council as Waste Planning Authority draws attention to the apparent conflict between national and local waste planning policy and seeks very careful consideration of this matter by the applicant and the Planning Inspectorate in examining the merits of the DCO proposal. KCC will also be requesting that the Planning Inspectorate satisfies itself that the planning considerations addressed in the planning consent granted by KCC are an appropriate basis for the decisions now sought.

Chapter 4 Traffic and Transport

Appendix 4.1 Transport Assessment (TA)

2 Existing Situation

Traffic Flows

The traffic and junction counts were completed in neutral dates in March 2017 and June 2016 and the County Council is satisfied that these are valid.

3 Development Proposal

Access and Site Layout

The route of access is unchanged and no assessment is required to ensure suitable geometry can be achieved.

Timescales

K3 is currently under construction (KCC/SW/10/444) and is expected to be operational by 2019, with the additional waste lorries expected in 2020. Construction of the WKN plant is expected to commence in 2021 and to last over three years.

Abnormal loads would be expected and would be subject to the usual authorisation from the relevant Highway Authorities.

The timing of the works raises some concern, as delivery would be in direct conflict with Highways England's announced M2 J5 improvement scheme delivery. The proposed build

timeline and peak for construction vehicles and staff for the construction of WKN would take place at the same time that the junctions would be expected to be under construction. During highways construction, capacity constraints or route diversion are always likely. The proposed K3/WKN build timeline would therefore increase volumes of traffic at a time when the network is planned to be constrained. Additionally, and subject to development contributions, the County Council as Local Highway Authority is seeking to secure grant funding to improve the Grovehurst junctions. In order to meet with the grant requirements, construction of the road improvements is expected to commence Q3 2021.

4 Compatibility with Transport Polices

National Policy Statements

The TA includes the correct location and details of the surrounding highway network. However, the assessment fails to mention that there is an operational dockyard and redundant railway siding within one mile of the application site. National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) paragraph 108 states that development should seek to encourage sustainable travel, lessen traffic generation and its detrimental impacts and reduce carbon emissions and climate impacts. In this context, KCC recommends there is a is a clear opportunity, which should be explored by the applicant, to deliver the large quantities of waste via rail or water.

The fact that the surrounding highway network is over capacity at both the M2 J5 and Grovehurst junctions adds significant weight to the need to seek alternative means of waste delivery to reduce the potential of highway delays caused by congestion.

Without investigations on the use of the available and alternative methods of delivery, it is considered that the application is not in full compliance with paragraph 108 of the NPPF.

5 Future Year Traffic Flows

Future Assessment Year

Assessments have been carried out for the appropriate Swale Borough Local Plan (2017). Additionally, an assessment has been completed for 2021, which considers the WKN construction traffic and K3 operational movements.

The 2021 assessment is considered to include the appropriate consented developments. The 2031 assessment is also considered to include all appropriate cumulative sites.

6 Trip Generation, Mode Share and Assignment

The cumulative impact of the K3 operation includes an additional 68 daily Heavy Good Vehicle (HGV) movements for this proposal, 258 daily HGV movements for the consented scheme and an additional 90 HGV movements for collection undertaken by Refuse Collection Vehicles (RCV). In summary, the K3 site is expected to generate 416 HGV movements per day. Adding the 90 WKN and 80 K4 construction traffic brings a total of 586 movements for the site in the immediate future. In addition to that are the 84 K4 construction

staff and 409 WKN construction staff, of which a percentage would be expected to hit the junctions in peak periods.

K3 Proposed Development

The TA states that the additional 107,000 tonnes of waste per annum would generate an additional 68 movements per day and evidence should be provided as to how this has been calculated and what assumptions have been made around the size of the delivery vehicles. It is assumed from the calculations that, on average, vehicles would carry 8.5 tonnes, but this would need to be clarified. The applicant has stated that there is no increase in construction traffic to increase the capacity. An explanation is required as to how this is justified, providing evidence to demonstrate that the plant has no change to its size or materials required. KCC requests clarity to explain why, if the plant was capable of processing the additional waste, the consent was not sought in the original application (KCC/SW/10/444).

The assessment states that the HGV movements would be spread equally in terms of hourly movements. In paragraph 6.5 it is stated that "typically HGV movements would not be in the night time periods". However, as shown in table 6.1, eleven of the movements are during night time hours. KCC requests that these movements are reprofiled within daylight hours to give a more accurate representation as to how the plant will operate.

WKN Proposed Development

The WKN operational temporal distribution is also inconsistent with that of the K3 analysis, and as such, is not accepted by the County Council as Local Highway Authority. For the WKN site, an assumption has been made that 25% of movements would be at night. The County Council accepts the statement in paragraph 6.5 that typically, movements would not occur over night and therefore requests that evidence is supplied from operational waste to energy sites, such as that at Aylesford. A day time comparison of the actual delivery times between 07:00 and 19:00 received from the Aylesford site should be compared to table 6.1 presented in the assessment, enabling a comparable delivery time profile to be provided. KCC has been in contact with RPS Transport Consultants requesting this detail. However, it has not been forthcoming with a level of detail to satisfy the County Council's query.

WKN Operation

The TA states that the additional 390,000 tonnes of waste per annum would generate an additional 250 HGV movements per day.

An estimation of staff numbers ranges between 35 to 49, with 49 being assumed for the assessment. Therefore, 41 car movements are expected, representing the 84% travelling by car. However, only 37 car movements appear to be accounted for. Table 6.4 would therefore require adjustment.

Table 6.4, demonstrating the expected HGV traffic, includes 38 movements at night -contrary to the above referenced statement in paragraph 6.5. As such, these movements should be reprofiled between the hours of 07:00 and 19:00.

WKN Construction

The TA demonstrates that a peak of 482 staff would be on site during months 24-40 of construction - 45 HGV deliveries or 90 movements. The County Council requests evidence from the existing K3 construction programme to understand the level of HGV movements and to confirm that the application is robust in this respect. The County Council also requests that the hourly number of deliveries is demonstrated through traffic count evidence for one week. The information will provide evidence that the assumptions made are justifiable.

Census data has been used to calculate the mode share of staff transport. The assessment carried out assumes 84% of staff would travel by car. This allows 409 staff accessing the site per day by car and the County Council considers this a fair assumption. The assessment shows that no staff are arriving during the peak hours, which KCC considers is inaccurate. Evidence from traffic counts for the existing construction site should again be provided to justify the assumption.

Operational Trip Distribution and Assignment

The HGV distribution assumes all traffic accessing the site would come via M2 J5 and the Grovehurst junction, which is considered robust.

The RCV distribution rates are assumed to be coming from the neighbouring Countrystyle Recycling plant based at Ridham Docks. An assumption has been made that waste would be collected equally from twelve surrounding districts. It is requested that the applicant provides evidence from the Countrystyle site to demonstrate what percentage of waste is routed to and from the east, avoiding the A249/Grovehurst junction, to justify this assumption.

Appendix F appears only to show numbers and not the distribution percentages. The County Council requires a percentage flow diagram to be provided so that this can be compared to the current Countrystyle site.

7 Transport Assessment

Junction Assessment

On the assessment provided for this application, there would be expected 59 peak hour movements through the A249/Swale Way corridor - 32 in the AM and 27 in the PM. However, this assumes an even spread of HGV movements. Traffic flow counts supplied for the previous Incinerator Bottom Ash (IBA) facility assessment (KCC/0625/2018), along with KCC's own data, shows that the peaks for the M2/A249 and A249/Grovehurst junctions are spread over a three-hour shoulder between 06:00 and 09:00 in the AM and 15:00 and 18:00 in the PM.

Although a general spread of deliveries could be assumed, it could equally be assumed that up to 50% of HGV deliveries come through the affected junctions during the peak shoulders. This assumption would result in 208 deliveries from the K3 operation, 125 from the WKN

operation and 45 for the WKN construction, totally a plausible 378 movements through the peak shoulders. The 2017 observed data records 245 through the eastern A249/Grovehurst roundabout in the AM. Assessing a single peak hour would produce approximately 63 HGV movements accounting for 26% of the total HGV movements through a junction that is already operating over capacity.

Site Access

Details on the expected peak operational queueing of the combined K3 and K4 WKN traffic within the site should be demonstrated so that the Local Highway Authority can be certain that this will not spill out onto Barge Way.

Barge Way between Northern Access & Fleet End

This junction has been demonstrated to operate well within capacity at the future year scenarios. As such, the Highway Authority has no concerns with the proposed development impact at this junction.

Swale Way/Barge Way Roundabout

The assessment demonstrates that the roundabout currently operates above operational capacity at the 2024 assessment, and includes the proposal's operational traffic in both the AM and PM peaks. In the AM peak, the Swale Way West arm reaches an RFC of 1.12 with 94 queueing vehicles. In the PM peak, the Swale Way South arm reaches its operational capacity with an RFC of 0.87. The applicant should note if that proposal is progressed, it should be expected that appropriate mitigation by way of a left turn lane facility off the Swale West arm may be required, which may potentially be delivered under a s278 agreement, depending on land ownership. The approach is currently of single carriageway width and mitigation will be required for the dominant HGV left turning movements resulting from this application.

A249/Grovehurst Junction

The assessment demonstrates that this junction is already operating beyond its operational capacity and it is on that basis that an application has been submitted for "Housing Infrastructure Funding" in order that the proposed Local Plan growth can be accommodated.

The proposed development would decrease the operational effectiveness of the junction and as such, appropriate levels of mitigation should be provided. The assessment demonstrates that the junction is exceeding its capacity on five of the seven arms of the junction in the AM peak and three in the PM peak. Queues in the PM peak are of such severity that they extend for over 362 vehicles. In the AM peak, the south A249 slip has queues of 23 vehicles, introducing significant safety concerns.

Therefore, any development affecting this junction would be required to provide mitigation and until such mitigation is complete, any development that adds traffic to the junction could not proceed prior to guaranteed delivery of improvements.

Car Parking

A detailed drawing of the operational and construction car parking arrangements should be submitted in order for the County Council to assess that the expected demand is provided for.

Summary

The proposed development would be required to provide mitigating measures for the Swale Way/Barge Way roundabout and A249/Grovehurst roundabouts. These junctions are over capacity and it is considered unacceptable to route the proposed amounts of traffic through the junctions until such a time as mitigation measures are secured.

A number of areas within the TA have been identified where further information should be provided to enable the County Council to provide a definitive response.

KCC considers that fundamentally, measures must be explored to secure delivery of the waste through the available rail and water facilities in order to demonstrate that it is compliant with paragraph 108 of the NPPF.

A Construction Management Plan and Framework Travel Plan will need to be provided for the WKN site in line with that of K4 and will need be approved by the County Council as the Local Highway Authority. A Decommissioning Management Plan will also be required for the WKN site. KCC would welcome an opportunity to review these documents as early as possible in the DCO process. If these documents are to be included as a DCO requirement, KCC requests that they are subject to approval of the Local Highway Authority.

Chapter 10 Water Environment

Appendix 10.2 Drainage Design Philosophy

The County Council supports the Drainage Strategy as proposed in Appendix 10.2. Suitable levels of surface water treatment have been proposed, including interceptors and attenuation ponds.

However, the County Council recommends that additional cross-sectional drawings of the proposed attenuation pond are provided within the Drainage Strategy report when the final ES is submitted. The drawings should include the available freeboard of the pond.

Chapter 11 Ecology

Chapter 11 indicates that there is a good understanding of the ecology within the site both currently and prior to existing works occurring on site, and the County Council is satisfied with the range of surveys proposed and completed within the development footprint.

The area that WKN is proposed to be built on, currently a construction compound, was intended to be restored to grassland and scrub. However, the submitted information has confirmed that the applicant will assess the impact on the site based on the habitats

previously within the site prior to it being used as a construction compound. Therefore, the County Council is satisfied that appropriate mitigation for the continued loss of habitat from WKN can be properly demonstrated.

The site is adjacent to the Swale Special Protection Area (SPA), Ramsar and Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI) and therefore the development may result in a likely significant impact on designated sites. The information submitted suggests that the impact on the designated sites from the development will be assessed, but this has not been clearly set out within the report. The County Council would fully expect information to be submitted within the report to assess the impact the proposed development would have on the designated sites, particularly due to the increase in noise, lighting and air quality. The applicant would be submitting a noise, air quality and transport report and KCC highlights that the conclusions of these reports would need to inform the ES.

As the determining authority, the Planning Inspectorate will have to undertake an Appropriate Assessment (AA) as part of the planning process. The applicant has submitted information to inform an AA, but the County Council highlights that the Planning Inspectorate will need to produce/take ownership of the AA and be satisfied that the conclusions of the AA indicate that there will be no likely significant effect on the designated site.

Appendix 11.2 Habitats Regulations Assessment Report

The Habitats Regulations Assessment (HRA) concludes, either within the Screening or AA, that there will be no likely significant effect on the designated sites. The report has set out a number of mitigation measures within the AA to avoid a likely significant effect and the County Council highlights that if the DCO application is granted, these mitigation measures will need to be implemented.

However, paragraph 5.43 of the HRA outlines an exception that details that additional work is being carried out to assess the impact that the proposed development would have on the designated site in relation to an increase in traffic. The County Council highlights that this work would have to be completed and the HRA updated prior to the determination of the application.

Chapter 12 Landscape and Visual Effects

The applicant has acknowledged the existence of the Public Rights of Way (PRoW) network surrounding the site and the Saxon Shore Way promoted route, which runs alongside Milton Creek. With reference to the County Council's previous response to the Scoping Report dated 5 October 2018 (Appendix 19), the applicant should be aware that Natural England has proposed a route for the England Coast Path along Public Footpath ZU1 (Appendix 20). If this proposal is approved by the Secretary of State, the number of people walking this section of the coast is likely to increase, due to the enhanced promotion and status of the National Trail. The impacts of the development may therefore affect a higher number of path users than expected by the applicant.

The County Council is pleased to see that the PRoW network and its users are being considered as receptors when assessing the potential impacts of this development. The

County Council notes the applicant has considered the potential landscape and visual impacts for users of these routes. Whilst these visual impacts may on balance be considered negligible, due to the existing industrial nature of the landscape, the proposed development may have a detrimental impact on path users, due to deteriorating air quality and noise effects arising from the development.

With this in mind, improvements to the existing PRoW network should be considered as mitigation for the potential impacts of the development on path users. The PRoW and Access service would welcome future engagement with the applicant to consider surfacing improvements along Public Footpath ZU1/The Saxon Shore Way, which would enhance accessibility for path users. These network improvements would provide positive community outcomes for the scheme and help to mitigate any negative effects arising from the development.

Chapter 13 Archaeology and Cultural Heritage

The County Council notes that in response to previous comments made on the Scoping Report (Appendix 19), the desk-based assessment now includes the results of site investigations within the WKN site, and this shows that there are substantial deposits of made ground of a modern date present. On this basis, the County Council is satisfied with the findings of the draft ES and PEIR with respect to the archaeological potential. Any archaeological mitigation can be accommodated through an appropriate programme of investigation and recording as stated in section 13.10.2 of the Environmental Statement.

Preliminary Environmental Impact Report

The County Council notes the omission of light and light pollution within the PEIR and would encourage its inclusion in the document.

KCC also recommends that the applicant actively seeks to promote employment opportunities that arise during construction and operation of K3 and WKN, in the local labour market. This should include training and development opportunities, developed in collaboration with local educational providers e.g. construction apprenticeships.

KCC would welcome further opportunity to engage throughout the progression of the DCO. If you require further information or clarification on any matter in this letter, then please do not hesitate to contact KCC.

I write pursuant to Section 46 of The Planning Act 2008 ("The Act") and hereby give notice that Wheelabrator Technologies Inc. (WTI) intend to submit an application for a Development Consent Order relating to the K3 generating station and WKN waste-to-energy facility.

DHA, on behalf of WTI, previously notified PINS in a letter dated 30th November 2018 that Wheelabrator Technologies Inc. (WTI) intend to submit an application for a Development Consent Order relating to the K3 generating station and WKN waste-to-energy facility. As you are aware further to our discussions with PINS and BEIS, further consultation is now being carried out to clarify to consultees that consent is being sought for the construction and operation of K3 to a generating capacity of 75MW in order for that to be properly categorised and consented under the Planning Act 2008. For avoidance of doubt we considered it prudent to re-serve notice under Section 46 of The Act and this letter explains the context behind this additional notification and the re-consultation undertaken.

Re-notification under Section 46 of the Act

K3

WTI are currently constructing the Wheelabrator Kemsley waste-to-energy facility (K3), which was granted planning permission in 2012, on land at Kemsley, to the north of Sittingbourne in Kent. K3 currently has consent to process up to 550,000 tonnes of waste per annum and has a consented generating capacity 49.9MW.

WTI have identified that the generating capacity of K3 can be increased to 75MW through internal alterations to optimise plant efficiency and that the facility is able to process an additional 107,000 tonnes of post-recycled waste per annum.

The 2018 consultation and publicity sought views from interested parties on an application for consent for that power upgrade and increased tonnage throughput, without any construction works being required.

However, in order for the K3 project to be properly categorised and consented under the Planning Act 2008, the application will now be seeking consent for the construction of K3 at its total generating capacity of 75MW (49.9MW consented + 25.1MW upgrade), which will also include a proposed total tonnage throughput of 657,000 tonnes per annum (550,000 consented + 107,000 tonnage increase).

As the K3 facility is currently being constructed and will be operational by the end of 2019, the effect in reality of the proposed application would remain the K3 facility generating an additional 25.1MW together with being able to process an additional 107,000 tonnes of waste per year.

WKN

As part of the same DCO application WTI are seeking development consent for the construction and operation of a new waste-to-energy facility, 'Wheelabrator Kemsley North' (WKN), on land adjacent to K3.

The proposals in respect of WKN remain the same as those consulted on in November/December 2018. WKN would have a gross electrical generation capacity of 42MW and be capable of processing up to 390,000 tonnes of post-recycled waste per annum. The Secretary of State for Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy issued a direction on 27th June 2018 that the WKN development is nationally significant and is therefore to be treated as a development for which development consent is required.

Re-consultation under Section 42 of The Act

Letters are being sent at the end of July 2019 to prescribed bodies, relevant statutory undertakers, specified Local Authorities and those parties with an interest in the land as prescribed by Section 42 of The Act.

It is intended that all consultees will have received those S42 letters by the 31st July 2019, to allow the S42 consultation to coincide with the commencement of the S48 period. The deadline provided for responses to the S42 consultation is the 28th August 2019, which provides the minimum requirement of a 28 day period for consultees to respond to the consultation.

All comments regarding K3 and WKN following the November/December 2018 consultation and publicity will continue to be reflected and addressed in the application.

S42 consultees have been provided with a covering letter, a copy of the S48 notice (as the proposed scheme is a development for which Environmental Impact Assessment is required), and a USB containing a draft Development Consent Order and a non-technical Preliminary Environmental Information Report, together with a set of key maps and plans to illustrate the location of the site and proposed development. Those same documents and plans are also available on the applicant's website (www.wtikemsley.co.uk).



Section 46 of The Act

In accordance with Section 46(1) of The Act please find enclosed with this letter the documents provided to the consultation bodies under Section 42. I have also included for reference the list of those prescribed bodies, statutory undertakers and local authorities who have been consulted.

Consultation under Section 47 of The Act

WTI consulted on and agreed a Statement of Community Consultation with Swale Borough Council and Kent County Council in October 2018 and undertook consultation with the local community at the beginning of November 2018 which included the distribution of an information leaflet to around 15,000 homes and business together with three local consultation events. The deadline provided for public comments was the 10th January 2018 which provided a period of some 71 days from the first public consultation event.

All comments regarding K3 and WKN following the November/December 2018 consultation and publicity will continue to be reflected and addressed in the application.

A proportionate re-consultation under Section 47 of The Act has been agreed with both Kent County Council and Swale Borough Council which involved contacting all members of the local community that have previously engaged in the consultation process. The relevant members of the local community were sent consultation letters which should have been received by the 31st July 2019 with a deadline of the 28th August 2019 by which to respond. As the local community has already had the opportunity to comment on the majority of the project the minimum period of 28 days is deemed acceptable in this case.

Publicity under Section 48 of The Act

The notice prepared to address Section 48 of The Act has been published in the Sittingbourne News Extra and Sheerness Times Guardian on the 24th July 2019 and will be published again in those papers on the 31st July 2019, as well as being published in the Medway Messenger on the 29th July 2019 and 5th August 2019. The same notice has been placed in the London Gazette and the Telegraph by the 31st July 2019

The S48 notice provides the same deadline for responses, the 28th August 2019, as defined for the purposes of the S42 consultation. That provides a period of 28 days starting on the day after the date of the second consecutive notice being placed in the locally circulating newspapers.

Timetable for submission

It remains the intention of the applicant to submit the application towards the end of August 2019. We will keep the Inspectorate updated should that intention alter for any reason and will continue to liaise as necessary.

I trust that this letter is sufficient to satisfy Section 46 of The Act and would welcome confirmation of that in due course. Please do not hesitate to contact me should you have any queries or require anything further at this stage.

1 INTRODUCTION

- 1.1 Wheelabrator Technologies Inc. (the Applicant) intends to make an application to the Secretary of State (SoS) for Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy for a Development Consent Order (DCO) to seek a power upgrade and tonnage throughput increase to the permitted Wheelabrator Kemsley waste-to-energy plant (K3) and a new waste-to-energy plant on adjacent land called Wheelabrator Kemsley North (WKN).
- 1.2 The Planning Act 2008 states that the construction or extension of a generating station of more than 50 Megawatts (MW) is considered within Section 14(1) (a) of the Act to be a 'nationally significant infrastructure project' and as such requires an application for a DCO to be made to the Planning Inspectorate and approved by the SoS for Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy.
- Planning permission was granted under the Town and Country Planning Act 1990 by Kent County Council in 2012 for a sustainable waste-to-energy plant (K3). Construction of the plant began in August 2016 and is expected to be completed with the plant operational by late 2019. As consented the K3 facility will have two 102MW thermal lines, be capable of processing 550,000 tonnes of waste per annum and have a generating output of 49.9MW. The proposed DCO application will seek consent to permit the facility to operate to an upgraded power generation level of 75MW and to process an additional 107,000 tonnes of waste per annum. This project is a Nationally Significant Infrastructure Project (NSIP) by virtue of it being an extension to an onshore generating station in England with a generating capacity of over 50MW under Section 14(1)(a) and 15(2) of the Planning Act 2008.
- Development Consent is also being sought for a proposed new waste-to-energy plant, Wheelabrator Kemsley North (WKN), which would be a single 125MWth line facility capable of processing 390,000 tonnes of waste per annum, with a generating capacity of 42MW. WKN is not therefore an NSIP by virtue of its generating capacity. Instead Wheelabrator Technologies Inc. (WTI) made a formal application on the 1st June 2018 to the SoS for Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy under Section 35 of the Planning Act 2008 for a direction as to whether the development, together with any matters associated with it, can be treated as development for which a DCO is required. The SoS issued their direction on the 27th June 2018 confirming that WKN can be treated as development for a which a DCO is required, as there are clear benefits to K3 and WKN being assessed comprehensively through the same DCO process and the removal of the need for separate consents to be sought.
- 1.5 K3 and WKN will therefore be subject to a single DCO application for both facilities to the SoS for Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy via the Planning Inspectorate.
- 1.6 Both K3 and WKN are developments of a type listed in part 10 Schedule 1 of the Infrastructure Planning (Environmental Impact Assessment) Regulations 2017 (hereafter the EIA Regulations) with a capacity exceeding 100 tonnes per day.
- 1.7 All development of a type listed in Schedule 1 of the EIA Regulations constitute EIA Development and the application for the K3 and WKN DCO is therefore required to be accompanied by an Environmental Statement (ES), prepared in accordance with the EIA Regulations.
- This document provides a summary of the developments proposed and the <u>preliminary results</u> of the EIA undertaken to date. Members of the public can comment on this 'Preliminary Environmental Information' ("PEI") through a dedicated page on the Applicant's website, via email, letter or using the feedback forms at the forthcoming public exhibitions. Details on how to do so are provided at the end of this document. Members of the public who register themselves as interested parties with the Planning Inspectorate (PINS) by the relevant deadline after the acceptance of the formal application will also be able to make comments on the final ES (details provided at the end of this document).

2 PROPOSED DEVELOPMENT SITES

Wheelabrator Kemsley (K3) Site

- 2.1 The K3 site is located on land immediately to the east of the Kemsley Paper Mill, located to the east of Kemsley, a residential suburb in the north of Sittingbourne in Kent. It lies adjacent to the Swale Estuary, with the Isle of Sheppey beyond. To the south of the site beyond K3 lies a capped former landfill site which lies adjacent to the confluence between Milton Creek and the Swale Estuary. The site lies in proximity to the A249 which links to both the M2 and M20 motorways to the south and with the Isle of Sheppey to the north.
- 2.2 The site benefits from planning permission (KCC/SW/10/444) granted in 2012 for the construction of a sustainable waste-to-energy plant and the site is at an advanced stage of construction and programmed to become fully operational in late 2019. A full EIA of the facility was undertaken and submitted as part of the application pursuant to permission KCC/SW/10/444. See Wheelabrator Kemsley (K3) for further details on page 5.

Wheelabrator Kemsley North (WKN) Site

- 2.3 The WKN site is located immediately north of the permitted K3 facility which is currently under construction and immediately to the east of the Kemsley Paper Mill. The WKN site is currently being used by WTI as a laydown and parking area for the construction of the adjacent K3 facility. The site has been cleared of vegetation and laid to concrete or hardcore with a perimeter fence. The site has extant permission for an Incinerator Bottom Ash facility permitted by Kent County Council (KCC/0265/2016). WTI no longer wish to build this facility and instead wish to replace it with a new waste-to-energy plant the subject of this application.
- 2.4 To the east of the site lies the Swale Estuary with the Isle of Sheppey beyond. Immediately to the north of the site lie the Kemsley Marshes beyond which lies the Kemsley Paper Mill effluent treatment works and a jetty operated by Knauf for the import of gypsum by barge.
- 2.5 The sites lie within the ward of Kemsley (0.8km to the south west) and Milton Regis (2.6km to the south west). Sittingbourne is situated approximately 2.6km south of the site.




Figure 1: Site location plan showing indicative red boundary

2 PROPOSED DEVELOPMENT SITES




Figure 2: Sensitive sites/areas/receptors in proximity to the sites

- 2.6 The sites lies in proximity to a number of sensitive areas and sites which could be potentially affected by the K3 and WKN proposals which will be assessed within the EIA. The main sensitive sites/areas are listed below and their location illustrated in Figure 2:
 - The Swale Special Protection Area, Special Site of Specific Interest and Ramsar site designated for its grazing marshes, estuarine habitats and the assemblage of breeding and overwintering birds it supports.
 - 'Castle Rough' a Medieval moated site (Scheduled Monument).
 - Local residents in the Kemsley area of Sittingbourne.
 - The A249 and local highways network.
 - The River Swale.
 - The Saxon Shore Way Public Right of Way which runs along the sites eastern boundaries.

It should be noted that this is not an exhaustive list but identifies the main sensitive sites/areas only.

3 WHEELABRATOR KEMSLEY (K3)

- 3.1 Planning permission was granted under the Town and Country Planning Act 1990 by Kent County Council in 2012 for a sustainable waste-to-energy plant (K3). Construction of the plant began in August 2016 and is expected to be completed with the plant operational by late 2019. As consented the K3 facility will have two 102MWth lines, be capable of processing 550,000 tonnes of waste per annum and have a generating output of 49.9MW.
- 3.2 The facility when operational will process post-recycled waste to produce electricity and steam consequentially reducing the disposal of waste to UK landfill. Steam generated by the facility will be piped to the adjacent Kemsley Paper Mill for the paper production process. The facility will employ approximately 50 full time members of staff and will operate in accordance with an Environmental Permit issued by the Environment Agency which sets limits on emissions to air, water and land and is continually monitored by them.

Wheelabrator Kemsley (K3) Proposed Development

- 4.1 As identified previously, K3 benefits from planning permission (KCC/SW/10/444) granted in 2012 for the construction of a sustainable waste-to-energy plant and the site is at an advanced stage of construction and programmed to become fully operational in late 2019.
- 4.2 The proposed application seeks a DCO to allow the permitted K3 facility to operate to an upgraded power generation level of 75MW (an additional 25.1 MW) and to process an additional 107,000 tonnes of waste per annum ('the K3 Proposed Development').
- These are purely operational changes to the facility and do not require any changes to the built form (design, size, shape or appearance) as permitted (KCC/SW/10/444 as amended) or to the layout of the site.




Figure 5: Process diagram illustrating how K3 will be modified to increase power output

- The ability to increase the power output from the facility is consequential to improvements to the efficiency of in plant technology since the original application was made. The operational change to the plant would be facilitated by de-restricting the flow of steam to the turbine and reconfiguring the central control system. The key processes of the K3 plant and the mechanism by which the power upgrade will be facilitated is set out in Figure 5 below.

4.5 An increased tonnage throughput allows WTI in the event of increased availability (the amount of time the plant can operate between routine maintenance) or changes in the composition of the waste received, to generate as much energy as they are permitted to do so and increase the overall efficiency of the plant. This increase in waste throughput will generate an additional 34 HGV visits to the site per day.

Wheelabrator Kemsley North (WKN) Proposed Development

- 4.6 The proposed application seeks Development Consent to construct and operate a new waste-toenergy plant, Wheelabrator Kemsley North (WKN) ('the WKN Proposed Development'). The facility would comprise a single 125MWth line facility capable of processing 390,000 tonnes of waste per annum, with a generating capacity of up to 42MW.
- 4.7 An illustrative plan showing how the layout of the facility will likely be arranged is shown in Figure 7. The plant will essentially comprise a series of interlinked buildings, the key buildings of which will be as follows:
 - Fuel reception and storage facilities, consisting of a tipping hall, shredder, storage bunker and cranes;
 - Combustion system housed within a boiler hall comprising a single combustion line and associated boilers;
 - · A steam turbine and generator housed within a turbine hall;
 - A bottom ash handling system, including storage hall and ash collection bay;
 - A flue gas treatment system, including residues and reagent storage silos and tanks;
 - A stack and associated emissions monitoring systems;
 - A cooling system comprising air cooled condenser (ACC) units; and
 - Other associated supporting facilities.
- 4.8 As with the adjacent K3 facility all waste will be brought to the site in HGVs or in Refuse Collection Vehicles via Barge Way from the north of the Paper Mill. Once arriving at the site, the HGVs access the facility via a weighbridge and then manoeuvre on site and enter the tipping hall.




Figure 6: Process diagram showing how WKN will operate

- 4.9 The WKN facility will then combust the waste imported to the site to generate hot gases that in turn are used to produce steam and ultimately electricity. The key waste-to-energy processes are illustrated in Figure 6 overleaf.

WKN - Hours of Operation

4.10 The facility, as with the adjacent K3 plant, will operate 24 hours per day, 7 days per week with programmed offline periods for maintenance.

WKN - Access and Transport

4.11 The additional waste will be brought to the site in HGVs or in refuse collection vehicles via Barge Way from the north of the Paper Mill. It is estimated that there will be on average 125 HGVs per day Monday to Saturday associated with the operation of the plant including waste delivery, IBA removal and deliveries of process inputs.

WKN - Chemical Storage

4.12 The Proposed Development will use a number of raw materials during the combustion and processing operation including hydrated lime, solid urea, activated carbon and low sulphur diesel. All chemicals will be stored in fully bunded areas.

WKN - Wastewater and Drainage

- Water used in the waste-to-energy process is continually recycled such that the facility is not a regular net consumer of water. Any excess process water is stored safely on site and utilised as and when required. No process water is discharged to the Swale.
- The onsite surface water drainage network for the site will be split into two separate drainage systems.

 The first drainage system will collect clean surface water runoff (for example from building roof areas) and store it in the lagoon.
- 4.15 The second drainage system will collect 'dirty' runoff (for example from the waste bunker) and store it in the 'dirty' water tank. This 'dirty' water will then be used in the process as required (for example for ash quenching) and will not be discharged into the Swale. The clean water will be stored in the lagoon and used to top up the 'dirty' water tank as and when required. If the lagoon has reached the maximum acceptable capacity it will be discharged at a controlled rate into the Swale Estuary.

WKN - Employment

4.16 It is anticipated that during the operational phase, the Project will generate between 35 and 50 full-time permanent jobs.

WKN - Construction of the Proposed Development

- 4.17 The entire site preparation and construction programme is anticipated to take approximately 40 months from commencement to take over. This will comprise the following key stages:
 - Civil engineering works (month 0-38) the physical works associate with constructing the facility
 - Process works (month 12-38) mechanical and electrical installation, fit out and commissioning of the plant
 - Commissioning of the facility (month 30 40)
- 4.18 With the exception of construction using the concrete slip-forming method, construction using constant pour methods for concrete laying and internal process works relating to mechanical and/ or electrical equipment installation, construction activities shall only take place between 07:00 and 19:00 hours Monday to Friday inclusive and 07:00 and 16:00 hours Saturday and Sunday with no construction activities to take place on Bank or Public Holidays subject to any prior written variation as approved by the Waste Planning Authority. The designated route for delivery of construction plant and materials is via Barge Way.
- 4.19 A designated construction laydown area is proposed north east of the site adjacent to the Knauf Jetty as shown on Figure 1 on page 3.

5 ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT ASSESSMENT

What is the purpose of EIA?

- 5.1 The purpose of Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) is to identify the likely significant effects of a proposed development, positive or negative, to some aspect of the environment whether natural or man made. Both the sensitivity of the environmental receptors being affected and the magnitude of the impact inform the significance of the effect. The findings of the EIA are then presented in a document known as an Environmental Statement (ES).
- The significant environmental effects of the K3 Proposed Development during operation and future decommissioning of the facility, and construction, operation and future decommissioning of the WKN Proposed Development requires assessment in the ES by appropriate technical experts.
- 5.3 Where feasible, mitigation measures have been proposed to avoid/reduce an adverse effect identified. A reassessment of an effect with this mitigation in place is then undertaken to determine its significance post mitigation. Any significant environmental effects remaining after mitigation are reported and represent the likely residual effects of the proposed development on the environment (if any).
- 5.4 Where identified, significant residual effects are required to be taken into account in the application decision making process by the SoS. If consent is granted mitigation measures are secured by requirements within the DCO to ensure they are implemented and legally enforceable.

What issues have been assessed?

- 5.5 A formal scoping opinion request was made to PINS in August 2018 to seek to agree the scope of the issues to be included in the EIA in consultation with the relevant consultees i.e. Kent County Council (KCC) Highways, the Environment Agency, Natural England etc. A copy of the formal scoping opinion is publicly available on PINS website: https://infrastructure.planninginspectorate.gov.uk/projects/southeast/wheelabrator-kemsley-generating-station-k3-and-wheelabrator-kemsley-north-wkn-waste-to-energy-facility/
- 5.6 Consequently it was agreed that the following topic areas need to be assessed within the EIA, a summary of the preliminary results of which is provided within this document:
 - Traffic and transport (K3 and WKN Proposed Development)
 - Air Quality (K3 and WKN Proposed Development)
 - Greenhouse Gases and Climate Change (K3 and WKN Proposed Development)
 - Noise and Vibration (K3 and WKN Proposed Development)
 - Human health (K3 and WKN Proposed Development)
 - Ground contamination (WKN only)
 - Water Environment (WKN only)
 - Ecology (K3 and WKN Proposed Development)
 - Landscape and Visual Effects (WKN only)
 - Archaeology and heritage (WKN only)
 - Cumulative effects (K3 & WKN Proposed Development and other proposed or permitted development in the local area)
- 5.7 Where a particular environmental feature, or component of it, has not been included within an EIA, this is not to suggest that there will be no associated effects; rather that these are not considered to be among the potentially significant effects.

6.1 The EIA will assess a range of potentially significant environmental effects utilising the professional experience of a range of competent experts and the Scoping Opinion of the SoS and relevant consultees. The findings of the EIA will be presented in the final ES. The summary below provides a commentary on the assessments undertaken to date including the likely significant environmental effects envisaged (where possible at this stage), any mitigation measures proposed to reduce or offset these effects and the likely residual effects of the development on the environment. Members of the public are advised that this information is preliminary at this stage pending the full results of the assessments which will be provided in the final ES submitted with the application to the SoS. Please see the end of this document for information on how you can comment on this Preliminary Environmental Information and the final ES once submitted to the SoS.

What has been assessed?

- 6.2 A scoping checklist of environmental features and their components was utilised to identify those aspects of the environment or components of them that have the potential to be subjected to likely significant environmental effects and therefore should be included in the EIA during the scoping process.
- 6.3 A formal Scoping Opinion request, which included the results of the checklist assessment, was made to the SoS in August 2018 to agree the scope of the EIA in consultation with the relevant consultees i.e. KCC, the Environment Agency, Natural England etc.
- 6.4 The EIA will be produced in accordance with the SoS's formal Scoping Opinion and subsequent consultation undertaken during the completion of the EIA.

Method of assessment

- The specialist assessments follow generally similar methodologies. Desk and/or field studies will be undertaken to establish the existing situation at the site(s) and surrounding area. The effects of the K3 and WKN Proposed Developments are then established using a method that compares the sensitivity /importance of an aspect of the environment with the likely size of the predicted change to establish the degree of effect (negligible, slight, moderate, substantial, very substantial). Typically if an effect is determined to be of moderate significance or above then it is deemed to be a significant effect for the purpose of the EIA Regulations.
- The degree of an effect determines the resources that should be put in place to avoid or reduce an adverse effect. Where appropriate mitigation measures have been proposed to avoid/reduce a significant adverse effect. The significance of an effect with this mitigation in place is then re-assessed to determine its significance post mitigation.
- Any significant environmental effects remaining after mitigation are reported and represent the likely residual effects of the proposed development on the environment.
- 6.8 All methodologies are undertaken in accordance with current guidance and best practice.
- 6.9 A summary of the preliminary assessments of the specialist environmental topics is provided overleaf.

Traffic and Transport

- 6.10 There are no construction vehicle movements associated with K3 Proposed Development. During operation it is estimated that it will produce an average of 34 additional HGV deliveries per day as a result of the additional 107 tonnes of waste. There will be no additional operational staff.
- 6.11 WKN is estimated to produce an average of 125 HGV deliveries per day when operational; 50 staff over three shifts are expected to be employed when fully operational. During WKNs construction period there is expected to be a maximum of 45 HGV deliveries and 480 construction staff per day. The majority of construction and operational staff vehicle movements will not occur during the peak hours of the highway network.
- 6.12 K3 will be assessed for operation only and WKN will be assessed for both construction and operational scenarios. Additionally, a cumulative assessment will be undertaken to assess the impact of both developments. Access for the vehicles associated with the construction and operation of the two developments would be via the A429, Swale Way and Barge Way. Highway capacity assessments are being undertaken to determine the effect of these vehicle movements along the adjacent highway network.
- 6.13 There are currently approximately 20,000 vehicle movements per day along Swale way, 2,000 of which are HGVs. Thus, the traffic associated with the operation of the two developments represents only a small proportion of current traffic flows on the adjacent highway network (approximately 2%) and the relative change in traffic flows as a result of the vehicles would be difficult to perceive. The sensitivity of receptors along the adjacent highway network are deemed to be low / negligible and initial assessments indicate that the effect of the vehicles would be negligible.
- 6.14 There is expected to be a number of abnormal and indivisible loads required to deliver large items of plant in connection with the construction of WKN. The escort and management requirements will be agreed with the highway authorities as part of obtaining permission to enable their movement on the highway via the Motor Vehicles (Authorisation of Special Use) General Order (HMSO,2003).

Air Quality

- 6.15 The impacts of emissions from the K3 and WKN Proposed Development on human health and sensitive nature conservation sites in the local area will be assessed using an atmospheric dispersion model. This will include an assessment to determine a suitable stack height for WKN to ensure adequate dispersion of pollutants. Emissions will be modelled at the concentration limits in the Industrial Emissions Directive (IED). The predicted contributions will be added to existing background concentrations and the total pollutant concentration will then be compared with the relevant Environment Assessment Levels. The impact of K3 and WKN emissions will be also assessed individually. The models will be run for five years of hourly sequential meteorological (weather) data to allow the impacts to be assessed for a wide range of conditions. The cumulative impacts of K3, WKN and other cumulative projects will also be considered.
- 6.16 The impacts of traffic-related emissions from vehicles movements generated by the developments on human-health will be assessed.
- 6.17 Concentrations of nitrogen oxides, sulphur dioxide, ammonia, nutrient nitrogen deposition rates and acid deposition rates at the Swale Special Protection Area and Ramsar, Medway Estuary and Marshes Special Protection Area and Ramsar, Thames Estuary and Marshes Special Protection Area and Ramsar, Queensdown Warren Special Area of Conservation and Outer Thames Estuary Special Protection Area will also be predicted and compared with the relevant critical levels and loads.

6.18 Whilst still subject to the final assessment, it is likely that the air quality effects associated with emissions from K3/WKN will not be significant as the optimum stack height will be determined as part of the assessment.

Greenhouse Gases and Climate Change

- 6.19 The main impact on climate change from both the K3 Proposed Development and the WKN Proposed Development would be their direct greenhouse gas emissions when operational from combustion of waste.
- 6.20 The proposed changes to K3 would increase its efficiency (the amount of electricity generated per tonne of waste) and therefore reduce its greenhouse gas emissions intensity, i.e. reduce the amount of greenhouse gases emitted per megawatt-hour of electricity generated.
- 6.21 Operation of the WKN Proposed Development would cause greenhouse gas emissions from waste combustion, transport and pollutant control systems but would also avoid some greenhouse gas emissions from alternative waste treatment and energy generation sources that are replaced. The greenhouse gas emissions of the K3 and WKN Proposed Developments will be quantified in the Environmental Statement and set into the context of the UK's energy, waste and climate change policies to assess the net impact.
- 6.22 Over the course of the K3 and WKN Proposed Development's lifetime, changes in climate could also pose risks to it or could increase the vulnerability of other parts of the environment it affects, such as local ecosystems. The main risk is from flooding, which will be assessed in the Water Environment chapter of the Environmental Statement including a suitable precautionary allowance for increased rainfall in the future, following the Government's guidance on flood risk.

Noise and Vibration

- 6.23 Work on the noise and vibration assessment is underway. Survey data to establish baseline noise levels has been gathered from previous projects at the Site and is considered sufficient and representative without further baseline measurement.
- 6.24 Noise and vibration during construction of the WKN Proposed Development will be controlled by adherence to an appropriate Construction Environmental Management Plan (CEMP) which will stipulate appropriate construction methods to minimise construction noise. There will be no construction working outside of the normal working hours as previously adopted for K3 without the express written permission of the local planning authority (Swale Borough Council).
- Noise levels are not anticipated to increase as a consequence of the K3 Proposed Development. A pro-rata estimation of the increase in associated vehicle movements suggests that any noise increase from waste vehicle movements would be less than 2 dB. Additional noise from the operational plant of WKN would be similar in character and magnitude to that from K3. Cumulative operational noise emissions from K3 and WKN will be controlled to acceptable levels in accordance with industry guidelines and World Health Organisation guidance, by selection of appropriate plant, by design and, where necessary, by acoustic mitigation.
- 6.26 The effects of noise on the ecology of the area will be considered within the ecology chapter, with appropriate noise predictions provided to the ecologist to inform their assessment.
- 6.27 Vibration during operation of the facility will be controlled at source, and off-site vibration is likely to be negligible. There would be no change to the existing K3 vibration emissions.

Human Health

- 6.28 The human health assessment will draw from and build upon outputs from the wider technical disciplines to assess the potential human health effects (both adverse and beneficial) that would be directly attributed to the proposed developments.
- 6.29 The approach and specific health assessment protocols applied are dependent on the nature, duration, magnitude and degree of community exposure to construction and operational activities and hazards which could potentially influence health.
- 6.30 The main health determinants considered within the assessment for the K3 Proposed Development comprise changes to air quality, transport and potentially some change in noise associated with waste deliveries to the site. Each health determinant will be assessed within a defined section of the ES to objective thresholds set to be protective of the environment and health; the Human Health chapter will then further assess the health determinants to set any potential risk in context.
- 6.31 The WKN Proposed Development requires construction and operation impacts to be considered. The health determinants to be assessed for both phases comprise changes in air quality, noise, transport and employment opportunities.
- 6.32 For both the K3 and WKN proposed developments, the significance of effect on human health will be considered in the context of a generally low socio-economic status in the area and comparably high allage all-cause mortality rate (i.e. local communities are considered relatively sensitive to both positive and negative changes in environmental and socio-economic conditions). At this stage, a preliminary assessment of each health determinant indicates that the magnitude of impact on local communities is not sufficient to quantify any measurable change in health outcomes. This is consistent with the Public Health England (formerly Health Protection Agency) position on Energy from Waste facilities (Health Protection Agency, 2010), and will be further tested within the final ES.

Landscape and Visual Effects

- 6.33 The K3 Proposed Development does not require any change to the built form or layout of the permitted scheme, therefore no adverse effects on landscape, townscape or visual resources are anticipated. The following section therefore focuses on the WKN Proposed Development. A preliminary Zone of Theoretical Visibility (ZTV) of the development has been generated to establish the study area based on preliminary scheme information.
- 6.34 Information on landscape, townscape and visual resources within the relevant study area has been collected through a detailed desktop review of existing studies and data sets and field-based surveys and analysis.
- 6.35 The WKN application site currently comprises laydown and parking areas for the construction of K3 and has been cleared of vegetation. Large scale industrial buildings and chimneys at the DS Smith Paper Mill form the western and southern site boundaries, separate the location from the residential districts of Sittingbourne. This urban area is defined as the Sittingbourne Industrial Commercial townscape character area. The Industrial/commercial character area has a poor quality and condition due to the extensive industrial buildings and infrastructure and the presence of disused and derelict land resulting in a low value. There are no designated landscapes which lie within the site area.
- 6.36 The site is currently not visible in views from the majority of the settlement of Sittingbourne due to industrial development on the edge of the town and the restored landfill mound to the south. To

the east of the site the channel of the Swale and low- lying landscape of the Isle of Sheppey allow more open, longer distance views. Key receptors of potentially high sensitivity and susceptibility to change in view as a result of the proposals include walkers using the Saxon Shore Way long distance footpath (ZU1/2) beside the Swale and Milton Creek. The greatest number of visual receptors with views towards the site would be the occupants of vehicles travelling on Swale Way.

- 6.37 Twelve candidate viewpoint locations have been defined and photography undertaken to inform the visual impact assessment. Viewpoints have been agreed through consultation with Kent County Council/Swale Borough Council.
- 6.38 The new buildings and infrastructure which form the proposed WKN, although large in scale, would form an extension of the existing character of neighbouring development at DS Smith. The townscape character of the site would be of low sensitivity to change through development. Significant adverse effects on townscape character during construction or operation during the day or at night, would be unlikely.
- 6.39 The surrounding landscape character areas of the Swale and Isle of Sheppey are generally in good condition and have an intrinsically high value. There would be no direct effects on these rural and wild landscapes and their sensitivity to change through the indirect influence of the new WKN would be medium or low. Significant adverse effects on these landscape character areas during construction or operation during the day or at night would also be unlikely due to the similar nature of the proposals to the established industrial context.
- There are unlikely to be any significant adverse effects during construction and operation on views gained by visual receptors at individual locations within the study area as a result of the proposals. The proposed buildings and structures would generally be visible in front of or in the backdrop of existing large scale industrial buildings at the paper mill. The tops of flue stacks are likely to be the only visible element, beside other stacks in views from the south and west. There will be no locations where new industrial buildings or structures at the proposal site would be seen in a view that does not already contain views of large areas of existing industry.
- 6.41 There is the potential for significant sequential effects on walkers using the Saxon Shore Way long distance path which follows the coastline and estuary landform within a valued and designated landscape, passing relatively close to the proposed WKN. Receptors would have the opportunity to gain a series of views of the development for a distance of several kilometres as part of a walk, leading to the potential for an accumulation of effects which may be significant. Further assessment work will be undertaken to establish the potential for these significant effects.

Biodiversity

- The effect of the K3 and WKN Proposed Developments on ecology will be assessed following goodpractice guidelines (Chartered Institute of Ecology and Environmental Management 2018) along with PINS Advice Note 10: Habitats Regulations Assessment Relevant to Nationally Significant Infrastructure Projects. The 2 km area surrounding the proposed WKN/K3 site includes the following designated sites:
 - The Swale Special Protection Area (SPA), Ramsar and Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI)
 - The Swale Marine Conservation Zone (MCZ);
 - Elmley Island National Nature Reserve (NNR); and
 - Milton Creek Local Wildlife Site (LWS).

- 6.43 Further internationally-designated sites within 10 km of the site boundary:
 - · Medway Estuary and Marshes SPA, Ramsar;
 - Thames Estuary and Marshes SPA, Ramsar;
 - Outer Thames Estuary SPA; and
 - Queendown Warren Special Area of Conservation (SAC).
- 6.44 The K3 Proposed Development has the potential to change the emissions, and hence potential effects from gaseous concentrations of oxides of nitrogen, ammonia, sulphur dioxide as well as deposition of both nutrient nitrogen and acid on nearby designated sites. Effects from emissions to air on these sites will be assessed following Environment Agency guidelines and using data from the Air Pollution Information System (APIS) website to define the site-relevant critical loads/critical load functions, as appropriate.
- 6.45 The WKN site is currently under temporary use as the laydown for K3. Although the WKN site currently benefits from permission to construct an Incinerator Bottom Ash (IBA) Facility which has elements of habitat creation associated with it, this will not now be constructed. Therefore, upon completion of K3, the original intention was to restore it back to rough grassland, scrub and rubble piles (i.e. the habitats it comprised pre-development). Extensive survey data exists from the original K3 application that included the WKN site demonstrating that the site supported reptiles, the nationally-rare plant annual-beard grass (also an interest feature of The Swale and Medway Estuary and Marshes Ramsar sites) and various species of breeding birds. On this basis, therefore, the ecological baseline for the WKN site will be the restored habitat of grassland, scrub and rubble piles.
- A large area of reedbed lies to the immediate north of the development site/south of the laydown area which has been used by breeding marsh harrier every year (surveys have been undertaken 2009, 2012, 2016 & 2018). During the original K3 application, there was sufficient uncertainty regarding the effects of construction activity on the marsh harrier that, in discussion with Natural England and the Royal Society for the Protection of Birds (RSPB), it was agreed that a new 1 ha reedbed would be created at Harty Fen on the Isle of Sheppey such that, should marsh harrier abandon the Kemsley reedbed due to construction disturbance, there would be alternative breeding habitat available nearby. The reedbed was built in 2011 and handed over to the RSPB in 2012.
- 6.47 The proposed laydown area comprises bare, made ground with an area of dense scrub and small patches of rough grassland. Surveys of the grassland for reptiles are being undertaken in autumn 2018. Initial results indicate a small population of common lizards is present in this area. The construction of WKN will result in the loss of the grassland/scrub/rubble habitat under the footprint of the building and associated infrastructure with associated effects on the fauna and flora these support. Once built, power generating stations such as K3 and WKN do not produce significant noise nor do they result in significant visual/activity disturbance with the majority of activities taking place within sealed buildings. There may be construction disturbance effects, however, particularly to The Swale SPA/ Ramsar/SSSI and associated sites. These will be avoided/mitigated through appropriate timing of works and the use of visual screens, as described for the original K3 application.
- 6.48 Since there is some overlap between the WKN and K3 sites, a comprehensive ecology mitigation strategy, updating that already produced as part of the original K3 application would be produced. This will set out the new areas of habitat creation associated with the WKN site, in addition to those already established for K3. It will provide details of both creation and on-going management/monitoring and describe how the development will deliver a net gain for biodiversity.

Ground Conditions

- 6.49 The ground conditions of the K3 site were assessed as part of the original application for the facility and addressed by virtue of planning conditions attached to that permission which have been discharged. In the absence of any change in built form associated with the K3 Proposed Development there is no potential for further ground condition related effects.
- 6.50 The effect of the proposed WKN development will be assessed following UK best practice, principally based around the Environment Agency and DEFRA document 'CLR11 Model Procedures for the Management of Land Contamination'. It is anticipated that, although the WKN site is located adjacent to the wider Paper Mill site since the 1930s, any contamination present at the site associated with the mills industrial history will be limited in extent. The Ground Conditions Chapter of the EIA will primarily focus on the potential for contamination to be present within the WKN development area and to determine potential effects of contamination, if present, to impact on human health, local groundwater and surface water resources and on the local sensitive ecological receptors.
- 6.51 The shallow geological stratum underlying the site is generally of a low sensitivity with regard to groundwater contamination, however the study will include an assessment of the potential effects during the construction and operation of the waste to energy plant might have on groundwater quality.
- 6.52 The nearby Swale and Milton Creek are both sensitive receptors both in terms of surface water quality and as nature conservation areas and the study will therefore include an assessment of potential effects the construction and operation of the waste to energy plant might have on these receptors.
- 6.53 It is anticipated that through the implementation of industry best practice methodologies during and post construction, impacts on human health, groundwater, surface water and sensitive ecological receptors are likely to be minimal.

Water Environment

- 6.54 The flood risk and drainage strategy for the K3 facility as permitted was assessed as part of the original application for the development. In the absence of any change to the quantum of the impermeable surface of the site and no proposed changes to the drainage regime there is no potential for further significant effects associated with the K3 Proposed Development.
- The effect of the WKN Proposed Development will be assessed following UK best practice, Institute of Environmental Management and Assessment (IEMA) Guidelines for Environmental Impact Assessment (2004) and the Design Manual for Roads and Bridges (DMRB), Volume 11, Part 10, (November 2009). Whilst the DMRB is not specific to the assessment of hydrology and flood risk, it provides an accepted approach to the assessment of development impacts. In addition, the assessment has been undertaken in line with National, Regional and Local planning policy requirements.
- 6.56 Determination of the baseline conditions at the application site has been established through a review of literature and data from publicly available sources including; the EA, British Geological Survey (BGS). Medway Drainage Board, and Kent County Council (KCC).
- 6.57 The Water Environment Chapter of the EIA will primarily focus on flood risk and the potential impacts on water quality and quantity as a consequence of the Proposed Development during the construction, operation and decommissioning phases.

- 6.58 The tidally dominated Swale is approximately 50 m to the east at closest orientation to the Proposed Development and has been classified by the EA as the main risk of flooding.
- 6.59 A comparison between EA flood model outputs and the profiled site ground level indicates that the entire Proposed Development lies within Flood Zone 1 (FZ1), with low probability of flooding (assessed as Land having a less than 1 in 1,000 annual probability of river or sea flooding). The construction access road is located within Flood Zone 3 (FZ3), and has a 'high' probability of tidal flooding.
- 6.60 The nearby Swale and Milton Creek are both sensitive receptors both in terms of surface water quality and as nature conservation areas, therefore the study will include an assessment of potential effects construction and operation of the Proposed Development might have on these receptors.
- 6.61 It is anticipated that through the implementation of industry best practice methodologies and appropriate drainage measures during construction, operation and later decommissioning phase, impacts on flooding and surface water, and interrelated sensitive ecological receptors are likely to be slight and not significant.

Archaeology and Heritage

- 6.62 The K3 Proposed Development will not require any changes to the built form or layout of the K3 facility as permitted and therefore no likely significant effects on archaeology and built heritage will result from the K3 Proposed Development.
- 6.63 A desk assessment undertaken in connection with the WKN Proposed Development has revealed that there are no statutorily designated heritage assets (e.g. Scheduled Monuments, Listed Buildings) within the application site.
- The closest designated asset is Castle Rough, a Scheduled Monument (SM) (HER number TQ96NW10, list entry number 1013368). The SM is located some 460 metres southwest of the proposal site. It is low lying and not visible from any distance away. The closest listed building to the built part of the proposed development is Little Murston Farmhouse, located some 1.4 kilometres southeast of the proposal site and listed at Grade II (list entry number 1061035). There are a number of other designated assets within the study area. There is no evidence that the proposed development would have a significant effect on any of them.
- Recent archaeological work in the area, including on the Sittingbourne Northern Relief Road, has indicated that the higher ground of the Kemsley Ridge has the potential to contain remains from the prehistoric through to the medieval periods, with further activity taking place in the lower lying marshlands now represented by areas of alluvium. There is also the potential for remains from later periods. No archaeological remains were observed on the surface within the proposal site, part of which has recently been used as a laydown area.
- The nature of the 20th century land-use within the proposal site and the associated ground disturbance suggest that the potential for the survival of previously unidentified sub-surface archaeological remains of national importance, or of sufficient importance to warrant preservation in situ, is unlikely. It is likely that any archaeological deposits within the proposed construction footprint have been damaged, possibly removed, and that the potential for the survival of archaeological remains is low.

- 7.1 Schedule 4 of the EIA Regulations states that an ES should provide a description of the likely significant effects of the development on the environment resulting from inter alia -
 - *5(e)* The cumulation of effects with other existing and/or approved projects, taking into account any existing environmental problems relating to area of particular environmental importance likely to be affected or the use of natural resources.
- 7.2 Cumulative effects can occur where more than one individual impact may lead to a more significant effect when considered in combination. The ES will therefore consider the potential cumulative effects of the K3 and WKN Proposed Development in combination with other developments within the local area.
- 7.3 All large-scale development within 3km of the site(s) and all large energy, industrial and mixed-use schemes for the purposes of the air quality and landscape and visual impacts (i.e. of a similar type to the proposed development and therefore most likely to result in significant effects) within 10km of the site(s) have been identified for assessment in the ES. This includes sites subject to planning applications and relevant allocations in Swale Borough Council's development plan. A list of these developments is provided below and their location identified on Figures 9 and 10.

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Wheelabrator Kemsley (K3), currently in construction, and the proposed Wheelabrator Kemsley North (WKN) will support the diversion of post-recycled waste from landfill or export and create clean, renewable baseload energy.



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Project Overview

Wheelabrator Technologies is preparing a DCO application for two waste-to-energy projects. The first is for the construction and operation of Wheelabrator Kemsley (K3) and the second is a new 42MW (gross) waste-to-energy facility, Wheelabrator Kemsley North (WKN). Both facilities are located adjacent to DS Smith's paper mill in Kemsley.

We consulted the public in 2017 regarding proposals for a power upgrade which would allow K3 to operate more efficiently to generate an increased amount of clean, renewable baseload electricity. We consulted again in 2018, this time including proposals for the K3 facility to process additional postrecycled waste, as well as consulting again on the power upgrade proposal along with WKN.

Following further guidance from the Planning Inspectorate we are now conducting a further consultation in 2019, so K3 can be properly categorised and consented under the Planning Act 2008.

This consultation reflects the fact Wheelabrator will be seeking consent for construction of K3 at its total generating capacity of 75MW (49.9MW consented + 25.1MW upgrade), together with the separate proposed total tonnage throughput of 657,000 tonnes per annum (550,000 consented + 107,000 tonnage increase). Please note, however, that in practice no new or different works are being proposed to the K3 project that was detailed in our November/December 2018 consultation.

Wheelabrator Kemsley (K3)

K3 currently has planning permission to generate up to 49.9MW (gross) clean, renewable baseload energy, enough to power over 100,000 homes, by processing up to 550,000 tonnes of post-recycled waste per year. K3 was granted planning permission in 2012 and is now under construction, with the facility expected to be operational by late 2019.

Wheelabrator has identified that the facility could generate up to 75MW (gross) of clean, renewable baseload energy which would be achieved by optimising the efficiency of the existing technology within the facility, allowing it to deliver higher amounts of clean, renewable baseload energy without altering its basic design or size. The additional clean, renewable baseload energy generated would be enough to power more than 52,000 extra homes.

The tonnage throughput increase would permit K3 to process an additional 107,000 tonnes of postrecycled waste each year in the event that there is an increase in the amount of time K3 can operate between routine maintenance. This will also allow us operational flexibility to manage the waste received.

We're also proposing to construct a new waste-to-energy facility on land immediately adjacent to K3, known as Wheelabrator Kemsley North (WKN).

WKN would be a new single line waste-to-energy plant capable of generating up to 42MW (gross), clean, renewable baseload electrical output by processing up to 390,000 tonnes of post-recycled waste per year. Alongside K3, WKN would also provide clean, renewable baseload electricity to the national grid. WKN will be designed to ensure optimal operational efficiency across the K3 and WKN facilities.

The WKN facility would be constructed immediately adjacent to the existing K3 facility. WKN would be capable of producing enough clean, renewable baseload energy to power more than 87,000 homes. Together, K3 and WKN would be capable of generating enough clean, renewable baseload energy to power more than 240,000 homes.

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

MARSHAL FOCH AND CITY **HONOURS**

GUILDHALL WELCOME

PRAISE FOR OUR ARMIES

Marshal Foch yesterday received the highest honour which the City of London can confer when he was presented at the Guildhall with the freedom of the City and a sword of honour. During this historic ceremony the Lord Mayor was able to announce that his Majesty had also been pleased to confer on the Commander-in-Chief of the Allied and Associated armies in France the baton of a Field-Marshal of the British Army. This announcement was received with immense enthusiasm by a crowded audience.

Great interest was displayed in Marshal Foch's visit to the City and the approaches to the Guildhall were packed by dense crowds. Inside the Guildhall there was a distinguished gathering, including many generals who fought with Marshal Foch in France. Foremost among these was Field-Marshal Sir Douglas Haig, the Commander-in-Chief of the British armies in France, who received a particularly warm reception, and later paid a soldier's tribute to the Marshal.

All along the route to the Guildhall Marshal Foch had an enthusiastic reception. On arriving at the Guildhall yard he inspected the guard-of-honour of the 1st Irish Guards.

A procession was then formed to the Great Hall, where a wonderful welcome awaited the distinguished visitor. The audience rose and cheered again and again, and Marshal Foch was evidently pleased with the greeting extended to him.

The customary ceremony of the presentation of the freedom of the City was then proceeded with. The order of the Court of Common Council conferring the honorary freedom of the City with a sword of honour was read by the Town Clerk. This was followed by the oration of the Chamberlain recounting the reasons which induced the City to add Marshal Foch's name to the distinguished list of freemen. Marshal Foch's, reply was a eulogy of the effort put forth by the British Empire to secure victory.

BRITISH DASH

MARSHAL FOCH'S TRIBUTE

Marshal Foch, who spoke in French, said:

After the welcome which I received last December and the manifestations of which I was the object on July 19, after having received from the King this morning the highest rank in the British Army, it was difficult for me to entertain any doubts about the warm and cordial feelings of Great Britain towards me. You have been good enough to make this assurance doubly sure by conferring upon me the highest distinction in the gift of your ancient city, in ascribing my name on its Roll of Honour, on which so many illustrious names appear. No testimony could be more valuable to me. I beg you to accept the expression of my profound, gratitude. (Cheers.)

Long before the war, I was able to appreciate the trend of ideas animating the British Army through my relations with Lord Roberts, the far-seeing and ever-wakeful patriot - (cheers) - with Lord French, the gallant and tenacious soldier of Ypres, with Sir Douglas Haig, and with Sir Henry Wilson. (Cheers.) Moreover, if since March 26, 1918, I was able to act with complete confidence and without reserve in our common pause, it was because I was fully aware of the moral value and the technical training of the British Army, and also of the splendid effort made by Great Britain to maintain the strength of her military forces. To quote but one example, at Ypres in 1914 did I not see the first British corps resist victoriously the enemy's violent attacks in spite of the cruellest losses, and this from Oct. 20 to Nov. 15? On the Somme in 1916 your recently-formed armies gave proof of incomparable ardour, and this gallantry was shared by all the contingents of the Empire - Canadians, Australians, New Zealanders, and others. (Cheers.) As for material, armament. the supply of a quantity of guns and munitions unsuspected to that day, of new mechanical contrivances, gas and apparatus for discharging it, aeroplanes, tanks; of what magnificent volume of production did the industry of your country not show itself capable?

This spirit animated the entire population. Like the Government, the people wanted to win at any price. (Cheers.) In order to give expression to that will and to make certain a victory slow in coming, Parliament in January, 1916, passed the law for compulsory service. If I had to continue this enumeration what would I not have to say about the devotion of the women and the citizens of all ages; from the first to the last all wanted to win, not in order to dominate, but to be free. (Cheers.)




