1.1 INTRODUCTION

- 1.1.1 Cory Environmental Holdings Limited (trading as Cory Riverside Energy) (Cory) is proposing to develop an integrated multi- technology energy generation park in Belvedere, London, to be known as Riverside Energy Park (REP). REP would be developed immediately adjacent to Cory's existing Riverside Resource Recovery Facility (RRRF).
- 1.1.2 Cory intends to apply to the Secretary of State in Q4 2018 for a Development Consent Order ('DCO') under the Planning Act 2008 ('the 2008 Act') to authorise the construction, operation and maintenance of REP.
- 1.1.3 This Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC) has been prepared in accordance with section 47 of the Planning Act 2008 which requires applicants to prepare a statement explaining how they will consult with the local community about the proposed application and carry out pre-application consultation in accordance with this statement.

- 1.1.4 This SoCC therefore explains how Cory will consult with the local community, including residents, businesses, community groups and political representatives about its proposals in accordance with the statutory requirements.
- 1.1.5 This consultation provides an important opportunity for the local community to engage and help shape the proposed development. Responses to the consultation will be taken into account before finalising the proposals and submitting an application for development consent to the Secretary of State.
- 1.1.6 Key consultation dates are outlined in the table below and Table 1.2 provides full details of the public exhibitions.

1.2 CORY ENVIRONMENTAL HOLDINGS LIMITED

- 1.2.1 Cory Environmental Holdings Limited is registered in England (company number 5360864) and the registered address is 2 Coldbath Square, London, United Kingdom, EC1R 5HL.
- 1.2.2 Cory is a leading recycling, energy recovery and resource management company. Cory operates the existing RRRF in Belvedere, adjacent to the project
- site. RRRF is a key element of London's energy and resource management infrastructure.
- 1.2.3 Cory is now progressing plans for the REP to maximise the use of its existing infrastructure and land holding, and to further meet the needs for resource recovery and energy generation. Further information on Cory is provided at http://www.coryenergy.com

1.3 RIVERSIDE ENERGY PARK

- 1.3.1 REP would be developed immediately adjacent to Cory's existing RRRF and would complement the operation of the existing facility. It would comprise a range of energy generating technologies that will supply low carbon/renewable electricity to London. The main elements of REP are described below:
 - Energy Recovery Facility: the ERF would use the same high performing combustion technology as the existing RRRF with the capability to treat commercial and industrial waste and the potential to treat municipal solid waste;
 - Solar Panels: would be integrated across a wide extent of the roof;
 - Battery Storage: would supply additional power to the local distribution network at times of peak electrical demand;
 - Anaerobic Digestion Facility: anaerobic digestion involves the breakdown of biodegradable material in the absence of oxygen. Outputs from the anaerobic digestion facility could be used as a fuel in the ERF to generate electricity or for use in the agricultural sector as fertilizer;

- Combined Heat and Power Connection: incorporate on-site combined heat and power ('CHP') infrastructure with the potential to supply a local heat network to service nearby residential properties in the future;
- be connected to the National Electrical Transmission
 System (NETS) via a new 132 kilovolt (kV) distribution
 network connection and a new substation within the
 REP site. In consultation with UK Power Networks
 (UKPN) Cory are considering Electrical Connection
 Route options to connect to the existing National
 Grid Littlebrook Power Station substation in Dartford.
 A single Electrical Connection Route will be
 confirmed through consultation and included in the
 application for development consent;
- Delivery of waste to REP: the majority of waste will be delivered to REP by barge from Waste Transfer Stations (WTS) along the River Thames using the existing jetty which serves the existing RRRF. The remainder would be delivered by road. The split of road and river deliveries will be determined through further assessment work and details included in the application for development consent; and

Removal of by-products from REP:

Incinerator Bottom Ash (IBA) would be transported by river to the existing IBA Facility at the Port of Tilbury for treatment/recycling and then used as secondary aggregate in the construction sector. Air Pollution Control Residues (APCR) would be taken off site by road in sealed containers to be recycled.

1.3.2 Cory forecasts that REP would:

- Generate up to 96 MW of low carbon renewable electricity at peak times, which taken together with the permitted capacity of 72 MW from the existing RRRF is the equivalent of powering c.300,000 homes across London (almost 10% of London's 3.2m households);
- Divert a further 650,000 tonnes of residual waste away from landfill, which will save the equivalent of 130,000 tonnes of CO₂ each year;
- Make use of Cory's existing river-based infrastructure on the River Thames to further reduce road traffic. At present, Cory's use of the Thames as a "Green Highway" currently removes around 100,000 truck journeys from London's roads every year. The new park would allow for a further 80,000 truck journeys to be removed;

- Be capable of supplying up to 30 MW of affordable heat energy to local housing;
- Create a further 175,000 tonnes/year of construction materials from the EfW process for use in building the south-east's homes and infrastructure, avoiding the need for industry to extract an equivalent tonnage of natural stone; and
- Make a valuable contribution to local employment, with over 100 full-time jobs and apprenticeships set to be created at the energy park and on the river. The construction period is likely to require a workforce in excess of 6,000 people.
- **1.3.3** Construction is targeted to begin in 2021, and REP is expected to be fully operational by 2024.

1.4 THE PLANNING PROCESS

- 1.4.1 The electricity generating capacity of REP will be in excess of 50 MW of electricity. As such, it is classified as a Nationally Significant Infrastructure Project (NSIP) under the Planning Act 2008 which may only be authorised by a DCO made by the Secretary of State.
- 1.4.2 Cory must submit a DCO application to the Planning Inspectorate (PINS) who will first decide, on behalf of the Secretary of State, whether to accept the application. If accepted, PINS will appoint an independent inspector or panel of inspectors to examine the application. Following a
- 6 month examination, the inspector(s) will make a recommendation to the Secretary of State who will then decide whether or not development consent should be granted.

1.4.3 The Secretary of State's decision must be made in accordance with the relevant National Policy Statements (NPSs) which outline the need for energy infrastructure and the issues to be considered. The relevant NPSs are: NPS EN-1 (Overarching Energy Policy), NPS EN-3 (Renewable Energy Infrastructure) and NPS EN-5 (Electricity Networks Infrastructure).

1.5 ENVIRONMENTAL INFORMATION AND POTENTIAL IMPACTS

- 1.5.1 REP is classified as 'EIA development' for the purpose of the Infrastructure Planning (Environmental Impact Assessment) Regulations 2017 ('EIA Regulations 2017').
- 1.5.2 Cory is therefore required to undertake an Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) for the REP proposal. Cory will publish a Preliminary Environmental Information Report (PEIR) as part of the pre-application consultation and we will be seeking views on this information.
- 1.5.3 The PEIR will present the preliminary environmental information collected to date and an initial assessment of the likely significant environmental effects of the proposals.
- 1.5.4 Cory will submit an Environmental Statement (ES) with the DCO application which will report on the likely significant environmental effects of REP identified in the EIA and the appropriate mitigation measures to be put in place where necessary.

1.6 CONSULTATION OBJECTIVES

- 1.6.1 Cory's objectives for the consultation are:
 - To provide consultees with sufficiently detailed information to understand the REP proposal and the potential impacts;
 - To provide consultees with an opportunity to influence aspects of the project that are under development and to understand which elements of the project are fixed and the reasons why;
- Clearly signpost the different ways in which consultees can comment on the proposals; and
- Start a meaningful dialogue with the community that can continue through the submission and examination phase of the consenting process.

1.7 WHAT WE WILL CONSULT ON

- 1.7.1 The statutory consultation will take place between 18th June and 30th July 2018. Consultation responses should be submitted to Cory by 17.00 on 30th July 2018. Cory will consider consultation responses received after this date wherever possible.
- 1.7.2 Cory will provide information on the outline design parameters of the REP proposal including any refinements made in response to previous consultation feedback, provide preliminary information on environmental impacts and proposed mitigation measures based on the findings from the published PEIR.
- 1.7.3 Cory will welcome and consider feedback on all aspects of the proposal and will specifically invite comments on the following:

- A preferred roof option for the facility (stepped, curved or flat);
- Options for the underground electricity connection route;
- The proposed use of the River Thames;
- The proposed approach to traffic and transport management;
- The proposed protection of local air quality; and
- Anything else that matters to you and that you think Cory needs to consider.
- 1.7.4 Cory will hold public exhibitions throughout the statutory consultation period at the times and locations set out in Table 1.2 subject to unforeseen circumstances.

- 1.7.5 In the event that a public exhibition(s) is cancelled or rescheduled due to unforeseen circumstances Cory will seek to alert consultees as early as possible by updating the Riverside Energy Park website and the Cory Riverside Energy twitter account.
- 1.7.6 Display boards at the public exhibitions will provide further details on the different elements of the proposed development, design options, transporting waste on the River Thames and indicative timescales. The public exhibitions will be attended by representatives from the REP team who will be available to answer questions on the proposed development and the consultation.
- 1.7.7 Consultation documents will be available for inspection at the public exhibitions and in local venues during the statutory consultation period including:

- SoCC: this document;
- PEIR: contains an overview of the nature and scale of the proposed development and an initial assessment of the likely significant environmental effects;
- PEIR NTS: a non-technical summary of the information in the PEIR;
- Project brochure: a non-technical summary of the REP proposal;
- Section 48 notice: a copy of the notice published in local and national newspapers advertising Cory's intention to submit a DCO application for the REP proposal as required by section 48 of the 2008 Act; and
- Feedback form: containing questions to capture views on the proposals and consultation available in print and on the Riverside Energy Park website for completion online at

www.riversideenergypark.com

1.8 HOW WE WILL CONSULT

- 1.8.1 Cory will provide information about the proposals and the consultation through a range of methods:
 - Public exhibitions: the public exhibitions will be open for anyone with an interest in REP to attend. Visitors will be able to ask questions to the REP team and will be encouraged to submit comments via a feedback form;
 - Newsletter: newsletters will be mailed to stakeholders within the consultation zone to inform the local community about the REP proposals and the community consultation;
 - **Website**: the Riverside Energy Park website will be regularly updated with the latest news about REP and will provide access to all consultation

- documents, allow completion of an online questionnaire and provide responses to Frequently Asked Questions that arise during the consultation;
- Social media: details of the consultation including reminders of when and where events are taking place will be publicised via the main Cory Riverside Energy twitter account: @CoryEnergy;
- **Posters**: posters advertising the public exhibitions will be displayed in local venues; and


1.8.2 The opening times provided in Table 1.3 are indicative and subject to the venue's operating procedures.



'Flood gates' open as downpour brings chaos

A clean-up operation has taken place across Bexley after several streets were waterlogged following thunder-storms and torrential rain.

A statement from Bexley Council confirmed 35 areas across the borough were damaged when flash flooding swept south east London and Kent.

Since the freak weather caused devastation to households, Bexley Council has promised to take action against problem areas to ensure there are no repeats of this in the future.

Among the roads affected was Pembroke Road in Erith, which was pictured partially submerged after the down-pour. Residents had called the London Fire Brigade as the flooding worsened.

According to the council, the scale of damage was

cil, the scale of damage was down to a burst calvert (wa-ter tunnel) which runs un-derneath the road.

Bronze Age Way in Bel-vedere was also heavily af-fected by the flooding, with photos showing the road submerzed in water and cars submerged in water and cars abandoned. As well as drivers, commut-

ers found themselves trapped at Erith train station after coming home from work as a result of flooding on Bronze Age Way. The road was closed for several days while the water was cleared.

The Council confirmed the flooding in Bronze Age Way was caused by blockages in the Corinthian Dyke.

Bexley Council has announced a partnership with Environment Agency, Thames Water and Network Rail to ensure parts of the borough that have been susceptible to flooding the past

will be safeguarded in future. Cllr Peter Craske, cabinet member for places, sent his sympathies to families who had been affected by flooding.


He said: "The torrential rain caused a number of floods across the borough and we worked alongside our partners as quickly as we could to try and ensure the safety of residents and road

Riverside Energy Park Proposed Application for Development Consent

Section 47, Planning Act 2008 Notice Publicising a Statement of Community Consultation (6th June 2018)

Cory Environmental Holdings Limited (trading as Cory Riverside Energy) ('the Applicant') of 2 Coldbath Square, London, United Kingdom, EC1R 5HL (company number 05360864) intends to make an application ('the Proposed Application') to the Secretary of State under section 37 of the Planning Act 2008 ('the 2008 Act') for a Development Consent Order ('DCO') authorising the construction, operation and maintenance of an integrated energy park known as Riverside Energy Park, at Norman Road in Belvedere in the London Borough of Bexley and an Electrical Connection to the Littlebrook substation located in the Borough of Dartford ('the Proposed Development').

The Proposed Development would comprise:

- the Riverside Energy Park, located to the north of Belvedere off Norman
- Road;
 the Electrical Connection, running underground between the Riverside Energy Park site and the Electrical Connection Point at Littlebrook substation into an existing National Grid building in Dartford;
 the Main Temporary Construction Compounds located to the south of the Riverside Energy Park site and west of Norman Road; and
 Other Cable Route Temporary Construction Compounds required to
- support the construction of the chosen Electrical Connection route.

The primary components of the Riverside Energy Park, with a nominal rated electrical output of up to 96 MWe, would comprise

- an Energy Recovery Facility (ERF);
- a Solar Photovoltaic Installation
- Battery Storage; and
 Enabling infrastructure for Combined Heat and Power to the site boundary to provide for potential future local district heating pipe connection.

The Proposed Application will also seek authorisation for the compulsory acquisition of interest in and rights over land, the temporary use of land and the overriding of easements and other rights.

The Proposed Development is classified as a Nationally Significant Infrastructu Project ('NSIP') under the 2008 Act which means that a DCO is required to authorise the construction, operation and maintenance of it.

The Applicant has prepared a Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC) in respect of the Proposed Application which can be inspected at the times and places set out below.

The Applicant is required under section 47 of the 2008 Act to consult the local community about the Proposed Application in accordance with the SoCC. The SoCC explains how the Applicant will consult the local community about the Proposed Application and includes details about consultation events, information available, and how to get involved. The consultation set out in the SoCC will take place between 18th June 2018 and 30th July 2018.



1.1 INTRODUCTION

- 1.1.1 Cory Environmental Holdings Limited (trading as Cory Riverside Energy) (Cory) is proposing to develop an integrated multi- technology energy generation park in Belvedere, London, to be known as Riverside Energy Park (REP). REP would be developed immediately adjacent to Cory's existing Riverside Resource Recovery Facility (RRRF).
- 1.1.2 Cory intends to apply to the Secretary of State in late 2018 for a Development Consent Order ('DCO') under the Planning Act 2008 ('the 2008 Act') to authorise the construction, operation and maintenance of REP.
- 1.1.3 This Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC) has been prepared in accordance with section 47 of the Planning Act 2008 which requires applicants to prepare a statement explaining how they will consult with the local community about the proposed application and carry out pre-application consultation in accordance with this statement.

- 1.1.4 This SoCC therefore explains how Cory will consult with the local community, including residents, businesses, community groups and political representatives about its proposals in accordance with the statutory requirements.
- 1.1.5 This consultation provides an important opportunity for the local community to engage and help shape the proposed development. Responses to the consultation will be taken into account before finalising the proposals and submitting an application for development consent to the Secretary of State.
- 1.1.6 Key consultation dates are outlined in the table below and Table 1.2 provides full details of the public exhibitions.

1.2 CORY ENVIRONMENTAL HOLDINGS LIMITED

- 1.2.1 Cory Environmental Holdings Limited is registered in England (company number 5360864) and the registered address is 2 Coldbath Square, London, United Kingdom, EC1R 5HL.
- 1.2.2 Cory is a leading recycling, energy recovery and resource management company. Cory operates the existing RRRF in Belvedere, adjacent to the project site.
- RRRF is a key element of London's energy and resource management infrastructure.
- 1.2.3 Cory is now progressing plans for REP to maximise the use of its existing infrastructure and land holding, and to further meet the needs for resource recovery and energy generation.

1.3 RIVERSIDE ENERGY PARK

- 1.3.1 REP would be developed immediately adjacent to Cory's existing RRRF and would complement the operation of the existing facility. It would comprise a range of energy generating technologies that will supply low carbon/renewable electricity to London. The main elements of REP are described below:
 - Energy Recovery Facility: the ERF would use the same high performing combustion technology as the existing RRRF with the capability to treat commercial and industrial waste and the potential to treat municipal solid waste;
 - Solar Panels: would be integrated across a wide extent of the roof;
 - Battery Storage: would supply additional power to the local distribution network at times of peak electrical demand;
 - Anaerobic Digestion Facility: anaerobic digestion involves the breakdown of biodegradable material in the absence of oxygen. Outputs from the Anaerobic Digestion facility, for example, could be used as a fuel in the ERF to generate electricity or for use in the agricultural sector as fertilizer;

- Combined Heat and Power Connection: incorporate on-site combined heat and power ('CHP') infrastructure with the potential to supply a local heat network to service nearby residential properties and businesses in the future;
- The Electrical Connection Route: REP would be connected to the National Electrical Transmission System (NETS) via a new 132 kilovolt (kV) distribution network connection and a new substation within the REP site. Working with UK Power Networks (UKPN), Cory are considering Electrical Connection Route options to connect to the existing National Grid Littlebrook Power Station substation in Dartford. A single Electrical Connection Route will be confirmed through consultation and included in the application for development consent;
- Delivery of waste to REP: the majority of waste will be delivered to REP by barge from Waste Transfer Stations (WTS) along the River Thames using the existing jetty which serves the existing RRRF. The remainder would be delivered by road. The split of road and river deliveries will be determined through further assessment work and details included in the application for development consent; and

Removal of by-products from REP:

Incinerator Bottom Ash (IBA) would be transported by river to the existing IBA Facility at the Port of Tilbury for treatment/recycling and then used as secondary aggregate in the construction sector. Air Pollution Control Residues (APCR) would be taken off site by road in sealed containers to be recycled.

1.3.2 Cory forecasts that REP would:

- Generate up to 96 MW of low carbon renewable electricity at peak times, which taken together with the permitted capacity of 72 MW from the existing RRRF is the equivalent of powering c.300,000 homes across London (almost 10% of London's 3.2m households);
- Divert a further 650,000 tonnes of residual waste away from landfill, which will save the equivalent of 130,000 tonnes of CO₂ each year;
- Make use of Cory's existing river-based infrastructure on the River Thames to further reduce road traffic. At present, Cory's use of the Thames as a "Green Highway" currently removes around 100,000 truck journeys from London's roads every year. The new park would allow for a further 80,000 truck journeys to be removed;

- Be capable of supplying up to 30 MW of affordable heat energy to local housing;
- Create a further 175,000 tonnes/year of construction materials from the thermal treatment process for use in building the south-east's homes and infrastructure, avoiding the need for industry to extract an equivalent tonnage of virgin materials; and
- Make a valuable contribution to local employment, with over 100 full-time jobs and apprenticeships set to be created at the energy park and on the river. The construction period is likely to require a workforce in excess of 6,000 people.
- 1.3.3 Construction is targeted to begin in 2021, and REP is expected to be fully operational by 2024.

1.4 THE PLANNING PROCESS

- 1.4.1 The electricity generating capacity of REP will be in excess of 50 MW of electricity. As such, it is classified as a Nationally Significant Infrastructure Project (NSIP) under the Planning Act 2008 which may only be authorised by a DCO made by the Secretary of State.
- 1.4.2 Cory must submit a DCO application to the Planning Inspectorate (PINS) who will first decide, on behalf of the Secretary of State, whether to accept the application. If accepted, PINS will appoint an independent inspector or panel of inspectors to examine the application.
- Following an examination of up to 6 months, the inspector(s) will make a recommendation to the Secretary of State who will then decide whether or not development consent should be granted.
- 1.4.3 The Secretary of State's decision must be made in accordance with the relevant National Policy Statements (NPSs) which outline the need for energy infrastructure and the issues to be considered. The relevant NPSs are: NPS EN-1 (Overarching Energy Policy), NPS EN-3 (Renewable Energy Infrastructure) and NPS EN-5 (Electricity Networks Infrastructure).

1.5 ENVIRONMENTAL INFORMATION AND POTENTIAL IMPACTS

- 1.5.1 REP is classified as 'EIA development' for the purpose of the Infrastructure Planning (Environmental Impact Assessment) Regulations 2017 ('EIA Regulations 2017').
- 1.5.2 Cory is therefore required to undertake an Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) for the REP proposal. Cory will publish a Preliminary Environmental Information Report (PEIR) as part of the pre-application consultation and will be seeking views on this information.
- 1.5.3 The PEIR will present the preliminary environmental information collected to date and an initial assessment of the likely significant environmental effects of the proposals.
- 1.5.4 Cory will submit an Environmental Statement (ES) with the DCO application which will report on the likely significant environmental effects of REP identified in the EIA and the appropriate mitigation measures to be put in place where necessary.

1.6 CONSULTATION OBJECTIVES

- 1.6.1 Cory's objectives for the consultation are:
 - To provide consultees with sufficiently detailed information to understand the REP proposal and the potential impacts;
 - To provide consultees with an opportunity to influence aspects of the project that are under development and to understand which elements of the project are fixed and the reasons why;
- Clearly signpost the different ways in which consultees can comment on the proposals; and
- Start a meaningful dialogue with the community that can continue through the submission and examination phase of the consenting process.

1.7 WHAT WE WILL CONSULT ON

- 1.7.1 The statutory consultation will take place between 18th June and 30th July 2018. Consultation responses should be submitted to Cory by 17.00 on 30th July 2018. Cory will consider consultation responses received after this date wherever possible.
- 1.7.2 Cory will provide information on the outline design parameters of the REP proposal including any refinements made in response to previous consultation feedback, provide preliminary information on environmental impacts and proposed mitigation measures based on the findings from the published PEIR.
- 1.7.3 Cory will welcome and consider feedback on all aspects of the proposal and will specifically invite comments on the following:

- A preferred roof option for the facility (stepped, curved or flat);
- Options for where Cory could route the underground electricity connection;
- Proposed use of the River Thames;
- Proposed approach to traffic and transport management;
- Proposed protection of local air quality; and
- Anything else that matters to you and that you think Cory need to consider.
- 1.7.4 Cory will hold public exhibitions during the statutory consultation period at the times and locations set out in Table 1.2 subject to unforeseen circumstances.



1 Introduction

- 1.1.1 Cory Environmental Holdings Limited (trading as Cory Riverside Energy) ('Cory') proposes to develop an integrated multi-technology energy generation park in Belvedere, London, to be known as Riverside Energy Park ('REP').
- 1.1.2 The REP proposal is classified as a Nationally Significant Infrastructure Project ('NSIP') under the Planning Act 2008 (as amended) ('the 2008 Act'). Cory will therefore need to apply to the Secretary of State ('SoS') for a development consent order ('DCO') to construct and operate the proposal.
- 1.1.3 The planning regime established by the Act 2008 places significant importance on pre-application consultation. Cory propose to undertake a single statutory pre-application consultation period between 18 June and 30 July 2018 incorporating the requirements of sections 42, 47 and 48 of the 2008 Act. Section 2 of this report sets out the requirements of the relevant legislation.
- 1.1.4 The Statement of Community Consultation ('SoCC') (enclosed with this document) explains to the local community how Cory will consult with them on the REP proposals as required under section 47(1) of the 2008 Act. The SoCC provides details of statutory consultation with the local community only.
- 1.1.5 This SoCC Explanatory Statement outlines the statutory consultation requirements of the 2008 Act; explains the pre-application consultation which Cory will undertake with local communities including non-statutory and statutory consultation activities; and provides details of consultation with local authorities on the SoCC as required by section 47(2) of the 2008 Act. This Statement is structured as follows:
 - Section 2 outlines the relevant legislation and guidance;
 - Section 3 provides an overview of the current REP proposals and modifications made to the EIA Scoping proposal;
 - Section 4 explains the purpose and content of the SoCC and Section 5 provides details of the consultation on the SoCC;
 - Section 6 outlines the key drivers behind Cory's community consultation process; and
 - Section 7 presents an overview of the refinement of the SoCC to date.
- 1.1.6 This version of the Consultation Document takes account of feedback received from the local authorities in February March 2018 and informal comments received on an earlier version of the draft SoCC document in March 2018.

Cory is now seeking formal comments on the content and format of the draft SoCC from local authorities under section 47(2) of the 2008 Act.

In accordance with section 47(3) of the 2008 Act local authorities have 28 days in which to respond to this consultation. Therefore, comments must be submitted to Cory by <u>3rd May 2018</u> to ensure that they are incorporated in the published version of the SoCC.

2 Legislation and Policy Background

- 2.1.1 This section outlines the statutory requirement to consult with the local community on proposed DCO applications. The requirements are set out in the 2008 Act, The Infrastructure Planning (Environment Impact Assessment) Regulations 2017 (the 'EIA Regulations') and associated guidance.
- 2.1.2 This document has been produced to satisfy section 47 of the 2008 Act (as amended) which sets out the requirement for applicants to consult with the local community on proposed DCO applications as summarised below:

Section 47 Duty to consult local community

- (1) The applicant must prepare a statement setting out how the applicant proposes to consult, about the proposed application, people living in the vicinity of the land.
- (2) Before preparing the statement, the applicant must consult each local authority that is within section 43(1) about what is to be in the statement.
- (3) The deadline for the receipt by the applicant of a local authority's response to consultation under subsection (2) is the end of the period of 28 days that begins with the day after the day on which the local authority receives the consultation documents.
- (4) In subsection (3) "the consultation documents" means the documents supplied to the local authority by the applicant for the purpose of consulting the local authority under subsection (2).
- (5) In preparing the statement, the applicant must have regard to any response to consultation under subsection (2) that is received by the applicant before the deadline imposed by subsection (3).
- (6) Once the applicant has prepared the statement, the applicant must <u>make the statement available for inspection by the public in a way that is reasonably convenient for people living in the vicinity of the land, and</u>
 - (a) publish a notice stating where and when the statement can be inspected
 - (b) publish the statement in such manner as may be prescribed.
- (7) The applicant must carry out consultation in accordance with the proposals set out in the statement.
- 2.1.3 The 2008 Act (as amended) requires that applicants undertake pre-application consultation with a range of stakeholders in addition to the local community. These requirements are summarised below:
 - Section 42: the applicant must consult with all those required including prescribed bodies¹, the Marine Management Organisation ('MMO'), the

- relevant local authorities, the Greater London Authority ('GLA') and relevant landowners or other parties with an interest in the land;
- Section 43(1): A local authority is within this section if the land is in the authority's area;
- Section 46: the applicant must notify the SoS of the proposed development and provide the section 42 consultation material to the SoS;
- Section 47: the applicant must consult with the relevant local authorities (as defined under section 43(1)) on the content of the SoCC, publish a notice in local newspapers, make the SoCC available to the public and consult with the local community in accordance with the published SoCC;
- Section 48: the applicant must publicise the proposed application in the manner prescribed by Regulation 4 of the APFP Regulations;
- Section 49: the applicant must take account of relevant responses received to consultation and publicity; and
- Section 50: the applicant must have regard to any guidance about how to comply with the requirements of Chapter 2.
- 2.1.4 While this document is concerned with the requirements of section 47 Cory will be undertaking consultation with the local community in parallel with preapplication consultation with stakeholders as required under section 42 of the 2008 Act including prescribed bodies, the MMO, the relevant local authorities, the GLA, landowners and other land interests.
- 2.1.5 The relevant authorities for the REP proposal for the purpose of Section 43(1) include the London Borough of Bexley ('LBB'), Dartford Borough Council ('DBC') and Kent County Council ('KCC').

Regulation 12 Consultation statement requirements

- (1) The consultation statement prepared under section 47(a) (duty to consult local community) must set out—
 - (a) whether the development for which the applicant proposes to make an application for an order granting development consent is EIA development; and
 - (b) if that development is EIA development, how the applicant intends to publicise and consult on the preliminary environmental information.
- 2.1.6 Regulation 12 of the EIA Regulations, set out above, requires that the SoCC must explain how preliminary environmental information about the proposed development will be publicised as part of the community consultation.
- 2.1.7 Cory has taken account of the DCLG (2015) 2008 Act Guidance on the Pre-Application Process (the 'DCLG 2008 Act pre-application guidance') in developing their approach to the community consultation.

3 REP Proposal Overview

3.1.1 This section presents a brief overview of the current REP proposals.

3.2 REP Proposal Overview

- 3.2.1 REP would be developed immediately adjacent to Cory's existing Riverside Resource Recovery Facility (RRRF) and would complement the operation of the existing facility. It would comprise a range of technologies including; waste energy recovery, waste anaerobic digestion, solar panels and battery storage. The main elements of REP are described below:
 - Energy Recovery Facility (ERF): to provide thermal treatment of Commercial and Industrial (C&I) waste with the potential for treatment of municipal solid waste (MSW);
 - Solar Photovoltaic Installation: to be integrated across a wide extent of the roof:
 - Battery Storage: to supply additional power to the local distribution network at times of peak electrical demand. This facility would be integrated into the main REP building;
 - Anaerobic Digestion Facility: outputs from the anaerobic digestion facility would be used as a fuel in the ERF to generate electricity or alternatively transferred off-site for use in the agricultural sector as fertilizer;
 - Combined Heat and Power Connection ('CHP'): REP would be CHP enabled with necessary infrastructure within the REP site included. The heat connection could service nearby residential developments such as the Thamesmead area;
 - The Electrical Connection Route: REP would be connected to the existing National Electrical Transmission System ('NETS') via a new 132 kilovolt (kV) distribution network connection and a new substation within the REP site. In consultation with UK Power Networks ('UKPN') Cory are currently considering Electrical Connection Route options to connect to the existing National Grid Littlebrook Power Station substation located south east of REP. All Electrical Connection options have been included within the Indicative Application Boundary at this stage. A single Electrical Connection Route will be confirmed through consultation with UKPN and included in the DCO application;
 - Delivery of waste to REP: the majority of waste will be delivered to REP by barge from Waste Transfer Stations (WTS) along the River Thames, utilising the existing jetty as per the existing RRRF. The remainder would be delivered by road. The proportions of the total to be delivered by road and river will be determined through further assessment work and details included in the DCO application; and

- Removal of by-products from REP: Incinerator Bottom Ash (IBA) would be transported by river to the existing IBA Facility at the Port of Tilbury for treatment/recycling, and then onward use as secondary aggregate in the construction sector. Air Pollution Control Residues (APCR) would be taken off site by road in sealed containers to be recycled.
- 3.2.2 Construction is targeted to begin in 2021, and REP is expected to be fully operational by 2024.

4 The draft SoCC

4.1 Scope of the SoCC

- 4.1.1 The SoCC is a statutory document produced to satisfy section 47(1) of the 2008 Act. A copy of Cory's draft SoCC is enclosed with this document. The enclosed draft SoCC is intended to provide an informative and comprehensive statement for local communities about how Cory will inform, engage and consult with them.
- 4.1.2 The content of the draft SoCC has been designed to meet the requirements of the 2008 Act and the EIA Regulations as outlined below:
 - Section 1.1: provides an overview of the REP proposals and the statutory community consultation activities that Cory will carry out as required under section 47(1) of the 2008 Act and includes a table setting out key dates for the community consultation including the statutory consultation period;
 - Section 1.2: introduces the applicant including company details and an overview of Cory's existing operations at RRRF;
 - Section 1.3: provides details on different elements of the REP proposals;
 - Section 1.4: outlines the DCO application process as established by the 2008 Act and identifies the issues that would be considered at examination should the REP DCO application be accepted;
 - Section 1.5: explains how Cory will publish Preliminary Environmental Information on the proposals in a Preliminary Environmental Information Report ('PEIR') which will be made available as part of the statutory consultation with the local community to satisfy regulation 12 of the EIA Regulations;
 - Section 1.6: outlines Cory's objectives for the statutory consultation with the local community;
 - Section 1.7: explains the information that will be made available during the statutory consultation and includes a table setting out the proposed date, time and location of statutory public exhibitions;
 - Section 1.8: explains the methods that Cory will use to inform and engage local communities about the REP proposals during the statutory consultation and provides information about where the consultation documents can be inspected by the members of the public;
 - Section 1.9: explains who Cory will target as part of the statutory consultation with the local community;
 - Section 1.10: explains how Cory will have regard to all relevant consultation comments received as required by section 49 of the 2008 Act;

- Section 1.11: provides the Riverside Energy Park website address where further details and regular updates on the REP proposals can be found; and
- Section 1.12: provides contact details for members of the community to contact Cory about the consultation and the REP proposal including an email address, free post address and free phone telephone number.
- 4.1.3 In parallel with this community consultation Cory will undertake pre-application consultation with stakeholders as required under section 42 of the 2008 Act including prescribed bodies, the MMO, the relevant local authorities, the GLA, landowners and other land interests.

4.2 Publication of the SoCC and SoCC notices

- 4.2.1 Section 47(6) of the 2008 Act (as amended) requires the applicant to publish a notice stating where and when the SoCC can be inspected by people living in the vicinity of the land.
- 4.2.2 The SoCC will be lodged in local venues for inspection by members of the community by 21st May 2018. The table below sets out the proposed locations for lodging paper copies of the SoCC alongside the other consultation documents.

5 Consultation on the SoCC

- 5.1.1 Section 47(6) of the 2008 Act (as amended) requires that the applicant must consult with each local authority within section 43(1) about the content of the SoCC,
- 5.1.2 The relevant authorities for the REP proposal who are being consulted on the SoCC include LBB, DBC and KCC. The table below sets out the timetable for the SoCC preparation:

- 5.1.3 Cory undertook early non-statutory engagement with the relevant local authorities on the content on an earlier version of the draft SoCC between February and March 2018. Following the receipt of feedback from local authorities Cory has incorporated the following changes in to the community consultation:
 - The consultation zone has been extended to incorporate the Bridge masterplan area in Dartford;
 - The Leigh University Technical College has been included as a public exhibition location;

- KCC and DBC have confirmed that there are no significant hard to reach groups;
- Resident's groups in surrounding area will be directly contacted about the proposed public exhibitions at request of KCC/DBC to address potential wider transport and road network users; and
- The Dartford Library has been included as an additional document inspection location.
- 5.1.4 Following liaison with the proposed exhibition venues a further change has been made due to a change in availability at The Dartford Bridge Learning & Community Campus. The public exhibition scheduled for the morning of 6th July 2018 is now proposed to be held at the Belvedere Community Centre. Cory has discussed this change with DBC and have reached agreement that the suite of exhibitions proposed within the Dartford area remain appropriate.
- 5.1.5 Cory is now seeking formal comments on the content and format of the updated draft SoCC from local authorities under section 47(2) of the 2008 Act.
- In accordance with section 47(3) of the 2008 Act local authorities have 28 days in which to respond to this consultation. Therefore, comments must be submitted to Cory by 3rd May 2018 to ensure that they are incorporated in the published version of the SoCC, comments can be emailed directly to info@riversideenergypark.com.
- 5.1.7 The SoCC is intended to provide an informative and comprehensive statement for local communities about how Cory will consult and engage with them on the REP proposal as part of the wider pre-application consultation process. Bearing this in mind Cory would be grateful for your views on the following elements of the SoCC:
 - Contact details for identified 'hard to reach' groups within the relevant local authority areas;
 - Contact details for any local interest groups which may have an interest in the REP proposals;
 - The proposed consultation zones (explained in Section 5):
 - The proposed scope of information to be provided at statutory consultation and any other information that should be provided; and
 - The proposed venues selected for lodging copies of the SoCC alongside other consultation documents and venues for the statutory public exhibitions.

6 Community Consultation Process

6.1 Consultation objectives

- 6.1.1 The objectives of Cory's community consultation process are:
 - To provide consultees with sufficiently detailed information to understand the REP proposal and the potential impacts;
 - To provide consultees with an opportunity to influence aspects of the project that are under development and to understand which elements of the project are fixed and the reasons why;
 - Clearly signpost the different ways in which consultees can comment on the proposals; and
 - Start a meaningful dialogue with the community that can continue through the submission and examination phase of the consenting process.
- 6.1.2 The DCLG 2008 Act pre-application guidance states that consultation should take place at a sufficiently early stage to allow consultees a real opportunity to influence the proposal.
- 6.1.3 Taking this into account Cory propose to undertake a two-stage consultation process with the local community. Cory has made the decision to undertake informal non-statutory consultation to provide the local community with an early opportunity to influence the REP proposal and the consultation process.
- 6.1.4 An overview of the proposed activities and the scope of information to be consulted on at non-statutory (Stage one) and statutory (Stage two) consultation is outlined in this section. The proposed community consultation timetable is set out below.

6.2 Stage one: Non-statutory consultation

- 6.2.1 Cory will provide the following information during the non-statuary consultation:
 - explain why the Application Site has been selected;
 - provide information about Cory's existing operations at the RRRF;
 - outline the design parameters of the REP proposal;
 - provide information about the different low carbon energy generating technologies to be utilised at REP;
 - explain Cory's plans to use the River Thames as a 'Green Highway' for deliveries to and from the REP; and
 - provide information about the DCO application process and key dates for further consultation on the REP.
- 6.2.2 Cory has made the decision to undertake early informal consultation to provide the local community with an opportunity to influence the REP proposal and the consultation process.
- 6.2.3 Cory will explain which aspects of the proposal require further refinement and will specifically seek people's views on the following:
 - A preferred roof option for the facility (stepped, curved or flat);
 - Options for where we could route the underground electricity connection;

- The proposed use of the River Thames;
- The proposed approach to traffic and transport management;
- The proposed protection of local air quality; and
- Anything else that matters to you and that you think we need to consider.
- 6.2.4 Cory intend to undertake the following consultation activities at Stage one to inform the local community about the REP proposals:
 - Public exhibitions: Cory will host non-statutory public exhibitions at local venues within the consultation zone which will be open for anyone with an interest in REP to attend. Copies of a project brochure setting out a non-technical summary of the REP proposal and a feedback form with questions to capture views on the proposals will be made available in print at the public exhibitions. Electronic copies of both documents will be made available online on the Riverside Energy Park website. Table 6.2 sets out details of the proposed non-statutory public exhibitions.

- 6.2.5 Information about the REP proposals and the Stage one public exhibitions will be publicised via the following methods:
 - Newsletter: Cory will mail a newsletter to stakeholders in the consultation zone (explained in Section 6.4 of this document);
 - Website: the Riverside Energy Park website will be regularly updated with the latest news about REP, provide access to all statutory consultation documents, allow completion of an online questionnaire and provide responses to Frequently Asked Questions that arise during the community consultation;

- Posters: posters advertising the non-statutory public exhibitions will be mailed to local councils, councillors, libraries and the public exhibition venues. Additionally, local business owners will be asked to display posters in shop windows;
- Social media: reminders of when and where public exhibition are taking place will be publicised via the main Cory twitter account (@CoryEnergy); and
- Newspaper notices: Cory will place an advertisement in a local newspaper circulating within the consultation zone to publicise the nonstatutory public exhibitions. Details of the proposed newspaper advertisement are provided in the table below:

6.3 Stage two: Statutory consultation

- 6.3.1 Cory will undertake a single statutory pre-application consultation period between 18th June 2018 and 30th July 2018 incorporating the requirements of sections 42, 47 and 48 of the 2008 Act across an extended 42-day consultation period.
- 6.3.2 Section 45 of the 2008 Act states that applicants must provide consultees notified under section 42 with a minimum of 28 days to respond to the consultation starting from the day after the receipt of the consultation documents.
- 6.3.3 Consultation responses should be submitted to Cory by 17.00 on 30th July 2018 however Cory will consider consultation responses received after this date wherever possible.
- 6.3.4 Section 1.7.2 of the SoCC outlines what information Cory will present to consultees during the statutory consultation period.
- 6.3.5 Section 1.7.3 of the SoCC identifies specific topics which Cory will invite comments on from the local community during the statutory consultation period.
- 6.3.6 Section 1.7.4 of the SoCC provides details of the proposed locations and times for the statutory public exhibitions.
- 6.3.7 Sections 1.7.6 1.7.7 of the SoCC outline the scope of information and documentation which will be made available to attendees at the statutory public exhibitions.

- 6.3.8 Section 1.8.1 of the SoCC outlines the range of communication methods that Cory will use to inform the local community about the REP proposal and the statutory consultation and includes details of proposed inspection venues where members of the public can view the consultation documents (as listed at Section 1.7.7 of the SoCC).
- 6.3.9 Cory will also place an advertisement in a local newspaper circulating within the consultation zone to publicise the statutory public exhibitions. Details of the proposed newspaper advertisement are provided in the table below:

6.4 Defining the consultation zone

- 6.4.1 Section 47 of the 2008 Act states that those 'living in the vicinity of the land' should be consulted. The DCLG 2008 Act pre-application guidance recognises that applicants are best placed to establish an appropriate area in which to consult the local community and that relevant local authorities should work together with applicants to develop a plan for consultation.
- 6.4.2 The DCLG 2008 Act pre-application guidance advises that the consultation zone should be proportionate to the expected level of impacts resulting from the proposal:
 - "The aim should be to ensure that consultation is appropriate to the scale and nature of the project and where its impacts will be experienced." [24]
 - "Applicants are required to set out in their Statement of Community Consultation how they propose to consult those living in the vicinity of the land. They are encouraged to consider consulting beyond this where they think doing so may provide more information on the impacts of their proposals (e.g. through visual impacts or increased traffic flow)." [56]
 - "To ensure that consultation is fair to all parties, applicants should be able to demonstrate that the consultation process is proportionate to the impacts of the project in the area that it affects, takes account of the anticipated level of local interest, and takes account of the views of the relevant local authorities." [77]
- 6.4.3 This Section explains how the proposed consultation zone, shown in Figure 6:1, has been defined for REP taking account of the DCLG 2008 Act preapplication guidance and the potential impacts arising from the different elements of the REP proposal.





- 6.4.4 The consultation zone has been defined to include those communities closest to the indicative application boundary since they are more likely to be affected by the proposals than the general public. The consultation zone boundary has been defined to include:
 - a 2km radius around the REP site; and
 - a 200m buffer either side of the electrical connection route options extended to the north to follow the natural boundary of the River Thames.
- 6.4.5 Appendix A contains a draft version of consultation zone map to be included in the final version of the SoCC which illustrates the proposed public exhibitions venue locations, document inspection locations, the REP site and electrical cable route option variants alongside the consultation zone area.
- 6.4.6 As explained in paragraph 6.4.4, Cory will engage and consult directly with local communities within a 2km radius of the REP site. The proposed consultation zone is proportionate to the potential impacts arising from the construction and operation of the REP which include (but not limited to):
 - Temporary and permanent transport impacts on the road and river network from delivery of components for construction;
 - Temporary impacts on air quality from dust and trackout however these impacts should be mitigated to a not significant level and air quality impacts from construction vehicles and vessels;
 - Temporary noise and vibration impacts on the nearest Noise Sensitive Receptors during construction;
 - Temporary visual impacts for users of local public rights of way (PRoW);

- Temporary impacts on terrestrial biodiversity disturbance to local flora and fauna from soil stripping, habitat loss and construction lighting;
- Temporary impacts on hydrology, flood risk and water resources potential for sediment discharge and chemical leakage into local water courses;
- Temporary impacts on ground conditions including compaction of soils, potential to release contaminates through soil disturbance and impacts to groundwater due to the potential for chemical spillages;
- Temporary socio-economic impacts both positive and negative including a strain on local services due to influx of construction workers, additional spending and job creation;
- Permanent air quality impacts due to the dispersion of pollutants from the REP stack, anaerobic digestion (AD) and increased vehicle and vessel delivering waste;
- Permanent impacts on townscape and the historic environment from the Stack and massing of the main REP building;
- Permanent noise from the operation of REP and increased vehicle movements;
- Permanent impact on biodiversity from noise from operational plant, dispersion of pollutants from REP Stack and operational lighting;
- Permanent impacts on ground conditions due to the potential for chemical spillages; and
- Permanent socio-economic impact due to the potential for job creation.
- 6.4.7 As explained in paragraph 6.4.4, Cory will also engage and consult directly with local communities within a 200m buffer either side of the electrical connection route options and up to the boundary of the River Thames to the north. Since the preferred electrical connection route is not likely to be chosen until after the statutory consultation a wide consultation zone has been adopted to provide all communities which could be potentially be affected with an opportunity to comment on the proposals. The proposed consultation zone is proportionate to the potential impacts arising from the construction of the electrical connection which include (but not limited to):
 - Temporary impacts on the road network from temporary road closures:
 - Temporary air quality impacts from dust and trackout, however these impacts should be mitigated to a not significant level;
 - Temporary noise and vibration impacts on the nearest Noise Sensitive Receptors during construction;
 - Temporary impact on townscape limited to local residents; and

 Temporary socio-economic impact due to the influx of construction workers.

6.5 Communication methods

- 6.5.1 Within the consultation zone the following stakeholders will be informed about the REP proposal and sent an invitation to attend public exhibitions by mail:
 - Local residents with postal addresses within the consultation boundaries;
 - Local businesses with postal addresses within the consultation boundaries;
 - Local interest groups which are active within the consultation boundaries;
 and
 - Elected representatives (Councillors, Members of Parliament and Members of the European Parliament) with local constituencies within the consultation boundaries.
- 6.5.2 Cory recognises that some of the potential impacts from the REP proposal may have the potential to affect communities located beyond the consultation zone. Therefore, in accordance with the DCLG 2008 Act pre-application guidance Cory will publicise the consultation and the REP proposal beyond the consultation zone through local newspaper advertisements, twitter and Riverside Energy Park website updates.


6.6 What we will do with consultation responses

- 6.6.1 Section 49 of the 2008 Act places a duty on applicants to take account of responses to statutory consultation and publicity.
- 6.6.2 Cory will record and consider all consultation responses received during the non-statutory and statutory consultation. The Consultation Report, which will be submitted with the REP DCO application will consider and respond to all formal consultation responses. Cory will consider consultation responses received outside of the statutory consultation period wherever possible.

7 Summary

- 7.1.1 This document and the enclosed draft SoCC explain the statutory consultation requirements of the 2008 Act and the pre-application consultation which Cory will undertake with local communities on the REP proposals.
- 7.1.2 This document together with the draft SoCC comprise the 'Consultation Documents' as defined under Section 47(3) and (4) of the 2008 Act.
- 7.1.3 Section 47(6) of the 2008 Act (as amended) requires that the applicant must consult with each local authority within section 43(1) about the content of the SoCC. The relevant authorities who are being consulted on the SoCC include LBB, DBC and KCC.
- 7.1.4 This version of the Consultation Documents takes account of feedback received from the local authorities in February March 2018 and informal comments received on an earlier version of the draft SoCC document in March 2018.
- 7.1.5 Cory undertook early non-statutory engagement with the relevant local authorities on the community consultation strategy between February and March 2018 and an earlier version of the draft SoCC between in March 2018. Follow the receipt of feedback from local authorities Cory has incorporated the following changes in to the community consultation:
 - The consultation zone has been extended to incorporate the Bridge masterplan area in Dartford;
 - The Leigh University Technical College has been included as a public exhibition location;
 - KCC and DBC have confirmed that there are no significant hard to reach groups;
 - Resident's groups in surrounding area will be directly contacted about the proposed public exhibitions at request of KCC/DBC to address potential wider transport and road network users; and
 - The Dartford Library has been included as an additional document inspection location.
- 7.1.6 Cory is now seeking formal comments on the content and format of the draft SoCC from local authorities under section 47(2) of the 2008 Act.
- 7.1.7 In accordance with section 47(3) of the 2008 Act local authorities have 28 days in which to respond to this consultation. Therefore, comments must be submitted to Cory by 3rd May 2018 to ensure that they are incorporated in the published version of the SoCC.

1 Statement of Community Consultation

1.1 Introduction

- 1.1.1 Cory Environmental Holdings Limited (trading as Cory Riverside Energy) (Cory) is proposing to develop an integrated multi-technology energy generation park in Belvedere, London, to be known as Riverside Energy Park (REP). REP would be developed immediately adjacent to Cory's existing Riverside Resource Recovery Facility (RRRF).
- 1.1.2 Cory intends to apply to the Secretary of State in Q4 2018 for a Development Consent Order ('DCO') under the Planning Act 2008 ('the 2008 Act') to authorise the construction, operation and maintenance of REP.
- 1.1.3 This Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC) has been prepared in accordance with section 47 of the Planning Act 2008 which requires applicants to prepare a statement explaining how they will consult with the local community about the proposed application and carry out pre-application consultation in accordance with this statement.
- 1.1.4 This SoCC therefore explains how Cory will consult with the local community, including residents, businesses, community groups and political representatives about its proposals in accordance with the statutory requirements.
- 1.1.5 This consultation provides an important opportunity for the local community to engage and help shape the proposed development. Responses to the consultation will be taken into account before finalising the proposals and submitting an application for development consent to the Secretary of State.
- 1.1.6 Key consultation dates are outlined in the table below and Table 1.2 provides full details of the public exhibitions.

1.2 Cory Riverside Energy Holdings Ltd

- 1.2.1 Cory Riverside Energy Holdings Ltd is registered in England (company number 5360864) and the registered address is 2 Coldbath Square, London, United Kingdom, EC1R 5HL.
- 1.2.2 Cory is a leading recycling, energy recovery and resource management company. Cory operates the existing RRRF in Belvedere, adjacent to the project site. RRRF is a key element of London's energy and resource management infrastructure.
- 1.2.3 Cory is now progressing plans for the REP to maximise the use of its existing infrastructure and land holding, and to further meet the needs for resource recovery and energy generation. Further information on Cory is provided at http://www.coryenergy.com/

1.3 Riverside Energy Park

- 1.3.1 REP would be developed immediately adjacent to Cory's existing RRRF and would complement the operation of the existing facility. It would comprise a range of energy generating technologies that will supply low carbon/renewable electricity to London. The main elements of REP are described below:
 - Energy Recovery Facility: the ERF would use the same high performing combustion technology as the existing RRRF with the capability to treat commercial and industrial waste and the potential to treat municipal solid waste:
 - Solar Panels: would be integrated across a wide extent of the roof;
 - Battery Storage: would supply additional power to the local distribution network at times of peak electrical demand;
 - Anaerobic Digestion Facility: anaerobic digestion involves the breakdown of biodegradable material in the absence of oxygen. Outputs



from the anaerobic digestion facility could be used as a fuel in the ERF to generate electricity or for use in the agricultural sector as fertilizer;

- Combined Heat and Power Connection: incorporate on-site combined heat and power ('CHP') infrastructure with the potential to supply a local heat network to service nearby residential properties in the future;
- The Electrical Connection Route: REP would be connected to the National Electrical Transmission System (NETS) via a new 132 kilovolt (kV) distribution network connection and a new substation within the REP site. In consultation with UK Power Networks (UKPN) Cory are considering Electrical Connection Route options to connect to the existing National Grid Littlebrook Power Station substation in Dartford. A single Electrical Connection Route will be confirmed through consultation and included in the application for development consent;
- Delivery of waste to REP: the majority of waste will be delivered to REP by barge from Waste Transfer Stations (WTS) along the River Thames using the existing jetty which serves the existing RRRF. The remainder would be delivered by road. The split of road and river deliveries will be determined through further assessment work and details included in the application for development consent; and
- Removal of by-products from REP: Incinerator Bottom Ash (IBA) would be transported by river to the existing IBA Facility at the Port of Tilbury for treatment/recycling and then used as secondary aggregate in the construction sector. Air Pollution Control Residues (APCR) would be taken off site by road in sealed containers to be recycled.

1.3.2 Cory forecasts that REP would:

- Generate up to 96 MW of low carbon renewable electricity at peak times, which taken together with the permitted capacity of 72 MW from the existing RRRF is the equivalent of powering c.300,000 homes across London (almost 10% of London's 3.2 m households);
- Divert a further 650,000 tonnes of residual waste away from landfill, which will save the equivalent of 130,000 tonnes of CO2 each year;
- Make use of Cory's existing river-based infrastructure on the River Thames to further reduce road traffic. At present, Cory's use of the Thames as a "Green Highway" currently removes around 100,000 truck journeys from London's roads every year. The new park would allow for a further 80,000 truck journeys to be removed;
- Be capable of supplying up to 30 MW of affordable heat energy to local housing;
- Create a further 175,000 tonnes/year of construction materials from the EfW process for use in building the south-east's homes and infrastructure,



- avoiding the need for industry to extract an equivalent tonnage of natural stone: and
- Make a valuable contribution to local employment, with over 100 full-time jobs and apprenticeships set to be created at the energy park and on the river. The construction period is likely to require a workforce in excess of 6,000 people.
- 1.3.3 Construction is targeted to begin in 2021, and REP is expected to be fully operational by 2024.

1.4 The Planning Process

- 1.4.1 The electricity generating capacity of REP will be in excess of 50 MW of electricity. As such, it is classified as a Nationally Significant Infrastructure Project (NSIP) under the Planning Act 2008 which may only be authorised by a DCO made by the Secretary of State.
- 1.4.2 Cory must submit a DCO application to the Planning Inspectorate (PINS) who will first decide, on behalf of the Secretary of State, whether to accept the application. If accepted, PINS will appoint an independent inspector or panel of inspectors to examine the application. Following a 6 month examination, the inspector(s) will make a recommendation to the Secretary of State who will then decide whether or not development consent should be granted.
- 1.4.3 The Secretary of State's decision must be made in accordance with the relevant National Policy Statements (NPSs) which outline the need for energy infrastructure and the issues to be considered. The relevant NPSs are: NPS EN-1 (Overarching Energy Policy), NPS EN-3 (Renewable Energy Infrastructure) and NPS EN-5 (Electricity Networks Infrastructure).

1.5 Environmental Information and Potential Impacts

- 1.5.1 REP is classified as 'EIA development' for the purpose of the Infrastructure Planning (Environmental Impact Assessment) Regulations 2017 ('EIA Regulations 2017').
- 1.5.2 Cory is therefore required to undertake an Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) for the REP proposal. Cory will publish a Preliminary Environmental Information Report (PEIR) as part of the pre-application consultation and we will be seeking views on this information.
- 1.5.3 The PEIR will present the preliminary environmental information collected to date and an initial assessment of the likely significant environmental effects of the proposals.
- 1.5.4 Cory will submit an Environmental Statement (ES) with the DCO application which will report on the likely significant environmental effects of REP identified in the EIA and the appropriate mitigation measures to be put in place where necessary.



1.6 Consultation Objectives

- 1.6.1 Cory's objectives for the consultation are:
 - To provide consultees with sufficiently detailed information to understand the REP proposal and the potential impacts;
 - To provide consultees with an opportunity to influence aspects of the project that are under development and to understand which elements of the project are fixed and the reasons why;
 - Clearly signpost the different ways in which consultees can comment on the proposals; and
 - Start a meaningful dialogue with the community that can continue through the submission and examination phase of the consenting process.

1.7 What we will consult on

- 1.7.1 The statutory consultation will take place between 18th June and 30th July 2018. Consultation responses should be submitted to Cory by <u>17.00 on 30th July 2018</u>. Cory will consider consultation responses received after this date wherever possible.
- 1.7.2 Cory will provide information on the outline design parameters of the REP proposal including any refinements made in response to previous consultation feedback, provide preliminary information on environmental impacts and proposed mitigation measures based on the findings from the published PEIR.
- 1.7.3 Cory will welcome and consider feedback on all aspects of the proposal and will specifically invite comments on the following:
 - A preferred roof option for the facility (stepped, curved or flat);
 - Options for where we could route the underground electricity connection;
 - Our use of the River Thames;
 - Our approach to traffic and transport management;
 - Our protection of local air quality; and
 - Anything else that matters to you and that you think we need to consider.
- 1.7.4 Cory will hold public exhibitions throughout the statutory consultation period at the times and locations set out in Table 1.2 subject to unforeseen circumstances.

- 1.7.5 In the event that a public exhibition(s) is cancelled or rescheduled due to unforeseen circumstances Cory will seek to alert consultees as early as possible by updating the Riverside Energy Park website and the Cory Riverside Energy twitter account.
- 1.7.6 Display boards at the public exhibitions will provide further details on the different elements of the proposed development, design options, transporting waste on the River Thames and indicative timescales. The public exhibitions will be attended by representatives from the REP team who will be available to answer questions on the proposed development and the consultation.
- 1.7.7 Consultation documents will be available for inspection at the public exhibitions and in local venues during the statutory consultation period including:
 - SoCC: this document;
 - PEIR: contains an overview of the nature and scale of the proposed development and an initial assessment of the likely significant environmental effects;



- PEIR NTS: a non-technical summary of the information in the PEIR;
- Project brochure: a non-technical summary of the REP proposal;
- Section 48 notice: a copy of the notice published in local and national newspapers advertising Cory's intention to submit a DCO application for the REP proposal as required by section 48 of the 2008 Act; and
- Feedback form: containing questions to capture views on the proposals and consultation available in print and on the Riverside Energy Park website for completion online at www.riversideenergypark.com.

1.8 How we will consult

- 1.8.1 Cory will provide information about the proposals and the consultation through a range of methods:
 - Public exhibitions: the public exhibitions will be open for anyone with an interest in REP to attend. Visitors will be able to ask questions to the REP team and will be encouraged to submit comments via a feedback form;
 - Newsletter: newsletters will be mailed to stakeholders within the consultation zone to inform the local community about the REP proposals and the community consultation;
 - Website: the Riverside Energy Park website will be regularly updated with the latest news about REP and will provide access to all consultation documents, allow completion of an online questionnaire and provide responses to Frequently Asked Questions that arise during the consultation;
 - Social media: details of the consultation including reminders of when and where events are taking place will be publicised via the main Cory Riverside Energy twitter account: @CoryEnergy;
 - Posters: posters advertising the public exhibitions will be displayed in local venues; and
 - Document inspection locations: the consultation documents, (listed under Section 1.7.7) will be available to view at the following locations throughout the consultation period:

1 Introduction

- 1.1.1 Cory Environmental Holdings Limited (trading as Cory Riverside Energy) ('Cory') proposes to develop an integrated multi-technology energy generation park in Belvedere, London, to be known as Riverside Energy Park ('REP').
- 1.1.2 The REP proposal is classified as a Nationally Significant Infrastructure Project ('NSIP') under the Planning Act 2008 (as amended) ('the 2008 Act'). Cory will therefore need to apply to the Secretary of State ('SoS') for a development consent order ('DCO') to construct and operate the proposal.
- 1.1.3 The planning regime established by the Act 2008 Act places significant importance on pre-application consultation. Cory proposed to undertake a single statutory pre-application consultation period between 18 June and 30 July 2018 incorporating the requirements of sections 42, 47 and 48 of the PA 2008. Section 2 of this report sets out the requirements of the relevant legislation.
- 1.1.4 The Statement of Community Consultation ('SoCC') (enclosed with this document) explains to the local community how Cory will consult with them on the REP proposals as required under section 47(1) of the 2008 Act. The SoCC provides details of statutory consultation with the local community only.
- 1.1.5 This SoCC Explanatory Statement outlines the statutory consultation requirements of the 2008 Act; explains the pre-application consultation which Cory will undertake with local communities including non-statutory and statutory consultation activities; and provides details of consultation with local authorities on the SoCC as required by section 47(2) of the 2008 Act. This Statement is structured as follows:
 - Section 2 outlines the relevant legislation and policy;
 - Section 3 provides an overview of the current REP proposals and modifications made to the EIA Scoping proposal;
 - Section 4 explains the purpose and content of the SoCC and Section 5 provides details of the consultation on the SoCC;
 - Section 6 outlines the key drivers behind Cory's community consultation process; and
 - Section 7 presents an overview of the refinement of the SoCC to date.
- 1.1.6 This version of the Consultation Document takes account of feedback received from the local authorities in February March 2018.

Cory is seeking informal views on the content and format of the draft SoCC.

Comments must be submitted to Cory by <u>17.00 on 29th March 2018</u> to ensure that they are incorporated in the draft version of the SoCC produced for statutory consultation.

Section 5 of this Statement provides details of the SoCC consultation timetable and explains how to submit your comments to Cory.

2 Legislation and Policy Background

- 2.1.1 This sections outlines the statutory requirement to consult with the local community on proposed DCO applications. The requirements are set out in the 2008 Act, The Infrastructure Planning (Environment Impact Assessment) Regulations 2017 (the 'EIA Regulations') and associated guidance.
- 2.1.2 This document has been produced to satisfy section 47 of the 2008 Act (as amended) which sets out the requirement for applicants to consult with the local community on proposed DCO applications as summarised below:

Section 47 Duty to consult local community

- (1) The applicant must prepare a statement setting out how the applicant proposes to consult, about the proposed application, people living in the vicinity of the land.
- (2) Before preparing the statement, the applicant must consult each local authority that is within section 43(1) about what is to be in the statement.
- (3) The deadline for the receipt by the applicant of a local authority's response to consultation under subsection (2) is the end of the period of 28 days that begins with the day after the day on which the local authority receives the consultation documents.
- (4) In subsection (3) "the consultation documents" means the documents supplied to the local authority by the applicant for the purpose of consulting the local authority under subsection (2).
- (5) In preparing the statement, the applicant must have regard to any response to consultation under subsection (2) that is received by the applicant before the deadline imposed by subsection (3).
- (6) Once the applicant has prepared the statement, the applicant must <u>make the statement available for inspection by the public in a way that is reasonably convenient for people living in the vicinity of the land, and</u>
 - (a) publish a notice stating where and when the statement can be inspected
 - (b) <u>publish the statement in such manner</u> as may be prescribed.
- (7) The applicant must carry out consultation in accordance with the proposals set out in the statement.
- 2.1.3 The 2008 Act (as amended) requires that applicants undertake pre-application consultation with a range of stakeholders in addition to the local community. These requirements are summarised below:
 - Section 42: the applicant must consult with all those required including prescribed bodies¹, the Marine Management Organisation ('MMO'), the

- relevant local authorities, the Greater London Authority ('GLA') and relevant landowners or other parties with an interest in the land;
- Section 43(1): A local authority is within this section if the land is in the authority's area;
- Section 46: the applicant must notify the SoS of the proposed development and provide the section 42 consultation material to the SoS;
- Section 47: the applicant must consult with the relevant local authorities (as defined under section 43(1)) on the content of the SoCC, publish a notice in local newspapers, make the SoCC available to the public and consult with the local community in accordance with the published SoCC;
- Section 48: the applicant must publicise the proposed application in the manner prescribed by Regulation 4 of the APFP Regulations;
- Section 49: the applicant must take account of relevant responses received to consultation and publicity; and
- Section 50: the applicant must have regard to any guidance about how to comply with the requirements of Chapter 2.
- 2.1.4 While this document is concerned with the requirements of section 47 Cory will be undertaking consultation with the local community in parallel with preapplication consultation with stakeholders as required under section 42 of the 2008 Act including prescribed bodies, the MMO, the relevant local authorities, the GLA, landowners and other land interests.
- 2.1.5 The relevant authorities for the REP proposal for the purpose of Section 43(1) include the London Borough of Bexley ('LBB'), Dartford Borough Council ('DBC') and Kent County Council ('KCC').

Regulation 12 Consultation statement requirements

- (1) The consultation statement prepared under section 47(a) (duty to consult local community) must set out—
 - (a) whether the development for which the applicant proposes to make an application for an order granting development consent is EIA development; and
 - (b) if that development is EIA development, how the applicant intends to publicise and consult on the preliminary environmental information.
- 2.1.6 Regulation 12 of the EIA Regulations, set out above, requires that the SoCC must explain how preliminary environmental information about the proposed development will be publicised as part of the community consultation.
- 2.1.7 Cory have taken account of the DCLG (2015) PA 2008 Guidance on the Pre-Application Process (the 'DCLG PA 2008 pre-application guidance') in developing their approach to the community consultation.

3 REP Proposal Overview

3.1.1 This section presents a brief overview of the current REP proposals.

3.2 REP Proposal Overview

- 3.2.1 REP would be developed immediately adjacent to Cory's existing Riverside Resource Recovery Facility (RRRF) and would complement the operation of the existing facility. It would comprise a range of technologies including; waste energy recovery, waste anaerobic digestion, solar panels and battery storage. The main elements of REP are described below:
 - Energy Recovery Facility (ERF): to provide thermal treatment of Commercial and Industrial (C&I) waste with the potential for treatment of municipal solid waste (MSW);
 - Solar Photovoltaic Installation: to be integrated across a wide extent of the roof:
 - Battery Storage: to supply additional power to the local distribution network at times of peak electrical demand. This facility would be integrated into the main REP building;
 - Anaerobic Digestion Facility: outputs from the anaerobic digestion facility would be used as a fuel in the ERF to generate electricity or alternatively transferred off-site for use in the agricultural sector as fertilizer:
 - Combined Heat and Power Connection ('CHP'): REP would be CHP enabled with necessary infrastructure within the REP site included. The heat connection could service nearby residential developments such as the Thamesmead area;
 - The Electrical Connection Route: REP would be connected to the existing National Electrical Transmission System ('NETS') via a new 132 kilovolt (kV) distribution network connection and a new substation within the REP site. In consultation with UK Power Networks ('UKPN') Cory are currently considering Electrical Connection Route options to connect to the existing National Grid Littlebrook Power Station substation located south east of REP. All Electrical Connection options have been included within the Indicative Application Boundary at this stage. A single Electrical Connection Route will be confirmed through consultation with UKPN and included in the DCO application;
 - Delivery of waste to REP: the majority of waste will be delivered to REP by barge from Waste Transfer Stations (WTS) along the River Thames, utilising the existing jetty as per the existing RRRF. The remainder would be delivered by road. The proportions of the total to be delivered by road and river will be determined through further assessment work and details included in the DCO application; and

- Removal of by-products from REP: Incinerator Bottom Ash (IBA) would be transported by river to the existing IBA Facility at the Port of Tilbury for treatment/recycling, and then onward use as secondary aggregate in the construction sector. Air Pollution Control Residues (APCR) would be taken off site by road in sealed containers to be recycled.
- 3.2.2 Construction is targeted to begin in 2021, and REP is expected to be fully operational by 2024.

4 The draft SoCC

4.1 Scope of the SoCC

- 4.1.1 The SoCC is a statutory document produced to satisfy section 47(1) of the 2008 Act. A copy of Cory's draft SoCC is enclosed with this document. The enclosed draft SoCC is intended to provide an informative and comprehensive statement for local communities about how Cory will inform, engage and consult with them.
- 4.1.2 The content of the draft SoCC has been designed to meet the requirements of the 2008 Act and the EIA Regulations as outlined below:
 - Section 1.1: provides an overview of the REP proposals and the statutory community consultation activities that Cory will carry out as required under section 47(1) of the 2008 Act and includes a table setting out key dates for the community consultation including the statutory consultation period;
 - Section 1.2: introduces the applicant including company details and an overview of Cory's existing operations at RRRF;
 - Section 1.3: provides details on different elements of the REP proposals;
 - Section 1.4: outlines the DCO application process as established by the 2008 Act and identifies the issues that would be considered at examination should the REP DCO application be accepted;
 - Section 1.5: explains how Cory will publish Preliminary Environmental Information on the proposals in a Preliminary Environmental Information Report ('PEIR') which will be made available as part of the statutory consultation with the local community to satisfy regulation 12 of the EIA Regulations;
 - Section 1.6: outlines Cory's objectives for the statutory consultation with the local community;
 - Section 1.7: explains the information that will be made available during the statutory consultation and includes a table setting out the proposed date, time and location of statutory public exhibitions;
 - Section 1.8: explains the methods that Cory will use to inform and engage local communities about the REP proposals during the statutory consultation and provides information about where the consultation documents can be inspected by the members of the public;
 - Section 1.9: explains who Cory will target as part of the statutory consultation with the local community;
 - Section 1.10: explains how Cory will have regard to all relevant consultation comments received as required by section 49 of the 2008 Act;

- Section 1.11: provides the Riverside Energy Park website address where further details and regular updates on the REP proposals can be found; and
- Section 1.13: provides contact details for members of the community to contact Cory about the consultation and the REP proposal including an email address, free post address and free phone telephone number.
- 4.1.3 In parallel with this community consultation Cory will undertake pre-application consultation with stakeholders as required under section 42 of the 2008 Act including prescribed bodies, the MMO, the relevant local authorities, the GLA, landowners and other land interests.

4.2 Publication of the SoCC and SoCC notices

- 4.2.1 Section 47(6) of the 2008 Act (as amended) requires the applicant to publish a notice stating where and when the SoCC can be inspected by people living in the vicinity of the land.
- 4.2.2 The SoCC will be lodged in local venues for inspection by member s of the community from 21st May 2018. The table below sets out the proposed locations for lodging paper copies of the SoCC alongside the other consultation documents.

- 5.1.1 Section 47(6) of the 2008 Act (as amended) requires that the applicant must consult with each local authority within section 43(1) about the content of the SoCC,
- 5.1.2 The relevant authorities for the REP proposal who are being consulted on the SoCC include LBB, DBC and KCC. The table below sets out the timetable for the SoCC preparation:

- Resident's groups in surrounding area will be directly contacted about the proposed public exhibitions at request of KCC/DBC to address potential wider transport and road network users.
- 5.1.4 Cory is seeking informal views on the content and format of the draft SoCC from local authorities.
- 5.1.5 Comments must be submitted to Cory by <u>17.00 on 29th March 2018</u> to ensure that they are incorporated in the draft version of the SoCC produced for statutory consultation. Comments should be emailed directly to info@riversideenergypark.com.
- 5.1.6 The SoCC is intended to provide an informative and comprehensive statement for local communities about how Cory will consult and engage with them on the REP proposal as part of the wider pre-application consultation process. Bearing this in mind Cory would be grateful for your views on the following elements of the SoCC:
 - Contact details for identified 'hard to reach' groups within LBB;
 - Contact details for any local interest groups which may have an interest in the REP proposals;
 - The proposed consultation zones (explained in Section 5);
 - The proposed scope of information to be provided at statutory consultation and any other information that should be provided; and
 - The proposed venues selected for lodging copies of the SoCC alongside other consultation documents and venues for the statutory public exhibitions.

6 Community Consultation Process

6.1 Consultation objectives

- 6.1.1 The objectives of Cory's community consultation process are:
 - To provide consultees with sufficiently detailed information to understand the REP proposal and the potential impacts;
 - To provide consultees with an opportunity to influence aspects of the project that are under development and to understand which elements of the project are fixed and the reasons why;
 - Clearly signpost the different ways in which consultees can comment on the proposals; and
 - Start a meaningful dialogue with the community that can continue through the submission and examination phase of the consenting process.
- 6.1.2 The DCLG PA 2008 pre-application guidance states that consultation should take place at a sufficiently early stage to allow consultees a real opportunity to influence the proposal.
- 6.1.3 Taking this into account Cory propose to undertake a two-stage consultation process with the local community. Cory have made the decision to undertake informal non-statutory consultation to provide the local community with an early opportunity to influence the REP proposal and the consultation process.
- 6.1.4 An overview of the proposed activities and the scope of information to be consulted on at non-statutory (Stage one) and statutory (Stage two) consultation is outlined in this section. The proposed community consultation timetable is set out below.

6.2 Stage one: Non-statutory consultation

- 6.2.1 Cory will provide the following information during the non-statuary consultation:
 - explain why the Application Site has been selected;
 - provide information about Cory's existing operations at the RRRF;
 - outline the design parameters of the REP proposal;
 - provide information about the different low carbon energy generating technologies to be utilised at REP;
 - explain Cory's plans to use the River Thames as a 'Green Highway' for deliveries to and from the REP; and
 - provide information about the DCO application process and key dates for further consultation on the REP.
- 6.2.2 Cory have made the decision to undertake early informal consultation to provide the local community with an opportunity to influence the REP proposal and the consultation process.
- 6.2.3 Cory will explain which aspects of the proposal require further refinement and will specifically seek people's views on the following:
 - A preferred roof option for the facility (stepped, curved or flat);

- Options for where we could route the underground electricity connection;
- Our use of the River Thames:
- Our approach to traffic and transport management;
- Our protection of local air quality; and
- Anything else that matters to you and that you think we need to consider.
- 6.2.4 Cory intend to undertake the following consultation activities at Stage one to inform the local community about the REP proposals:
 - Public exhibitions: Cory will host non-statutory public exhibitions at local venues within the consultation zone which will be open for anyone with an interest in REP to attend. Copies of a project brochure setting out a non-technical summary of the REP proposal and a feedback form with questions to capture views on the proposals will be made available in print at the public exhibitions. Electronic copies of both documents will be made available online on the Riverside Energy Park website. Table 6.1 sets out details of the proposed non-statutory public exhibitions.

- 6.2.5 Information about the REP proposals and the Stage one public exhibitions will be publicised via the following methods:
 - Newsletter: Cory will mail a newsletter to stakeholders in the consultation zone (explained in Section 6.4 of this document);
 - Website: the Riverside Energy Park website will be regularly updated with the latest news about REP, provide access to all statutory consultation documents, allow completion of an online questionnaire and provide responses to Frequently Asked Questions that arise during the community consultation.

- Posters: posters advertising the non-statutory public exhibitions will be mailed to local councils, councillors, libraries and the public exhibition venues. Additionally, local business owners will be asked to display posters in shop windows.
- Social media: reminders of when and where public exhibition are taking place will be publicised via the main Cory twitter account (@CoryEnergy); and
- Newspaper notices: Cory will place an advertisement in a local newspaper circulating within the consultation zone to publicise the nonstatutory public exhibitions. Details of the proposed newspaper advertisement are provided in the table below:

6.3 Stage two: Statutory consultation

- 6.3.1 Cory will undertake a single statutory pre-application consultation period between 18th June 2018 and 30th July 2018 incorporating the requirements of sections 42, 47 and 48 of the PA 2008 across an extended 42-day consultation period.
- 6.3.2 Section 45 of the 2008 Act states that applicants must provide consultees notified under section 42 with a minimum of 28 days to respond to the consultation starting from the day after the receipt of the consultation documents.
- 6.3.3 Consultation responses should be submitted to Cory by <u>17.00 on 30th July</u> <u>2018</u> however Cory will consider consultation responses received after this date wherever possible.
- 6.3.4 Section 1.7.2 of the SoCC outlines what information Cory will present to consultees during the statutory consultation period.
- 6.3.5 Section 1.7.3 of the SoCC identifies specific topics which Cory will invite comments on from the local community during the statutory consultation period.
- 6.3.6 Section 1.7.4 of the SoCC provides details of the proposed locations and times for the statutory public exhibitions.
- 6.3.7 Sections 1.7.5 1.7. 7 of the SoCC outline the scope of information and documentation which will be made available to attendee at the statutory public exhibitions.

- 6.3.8 Section 1.8.1 of the SoCC outlines the range of communication methods that Cory will use to inform the local community about the REP proposal and the statutory consultation and includes details of proposed inspection venues where members of the public can view the consultation documents (as listed at Section 1.7.7 of the SoCC).
- 6.3.9 Cory will also place an advertisement in a local newspaper circulating within the consultation zone to publicise the statutory public exhibitions. Details of the proposed newspaper advertisement are provided in the table below:

6.4 Defining the consultation zone

- 6.4.1 Section 47 of the 2008 Act states that those '*living in the vicinity of the land*' should be consulted. The DCLG PA 2008 pre-application guidance recognises that applicants are best places to establish an appropriate area in which to consult the local community and that relevant local authorities should work together with applicants to develop a plan for consultation.
- 6.4.2 The DCLG PA 2008 pre-application guidance advises that the consultation zone should be proportionate to the expected level of impacts resulting from the proposal:
 - "The aim should be to ensure that consultation is appropriate to the scale and nature of the project and where its impacts will be experienced." [24]
 - "Applicants are required to set out in their Statement of Community Consultation how they propose to consult those living in the vicinity of the land. They are encouraged to consider consulting beyond this where they think doing so may provide more information on the impacts of their proposals (e.g. through visual impacts or increased traffic flow)." [56]

"To ensure that consultation is fair to all parties, applicants should be able to demonstrate that the consultation process is proportionate to the impacts of the project in the area that it affects, takes account of the anticipated level of local interest, and takes account of the views of the relevant local authorities." [77]

6.4.3 This Section explains how the proposed consultation zone, shown in Figure 6:1, has been defined for REP taking account of the DCLG PA 2008 preapplication guidance and the potential impacts arising from the different elements of the REP proposal.





- 6.4.4 The consultation zone has been defined to include those communities closest to the indicative application boundary since they are more likely to be affected by the proposals than the general public. The consultation zone boundary has been defined to include:
 - a 2km radius around the REP site; and
 - a 200m buffer either side of the electrical connection route options extended to the north to follow the natural boundary of the River Thames.
- 6.4.5 Figure 6.2 is provided for indicative purposes only. Appendix A contains a draft version of consultation zone map to be included in the final version of the SoCC which illustrates the proposed public exhibitions venue locations, document inspection locations, the REP site and electrical cable route option variants alongside the consultation zone area.
- 6.4.6 As explained in paragraph 6.4.4, Cory will engage and consult directly with local communities within a 2km radius of the REP site. The proposed consultation zone is proportionate to the potential impacts arising from the construction and operation of the REP which include (but not limited to):
 - Temporary and permanent transport impacts on the road and river network from delivery of components for construction;
 - Temporary impacts on air quality from dust and trackout however these impacts should be mitigated to a not significant level and air quality impacts from construction vehicles and vessels;

- Temporary noise and vibration impacts on the nearest Noise Sensitive Receptors during construction;
- Temporary visual impacts for users of local public rights of way (PRoW);
- Temporary impacts on terrestrial biodiversity disturbance to local flora and fauna from soil stripping, habitat loss and construction lighting;
- Temporary impacts on hydrology, flood risk and water resources potential for sediment discharge and chemical leakage into local water courses;
- Temporary impacts on ground conditions including compaction of soils, potential to release contaminates through soil disturbance and impacts to groundwater due to the potential for chemical spillages;
- Temporary socio-economic impacts both positive and negative including a strain on local services due to influx of construction workers, additional spending and job creation;
- Permanent air quality impacts due to the dispersion of pollutants from the REP stack, anaerobic digestion (AD) and increased vehicle and vessel delivering waste;
- Permanent impacts on townscape and the historic environment from the Stack and massing of the main REP building;
- Permanent noise from the operation of REP and increased vehicle movements:
- Permanent impact on biodiversity from noise from operational plant, dispersion of pollutants from REP Stack and operational lighting;
- Permanent impacts on ground conditions due to the potential for chemical spillages; and
- Permanent socio-economic impact due to the potential for job creation.
- 6.4.7 As explained in paragraph 6.4.4, Cory will also engage and consult directly with local communities within a 200m buffer either side of the electrical connection route options and up to the boundary of the River Thames to the north. Since the preferred electrical connection route is not likely to be chosen until after the statutory consultation a wide consultation zone has been adopted to provide all communities which could be potentially be affected with an opportunity to comment on the proposals. The proposed consultation zone is proportionate to the potential impacts arising from the construction of the electrical connection which include (but not limited to):
 - Temporary impacts on the road network from temporary road closures;
 - Temporary air quality impacts from dust and trackout, however these impacts should be mitigated to a not significant level;

- Temporary noise and vibration impacts on the nearest Noise Sensitive Receptors during construction;
- Temporary impact on townscape limited to local residents; and
- Temporary socio-economic impact due to the influx of construction workers.

6.5 Communication methods

- 6.5.1 Within the consultation zone the following stakeholders will be informed about the REP proposal and sent an invitation to attend public exhibitions by mail:
 - Local residents with postal addresses within the consultation boundaries;
 - Local businesses with postal addresses within the consultation boundaries;
 - Local interest groups which are active within the consultation boundaries;
 and
 - Elected representatives (Councillors, Members of Parliament and Members of the European Parliament) with local constituencies within the consultation boundaries.
- 6.5.2 Cory recognise that some of the potential impacts from the REP proposal may have the potential to affect communities located beyond the consultation zone. Therefore, in accordance with the DCLG PA 2008 pre-application guidance Cory will publicise the consultation and the REP proposal beyond the consultation zone through local newspaper advertisements, twitter and Riverside Energy Park website updates.

6.6 What we will do with consultation responses

- 6.6.1 Section 49 of the 2008 Act places a duty on applicants to take account of responses to statutory consultation and publicity.
- 6.6.2 Cory will record and consider all consultation responses received during the non-statutory and statutory consultation. The Consultation Report, which will be submitted with the REP DCO application will consider and respond to all formal consultation responses. Cory will consider consultation responses received outside of the statutory consultation period wherever possible.

7 Summary

- 7.1.1 This document and the enclosed draft SoCC explain the statutory consultation requirements of the 2008 Act and the pre-application consultation which Cory will undertake with local communities on the REP proposals.
- 7.1.2 This document together with the draft SoCC comprise the 'Consultation Documents' as defined under Section 47(3) and (4) of the 2008 Act.
- 7.1.3 Section 47(6) of the 2008 Act (as amended) requires that the applicant must consult with each local authority within section 43(1) about the content of the SoCC. The relevant authorities who are being consulted on the SoCC include LBB, DBC and KCC.
- 7.1.4 Cory undertook early non-statutory engagement with the relevant local authorities on the content on an earlier version of the draft SoCC in February 2018. Follow the receipt of feedback from local authorities Cory have incorporated the following changes in to the community consultation:
 - The consultation zone has been extended to incorporate the Bridge masterplan area in Dartford;
 - The Leigh University Technical College has been included as a public exhibition location;
 - KCC and DBC have confirmed that there are no significant hard to reach groups; and
 - Resident's groups in surrounding area will be directly contacted about the proposed public exhibitions at request of KCC/DBC to address potential wider transport and road network users.
- 7.1.5 Cory is now seeking informal views on the content and format of the draft SoCC from local authorities.
- 7.1.6 Comments must be submitted to Cory by <u>17.00 on 29th March 2018</u> to ensure that they are incorporated in the draft version of the SoCC produced for statutory consultation. Comments should be emailed directly to <u>info@riversideenergypark.com</u>.
