Final statement of objection to Rosefield solar farm

I write as an as an interested party, to register my continued objection to the proposal to create a large solar farm together with Bess battery storage and other ancillary items under the heading of Rosefield solar farm.

The applicant EDF, have shown a continued and arrogant approach with a distinct lack of understanding of the many nuances that this large project encompasses. Initially finding a single landowner was a lazy and apparently easy method of gaining a rapid approval by the by the Inspectorate. However, they failed to understand the range of significant issues that impact both the local community, local farmers, tenants, and businesses that came as an integral part of the Verney Claydon estate.

The application should be refused.

- The cumulative impact of the range of environmental issues.
- The colony of Beckstein bats, a red listed and rare colony.
- The destruction and industrialization of an important valued landscape.
- The loss of a highly significant and important business that supplies critical medical diagnostic products to the National Health add European and worldwide customers. The failure of EDF to understand the nature of this business from the very beginning, highlights the failure by EDF, through insufficient research, to ask questions and understand issues that are facing a development of this size this area.
- The whole community have clearly stated that they are opposed to this proposal and supported the objections in all the consultations and, by raising significant amounts of money to fund experts in the subjects investigated by the NSIP inspectorate.
- All the other issues have been fully covered within the NSIP, in detail, and the way in which the objections have been presented in a clear and unambiguous way has left the Inspectorate in a difficult position should they choose to ignore them and recommend approval.

Finally, I would remind that the inspectorate that the government are now making clear political statements about the importance of the views of local communities within the decision-making process of Planning.

I urge you to refuse the application.
