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1 Introduction

1.1 Status of the Statement of Common Ground

- 1.1.1 This draft Statement of Common Ground ('dSoCG') has been produced for FVS Dean Moor Limited ('the Applicant') to support the application for a prepared in respect of the Development Consent Order (the 'DCO application') to the Secretary of State for Energy Security and Net Zero ('SoS') for Dean Moor Solar Farm ('the Proposed Development') located between the villages of Gilgarran and Branthwaite in West Cumbria (the 'Site'), which is situated within the administrative area of Cumberland Council ('the Council').
- 1.1.2 This dSoCG has been prepared by (1) the Applicant and (2) Historic England (HE). It is agreed that this dSoCG is an accurate description of the matters raised by Historic England and the current status of each matter. A high-level overview of the engagement undertaken since September 2023 is summarised in section 3.

1.2 Purpose of this document

1.2.1 The dSoCG has been produced to confirm to the Examining Authority (ExA) where agreement has been reached between the parties, and where agreement has not (yet) been reached. In the planning process, SoCGs are an established means of allowing all parties to identify and focus on specific matters that may need to be addressed during the Examination. The dSoCG is a 'live' document that will be updated by the parties as matters progress.

1.3 Terminology

1.3.1 In the matters table in Section 3 of this dSoCG, 'Matter agreed' indicates where issues are resolved. 'Matter under discussion' indicates where points will be the subject of ongoing discussion wherever possible to resolve, or refine, the extent of disagreement between the parties and 'Matter not agreed' indicates agreement on the matter could not be reached following significant engagement.



2 Current Position

2.1 Position of Historic England and the Applicant

- 2.1.1 The Applicant and HE have had positive engagement on the Proposed Development, which has centred around the methodology and conclusions within the relevant chapters and appendices of the Environmental Statement (ES) in relation to the assessment of heritage assets. There are currently no matters which are under discussion or have not been agreed.
- 2.1.2 Within their Relevant Representation (RR) [RR-016], HE raised matters relating to the guidance referenced within the HEDBA, and clarifications around views from the Far Branthwaite Edge, Dairy and Barn Grade II Listed Building [NHLE: 1138216]. The Applicant has responded to these points within the 'Applicant Response to Relevant Representations' (ARRR) [REP1-002] and provided clarification within the updated (D2) HEDBA and ES Chapter 6 where appropriate to provide revised referencing and clarity in the use of guidance.
- 2.1.3 The shared position set out below within Table 2.1 '*Matters agreed*' is the agreed position.



2.2 Matters agreed

2.2.1 Table 2.1 below details the matters agreed with HE.

HE.1	Technical recommendations on the approach to ES Chapter 6 - Cultural Heritage	The Applicant has taken on board the feedback provided by HE to improve the clarity and consistency of ES Chapter 6, and its referencing, such that these aspects of HE feedback are fully resolved by the revisions. HE comments related to the inclusion of 'out of date' guidance within Chapter 6 has been discussed and agreed as appropriate to include additional context to the Historic HEDBA to explain how this guidance relates to a methodology that remains in use, and how it has been used in the HEDBA in a manner that is appropriate despite the original source material being superseded. The Applicant response to HE's RR comments on this matter is included within the 'ARRR [D1.1], and the HEDBA and ES Chapter 6 have been updated to provide revised referencing and clarity in the use of guidance. A technical note has been produced which discusses the EIA methodology. Following these updates, it is agreed that there are no outstanding issues related to guidance within ES Chapter 6 – Cultural Heritage and supporting appendices. HE.2	The potential for archaeological remains on the Proposed Development Site	It is agreed that the assessment of the HEDBA, which is reinforced by the findings of the geophysical survey, support a judgement that the probability of significant archaeological remains across the Site is low, not least due to the extensive history of open cast mining and other development across large areas of the Site. It is also agreed that despite this, further investigation is required in the form of additional fieldwork, including trial trenching, to inform a fuller understanding of the Site's archaeological baseline. The Archaeology Management Strategy (AMS), which includes an outline Written Scheme of Investigation (WSI), has been agreed with the Council's archaeologist. The AMS provides an appropriate foundation for fieldwork to be undertaken in advance of construction on the Site, and sets out pathways to secure any further mitigation (exclusion, design alternatives, working methods, and a watching brief to be implemented during construction) depending on fieldwork outcomes. Subject to the Council's acceptance of the final AMS, HE accepts the approach to archaeological investigation and mitigation.in principle, with further scrutiny to be provided of the final AMS to be approved for DCO Requirement 9, and in association with the outcomes of that fieldwork.	
HE.3	The potential for positive effects on archaeology	The archaeological fieldwork secured by a DCO Requirement, and the publication of outcomes, will mitigate the impacts on known or unknown archaeological remains and there is a potential for positive effect through the addition of knowledge to the local Historic Environment Record (HER). The Applicant considers that there is positive potential to better reveal the significance of the Stone Circle and Cairn through the introduction of a permissive path and information boards in the vicinity of the Stone Circle and Cairn, providing the potential to interact with the SM and an opportunity to engage with the designated heritage asset. HE.5	Conclusions as to effects on designated heritage assets (Stone Circle and Round Cairn and Wythemoor Sough and Adjoining Barn and Stable)	While the Proposed Development has the potential for significant effects (in EIA terms) on designated heritage assets during all phases, the exclusion of development from more elevated areas affecting the Stone Circle and Round Cairn, and further setback from Grade II Listed Wythemoor Sough and Adjoining Barn and Stable (Wythemoor Sough) (NHLE: 1327185) coupled with the mitigation / enhancement planting provided by the LSP and OLEMP, mean that there will be less than substantial harm to these designated heritage assets. In response to ExAQ 5.0.2 regarding the evidence base to assess impacts on the Stone Circle and Round Cairn, the Applicant and HE have agreed that further photographs of the Stone Circle and Round Cairn would demonstrate its relationship with its landscape setting and the Site, and it was agreed that the inclusion of the additional photographs within the updated HEBDA would be an appropriate way in which response to the request for further visualisations.
