Objection to Sunnica Ltd Non-Material Change Request

Good afternoon,

I live in the area affected by the Sunnica Energy Farm and am writing to formally object to the Non-Material Change request concerning the proposed alteration to the National Grid access point.

Once again, Sunnica Ltd is seeking to make changes to their plans after consent has been granted, and once again, the local community is being shut out of the process. The original consultation saw over 1,300 objections from residents who are deeply invested in what happens in their own community. Our voices, our concerns, and our livelihoods deserve to be heard—not dismissed through limited consultation and technical reclassifications of “non-material” changes.

The grid connection and associated infrastructure are core elements of the project. These should have been finalised before the original application and certainly before the Examination in 2023. Changes at that stage caused confusion, delays, and additional environmental impacts. Approving further amendments now risks allowing Sunnica to continue shifting the goalposts, undermining the transparency and certainty that the Development Consent Order process is meant to guarantee.

Local people like me have taken the time to engage with this process because we care about our landscape, heritage, wildlife, and the local economy. Restricting consultation and excluding communities from discussions about significant changes is deeply unfair and erodes trust in the process. Approving this request would set a dangerous precedent, enabling a series of small, cumulative amendments that fundamentally alter the project without proper scrutiny or genuine public input.

I urge the Planning Inspectorate and the Secretary of State to reject this change. Local communities have already made it clear how strongly they feel, and any attempt to bypass our voices risks further harm to both the environment and public confidence in this process.
