

Dear Sir

We are painfully disappointed that our request for the inspectorate to visit our house to at first hand witness the impact of the Solar farm panel arrays on our direct outlook have not been taken up.

As per our submission under reference S77C74412 we requested a visit whilst the inspectorate and applicant conducted local site visits as they would have needed to walk or drive past our house in any case for the days activities .

Once again we can only assume that the concerns and worries of the local residents are being totally disregarded relating to all matters of this Rosefield Solar farm and associated infrastructure by other third parties .

The area of the Claydons has suffered massively over recent years with the construction of both HS2 and East West rail links (no benefit is felt to the local communities, only damaged roads, hedgerows, house walls and daily facing the danger of "rat running" workmen in their cars and trucks from the projects. This will only increase if further infrastructure project such as Rosefield and local BESS plus power station enhancements are allowed to pass planning.

The fact that the applicant has applied for this Solar farm and BESS placement because it cites that the National grid infrastructure is in place to access the grid is ridiculous . National grid state that if this Rosefield Solar farm proceeds then they will have to build double the size substation at Winslow / East Claydon to accept the feeds . This is an circular argument , we need none of it .

This area of the Chilterns and North Bucks plus the end of the Aylesbury vale is some of the last remaining natural areas of the three counties offering scope for country walks and rural living . It is a prize area for farming both arable and livestock . Surely the country needs to sustain its food supply infrastructure ? Turning over in excess of 3000 acres of land to solar panels and BESS infrastructure cannot be in the national interests of the country .

As a final comment I heard recently on the radio that the CEO of EDF, the company behind the planning and works for this project even stated that the UK did not require any additional power generation from NEW projects, it only needed a better grid infrastructure and deployment of the power it can already generate as well as the completion of projects already granted permission to proceed.

If he says that then how on earth is it possible to grant permission for this Rosefield Solar project ?
