1 Introduction

1.1 Background

- This Statement of Common Ground (SoCG) has been prepared between RWE Renewables UK Dogger Bank South (West) Ltd and RWE Renewables UK Dogger Bank South (East) Ltd, ('the Applicants') and National Highways to set out the areas of agreement and disagreement between the two parties in relation to the proposed Development Consent Order (DCO) application for the Dogger Bank South ('DBS') West Offshore Wind Farm and DBS East Offshore Wind Farm, collectively known as DBS Offshore Wind Farms (herein 'the Projects').
- 2. The Application is for development consent for the Applicants to construct and operate the proposed Projects under the Planning Act 2008. Further description of the Projects is available in **Project Description**, **Figure 5-1** (**Revision 3**) [REP7-034].
- 3. In drafting this SoCG, the Applicants have had regard to the Planning Act 2008 Guidance: Examination stage for Nationally Significant Infrastructure Projects (Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government and Department for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities, 2024).
- The need for a SoCG between the Applicants and National Highways is set out within the **Rule 6 Letter** [PD-002] issued by the Planning Inspectorate (PINS) on the 24th September 2024 and reiterated in the updated Rule 6 Letter [PD-010] issued on 17th December 2024.
- 5. This SoCG is intended to provide the Examining Authority (ExA) with a clear summary of discussions between the parties and has been structured to reflect topics which are of interest to National Highways, and which have been raised within National Highways' Relevant Representation [RR-037] to the Dogger Bank South Offshore Wind Farms DCO that has been submitted to the Planning Inspectorate pursuant to the Planning Act 2008.
- 6. It is the intention that this document will facilitate further discussions between the Applicants and National Highways and will provide the ExA with a clear overview of the level of common ground between both parties. This document has been updated throughout the Examination process.
- 7. The following application documents have informed the discussions with National Highways and address the elements of the Projects that may affect the interests of National Highways:

8. National Highways and the Applicants have been working together to minimise the possible impacts of the Projects on National Highways' operations.

1.2 Approach to SoCG

- This SoCG has been developed during the pre-examination and examination phases of the Projects. In accordance with discussions between the Applicants and National Highways, this SoCG is focused on matters of material interest and relevance to National Highways, namely matters covered in the Application Documents outlined in Table 1-1 and related topics.
- 10. The structure of this SoCG is as follows:
 - Introduction: background to the development of the SoCG.
 - **Consultation and Engagement**: a summary of consultation and engagement with National Highways to date.
 - Agreement Log: a record of the Applicants' position alongside National Highways' position is set out in **Table 3-2** in relation to the application documents set out in **Table 1-1**.
- 11. It is agreed that this SoCG is an accurate description of the areas agreed between the parties, and that this SoCG accurately records key meetings and consultation with National Highways.







2 Consultation and Engagement

2.1 Introduction

National Highways have been consulted on the Projects throughout the preapplication stage, having engaged in the Traffic and Transport ETG meetings under the Evidence Plan Process, as well as via non-statutory and statutory consultation under Section 42 of the Planning Act 2008.

2.2 Consultation and Engagement Summary

13. **Table 2-1** summarises the consultation that the Applicants have undertaken with National Highways as statutory or non-statutory consultation during the preapplication and post-application phases.

6.	Requirement 27 of the Draft DCO [REP1-004] is appropriate to manage the potential effects of decommissioning activities.	National Highways agree that the potential for decommissioning effects can be managed through the requirement to produce an Onshore Decommissioning Plan.	
7.	The wording of Articles 10 and 12 of the Draft DCO [REP3-004] is appropriate. National Highways have raised concerns with '28 days deemed consent' clause of Articles 10 and 12. The Applicants and National Highways have discussed this matter thoroughly (see Table 2-1) and it is the Applicants' position that 28 days is the standard and appropriate time for National Highways to respond to an application under Articles 10 and 12. It is the Applicants position that the fundamental purpose of a deemed consent mechanism is to provide certainty and avoid undue delay in the delivery of critical infrastructure and to ensure the process for discharge of requirements is efficient, transparent, and reliable. The Applicants consider that 28 days represents a fair	The Applicants and National Highways have been in discussion regarding the wording of Article 10 (Temporary closure of streets) and Article 12 (Power to alter layout, etc. of streets) relating to deemed consent after 28 days throughout Examination. During a meeting to discuss this matter on 30 th January 2025 National Highways raised concerns that consent might be granted if the application under Articles 10 and 12 did not reach the appropriate contact in order to be processed within the 28-day period. During a meeting to discuss this matter on 13/03/25 National Highways stated that the principle of deemed consent was their principal concern, rather than the 28-day time period being too short.	
	The Applicants consider that 28 days represents a fair and reasonable period within which a discharging	National Highways and the Applicants have now reached agreement on this matter.

The Secretary of State has accepted this principle in several comparable DCOs, including Awel y Môr, East Anglia ONE North, East Anglia TWO, and most recently, Rampion 2. These precedents reinforce that a 28-day period, starting from submission, strikes the right balance between allowing authorities time to consider the application and ensuring timely progress for Nationally Significant Infrastructure Projects.		
	This matter is now considered agreed post the receipt of National Highways' 24 th June 2025 email.
