A11.1.1 INTRODUCTION

A11.1.1.1 PROJECT BACKGROUND

- This document is an Archaeological Desk-Based Assessment of land north-west of Newark-on-Trent, Nottinghamshire (hereafter 'the Order Limits', **Figure A11.1.1a-d**), the Order Limits extend from Ossington in the north, Eakring in the west, and Cromwell in the east. It was produced by Wessex Archaeology.
- This study is a technical appendix to the Environmental Statement (ES) chapter for the Great North Road Solar and Biodiversity Park ("the Development"), a proposed solar farm and associated infrastructure across an area of approximately 1,765 hectares (ha).

A11.1.1.2 DEVELOPMENT PROPOSALS

ES Chapter 5, Development Description, [EN010162/APP/6.2.5] sets out that the Development will comprise the installation of a series of ground-mounted solar PV panels within the Order Limits. Associated works will include a Battery Energy Storage System (BESS), inverter housings, switch gear, access tracks, compounds, underground cabling, security measures and other ancillary equipment and landscaping.

A11.1.1.3 SCOPE OF DOCUMENT

- This assessment has been prepared in order to determine, as far as is possible from existing information, the nature, extent and significance of the archaeological resource within the Order Limits and its environs, and to provide an assessment of the potential impact of the Development on the heritage assets that embody that significance.
- The Historic Environment, as defined in the National Planning Policy Framework¹ (2024): Annex 2, comprises:
- 'all aspects of the environment resulting from the interaction between people and places through time, including all surviving physical remains of past human activity, whether visible, buried or submerged, and landscaped and planted or managed flora.'
- 7 NPPF Annex 2 defines a Heritage Asset as:
- 'a building monument, site, place, area or landscape identified as having a degree of significance meriting consideration in planning decisions, because of its heritage interest. Heritage assets include designated heritage assets and assets identified by the local planning authority (including local listing).'

A11.1.1.4 AIMS

- Outline the known and potential heritage assets within the Order Limits based on a review of existing information within a defined study area (as shown in Figure A11.1.1);
- Assess the significance of known and potential heritage assets through weighted consideration of their valued components; and
- Make recommendations for strategies to mitigate potential adverse impacts arising from the proposed Development.

A11.1.2 METHODOLOGY

A11.1.2.1 INTRODUCTION

The methodology employed during this assessment was based upon relevant professional guidance, including the Chartered Institute for Archaeologists' Standard and guidance for historic environment desk-based assessment (CIfA 2014, revised 2020²).

A11.1.2.2 STUDY AREA

A Study Area was established within a 1 km radius of the Order Limits as agreed with heritage stakeholders. The recorded historic environment resource within the Study Area was considered in order to provide a context for the discussion and interpretation of the known and potential archaeological resource within the Order Limits.

A11.1.2.3 SOURCES

- Several publicly accessible sources of primary and synthesised information were consulted. These comprised:
 - The National Heritage List for England (NHLE), which is the only official and up to date database of all nationally designated heritage assets;
 - The Nottinghamshire Historic Environment Record (NHER), comprising a database of recorded archaeological sites, find spots, and archaeological events within the county (Obtained August 2023);
 - Relevant national, regional and thematic Research Frameworks (e.g., East Midlands Research Framework³);
 - National heritage datasets including the Archaeological Data Service (ADS), Heritage Gateway, OASIS, PastScape and the National Record of the Historic Environment (NRHE) Excavation Index;
 - Historic manuscripts, surveyed maps, LiDAR data, Aerial Photography, National Mapping Programme cropmark data and Ordnance Survey maps;
 - Relevant primary and secondary sources held in Wessex Archaeology's own library;
 - Phase 1 geophysical survey (see ES Technical Appendix A11.4) [EN010162/APP/6.4.11.4];
 - Phase 2 geophysical survey (see ES Technical Appendix A11.5) [EN010162/APP/6.4.11.5];

- Phase 1 evaluation (see ES Technical Appendix A11.6) [EN010162/APP/6.4.11.6]; and
- Phase 2 evaluation (see ES Technical Appendix A11.7) [EN010162/APP/6.4.11.7].

A11.1.2.4 SITE VISIT

- The Order Limits were visited between the 30th of January and the 7th of March 2024. Weather conditions varied across the weeks but were generally dry and clear. A fieldwork record comprising digital photography [taken on the site visit?] is held in the project archive.
- The aim of the Site visit was to assess the general aspect, character, condition and setting of the Order Limits and to identify any prior impacts not evident from secondary sources. The Site visit also sought to ascertain if the Order Limits contained any previously unidentified features of archaeological, architectural, or historic interest.

A11.1.2.5 SIGNIFICANCE

- Significance (for heritage policy and as used in this assessment) is defined in NPPF Annex 2 as:
- 'The value of a heritage asset to this and future generations because of its heritage interest. The interest may be archaeological, architectural, artistic or historic. Significance derives not only from a heritage asset's physical presence, but also from its setting. For World Heritage Sites, the cultural value described within each site's Statement of Outstanding Universal Value forms part of its significance.'
- The interests as listed in the NPPF are further defined in Historic England's (2019) Statements of Heritage Significance: analysing significance in heritage assets⁴. These are:
 - Archaeological Interest: there will be archaeological interest in a heritage asset if it holds, or potentially holds, evidence of past human activity worthy of expert investigation at some point;
 - Architectural and Artistic Interest: these are interests in the design and general aesthetics of a place. They can arise from conscious design or fortuitously from the way the heritage asset has evolved. More specifically, architectural interest is an interest in the art or science of the design, construction, craftsmanship and decoration of buildings and structures of all types. Artistic interest is an interest in other human creative skill, like sculpture; and
 - Historic Interest: An interest in past lives and events (including prehistoric). Heritage assets can illustrate or be associated with them. Heritage assets with historic interest not only provide a material record of our nation's history but can also provide meaning for communities derived from their collective experience of a place and can symbolise wider values such as faith and cultural identity.

A11.1.2.6 ASSUMPTIONS AND LIMITATIONS

- Data used to compile this report consists of secondary information derived from a variety of sources, only some of which have been directly examined for the purposes of this study. The assumption is made that this data, as well as that derived from other secondary sources, is reasonably accurate.
- The records held by the Nottinghamshire Historic Environment Record (NHER) are not a record of all surviving heritage assets, but a record of the discovery of a wide range of archaeological and historical components of the historic environment. The information held within it is not complete and does not preclude the subsequent discovery of further elements of the historic environment that are, at present, unknown. The date from NHER was obtained in August 2023 and checked for currency in June 2025

A11.1.3 BASELINE RESOURCE

A11.1.3.1 THE ORDER LIMITS

- The Order Limits comprise a series of interconnected irregular parcels of arable land equalling approximately 1,765 hectares (ha) in size. To accurately assess the entirety of the Order Limits the following baseline has been broken down into ten geographical locations, Areas 1 10. These areas are unrelated to the Development work no. areas and have been chosen in order to help assess the historic environment data in manageable amounts. The Areas can be seen outlined on **Figure A11.1.1a-d**.
- Whilst Listed Buildings have been included in the following baseline, the effects of the Development on these assets are assessed in ES Technical Appendix A11.2 [EN010162/APP/6.4.11.2].
- The following sections provide a summary of the recorded historic environment within the Study Area, compiled from the sources summarised above and detailed in the references section of this report. The likelihood of as-yet unrecorded archaeological remains within the Order Limits is informed

- by the consideration of the known heritage assets within the Study Area, in conjunction with the geology and topography of the area.
- Records obtained from the National Heritage List for England (NHLE), NHER and other sources are listed in Gazetteers for each area and illustrated in Figures A11.1.2 A11.1.12.

A11.1.3.2 AREA 1

A11.1.3.2.1 Introduction

- Area 1 is located in the south of the Study Area and is agricultural in character, with the settlement of Kelham to the south-east of the Order Limits. The River Trent traverses the south-east corner of Area 1 from the north-east to south-west, which is reflected in the topography of the area which rises from the river valley in the south-west at approximately 13 m above Ordnance Datum (aOD) to approximately 68 m aOD in the north-west of Area 1.
- The underlying bedrock of Area 1 consists of the following Mercia Mudstone Groups: Mudstone, and Siltstone & Dolomitic. There are superficial deposits within the south-east of Area 1 consisting of Alluvium Clay, Silt, Sand and Gravel, and Holme Pierrepont Sand and Gravels (British Geological Survey).

A11.1.3.2.2 Designated Heritage Assets

A11.1.3.2.2.1 Order Limits

There are no Designated Archaeological Assets within the Order Limits in Area 1.

A11.1.3.2.2.2 Study Area

- There are 14 Listed Buildings within the Study Area of Area 1, these assets include two Grade I Listed Buildings, one Grade II* Listed Building and 11 Grade II Listed Buildings.
- The Designated Heritage Assets of Area 1 are illustrated in **Figure A11.1.2d**.

A11.1.3.2.3 Previous Studies

A11.1.3.2.3.1 Order Limits

- The NHER records a single previous study within the Order Limits in Area 1 comprising a fieldwalking exercise near Flash Farm (ENT277; Figure A11.1.8d).
- Wessex Archaeology undertook a phase of geophysical surveys across various locations within the north-east part of Area 1⁶. This identified several archaeological features within the Study Area. Magnitude Survey also undertook a second phase of geophysical surveying in 2024⁷.

York Archaeology undertook the Phase 2 programme of archaeological evaluation (trial trenching), within Area 1 in 2025. A total of 14 trenches were identified as containing archaeological features comprising pits and ditches, which were unable to be dated⁸.

A11.1.3.2.3.2 Study Area

- The NHER contains entries on a small number of investigations which have been carried out within the Study Area within Area 1. These include a series of works within the grounds of Kelham Hall to the south-east of the Order Limits (ENT4602, ENT4603, ENT4604), as well as a watching brief, and further fieldwalking around the settlement of Kelham (ENT3947, ENT3551, ENT279 and ENT278).
- Where relevant, the results of these investigations are discussed in further detail below in the archaeological and historical context.
- Previous archaeological investigations carried out within the Study Area are illustrated in **Figure A11.1.8a-d.**

A11.1.3.2.4 Archaeological and Historical Context

A11.1.3.2.4.1 Prehistoric (970,000 BC-AD 43) (Figure A11.1.3d)

- The early prehistoric periods from the Palaeolithic to the Mesolithic are generally associated with hunter-gatherer patterns of exploitation and shifting seasonal settlement. As a result, evidence from this period, particularly in Nottinghamshire, is often ephemeral and difficult to identify. However, an increase in evidence of Palaeolithic activity has been recorded particularly within the River Gravels present along the banks of the River Trent. To the south-east of the Study Area, on the western bank of the River Trent at Farndon Fields, a nationally important Palaeolithic campsite has indicated that hunter-gatherer communities may have migrated between the River Trent Valley and the noted Palaeolithic cave sites in the north-east of the county during this period⁹.
- Similar patterns within the landscape have been observed during the Mesolithic period, once again notably around the River Trent Valley, these sites are characterised largely by surface-level lithic finds that have been primarily identified during field-walking activities¹⁰. Whilst the majority of archaeological investigations for these periods have been undertaken at cave sites such as Creswell Craggs, it is worth noting that landforms such as Paleo-channels within areas such as the Trent Valley could provide the geoarchaeological conditions to preserve evidence of Mesolithic organic material which may provide evidence to greater understand areas of the Mesolithic which have until now been sparse; economy, society and the changing environment¹¹.

- There are no known finds from these periods within Area 1.
- The earliest dated finds recorded within Area 1 date to the Neolithic period, with a series of findspots within the east of the Study Area. Identified during fieldwalking activities these are finds recovered from the surface and include collections of flints (L11114, L11340, L11856), an axehead (L8313) and two stone axes (L3121, L3122).
- The earliest recorded activity within the Order Limits, lies along the eastern border of Area 1 and Area 10, with substantial evidence of two Iron Age settlements present (**M2968**, **M2966**). The northern settlement (**M2966**) was identified via aerial photographic analysis by a series of enclosures and hut circles, along with a possible hengiform feature in the form of a double-ring ditch. Geophysical survey undertaken by Wessex Archaeology¹², indicated the presence of the hengiform feature.
- The southern settlement (**M2968**) was also identified via aerial photographic analysis, with a series of cropmarks outlining parallel linear features of a large sub-rectangular enclosure subdivided internally. The southern settlement has not been subject to archaeological investigation.
- Further Iron Age activity has been noted as within the NHER as pottery sherds found during fieldwalking activity (**L11339**).

A11.1.3.2.4.2 Romano-British (AD43-410) (Figure A11.1.3d)

- The start of the Roman occupation in England is traditionally dated to the surrender of the tribes at Colchester during campaigns of the Roman army in AD 43 under the imperial command of Claudius.
- Whilst no Romano-British activity has been identified within the Order Limits itself, areas of Romano-British settlement have been identified via aerial imagery within the Study Area around the settlements of Kelham and Averham (M8317, M8320). These settlements have been identified through the form of cropmarks; however, no surface finds were located during site visits.
- Romano-British finds have been found elsewhere within Area 1 via fieldwalking activities, with surface level pottery sherds located within proximity to the identified cropmarks (L11145, L11341, L11858).

A11.1.3.2.4.3 Anglo-Saxon (AD410-1066) and Medieval (1066-1500) (Figure A11.1.4d)

There is a general paucity of Anglo-Saxon finds within the region, however, finds uncovered during archaeological evaluations within Kelham Hall Park and Garden, have provided evidence of a substantial settlement present at Kelham during the Anglo-Saxon period. This corroborates Domesday Survey evidence of a large settlement in the area by 1086. Archaeological evaluation uncovered a variety of Anglo-Saxon pottery, Torksey-type wares, largely dating to the 9th and 10th centuries. Furthermore, environmental samples have identified high numbers of mixed cereal grains and low quantities of wild species, evidence of cultivation during this period

(MNT27612 – 8). The lack of chaff and the nature of the pottery assemblage suggests the area was primarily domestic in character.

- Within the wider Study Area only one identified Anglo-Saxon findspot was located to the east of the Order Limits in the north of Area 1. The findspot consists of a collection of Anglo-Saxon pottery sherds, mixed within a collection of later medieval pottery sherds (**L11859**).
- During the medieval period, Area 1 lay within the manor of Kelham. The manor had a total of 43 households, consisting of 5 villagers, 26 freemen and 12 smallholders, making it one of the larger settlements in the area. The manor was significant in terms of landholding, with 17.9 taxable plough teams¹³, meadows and woodlands. Given the manor's size, the extent of land under cultivation, and the Order Limits within Area 1's proximity to the village centre, it would have been part of the agricultural land utilised during the medieval period.
- Within Kelham, the Church of St Wilfrid, is the only recorded evidence from the medieval period with elements of the existing building such as within the nave, tower, clerestory and west tower (**NHLE 1302213/L3146**) dated to the 14th century.
- Medieval finds within Area 1 are largely defined by surface-level pottery located across the south of the Area. On of these pottery finds was within the Order Limits in the south (**L8319**). These are likely to be objects defined as casual loss during agricultural activities such as ploughing.

A11.1.3.2.4.4 Post-medieval (AD 1500-1800)- 19th century (AD 1800-1900) (Figure A11.1.5d/A11.1.6d)

- Evidence would suggest that there was a continuation of occupation and land use from the medieval through to the post medieval period. Within Area 1, the known centre of medieval settlement, Kelham, contains a number of residential buildings and features that are known to be post-medieval in date. Grove Cottage (M14639), 4 & 6 Blacksmith Lane (M13795), The Old Post Office (M16958) are all examples of residential properties built post-1500.
- There are a number of records relating to Kelham Hall, situated in the southeast of Area 1, 420 m from the Order Limits (M17816). Kelham Hall belonged to the Sutton family in the early post-medieval period, with documentary evidence suggesting a hall was situated in this location from 1674. This original hall was rebuilt in the Georgian style in 1730 (L9748), and alterations were made to the rebuilt hall during the early 19th century including a Jacobean style servants wing and an ornamental roof, however in 1857 the house was destroyed by fire. Following the fire, George Gilbert Scott began work on rebuilding the hall however, due to a lack of funds the work was never fully completed (M13970). Following the rebuilding of the hall, William Andrews Nesfield was commissioned in 1860 to design the surrounding landscape, some features present within his designs were constructed however, the majority were never actualised within the park.

¹³ When Domesday refers to number of ploughs it is referring to the taxable amount of land that can be ploughed by a team of eight oxen. Modern day estimates place a ploughland at approximately 120 acres, though this can vary depending on soil conditions and other factors. By using this number as a guide, Kelham had 2148 acres of taxable arable land.



Within the Order Limits there is evidence of post-medieval gunflints within the east of the Order Limits within Area 1, potentially related to Civil War activity within the wider landscape (**L11115**). Further north, evidence of a post-medieval brickyard plantation is present within the Order Limits (**M3158**, **L3158**). The presence of a former brickyard on the site can be evidenced by the presence of a small wood which grows up on the site of old clay holes, created through the brickmaking process¹⁴.

A11.1.3.2.4.5 Undated (Figure A11.1.7d)

- There is a large number of undated features recorded within the NHER Data, this is due in part to the high level of aerial imagery analysis that has been undertaken throughout the landscape, and also in part due to the extensive investigations that have occurred within the bounds of Kelham Park and Gardens. Investigations within Kelham Park and Gardens have identified a high number of undated pits, postholes, and ditches within the area. The provenance and nature of these features have yet to be confirmed and as such it is not known how this relates to the existing archaeological record.
- Within the Order Limits, aerial imagery analysis, have identified a number of cropmarks, indicating a number of potential archaeological features including sub-rectangular and square enclosures (L8327, L9741), boundaries (L8319), and ditches (L8312). As these have not been subject to intrusive archaeological investigation the provenance and nature of these features have not yet been confirmed. These will be investigated as part of the further evaluation, which forms the first stage of the TA A11.8 Archaeological Mitigation Strategy (AMS) [EN010162/APP/6.4.11.8] which will be secured as a Requirement in the DCO.

A11.1.3.3 AREA 2

A11.1.3.3.1 Introduction

- Area 2 is located in the south of the Study Area. The land within the Order Limits is agricultural in character, with the settlement of Averham to the east of the Site. The River Trent traverses the north-east corner of Area 2 flowing from south to north, which is reflected in the topography of the area which is characterised as lying within the river valley at approximately 13 14 m aOD across the Area.
- The underlying bedrock of Area 2 consists of the following Mercia Mudstone Groups: Mudstone, and Siltstone & Dolomitic, as well as Gunthorpe Member: Mudstone. There are superficial deposits across the whole of the Area consisting of Alluvium Clay, Silt, Sand and Gravel, and Holme Pierrepont Sand and Gravels (British Geological Survey).

A11.1.3.3.2 Designated Heritage Assets

A11.1.3.3.2.1 Order Limits

There are no Designated Archaeological Assets within the Order Limits in Area 2.

A11.1.3.3.2.2 Study Area

- The are seven Designated Heritage Assets within the Study Area of Area 2, including one Scheduled Monument, one Grade I Listed Building, and five Grade II Listed Buildings.
- The Scheduled Monument within the Study Area of Area 2 is the Averham Moat and Enclosure (NHLE 1017687) which is located approximately 370 m north-east of the Order Limits and includes the moated site of Averham manor and the adjacent enclosure which extends to the south-east.
- The Designated Heritage Assets of Area 2 are illustrated in **Figure** A11.1.2d.

A11.1.3.3.3 Previous Studies

A11.1.3.3.3.1 Order Limits

The only event recorded on the NHER inside the Order Limits, within Area 2, is a watching brief which took place within the bounds of the Staythorpe Electrical Substation (ENT4079). There was limited archaeological evidence identified during these works, and any results are discussed below within the archaeological and historical context. More recently evaluation has taken place on the proposed Staythorpe BESS site which recorded some Neolithic remains.

A11.1.3.3.3.2 Study Area

There have been a number of archaeological events within the Study Area, within Area 2. These events have been largely focussed on the east of the Study Area around the settlement of Averham, including a series of trial trenching, watching briefs, and geophysical surveys. Further investigations



- have also taken place within the bounds of the Staythorpe Electrical Substation, including instances of geophysical surveying and fieldwalking.
- Where relevant, the results of these investigations are discussed in further detail below in the archaeological and historical context.
- 67 Previous archaeological investigations carried out within the Study Area are illustrated in **Figure A11.1.8d**.

A11.1.3.3.4 Archaeological and Historical Context

A11.1.3.3.4.1 Prehistoric (970,000 BC- 43AD) Figure A11.1.3d

- The location of Area 2 within the riverine environment of the River Trent would have been attractive to early prehistoric hunter-gatherer societies who favoured river valley environments.
- There have been a limited number of Palaeolithic finds identified within Area 2, those finds include a findspot of Palaeolithic flints (**L12050**) located approximately 335 m east of the Order Limits. Within the south of the Order Limits, in Area 2, a variety of zooarchaeological finds discovered within peat and sand deposits have been dated to the early prehistoric (**L11266**). A small palaeolithic flint find was identified within the same deposits as the zooarchaeological finds (**L11267**).
- A number of Mesolithic finds have been identified outside of the Order Limits in Area 2, to the south of the Order Limits within the vicinity of a paleochannel including a human femur, timbers, and animal bones (L12287). The animal bones, thought to be from a Roe Deer, are noted as having typical skinning marks on them.
- A limited level of Neolithic finds have been identified in the east of Area 2, outside of the Order Limits, including two isolated flint finds (L5687, L3108) and a one sherd of pottery (L12132). Similar levels of isolated finds have been identified from the Bronze Age along the western banks of the River Trent largely typified as flint finds (L3003), zooarchaeological finds (L12288), and a bronze sword (L3112).
- The later prehistoric periods (Bronze Age & Iron Age) are traditionally seen as the time of technological change, with the transition away from hunter-gathering to establishing farming and settled communities. A possible Iron Age settlement has been identified approximately 500 m to the west of the Order Limits in Area 2, via Aerial Imagery a small complex of linear features, and several circular or subcircular features have been identified indicating potential hut circles typical of Iron Age settlements (M3057).

A11.1.3.3.4.2 Romano-British (AD43-410) (Figure A11.1.3d)

As mentioned previously, there is evidence of a small Romano-British settlement present within Kelham, to the north of Area 2. Whilst no further settlement activity has been identified within the Study Area, a series of scattered finds of Romano-British pottery (L3456, L11268, L12134, L11722, L8807, L11268) have been identified to the south of the possible settlement, indicating that the landscape within Area 2 was likely traversed regularly during the period and possibly formed part of the agricultural hinterland of the settlement.



No further Romano-British finds have been identified throughout the Order Limits or Study Area within Area 2.

A11.1.3.3.4.3 Anglo-Saxon (AD 410-1066)- Medieval (AD 1066-1500) Figure A11.1.4d

- There are no recorded finds or features dating to the Anglo-Saxon period within Area 2, however, two settlements are recorded in the 1086 Domesday Survey, indicating established settlement activity within the Anglo-Saxon period.
- During the medieval period, Area 2 lay within the manors of both Averham and Staythorpe. The manor of Averham, situated to the east of the Order Limits, had a total of 57 households, consisting of 21 villagers, 13 freemen, 22 smallholders, and 1 priest, making it one of the larger settlements in the area. The manor had a significant number of landholdings, with 20 taxable plough teams¹⁵, meadows and woodlands.
- The manor of Staythorpe, situated to the south-west of the Order Limits, had a total of 16 households, consisting of 12 villagers and 4 smallholders. Due to the smaller size of the settlement, the number of landholdings held by the manor were significantly less than Averham, with only 7.5 taxable plough teams, and 600 acres of meadow.
- Given the manor's size, the extent of land under cultivation, and the Order Limit's proximity to the village centre, it is likely that the majority of the Order Limits would have formed part of Averham's landholdings during this period, with possibly a smaller section in the south-west of the Order Limits forming part of Staythorpe. However, it is expected in both manors that the Order Limits would have been part of the agricultural land utilised during the medieval period.
- There is no recorded evidence of the medieval period within the settlement of Staythorpe. However, in Averham, the Church of St Michael (NHLE 1046008/ L3157) has evidence of its construction in the 14th and 15th centuries, as well as documentary sources indicating its previous Anglo-Saxon origins. Elsewhere in Averham, there is extensive earthwork evidence indicating the presence of a moated site possibly the Manor of Averham, these earthworks include the foundations of the possible manor and fragments of tile (M3010).
- Medieval finds across Area 2 are largely defined by surface level flint scatters located predominantly within the vicinity of Averham in the east of the Area. Limited recorded evidence of Medieval pottery finds were within the Order Limits, within the south (L11269). These are likely to be objects defined as casual loss during agricultural activities such as ploughing.

¹⁵ When Domesday refers to number of ploughs it is referring to the taxable amount of land that can be ploughed by a team of eight oxen. Modern day estimates place a ploughland at approximately 120 acres, though this can vary depending on soil conditions and other factors. By using this number as a guide, Averham had 2400 acres of taxable arable land, Staythorpe had 900 acres of taxable arable land



A11.1.3.3.4.4 Post-medieval (AD 1500-1800) – 19th century (AD 1800-1900) (Figure A11.1.5d/A11.1.6d)

- Evidence would suggest that there was a continuation of occupation and land use from the medieval through to the post-medieval period. Within Area 2 the known centres of medieval settlement, Averham and Staythorpe, contain a number of residential buildings and features that are known to be post-medieval in date. Manor Farmhouse (M14334) and Staythorpe House Farmhouse (M17126) in Staythorpe, and Yew Tree Cottage (NHLE 1046005/M9192) and The Old Forge (M15055) in Averham are all examples of residential properties built post-1500.
- Outside of residential and agricultural features there is limited evidence of any other post-medieval activity throughout Area 2, aside from the possible site of a Civil War Redoubt, on the eastern banks of the River Trent approximately 500 m from the Order Limits(M5672). A redoubt was a typical Civil War fort, consisting of an enclosed defensive emplacement outside a larger fort. These structures usually relied on earthworks rather than stone or brick. There are no surface-level remains of the Redoubt within the noted location however there is still potential for below-ground features to be present.
- The position of the finds throughout the landscape, largely to the east of the Order Limits indicates that this area continued to form part of the agricultural landscape of Averham and to a lesser extent Staythorpe throughout this period.

A11.1.3.3.4.5 Modern (AD1900-present day) (Figure A11.1.6D)

During the Second World War (WWII) there is a recorded aircraft crash within the Study Area, close to the Staythorpe Power Station in the south of the Study Area. Whilst the location assigned by the NHER falls outside of the Order Limits it is possible the actual location of the crash fell within them.

A11.1.3.3.4.6 Undated (Figure A11.1.7d)

There are a large number of undated features recorded within the NHER Data, this is due in part to the high level of aerial imagery analysis that has been undertaken throughout the landscape. Within the boundary of the Order Limits itself several undated features of possible archaeological origin have been identified via aerial imagery. Within the south of the Order Limits, a possible section of an enclosure with internal features (L5688), and in the north a heavily pitted area with a possible sub-rectangular enclosure and series of irregular linear features (L2999). There are also several enclosures and linear features across the north of the Order Limits as noted by the National Mapping Programme (L9706, L9707, L9708). As these have not been subject to intrusive archaeological investigation the provenance and nature of these features have not yet been confirmed.



A11.1.3.4 AREA 3

A11.1.3.4.1 Introduction

- Area 3 is located in the south-west of the Study Area. The land within which the Order Limits lies is agricultural in character, with the village of Knapthorpe in the north of the Area. This Area lies to the west of the River Trent, with gently undulating hills across the area, rising to approximately 75 m aOD across the centre of the Area, and falling to approximately 28 26 m aOD in the northern and southern extents of the Study Area.
- The underlying bedrock of Area 3 consists of the following Mercia Mudstone Groups: Mudstone, and Siltstone & Dolomitic. There are small areas of superficial deposits in the north and south-east of the Area consisting of Alluvium Clay, Silt, Sand and Gravel (British Geological Survey).

A11.1.3.4.2 Designated Heritage Assets

A11.1.3.4.2.1 Order Limits

88 There are no Designated Heritage Assets within the Order Limits, in Area 3.

A11.1.3.4.2.2 Study Area

- The Designated Heritage Assets within Area 3 include one Grade I Listed Building, two Grade II* Listed Buildings, 14 Grade II Listed Buildings, and two Scheduled Monuments.
- The Scheduled Monuments are the Earlshaw Hall moat Scheduled Monument (NHLE 1008628), which includes a roughly square island, situated approximately 400 m north of the Order Limits, and the Moated site, fishponds, and decoy pond 490 m northwest of Park Spring Farm Scheduled Monument (NHLE 1018120), situated approximately 400 m south-west of the Order Limits.
- 91 All Designated Archaeological Assets are illustrated in Figure A11.1.2c/d.

A11.1.3.4.3 Previous Studies

A11.1.3.4.3.1 Order Limits

- 92 Magnitude Surveys undertook a series of geophysical surveys across the majority of the Order Limits within Area 3 in 2022¹⁶.
- York Archaeology undertook the Phase 2 programme of archaeological evaluation (trial trenching), across the Order Limits of Area 3 in 2025. A total of 49 trenches were identified as containing archaeological features consisting of linear ditches with the occasional curvilinear and pit. These were dated from the Roman to the Modern period¹⁷, with large quantities of Roman pottery uncovered within a number of these features.
- The NHER only records one investigation within the Order Limits in Area 3, a fieldwalking survey, in the east of the Order Limits (**ENT3755**). A variety of

above surface finds were located during this survey, which have been mentioned in the below section Archaeological and Historical context.

A11.1.3.4.3.2 Study Area

- There are no recorded intrusive archaeological investigations undertaken within the Study Area of Area 3.
- Previous archaeological investigations carried out within the Study Area are illustrated in **Figure A11.1.8c/d**.

A11.1.3.4.4 Archaeological and Historical Background

A11.1.3.4.4.1 Prehistoric (970,000 BC- 43AD) (Figure A11.1.3c/d)

- There are no recorded finds or features from the Palaeolithic or Mesolithic within Area 3. The earliest recorded find dates to the Neolithic period, situated in the east of the Order Limits within Area 3, a findspot of worked flint was identified during field walking (ENT3755).
- There are no further Prehistoric finds or features present within Area 3, this is possibly due to both a lack of intrusive archaeological investigations undertaken within the Area and that unlike Area's 1 and 2, Area 3 is situated further to the west of the riverine environment of the River Trent.

A11.1.3.4.4.2 Romano-British (AD43-410AD)

There are no recorded Romano-British finds or features present within Area 3.

A11.1.3.4.4.3 Saxon (410-1066AD) and Medieval (1066-1500AD) (Figure A11.1.4c/d)

- There are no recorded finds or features dating to the Anglo-Saxon period within Area 3, however, two settlements are recorded in the 1086 Domesday Survey, indicating established settlement activity within the Anglo-Saxon period.
- During the medieval period, Area 3 lay within the manors of both Hockerton and Knapthorpe. The manor of Hockerton, situated to the south-west of the Order Limits, had a total of 27 households, consisting of 17 villagers, and 10 smallholders, whilst the settlement is one of the larger settlements recorded within the Domesday it is still relatively small in comparison to the nearby settlements of Kelham and Averham. The manor had a relatively small number of landholdings given its size, with 11 taxable plough teams, 54 acres of meadows and woodlands.
- The manor of Knapthorpe (**M3105**), situated to the south-west of the Order Limits, had a total of 12 households, consisting of 5 villagers and 4 smallholders. The manor held a small number of landholdings with only 5.7 taxable plough teams¹⁸, 6 acres of meadow, and woodland.

¹⁸ When Domesday refers to number of ploughs it is referring to the taxable amount of land that can be ploughed by a team of eight oxen. Modern day estimates place a ploughland at approximately 120 acres, though this can vary depending on soil conditions and other factors. By using this number as a guide, Hockerton had 1320 acres of taxable arable land, and Knapthorpe had 684 acres of taxable arable land

- Given the relatively small extent of land under cultivation, given the Order Limit's proximity to the respective village's centres, most of the Order Limits would likely have formed part of Hockerton and Knapthorpe. It is expected that the Order Limits would have been part of the agricultural land utilised during the medieval period.
- The NHER data within Area 3 reflects the settlement pattern established in the Domesday records, with the majority of the finds located in and around the settlements of Hockerton and Knapthorpe. Including the Church of St Nicholas in Hockerton, which has elements dating back to the 12th century (NHLE 1045486/ M3142). There is also earthwork evidence of medieval village buildings to the south-east of Hockerton as well as medieval pottery finds indicating that the village extended further during the medieval period (M3072).
- There is further evidence of medieval activity within Area 3, with the Earlshaw Hall Moat lying approximately 420 m north of the Order Limits (NHLE 1008628/M2956/L2956). This type of site was common across medieval England, they traditionally served as prestigious aristocratic and seigneurial residences with the moat typically a show of status as opposed to a defensive military feature. The moat at Earlshaw Hall has been well-preserved with surviving earthworks, the entire site is approximately 100 ft square, with a 25 ft wide and 4 ft deep moat. The site was abandoned so the building remains are likely to still be present within the central island. To the south and southwest of the moated site, a wide range of pottery sherds were identified, within agricultural fields with well-preserved ridge and furrow, possibly related to activity at Earlshaw Hall.

A11.1.3.4.4.4 Post-medieval (AD 1500-1800) and 19th century (1800-1900) (Figure A11.1.5c/d- 6c/d)

- Evidence would suggest that there was a continuation of occupation and land use from the medieval through to the post-medieval period. Within Area 3 the most prominent landscape feature of the period was the Averham Park estate (MNT26653), situated in the south-east of Area 3; the extent of the park encompassed a significant part of the Order Limits within the area. The park appears on Chapman's 1774 Map of Nottinghamshire and appears to have been built alongside Averham Park House (M9191) in the early 18th century. Whilst the park had been largely removed by the 1830s, there remains earthwork evidence within the former boundary of the estate (L3205). These earthworks can be seen via LiDAR Analysis and appear to be present adjacent to the Order Limits and not within them.
- 107 Whilst the surrounding landscape has been altered significantly since the post-medieval period, Grade II* Listed Building Averham Park House (**NHLE 1046003**), a hunting lodge built by the second Lord Lexington in 1718 is still situated within Area 3 approximately 230 m east of the Order Limits. The house was built in the 'Coleshill' type, with two detached, flat-roofed wings.
- A further designed landscape park from the period extends into the north-western corner of Area 3, approximately 65 m west of the Order Limits (MNT26694). Winkburn Park, is noted on both Chapman's 1774 Map and Sanderson's 1835 Map '20 miles around Mansfield'. The associated Hall lies outside of the Study Area boundary, and was built around 1700, however,



- documentary sources indicate the park was formed during the period in which the village of Winkburn was enclosed between 1735 and 1766.
- There were also several isolated farmsteads throughout the Study Area during the period (M17707, M17705, M17703), this was common within rural landscapes at the time due to the enclosure of the landscape. None of these farms were situated within the Order Limits, however, it is assumed that during the period the Order Limits formed the agricultural land associated with these farms.
- 110 As well as being agricultural in nature, the NHER records a small number of brick kilns present within the Study Area during this period (M3212, M3138). These sites would have formed part of the local cottage industries within the local area, serving the local communities and have survived in the form of earthworks.
- Alongside these post-medieval landscape features, field walking has identified a selection of post-medieval finds. These include a number of post-medieval pottery sherds located within the east of the Order Limits (**L11855**), and a coin hoard of early post-medieval date situated approximately 300 m north of the Order Limits (**L5635**).

A11.1.3.4.4.5 Undated (Figure A11.1.7c/d)

- There are a large number of undated features recorded within the NHER Data, this is due in part to the high level of aerial imagery analysis that has been undertaken throughout the landscape. Within the boundary of the Order Limits itself several undated features of possible archaeological origin have been identified via aerial imagery. The following currently undated archaeological features have been identified within the Order Limits within Area 3.
- Lying across the southern Order Limits, the cropmarks of a rectangular ditched enclosure have been identified (**L5634**). Whilst no finds have been recorded at the Order Limits, analysis of LiDAR imagery also indicates the existence of the enclosure.
- In the south-east of Area 3, close to the Order Limits, aerial imagery has located the cropmarks of a brick pit alongside a linear earthwork that crosses into the Order Limits (**L3209**). Once again, these features can be seen on LiDAR imagery.
- In the central region of the Order Limits, lies a j-shaped trench which runs along the parish boundary between the parishes of South Muskham and Averham. This ditch was noted on the 1919 OS Map, its purpose is not known, and its survival is unknown due to the establishment of a later field boundary over the noted location.



A11.1.3.5 AREA 4

A11.1.3.5.1 Introduction

- 116 Area 4 is located in the west of the Study Area. The land within which the Order Limits lies is agricultural in character, with the settlement of Eakring to the west of the Order Limits and the small settlement of Maplebeck. The landscape is characterised as an upland area of the River Trent Valley, with the land rising to approximately 95 m aOD in the south-west of the area and falling to approximately 31 m AOD in the north-east of the Area.
- The underlying bedrock of Area 4 consists of the following Mercia Mudstone Groups: Mudstone, and Siltstone & Dolomitic, as well as Tarporley Siltstone Formation: Siltstone, Mudstone, and Sandstone. There are superficial deposits across the north and west of the Area consisting of Alluvium Clay, Silt, Sand and Gravel (British Geological Survey).

A11.1.3.5.2 Designated Heritage Assets

A11.1.3.5.2.1 Order Limits

118 There are no Designated Heritage Assets within the Order Limits in Area 4.

A11.1.3.5.2.2 Study Area

- The Designated Heritage Assets within Area 4 include one Grade I Listed Building, one Grade II* Listed Building and 12 Grade II Listed Buildings.
- 120 All Designated Heritage Assets are illustrated in Figure A11.1.2a/c.

A11.1.3.5.3 Previous Studies

A11.1.3.5.3.1 Order Limits

- The NHER has no records of intrusive archaeological events occurring within the Order Limits in Area 4.
- However, in 2022 AOC and Magnitude undertook areas of geophysical surveying across the south-east and central regions of the Order Limits within Area 4 (see TA A11.4 [EN010162/APP/6.4.11.4]).
- 123 In 2024 York Archaeology undertook the Phase 1 archaeological evaluation (trial trenching), across areas within the east of Area 4. Archaeological features, from across 39 trenches, ranged in date from the Iron Age to post-medieval periods. These features comprised pits, gullies, and enclosure ditches broadly dating to the later prehistoric and Romano-British periods. Later ridge and furrow field systems, as well as evidence of old field boundaries, were also recorded within a large number of excavated trenches 19.

A11.1.3.5.3.2 Study Area

- There have been no intrusive archaeological investigations within the Study Area of Area 4.
- 125 Previous archaeological investigations carried out within the Study Area are illustrated in **Figure A11.1.8a/c**.

A11.1.3.5.4 Archaeological and Historical Background

A11.1.3.5.4.1 Prehistoric (970,000 BC- 43AD) (Figure A11.1.3a/c)

There is only one recorded Prehistoric find within Area 4, a Palaeolithic chert scraper (**L4110**) located approximately c. 710 m north of the Order Limits, was identified in 1960 during an archaeological investigation. No further finds were found within proximity to the scraper.

A11.1.3.5.4.2 Romano-British (AD 43-410) (Figure A11.1.3a/c)

Situated approximately 885 m south of the Order Limits, on the periphery of the settlement of Winkburn, a series of cropmarks have been identified. The cropmarks consist of two double ditched enclosures, a ring ditch and two straight double ditches (**L5633**). Whilst investigating these cropmarks, a number of surface level finds were encountered of Romano-British pottery sherds (**L8797**). Whilst the cropmarks have not been subjected to intrusive archaeological investigation, it is possible that due to the presence of Romano-British finds within the area it is an indication of Romano-British activity within the landscape.

128 No further Romano-British finds or features have been located within Area 4.

A11.1.3.5.4.3 Saxon (AD410-1066)- Medieval (1066-1500) (Figure A11.1.4a/c)

- Despite a general paucity of Anglo-Saxon finds within the region, an Anglo-Saxon brooch was uncovered, within the central region of the Order Limits within the Maplebeck Estate (**L4210**). The find was uncovered during ploughing activities in the 1930s, and has since been destroyed, however, the description of the find matched that of a similar brooch located in the Vale of Belvoir (a region located to the south of Newark-on-Trent).
- Whilst no further Anglo-Saxon finds have been found within Area 4, three settlements are recorded in the 1086 Domesday Survey, indicating established settlement activity within the Anglo-Saxon period.
- During the medieval period, Area 4 lay within the manors of Maplebeck, Beesthorpe, and Eakring. The largest of the three, located to the west of the Order Limits, Eakring had a total of 19 households, consisting of 4 villagers, 9 freemen, 5 smallholders, and 1 priest. The manor's landholdings comprised 10.5 plough teams²⁰, 6 acres of meadow, and woodland.
- The manor of Maplebeck, located in the central region of Area 4, had a total of 17 households, consisting of 12 freemen, and 5 smallholders. The manor's landholdings comprised 10.5 plough teams, 30 acres of meadow, and woodland.
- The smallest of the Manors, Beesthorpe, is located to the east of Maplebeck, it had a total of 6.5 households, consisting of 6 freemen and 4 smallholders. The manor's landholdings are relative to its considerably smaller size, with only 4 plough teams, 0.5 acres of meadow, and 40 acres of woodland.

²⁰ When Domesday refers to number of ploughs it is referring to the taxable amount of land that can be ploughed by a team of eight oxen. Modern day estimates place a ploughland at approximately 120 acres, though this can vary depending on soil conditions and other factors. By using this number as a guide, Eakring and Maplebeck both had 1260 acres of taxable arable land, and Beesthorpe had 480 acres of taxable arable land.

- 134 The settlement at Beesthorpe, located approximately 350 m north of the Order Limits, is known as a Deserted Medieval Village (DMV) as it was depopulated in the 12th century (M4214), to establish a Cistercian grange, with an associated chapel for Rufford Abbey (M18123). Rufford Abbey, a Cistercian Monastery, was founded in 1147 by Gilbert De Gant approximately 3 km to the west of the Study Area, the Abbey owned land across the west of the Study Area as well as Beesthorpe itself. The grange was a typical development of Cistercian monasteries of the time, established as the central Manor for the surrounding agricultural land they were on occasion converted from tenanted manors which is thought to have occurred at Beesthorpe. The grange and chapel were passed to the Earl of Shrewsbury during the dissolution of the monasteries, the chapel was subsequently demolished whilst the grange was likely reinstated as a Manor House. In proximity to where the medieval chapel is thought to have been located, a series of medieval finds were located during the 18th century, including early medieval coins and human remains (L9973).
- Whilst the settlements of Maplebeck and Eakring were established by the early medieval period, the only surviving medieval evidence within the villages lies within their respective parish churches. The Grade I Listed Building the church of St Radegund (NHLE 1045596/M4240), at Maplebeck, is located approximately 150 m south of the Order Limits. Much of the church was restored in the 17th century, however, the following 14th century elements have been retained, the nave, north aisle, chancel, and the west tower and spire.
- approximately 412 m west of the Order Limits (NHLE 1370132/ M4133). The church went through several phases of construction with the earliest elements dating to the 12th and 13th centuries including the west tower and the inner tower arch (L4133). The chancel, four light window, and north and south lancets are of 13th century date (L9418). The remaining church structures including the tower are 14th century in date (L9419).
- Within the north of the Study Area, approximately 775 m north of the Order Limits, documentary sources indicate the location of a medieval deerpark, thought to be the park of the Earl of Winchester first mentioned in 1260 (M5728). The park was noted on Charles' Saxons map of Nottinghamshire 1610 however, it has since been converted to arable land.

A11.1.3.5.4.4 Post-medieval (AD 1500-1800)- 19th century (1800-1900) (Figure A11.1.5a/c – 6a/c)

Evidence would suggest that there was a continuation of occupation and land use from the medieval through to the post-medieval period. Within Area 4 the known centres of medieval settlement, Eakring and Maplebeck, a number of residential buildings and features that are known to be post-medieval in date many of which are now Listed Buildings. Cherry View (M14955), Row of 5 houses south-west of Eakring Windmill (NHLE 1370133/M14954), Old Church Farmhouse (M14947) in Eakring, and House adjacent to Toad Hall to the east (M14508), Maplebeck Farmhouse (NHLE 1370160/M9391), Low Farmhouse (NHLE 1370159/M9389), Red Hill House (M14507) are all examples of residential properties built post-1500.



- Elsewhere in the north-east of Area 4, lies Beesthorpe Hall which was built in the 17th century replacing the previous medieval grange, several features remain of the Beesthorpe estate including a lodge (M17696), and stables (M13791). Sanderson's 1835 map of Nottinghamshire also indicates the extent of the associated grounds, which included a pleasure ground and bowling green. The grounds are no longer present, as the park has been converted to arable land.
- There were also several isolated farmsteads throughout the south of the Study Area during the period (M17701, M17702, M17061), this was common within rural landscapes at the time due to the enclosure of the landscape. None of these farms were situated within the Order Limits, however, it is assumed that during the period the Order Limits formed the agricultural land associated with these farms.

A11.1.3.5.4.5 Modern (AD1900-present day) (Figure A11.1.6a/c)

The only Modern assets within Area 4, are a K6 Telephone Kiosk in Maplebeck (NHLE 1396379/M18804), and a War Memorial in Eakring (NHLE 1462821/M18748).

A11.1.3.5.4.6 Undated (Figure A11.1.7a/c)

There are a large number of undated features recorded within the NHER Data, this is due in part to the high level of aerial imagery analysis that has been undertaken throughout the landscape. Within the boundary of the Order Limits itself several undated features of possible archaeological origin have been identified via aerial imagery. The undated features within the boundary of the Order Limits, have been indicated as two enclosures (L5524, L10706) and to the south of Maplebeck a pond which was noted on historic mapping and has since been infilled (L3180). As these have not been subject to intrusive archaeological investigation the provenance and nature of these features have not yet been confirmed.

A11.1.3.6 AREA 5

A11.1.3.6.1 Introduction

- 143 Area 5 is located in the north-west of the Study Area. The land within the Order Limits is agricultural in character, with the settlement of Kneesall to the north-west of the Order Limits. The landscape is characterised as an upland area of the River Trent Valley, with the land rising to approximately 95 m AOD in the west of the Area and falling to approximately 31 m AOD in the south-east of the Area.
- The underlying bedrock of Area 5 consists of the following Mercia Mudstone Groups: Mudstone, and Siltstone & Dolomitic. There are pockets of superficial deposits across Area 5 consisting of Alluvium Clay, Silt, Sand and Gravel, Till Mid Pleistocene Diamicton, and Glaciofluvial Deposits Mid Pleistocene Sand and Gravel (British Geological Survey).

A11.1.3.6.2 Designated Heritage Assets

A11.1.3.6.2.1 Order Limits

145 There are no Designated Heritage Assets within the Order Limits, in Area 5.

A11.1.3.6.2.2 Study Area

- The Designated Heritage Assets within Area 5 include four Grade II Listed Buildings, and one Scheduled Monument.
- The Scheduled Monument Norwell Woodhouse moat and fishpond (NHLE 1009152) is situated approximately 700 m south-east of the Order Limits, it is a small farmstead moat with an attached fishpond.
- 148 All Designated Heritage Assets are illustrated in Figure A11.1.2a/b.

A11.1.3.6.3 Previous Studies

A11.1.3.6.3.1 Order Limits

- The NHER has no records of intrusive archaeological events occurring within the Order Limits in Area 5.
- However, in 2022 AOC and Magnitude undertook areas of geophysical surveying across the eastern and south-west regions of the Order Limits within Area 5²¹.
- In 2025 Magnitude also undertook further areas of geophysical surveying across the Order Limits within Area 5. The surveying identified potential Iron Age/Romano-British enclosure complexes, within the southern part of the Order Limits²².
- 152 York Archaeology undertook a programme of archaeological evaluation (trial trenching), within the north of Area 5 in 2025. A total of 50 trenches were excavated with 21 trenches containing archaeological features comprising of

ditches relating to previous field systems and occasional pits, dating from the post-medieval period onwards²³.

A11.1.3.6.3.2 Study Area

- The only recorded archaeological investigation within the Area 5 Study Area is a series of tree sampling for tree-ring analysis of timbers from Manor Farm, Kersall(**ENT4419**).
- Where relevant, the results of these investigations are discussed in further detail below in the archaeological and historical context.
- Previous archaeological investigations carried out within the Study Area are illustrated in **Figure A11.1.8a/b**.

A11.1.3.6.4 Archaeological and Historical Context

A11.1.3.6.4.1 Prehistoric (970,000 BC- AD 43) (Figure A11.1.3a/b)

The Prehistoric finds within Area 5 consist of a series of Neolithic flint finds within the south-eastern extent of the Order Limits (**L4180**, **L4213**, **L8598**). These finds were identified as casual find (not found via the means of archaeological investigation), and no further Neolithic or Prehistoric finds have been uncovered within the Area. However, this is perhaps more a reflection on the lack of intrusive archaeological investigation that has occurred within this landscape than a true reflection on the prehistoric archaeological potential of Area 5.

A11.1.3.6.4.2 Romano-British (AD 43-410) (Figure A11.1.3a/b)

- within close proximity to the identified Neolithic flints, and also categorised as casual finds by the NHER, a small amount of Romano-British pottery sherds were identified within the Order Limits (**L41841**).
- Outside of the Order Limits within Area 5, only one further Romano-British find was identified. Situated approximately 730 m east of the Order Limits, a number of pottery fragments were identified during a site visit (**L9588**).

A11.1.3.6.4.3 Anglo-Saxon (AD 410-1066) and Medieval (AD 1066-1500) (Figure A11.1.4a/b)

- There are no recorded finds or features dating to the Anglo-Saxon period within Area 5, however, one settlement was recorded in the 1086 Domesday Survey, indicating established settlement activity within the Anglo-Saxon period.
- During the medieval period, the manor of Kersall, was located in the southern region of Area 5, approximately 200 m west of the Order Limits. The manor had a total of 14 households, consisting of 16 villagers, 8 freemen, and 4 smallholders. In contrast to its relatively small size, the manor had a large number of landholdings including 22 acres of meadow, and woodland.
- 161 Given the extent of land under cultivation, and the Order Limit's proximity to the village's centre, it is likely that the majority of the Order Limits would have formed part of the landholdings of Kersall Manor. It is expected that the

Order Limits would have been part of the agricultural land utilised during the medieval period.

- Whilst no evidence of medieval Kersall is present within the NHER data, there is further evidence of medieval activity within Area 5, with the Scheduled Monument Moated site at Norwell Woodhouse lying approximately 860 m east of the Order Limits (NHLE1009152/M4183). This type of site was common across medieval England, they traditionally served as prestigious aristocratic and seigneurial residences with the moat typically a show of status as opposed to a defensive military feature. The only surviving remains of the Moat are the 3 sides and a small dry pond, with no evidence of the north-west arm present.
- A further moat to the east of the Scheduled Monument was also identified via earthworks and cartographic evidence (**M4184**). This feature has been filled in and ploughed over, the central island is noted to be narrow, and it is possible it was a moated garden.
- 164 No further medieval finds or features have been identified within Area 5.

A11.1.3.6.4.4 Post-medieval (AD 1500-1800) 19th century (AD 1800-1900) (Figure A11.1.5a/b – 6a/b)

- Evidence would suggest that there was a continuation of occupation and land use from the medieval through to the post-medieval period. Within Area 5 the known centre of medieval settlement, Kersall, a number of residential buildings and features that are known to be post-medieval in date, many of which are now Listed Buildings. Manor Farmhouse (M14684), two cottages adjacent to Manor Farm to the north (M14642), Kersall Chapel (L6600) are all examples of residential properties built post-1500.
- 166 Continuing on with the landscape patterns of areas to the south, there were several isolated farmsteads throughout the Study Area during the period (M17651, M17645, M17644, M17646), this was common within rural landscapes at the time due to the enclosure of the landscape. None of these farms were situated within the Order Limits, however, it is assumed that during the period the Order Limits formed the agricultural land associated with these farms.
- As well as being agricultural in nature, the NHER records a small number of brick kilns present within the Study Area during this period (M4231, M4232, M6598). These sites would have formed part of the local cottage industries within the local area, serving the local communities and have survived in the form of earthworks.

A11.1.3.6.4.5 Modern (AD 1900-present day) (Figure 11.1.6a/b)

In the north of the Order Limits within Area 5, lies the Second World War (WWII) RAF base, RAF Ossington (L10557). The airbase was constructed between 1941 and 1942 in the typical form of an A-shaped bomber airfield with three hard runways. Whilst activity at the airfield decreased following the end of WWII it was still in use until 1959, areas of hardstanding can still be seen within the landscape, however, much of the runways and above-ground structures were demolished or repurposed following the closure of the airfield.



To the south of the remaining airfield within the Order Limits lies the former Standard 11008/41 Battle Headquarters (L10566) of the former RAF Ossington, the remains of the building now lie within an arable field.

A11.1.3.6.4.6 Undated (Figure A11.1.7a/b)

- 170 There are a large number of undated features recorded within the NHER Data, this is due in part to the high level of aerial imagery analysis that has been undertaken throughout the landscape. Within the boundary of the Order Limits itself, several undated features of possible archaeological origin have been identified via aerial imagery. The following currently undated archaeological features have been identified within the Order Limits within Area 5.
- In the south-east of the Order Limits a group of faint cropmarks have been noted, these potentially indicate a previous field system and also some buildings (**L4248/L8640**). Analysis of LiDAR imagery has been unable to identify any above ground indications of these cropmarks.
- In the south-west of the Order Limits trackway has been identified (**L9933**) analysis of the LiDAR imagery indicates an above-ground presence of the trackway. The track is not present on historic mapping from the 19th and 20th centuries, indicating an earlier provenance, however, without further archaeological investigation the exact date is unknown.

A11.1.3.7 AREA 6

A11.1.3.7.1 Introduction

- 173 Area 6 is located in the north of the Study Area. The land within which the Order Limits lies is agricultural in character, with the settlement of Weston to the north-east of the Order Limits, and Ossington to the south. The landscape is characterised as an upland area of the River Trent Valley, with the land rising to approximately 59 m aOD in the south-west of the Area and falling to approximately 25 m AOD in the north and east of the Area.
- The underlying bedrock of Area 6 consists of the following Mercia Mudstone Groups: Mudstone, and Siltstone & Dolomitic. There are pockets of superficial deposits across Area 6 consisting of Alluvium Clay, Silt, Sand and Gravel, these largely align with the tributary streams of the River Trent which traverse the Area (British Geological Survey).

A11.1.3.7.2 Designated Heritage Assets

A11.1.3.7.2.1 Order Limits

175 There are no Designated Heritage Assets within the Order Limits, in Area 6.

A11.1.3.7.2.2 Study Area

- 176 The Designated Heritage Assets within Area 6 include three Grade I Listed Buildings, two Grade II* Listed Buildings, and 19 Grade II Listed Buildings, and two Scheduled Monuments.
- 177 The Scheduled Monument: moat, three fishponds, enclosures, hollow way and part of a road at Hall Yard (NHLE 1008247), situated approximately 60 m north of the Order Limits.
- 178 All Designated Archaeological Assets are illustrated in Figure A11.1.2b.

A11.1.3.7.3 Previous Studies

A11.1.3.7.3.1 Order Limits

- Wessex Archaeology undertook a phase of geophysical survey across various locations within the Order Limits, including within the north, east and south of Area 6²⁴. The surveying identified several archaeological features within the west of the Order Limits, these features detected are expected to be ditches of possible archaeological origin; one area of which could form a small, 'square-shaped enclosure', though their exact provenance is unknown subject to further intrusive investigation. In 2024 Magnitude Surveys undertook a second phase of geophysical surveying across the majority of the Order Limits²⁵.
- In 2024 York Archaeology undertook the Phase 1 archaeological evaluation (trial trenching), which included a small area within the south-east of Area 6.

- Archaeological features were identified from across 3 trenches. These features comprised a Romano-British ditch and 19th-20th century features²⁶.
- Also taking place within the north of the Order Limits, a trial trenching exercise was undertaken in 1952 by the Newark Archaeological Committee (ENT79/L4173). The investigation uncovered a group of Roman pottery sherds, with no other features or finds indicating Romano-British activity within the area.

A11.1.3.7.3.2 Study Area

- There have been two archaeological events undertaken within the Study Area, within Area 6. These events have both been watching briefs focussed on the north of the Study Area.
- Where relevant, the results of these investigations are discussed in further detail below in the archaeological and historical context.
- Previous archaeological investigations carried out within the Study Area are illustrated in **Figure A11.1.8b**.

A11.1.3.7.4 Archaeological and Historical Context

A11.1.3.7.4.1 Prehistoric (970,000- AD43) (Figure A11.1.3b)

- The earliest identified find from within Area 6 is a Palaeolithic flint blade, located centrally within the Order Limits, along the banks of Moorhouse Beck (**L4219**). No further Palaeolithic or Mesolithic finds have been identified within the Area.
- Elsewhere, outside of the Order Limits a scattering of Neolithic finds have been identified, including two stone axes (**L5727**, **L4171**) and a flint findspot (**L4221**). These finds appear to be isolated finds, located during the early 20th century, with no further information available within the NHER record.
- 187 No further Prehistoric finds or features were identified within Area 6.

A11.1.3.7.4.2 Romano-British (AD 43-410) (Figure A11.1.3b)

- There has been no recorded Romano-British settlement activity within Area 6, however a series of finds have been located scattered across the central region of the Area. Two of these finds were recorded within the Order Limits, one of which was mentioned in Section 4.7.7 which uncovered a group of Roman pottery sherds (**L4173**). The second, reports further fragments of Roman pottery found on the banks of Moorhouse Beck (**L8633**).
- 189 Elsewhere within the Area similar findspots of scattered Romano-British pottery have been recorded, uncovered during fieldwalking or agricultural activities.

A11.1.3.7.4.3 Anglo-Saxon (AD410-1066) and Medieval (AD 1066-1500) (Figure 11.1.4b)

There are no recorded finds or features dating to the Anglo-Saxon period within Area 6, however, two settlements were recorded in the 1086 Domesday Survey, indicating established settlement activity within the Anglo-Saxon period.

- During the medieval period, the manor of Ossington (**M4218**), was located in the southern region of Area 6 approximately 385 m south-east of the Order Limits. The manor had a total of 26 households, consisting of 16 villagers, 4 freemen, and 6 smallholders. The manor's landholdings included 12 plough teams²⁷, 28 acres of meadow, and woodland. Though documentary sources have previously indicated the village was a DMV no archaeological evidence was able to confirm this.
- The manor of Weston was located in the north-west region of Area 6. The manor had a total of 18 households, consisting of 14 villagers, 1 freeman and 3 smallholders. The manor's landholdings included 12 plough teams, 30 acres of meadow, woodland, and a mill (M6696).
- 193 Given the extent of land under cultivation, and the Order Limit's proximity to the village's centre, it is likely that some areas of the Order Limits would have formed part of both the Ossington and Weston Manors. It is expected that the Order Limits would have been part of the agricultural land utilised during the medieval period.
- 194 Elements of both settlements' medieval heritage can still be seen through a variety of features recorded within the NHER. Several 13th-century features are present within The Church of All Saints at Weston (NHLE 1179778/L4238), notably a cross situated within the churchyard (L5726). Elsewhere, within Weston a possible moated site, 6ft deep and wide, was noted through aerial photography (M4174) though its exact use is not confirmed it is possibly associated with the medieval manor at Weston.
- Documentary evidence indicates that during the medieval period, the settlement of Ossington was bestowed by Roger de Buron on the Lenton Priory of the Knights Hospitallers. In 1338 there was a manor house and garden, two dovecotes, and two windmills recorded at the site. The Church of the Holy Rood in Ossington was also granted to the Knights Hospitallers by Archbishop William in the 12th century, however, no physical presence of the medieval church remains (NHLE 1045958/M4245).

A11.1.3.7.4.4 Post-medieval (AD 1500-1800) and 19th century (AD1800-1900) (Figure A11.1.5b – 6b)

- Evidence would suggest that there was a continuation of occupation and land use from the medieval through to the post-medieval period. Within Area 6 the known centres of medieval settlement, Ossington and Weston, a number of residential buildings and features that are known to be post-medieval in date many of which are now Listed Buildings. Five residential properties along Main Street, Ossington (M14367, M14050, M14402, M14368), along with the Chapel (M6697) and smithy (M6698) in Weston are all examples of properties built post-1500.
- 197 In the south of the Area lies the Ossington Hall and Park, the hall was first built by Cartwrights in 1580, though it was replaced in 1729 with subsequent alterations throughout the 18th century (**M5990**). It was situated approximately 310 m west of the Order Limits and demolished in 1963. The

associated landscape park and garden was designed by Sir John Soane and James Gibbs during the rebuilding of the house in the 18th century and encompasses areas of the Order Limits within its boundary (MNT26679). The extent of the estate can be seen on both Chapman's 1774 Map of Nottinghamshire and Sanderson's 1835 Map of Nottinghamshire and Derbyshire (not reproduced).

A11.1.3.7.4.5 Modern (1900-present) (Figure A11.1.6b)

198 As mentioned previously, RAF Ossington was a Second World War Airfield situated to the west of Ossington village within Area 5. It did, however, extend into the west of Area 6 and the Order Limits before its abandonment, no remnants remain within the Area.

A11.1.3.8 AREA 7

A11.1.3.8.1 Introduction

- Area 7 is located in the north-east of the Study Area. The land within which the Order Limits lies is agricultural in character, including the settlement of Carlton-on-Trent to the north-east of the Order Limits. The landscape lies to the east of the River Trent situated within the lowlands of the river valley, the land rises to approximately 37 m aOD in the west of the Area and falling to approximately 8 m AOD in the east of the Area.
- The underlying bedrock of Area 7 consists of the following Mercia Mudstone Groups: Mudstone, and Siltstone & Dolomitic. There are superficial deposits across Area 7 consisting of Alluvium Clay, Silt, Sand and Gravel, and Holme Pierrepont Sand and Gravels, these deposits are concentrated in the east of the Area along the river bank (British Geological Survey).

A11.1.3.8.2 Designated Heritage Assets

A11.1.3.8.2.1 Order Limits

201 There are no Designated Heritage Assets within the Order Limits, in Area 7.

A11.1.3.8.2.2 Study Area

- The Designated Heritage Assets within Area 7 include two Grade II* Listed Buildings, 16 Grade II Listed Buildings, and two Scheduled Monuments.
- The Willoughby Deserted Medieval Village Scheduled Monument (NHLE 1013884), which includes a post-medieval moated manor, church, six fishponds, ridge and furrow, and hollow way, situated adjacent to the eastern boundary of the Order Limits. The other Scheduled Monument within Area 7 is a site discovered by aerial photography to the north-north-east of Carlton-on-Trent (NHLE 1003487), situated approximately 1 km east of the Order Limits. This monument has not been reviewed under the Monuments Protection Programme, and therefore has no available description.
- 204 All Designated Archaeological Assets are illustrated in Figure A11.1.2b.

A11.1.3.8.3 Previous Studies

A11.1.3.8.3.1 Order Limits

- 205 Wessex Archaeology undertook a phase of geophysical survey across various locations within the Order Limits, including across the majority of Area 7²⁸. The surveying identified several archaeological features within the Study Area though none were identified within the Order Limits.
- ²⁰⁶ In 2024 Magnitude Surveys undertook a second phase of geophysical surveying across the central and northern sections of the Order Limits²⁹.
- 207 York Archaeology undertook a programme of archaeological evaluation (trial trenching), within the eastern extent of the Order Limits in Area 7 in 2025. A

single trench (out of three excavated) contained archaeological features comprising part of an earlier ridge and furrow field system³⁰.

A11.1.3.8.3.2 Study Area

- There have been a limited number of archaeological events within the Study Area, within Area 7. These events have been completed to the south near Norwell and Cromwell and include excavations, watching briefs, and geophysical survey.
- where relevant, the results of these investigations are discussed in further detail below in the archaeological and historical context.
- 210 Previous archaeological investigations carried out within the Study Area are illustrated in **Figure A11.1.8b**.

A11.1.3.8.4 Archaeological and Historical Context

A11.1.3.8.4.1 Prehistoric (970,000 BC- Romano-British AD43) (Figure A11.1.3b)

- The earliest recorded find within Area 7 is a Neolithic stone axehead, uncovered within agricultural fields approximately 385 m south-east of the Order Limits (**L8615**). No further Neolithic finds or features were found within the Area.
- 212 Elsewhere within the Area, along the banks of the River Trent two further isolated Prehistoric finds have been located. A Bronze Age shield was uncovered from the river itself, during dredging activities in the early 20th century (**L4280**) along the north-eastern boundary of the Study Area. Along the south-eastern boundary of the Study Area, a possible Iron Age vessel was uncovered during gravel extraction (**L8817**).
- 213 No further Prehistoric finds or features were identified within Area 7.

A11.1.3.8.4.2 Romano-British (AD 43-410) (Figure A11.1.3b)

- Romano-British activity within Area 7 is concentrated along the banks of the River Trent, along the eastern extent of the Study Area. This activity is largely focused on a complex of crop and soil marks indicating a probable Roman villa, situated approximately 930 m east of the Order Limits (M4282). Trial trenching was undertaken at the site in 1949 which showed that the ditches within the site had been frequently recut and produced a range of Romano-British tiles and pottery (L7493/ENT27). Fieldwalking within the vicinity has revealed additional tiles and stone debris from the villa but no further pottery (L7494).
- Romano-British finds throughout the Study Area are characterised as surface-level finds encountered during field walking or agricultural activity. These finds include pottery sherds, tile fragments, and a loomweight (**L4199**, **L4313**, **L8618**).

A11.1.3.8.4.3 Saxon (AD 410- 1066)- Medieval (1066-1500) (Figure A11.1.4b)

- There are no recorded finds or features dating to the Anglo-Saxon period within Area 7, however, two settlements were recorded in the 1086 Domesday Survey, indicating established settlement activity within the Anglo-Saxon period.
- During the medieval period, the manor of Carlton-on-Trent, was located in the north-eastern region of Area 7 approximately 740 m north-east of the Order Limits. The manor had a total of 16 households, consisting of 3 villagers, 8 freemen, and 5 smallholders. The manor's landholdings included 8.7 plough teams³¹, 45 acres of meadow, and woodland.
- The manor of Willoughby was located in the central region of Area 7 located adjacent to the eastern boundary of the Order Limits. The manor had a total of 7 households, consisting of 3 villagers and 4 freemen. The manor's landholdings included 3.9 plough teams, and 34 acres of meadow.
- Given the extent of land under cultivation, and the Order Limit's proximity to the village centres, it is likely that some areas of the Order Limits would have formed part of both the Carlton-on-Trent and Willoughby Manors. It is expected that the Order Limits would have been part of the agricultural land utilised during the medieval period.
- The settlement at Willoughby is known as a Deserted Medieval Village (DMV) as by the end of the period it had been depopulated (**NHLE 1013884/M4189**). The remnants of the settlement are typical of DMVs with a waterfilled homestead moat, earthworks representing possible house platforms and areas of ridge and furrow (**MNT26876/7**).
- The only extant medieval remains within the settlement of Carlton-on-Trent is the doorway of St Mary's Church, situated approximately 690 m east of the Order Limits (NHLE 1046012/L9984).

A11.1.3.8.4.4 Post-medieval (AD1500-1800AD) and 19th century (AD1800-1900) (Figure 11.1.5b – 6b)

- Evidence would suggest that there was a continuation of occupation and land use from the medieval through to the post-medieval period. Within Area 7 the known centres of medieval settlement, Carlton-on-Trent, a number of residential buildings and features that are known to be post-medieval in date many of which are now Listed Buildings. The Grey House (NHLE 1045970/M9205), Park Farm House (NHLE 1045973/M9211), Westfield (M18592), and Holly Cottage (NHLE 1369978/M9210) are all examples of properties built post-1500.
- 223 Continuing on with the landscape patterns of Areas in the west of the Order Limits, there were several isolated farmsteads throughout the Study Area during the period (M17700, M17695, M9254), this was common within rural landscapes at the time due to the enclosure of the landscape. None of these farms were situated within the Order Limits boundary, however, it is

assumed that during the period the Order Limits formed the agricultural land associated with these farms.

Carlton Hall (NHLE 1046012/M9200) situated approximately 670 m east of the Order Limits, was constructed in 1765 with a small associated garden as indicated by Chapmans 1835 Map of Nottinghamshire and Derbyshire (not reproduced), however by 1885 a large park had been constructed as part of the house's estate (MNT26657). The garden extends into the east of the Order Limits, where the park is split by the Great Northern Railway line, as seen on the First Edition Ordnance Survey Mapping.

A11.1.3.8.4.5 Undated (Figure 11.1.7b)

- There are a large number of undated features recorded within the NHER Data, this is due in part to the high level of aerial imagery analysis that has been undertaken throughout the landscape. Within the boundary of the Order Limits, several undated features of possible archaeological origin have been identified via aerial imagery. The following currently undated archaeological features have been identified within the Order Limits boundary within Area 7.
- In the north of the Order Limits, lies a small ditch (**L9956** visible faintly via LiDAR Analysis, which is likely related to previous agricultural activities. Situated approximately 740 m south-west of the ditch, a sub-rectangular raised platform was also noted (**L7846**).
- To the south-east of the Site a series of cropmark features have been identified, including a possible enclosure and ring-ditch (**L9963**), a pit alignment (**L4190**) and two parallel lines with a third intersecting at a right angle (**L9962**). Analysis of LiDAR imagery has been unable to identify any above-ground indications of these cropmarks.

A11.1.3.9 AREA 8

A11.1.3.9.1 Introduction

- Area 8 is located in the east of the Study Area. The land within which the Order Limits lies is agricultural in character, with the settlements of Cromwell to the north-east and Norwell to the north-west of the Order Limits. The landscape lies on the eastern banks of the River Trent with the River traversing the east of the Study Area on a north-south alignment, the land rises to approximately 31 m aOD in the west of the Area and falling to approximately 9 m aOD in the east of the Area.
- The underlying bedrock of Area 8 consists of the following Mercia Mudstone Groups: Mudstone, and Siltstone & Dolomitic. Superficial deposits across Area 8 consist of Alluvium Clay, Silt, Sand and Gravel, and Holme Pierrepont Sand and Gravels (British Geological Survey).

A11.1.3.9.2 Designated Heritage Assets

A11.1.3.9.2.1 Order Limits

There are no Designated Heritage Assets within the Order Limits boundary, in Area 8.

A11.1.3.9.2.2 Study Area

- The Designated Heritage Assets within Area 8 include two Grade I Listed Buildings, 19 Grade II Listed Buildings, and three Scheduled Monuments.
- The Designated Archaeological Assets within Area 8 are the Scheduled Monument of a Settlement 3/4m west of Cromwell Village (NHLE 1003490), this monument is enclosed by the Order Limits boundary on all sides, however, it does not lie within the Order Limits. The other Scheduled Monuments within Area 8 include rectangular barrows at North Muskham (NHLE 1003492), situated approximately 455 m east of the Order Limits, and Old Hall Moat and two fishponds (NHLE 1009153), situated approximately 760 m west of the Order Limits.
- 233 All Designated Archaeological Assets are illustrated in Figure A11.1.2b/d.

A11.1.3.9.3 Previous Studies

A11.1.3.9.3.1 Order Limits

- Wessex Archaeology undertook a phase of geophysical survey across various locations within the Order Limits, including across the majority of Area 8. The surveying identified several archaeological features within the Order Limits, including areas of Bronze Age activity within the east of the Order Limits, which include a barrow, potential hut circles and enclosures.
- ²³⁵ In 2022 AOC and Magnitude undertook areas of geophysical surveying across the south-east and central regions of the Order Limits within Area 8³².
- 236 In 2024 York Archaeology undertook the Phase 1 archaeological evaluation (trial trenching), which included areas across the central extent of the Order

Limits within Area 8. Archaeological features were identified from across 36 of the 52 trenches excavated. These features comprised undated ditches and pits, ridge and furrow field systems; and former field boundaries visible on 1900's OS mapping³³.

- York Archaeology undertook the Phase 2 archaeological evaluation (trial trenching), which included an area in the south-east of the Order Limits in Area 8. A total of 10 trenches contained archaeological features, which can be loosely characterised as ditches and pits. One pit contained evidence for early prehistoric pottery, preliminarily dated between the Late Neolithic and Early Bronze Age.
- The NHER also records three previous investigations within the Order Limits boundary within the Area, with an excavation being undertaken on a possible Barrow along the eastern boundary of the Order Limits (ENT26). Elsewhere in the south of the Site at Foxholes Farm, a geophysical survey (ENT3904) and series of trial trenching was undertaken (ENT3865). These trenches were intended to target cropmarks identified on aerial photography as anomalies of potential archaeological interest, the findings of which have been discussed below in the Archaeological and historical context.

A11.1.3.9.3.2 Study Area

- There have been a number of archaeological events within the Study Area, within Area 8. These events have been largely focussed around the settlements of Norwell and Cromwell, including watching briefs, and timber sampling.
- ²⁴⁰ Previous archaeological investigations carried out within the Study Area are illustrated in **Figure A11.1.8b/d**.

A11.1.3.9.4 Archaeological and Historical Context

A11.1.3.9.4.1 Prehistoric (970,000- AD 43) (Figure A.11.1.3b/d)

- The earliest recorded find within Area 8 is a Mesolithic flint findspot, uncovered within agricultural fields in the south of the Order Limits (**L12100**). No further Mesolithic finds or features were found within the Area.
- In the east of the Order Limits, lies an area of Neolithic and Bronze Age activity, around a possible mortuary enclosure (**M8624**) and Bronze Age barrow (**M8623**). The enclosure has been identified through aerial photography, with the barrow being subject to excavation in the 1950s when it was still visible above ground. The remains of a probable clay-lined burial pit were found centrally, alongside a series of finds including beaker sherds, Bronze Age pottery sherds and the rim of a food vessel.
- Several isolated Bronze Age finds have been identified in the south of the Order Limits (**L8609**, **L2967**) and an artefact scatter of Neolithic and Bronze Age flint flakes has also been identified in the northern boundary of the Area, on an area of elevated height (**L4217**).
- Iron Age finds in the Area are primarily focused along the banks of the River Trent, which traverses the east of the Study Area aligned north to south. A possible Iron Age barrow cemetery has been sighted via aerial photography

approximately 400 m east of the Order Limits (**M4287**). A series of small rectangular enclosures were seen, typical of an Iron Age form of barrow which was primarily found in East Yorkshire and Humberside and rare in this region. The only other identified Iron Age find within the Area was a scabbard, located approximately 330 m east of the Order Limits (**L5843**).

A11.1.3.9.4.2 Romano-British (AD 43- 410) (Figure A11.1.3b/d)

- ²⁴⁵ As mentioned above in Previous Studies, a series of trial trenching was undertaken within the west of the Order Limits in Area 8 around Fox Holes Farm (ENT3865). Within one of the trench's a number of small slots and irregular pits were bounded by three adjacent parallel gullies, with animal bone recovered from each gully which have all been dated to the Romano-British period.
- Whilst no further finds or features have been found within the Order Limits boundary, a possible Roman Villa has been noted in the form of cropmarks, adjacent to the north-east of the Order Limits boundary (**M4195**). The cropmarks comprised complex rectangles and long linear features, which could also indicate very regular farming enclosures.
- Four further Romano-British findspots can be seen scattered throughout the Area, characterised as isolated surface finds of Roman pottery sherds (L8604, L4204, L4312, L7492).

A11.1.3.9.4.3 Saxon (AD410-1066)- Medieval (AD 1066-1500) (Figure A11.1.4b/d)

- Despite a general paucity of Anglo-Saxon finds within the region, remnants of an Anglo-Saxon bridge were located approximately 930 m east of the Order Limits (**L4286**). The remains of the bridge were removed from the River Trent in the early 19th century at the time the bridge was believed to be of Roman date, however, dendrochronological analysis of the surviving timber fragment revealed the date of felling to the mid-8th century, making it the only Saxon bridge known from this period in the country.
- Whilst no further Anglo-Saxon finds have been found within Area 8, two settlements are recorded in the 1086 Domesday Survey, indicating established settlement activity within the Anglo-Saxon period.
- During the medieval period, the manor of Cromwell, was located adjacent to the north-eastern extent of the Order Limits in Area 8. The manor had a total of 17 households, consisting of 8 villagers, 7 freemen, and 2 smallholders. The manor's landholdings included 11 plough teams³⁴, meadow and woodland.
- The manor of Norwell was located in the north-western region of Area 8, approximately 900 m west of the Order Limits. The manor had a total of 26 households, consisting of 22 villagers, 3 smallholders and a priest. The manor's landholdings included 15 plough teams and 73 acres of meadow, and woodland.

³⁴ When Domesday refers to number of ploughs it is referring to the taxable amount of land that can be ploughed by a team of eight oxen. Modern day estimates place a ploughland at approximately 120 acres, though this can vary depending on soil conditions and other factors. - 252 Given the extent of land under cultivation, and the Order Limits' proximity to the village centres, it is likely that some if not all areas of the Order Limits would have formed part of both the Cromwell and Norwell Manors. It is expected that the Order Limits would have been part of the agricultural land utilised during the medieval period.
- The extant medieval remains within Norwell are defined by several medieval period buildings including the Dovecote associated with the medieval manor house (L8599), Southview Cottage (M18580) and the Church of St Lawrence (NHLE 1369970/M4241). As well as a moat, which encompassed the Old Hall (NHLE 1045955/M4187/M4186), which can still be seen within the landscape. At Cromwell, the only surviving medieval remains are at St Giles Church (NHLE 1369982/L4242), which was constructed in the 12th and 13th centuries.
- As mentioned above in Previous Studies, a series of trial trenching was undertaken within the west of the Order Limits in Area 8 around Fox Holes Farm (ENT3865). During the investigations, several medieval features and finds were uncovered including a large curvilinear ditch filled with animal bone, several boundary ditches, sherds of medieval pottery and two clay pipe stems (L12097).

A11.1.3.9.4.4 Post-medieval (AD1500-1800)- 19th century (AD1800-1900) (Figure A11.1.5b/d – 6b/d)

- Evidence would suggest that there was a continuation of occupation and land use from the medieval through to the post-medieval period. Within Area 8 the known centres of medieval settlement, Cromwell and Norwell, there are a number of residential buildings and features that are known to be post-medieval in date, many of which are now Listed Buildings. Cromwell Post Office (M14944), 3 & 6-9 Main Street (M18599/M18600), Greenways (M17156) in Cromwell and Old Mill House (M14385), The Old house and adjoining Elderberry Cottage (M9244), and Auld Cottage (M18579) in Norwell are all examples of properties built post-1500.
- The only recorded post-medieval monument within the Order Limits in the area, is a post-medieval signal box (M6639) which would have been associated with the establishment of the Great Northern Railway line which traverses the Area aligned north to south. The box was recorded on the first edition Ordnance Survey mapping and is no longer present within the landscape.

A11.1.3.9.4.5 Undated (Figure A11.1.7b/d)

- There are a large number of undated features recorded within the NHER Data, this is due in part to the high level of aerial imagery analysis that has been undertaken throughout the landscape. Within the boundary of the Order Limits itself, a large number of undated features of possible archaeological origin have been identified via aerial imagery. The following currently undated archaeological features have been identified within the Order Limits boundary within Area 8.
- 258 Throughout the Order Limits a number of cropmarks have been identified indicating previous enclosures or linear features, it is not confirmed whether these are indications of Prehistoric land use or represent pre-enclosure landscapes from the medieval period.



- As well as these enclosures and linear features, a variety of ring ditches and small circular enclosures have been identified across the Order Limits, predominantly within the east in proximity to the previously identified Bronze Age barrows (L8627, L4207, L8623, L8628, L4191). These features may be contemporary within this established funerary landscape.
- 260 Elsewhere to the south of Norwell Lane in the east of the Order Limits, a possible Iron Age/Romano-British settlement complex has been identified (M8612, L8610, L8611). This settlement has been identified as a group of enclosures, with small ring ditches inside and outside of the enclosures.

A11.1.3.10 AREA 9

A11.1.3.10.1 Introduction

- Area 9 is located in the east of the Study Area. The land within which the Order Limits lies is agricultural in character, with the settlement of Bathley to the west of the Order Limits, and North Muskham and Holme to the east of the Order Limits. The landscape lies to the east of the River Trent situated within the lowlands of the river valley, the land rises to approximately 23 m aOD in the west of the Area and falling to approximately 10 m aOD in the east of the Area.
- The underlying bedrock of Area 9 consists of the following Mercia Mudstone Groups: Mudstone, and Siltstone & Dolomitic. There are superficial deposits across Area 9 consisting of Alluvium Clay, Silt, Sand and Gravel, and Holme Pierrepont Sand and Gravels, these deposits are concentrated in the east of the Area along the river bank (British Geological Survey).

A11.1.3.10.2 Designated Heritage Assets

A11.1.3.10.2.1 Order Limits

263 There are no Designated Heritage Assets within the Order Limits, in Area 9.

A11.1.3.10.2.2 Study Area

- The Designated Archaeological Assets within Area 9 include a Grade I Listed Building, 17 Grade II Listed Buildings, and two Scheduled Monuments.
- The Scheduled Monuments of a Standing Cross 300 m north of Trent Farm (NHLE 1018131), this monument is situated approximately 300 m east of the Order Limits, and a Standing Cross 140 m north of the Old Hall (NHLE 1018130) situated approximately 985 m north-east of the Order Limits.
- 266 All Designated Archaeological Assets are illustrated in Figure A11.1.2d.

A11.1.3.10.3 Previous Studies

A11.1.3.10.3.1 Order Limits

Wessex Archaeology undertook a phase of geophysical survey across various locations within the Order Limits, including across the majority of Area 9. The surveying identified several archaeological features within the Order Limits, including in the west of the Order Limits where a series of curvilinear and rectilinear anomalies have been recorded which potentially indicate an Iron Age – Romano-British settlement.

A11.1.3.10.3.2 Study Area

There have been a number of archaeological events within the Study Area, within Area 9. These events have been largely focussed in the north-east of the Study Area, including trial trenching, watching briefs, and timber sampling.



- ²⁶⁹ In 2022 AOC and Magnitude undertook areas of geophysical surveying across the south-east and central regions of Area 9³⁵.
- In 2025 York Archaeology undertook the Phase 2 archaeological evaluation (trial trenching), which included areas across the central extent of Area 9. Archaeological features were identified from across 21 trenches out of 50 excavated. These features comprised undated ditches and pits, ridge and furrow field systems; and former field boundaries visible on 1900's OS mapping³⁶.
 - Where relevant, the results of these investigations are discussed in further detail below in the archaeological and historical context.
 - 272 Previous archaeological investigations carried out within the Study Area are illustrated in **Figure A11.1.8d**.

A11.1.3.10.4 Archaeological and Historical Context

A11.1.3.10.4.1 Prehistoric (970,000 BC- AD 43) (Figure A11.1.3d)

- The earliest recorded find within the Area, a Palaeolithic findspot comprising a number of lithic implements (**L8355**), found approximately 185 m north of the Order Limits. A further group of worked flint was identified approximately 150 m west of the Order Limits, dated to the Mesolithic period (**L11118**). Both finds were recovered through fieldwalking activities, with no further Palaeolithic or Mesolithic finds present within Area 9.
- Activity increased significantly within the Area during the Neolithic period with a large number of Neolithic finds recovered from across the Order Limits. Within the north of the Order Limits, these finds were collected in the 1970s by a local farmer (Mr H Kent) from along the banks of a stream between Bathley and N Muskham parishes, these finds consisted of a variety of flint implements and axe heads (artefact scatter **L5646** was found within the Order Limits). Further finds within central and southern areas of the Order Limits have also been largely defined as a variety of flint finds, no settlement activity from this period has been identified within the Area to date.
- 275 Bronze Age activity in Area 9 includes a Barrow cemetery (**M8340**). Identified via aerial photography, the cemetery includes sections of four circles including a large circle with an internal concentric circle, with one ring ditch to the north. This is a continuation of similar monuments present to the north within Area 9. Another Bronze Age find identified within Area 9 is a Bronze Age flint arrowhead (**L5643**).
- To the east of the Order Limits, trial trenching within North Muskham revealed a series of features whose date and layout suggest they are part of a larger enclosure that may have associated settlement remains (**L12118**). Pottery sherds dating to the Iron Age also indicated the provenance of these features were Iron Age. No further investigations have confirmed the presence of a possible Iron Age settlement within North Muskham.

A11.1.3.10.4.2 Romano-British (AD 43-410) (Figure A11.1.3d)

277 Romano-British activity within Area 9 is limited to Roman pottery sherds uncovered during fieldwalking activities within the south of the Area (L11147, L11152). No further finds have been recovered from within the Order Limits or Study Area.

A11.1.3.10.4.3 Saxon (AD 410-1066)-Medieval (AD 1066-1500) (Figure A11.1.4d)

- ²⁷⁸ Despite a general paucity of Anglo-Saxon finds within the region, remnants of Anglo-Saxon pottery have been uncovered during fieldwalking activities within the South of the Area (**L11225**, **L11177**).
- Whilst no further Anglo-Saxon finds have been found within Area 9, two settlements are recorded in the 1086 Domesday Survey, indicating established settlement activity within the Anglo-Saxon period.
- During the medieval period, the manor of North Muskham was located approximately 440 m east of the Order Limits in Area 9. The manor had a total of 46 households, consisting of 14 villagers, 18 freemen, and 12 smallholders. The manor's landholdings were extensive including 30 plough teams, 106 acres of meadow, and woodland.
- Given the extent of land under cultivation, and the Order Limits' proximity to the village centre, it is likely that some if not all areas of the Order Limits would have formed part of the holdings of North Muskham Manor. It is expected that the Order Limits would have been part of the agricultural land utilised during the medieval period.
- The manor of Bathley was located in the western region of Area 9 adjacent to the western extent of the Order Limits. The size of the manor and its landholdings are unknown as no details were included in the Domesday records. This possibly indicates the settlement was a larger town or an abandoned settlement. However, the NHER data records several features within the bounds of the modern settlement which are dated to the medieval period. A post-medieval cottage within the village is believed to be the site of a medieval chapel, whose building materials the cottage was constructed from (M2962). Several stone coffins have been found at the site, corroborating the location of the medieval chapel (L2962). A further example of medieval activity is The Hollies, a medieval hall which was dendro-dated to the late 13th century (M9198).
- Medieval activity within North Muskham can be seen within the Church of St Wilfrid (NHLE 1178997/M3155), which dates to the 12th century. Approximately 800 m north of the Church within the settlement of North Muskham, lies a medieval wayside cross, whose remains stand to 1.6 m with a 0.7 m square plinth of possible 13th century date (M3259). Other casual finds, in the north-east of the settlement include a medieval well and well shaft, alongside medieval pottery sherds (L2990).
- In areas within the south of the Area where fieldwalking activities have been undertaken a variety of medieval pottery has been located, within areas presumed to form part of the agricultural landscape during the period.



A11.1.3.10.4.4 Post-medieval (AD 1500-1800)- 19th century (AD 1800-1900) (Figure A11.1.5d – 6d)

- Evidence would suggest that there was a continuation of occupation and land use from the medieval through to the post-medieval period. Within Area 9 the known centres of medieval settlement, North Muskham and Bathley, there are a number of residential buildings and features that are known to be post-medieval in date many of which are now Listed Buildings. Buena Vista (M14418), Church Row (M14461), Trent View (M14469), Muskham Grange (M3258) in North Muskham, and Cherrymead (M15035), a Pump and Well (M3260), and the Crown Inn at Bathley are all examples of properties built post-1500.
- There is limited post-medieval activity outside of the established settlements however, a post-medieval windmill was noted approximately 115 m west of the Order Limits, though the windmill is no longer present within the landscape (M17152).

A11.1.3.10.4.5 Undated (Figure A11.1.7d)

- There are a large number of undated features recorded within the NHER Data, this is due in part to the high level of aerial imagery analysis that has been undertaken throughout the landscape. Within the boundary of the Order Limits itself, a large number of undated features of possible archaeological origin have been identified via aerial imagery. The following currently undated archaeological features have been identified within the Order Limits boundary within Area 9.
- ²⁸⁸ Throughout the Order Limits a number of cropmarks have been identified indicating previous enclosures or linear features, it is not confirmed whether these are indications of Prehistoric land use or represent pre-enclosure landscapes from the medieval period.
- As well as these enclosures and linear features two separate possible settlement complexes have been identified within the Order Limits. Along the eastern edge of the Order Limits a cropmark complex of roughly rectangular paddocks has been identified (M8337), a slight impression of these paddocks can be seen through LiDAR analysis. In the western extent of the Order Limits, a set of rectangular enclosures with internal partitions and possible hut circles was identified (M8332), these features are not visible on LiDAR imagery.
- ²⁹⁰ Elsewhere within the Order Limits, a possible ring ditch (L9731) and several circular enclosures (L2973, L8334) have also been identified. As previously stated however without intrusive archaeological investigations the provenance of these features cannot be affirmed.

A11.1.3.11 AREA 10

A11.1.3.11.1 Introduction

- Area 10 is located in the south-east of the Study Area. The land within which the Order Limits lies is agricultural in character, with the settlement of Little Carlton to the west of the Site, and South Muskham to the east of the Order Limits. The landscape lies to the north and west of the River Trent situated within the lowlands of the river valley, the topography of the Area lies between 11 and 14 m aOD.
- The underlying bedrock of Area 10 consists of Mercia Mudstone. There are superficial deposits across Area 10 consisting of Alluvium Clay, Silt, Sand and Gravel, and Holme Pierrepont Sand and Gravels, these deposits are situated across the Area (British Geological Survey).

A11.1.3.11.2 Designated Heritage Assets

A11.1.3.11.2.1 Order Limits

There are no Designated Archaeological Assets within the Order Limits, in Area 10.

A11.1.3.11.2.2 Study Area

- The Designated Archaeological Assets within Area 10 include one Grade I Listed Building, one Grade II* Listed Building, ten Grade II Listed Buildings, and five Scheduled Monuments.
- The Scheduled Monuments are the following: an Iron Age Settlement (NHLE 1003494) situated approximately 600 m east of the Order Limits, a site of Pit Alignments (NHLE 1003493) situated approximately 65 m east of the Order Limits, Little Carlton medieval village and part of the meadow field system (NHLE 1019870) situated approximately 170 m west of the Order Limits, and in the south of the Area two Civil war monuments (NHLE 1017620, NHLE 1016047).
- 296 All Designated Archaeological Assets are illustrated in Figure A11.1.2d.

A11.1.3.11.3 Previous Studies

A11.1.3.11.3.1 Order Limits

- ²⁹⁷ In 2022 AOC, Magnitude and Wessex Archaeology undertook a phase of geophysical survey across various locations within Area 10.
- The NHER also records one previous investigation within the Order Limits boundary within the Area, with a watching brief within the north-eastern section of the Order Limits (ENT3871). No archaeological remains or artefacts were encountered.

A11.1.3.11.3.2 Study Area

There have been a number of archaeological events within the Study Area, within Area 10. These events have been largely focussed in the north-east of the Study Area, including excavation, trial trenching, watching briefs, and geophysical surveys.



- 300 Where relevant, the results of these investigations are discussed in further detail below in the archaeological and historical context.
- 301 Previous archaeological investigations carried out within the Study Area are illustrated in **Figure A11.1.8d**.

A11.1.3.11.4 Archaeological and Historical Context

A11.1.3.11.4.1 Prehistoric (970,000 BC – AD 43) (Figure A11.1.3d)

- Within Area 10 there has been a considerable amount of fieldwalking undertaken across the Study Area which has resulted in a higher level of Palaeolithic and Mesolithic lithic finds than present in other Areas. Several Palaeolithic finds have been recovered (L11140) (L11144). A higher quantity of Mesolithic flint finds have been recovered from across the whole of the Area (L11122, L11130, L11127, L11125, L11119, L11116). This marked increase in comparison to the other Areas is likely a combination of the increased fieldwalking activity alongside the banks of the River Trent, a desirable landscape for Palaeolithic and Mesolithic communities.
- Similarly, the NHER Data for the Neolithic and Bronze Age periods is defined by a large number of lithic finds both within and outside the Order Limits boundary, as a result of extensive field walking within this landscape (L11120, M18281, L11123, L1121, L11124, L11129, L11134, L11132). Despite the increase in settlement activity within this period, no Neolithic settlement activity has been recorded within the Area. However, one small area of possible Bronze Age settlement activity has been recorded within the north-eastern corner of the Order Limits. The activity consisted of a cluster of fire-cracked pebbles within a roughly circular patch, as this was recorded during fieldwalking, it is possible that all of this feature is not yet exposed and carries the potential for an undisturbed settlement and activities associated with Bronze Age settlements (M18279).
- A possible small Iron Age settlement site has been identified via aerial photography within the north-east of the Order Limits, to the north-west of South Muskham (NHLE 1003494/M8348). The settlement is formed by a complex of intersecting linear features, which include a square enclosure with a circular patch in a small irregular enclosure containing a small circle and pit alignment. An Iron Age quern stone has also been identified in proximity to this possible settlement (L5642), alongside Iron Age pottery sherds (L11166, L11149) and an Iron Age brooch (L11107).
- 305 A similar possible Iron Age settlement site has also been identified within the south-west of the Order Limits, aerial photography identified a complex of linear features and enclosures mainly squarish or rectangular in form (M8330).
- Due to the nature of Iron Age settlements being repurposed during the Romano-British period, these settlements may also have been the site of later Romano-British settlement activity.

A11.1.3.11.4.2 Romano-British (AD 43-410) (Figure A11.1.3d)

The continued development of the landscape during the Romano-British period has revealed via aerial photography. Further possible settlements outside of the Order Limits boundary (**M8350**, **L8344**). North-west of the



- Order Limits, a series of excavations were undertaken to test for cropmark features, several pits and ditches were uncovered within which large quantities of Romano-British pottery were uncovered (**L8344**).
- Romano-British finds have been found elsewhere via fieldwalking activities, with surface-level pottery sherds located within proximity to the identified cropmarks (L11109, L11108, L11148).
- Similar patterns have been observed throughout the rest of the Study Area, with a mix of surface-level finds and possible small settlement sites identified via aerial photography.

A11.1.3.11.4.3 Saxon (AD 410- 1066)- Medieval (AD 1066-1500) (Figure A11.1.4d)

- Despite a general paucity of Anglo-Saxon finds within the region, remnants of Anglo-Saxon pottery and isolated finds have been uncovered during fieldwalking activities to the east of the Order Limits (L11169, L2900, L11174, L8365, L3128, L11167).
- Whilst no further Anglo-Saxon finds have been found within Area 10, two settlements are recorded in the 1086 Domesday Survey, indicating established settlement activity within the Anglo-Saxon period.
- During the medieval period, the manor of Little Carlton, was located adjacent to the western boundary of the Order Limits within Area 10. The manor had a total of 23.5 households, consisting of 7 villagers, 22 freemen, and 16 smallholders. The manor's landholdings were extensive including 17.5 plough teams, 66 acres of meadow, and 80 acres of woodland.
- The manor of South Muskham was located adjacent to the eastern boundary of the Order Limits within Area 10. The manor had a total of 24.5 households, consisting of 7 villagers, 21 freemen, and 18 smallholders. The manor's landholdings were extensive including 18.8 plough teams, 78 acres of meadow, and 80 acres of woodland.
- Given the extent of land under cultivation, and the Order Limits proximity to the village centre, it is likely that some if not all areas of the Order Limits would have formed part of both the Little Carlton and South Muskham Manors. It is expected that the Order Limits would have been part of the agricultural land utilised during the medieval period.
- Earthwork evidence to the west of Little Carlton indicates that the settlement has shrunk in size since the medieval period, with trackways, sunken pathways, boundaries, as well as house platforms and tofts all visible within now agricultural fields (M2965).
- The remaining medieval evidence within South Muskham can be seen within the Church of St Wilfrid, situated approximately 355 m east of the Order Limits (M3147). The western tower, chancel and large five-light window are all 13th century, alongside two arcades dating to the 14th century.
- As noted with earlier periods the increase in fieldwalking activity within Area 10 has resulted in large numbers of surface-level finds being identified, which can also be seen through the large level of medieval pottery sherds that have been located throughout the Area, including within the Order Limits (L11168, L11164, L11162, L11161, L11165, L11163, L11160, L11154,



L11159, **L11155**). Also seen via aerial photography in the south-west of the Order Limits, a pair of parallel ditches with two ditches and one incomplete ring ditch has been recorded as a possible post mill from the medieval period (M18020).

A11.1.3.11.4.4 Post-medieval (AD 1500-1800) and 19th century (AD 1800-1900) (Figure A11.1.5d – 6d)

- Evidence would suggest that there was a continuation of occupation and land use from the medieval through to the post-medieval period. Within Area 10 the known centre of medieval settlement, South Muskham, there are a number of residential buildings and features that are known to be post-medieval in date many of which are now Listed Buildings. Rose Dene (M14289), Rosegarth (M14325), and Grange Farmhouse (M14066) are all examples of properties built post-1500.
- During the 17th century, England experienced a series of armed conflicts between Parliamentarians and Royalists, most commonly known as the English Civil War. The Area encompasses an important landscape for the Civil War with the main quarters of the Scots army at the third siege of Newark lying between the Kelham and Muskham bridges (M5640). Clampe's Plan, a cartographic source from the period, shows it as a large, entrenched camp of bastion trace with redans at the centre of the north-east and southwest sides and south-west of the centre of the other two. Limited remains can be seen of the camp however, a section of ditch identified via aerial photography may indicate the potential for further remains to be uncovered. A number of scheduled monuments relating to the civil war defences around Newark are recorded to the south-east of the Order Limits (M5641, M3129, M2980).
- As well as the military encampment, gunflints have also been identified throughout the Area (**L11126**, **L11128**, **L11133**). Also identified was a post-medieval pump, which is no longer present within the landscape (**L3279**).

A11.1.3.11.4.5 Undated (Figure A11.1.7d)

- There are a large number of undated features recorded within the NHER Data, this is due in part to the high level of aerial imagery analysis that has been undertaken throughout the landscape and also as a result of high levels of fieldwalking undertaken within the Area. Within the boundary of the Order Limits itself, a large number of undated features of possible archaeological origin have been identified via aerial imagery. The following currently undated archaeological features have been identified within the Order Limits boundary within Area 10.
- A large number of undated finds located across the Area consist of fire-cracked pebbles (representative of possible burning), these pebbles indicate the presence of possible prehistoric activity across the landscape, however, due to the nature of the finds they are not able to be accurately dated to a specific period.
- As well as these pebbles a number of cropmark complexes have been identified via aerial photography, possibly indicating settlement activity (M8342, M8347, L8348, L2967, L8330, L8345, L8352). As previously stated however without intrusive archaeological investigations the provenance of these features cannot be affirmed.

A11.1.3.12 MAP REGRESSION

- As established through the analysis of the NHER data, since at least the medieval period the landscape throughout the majority of the Order Limits has been utilised as agricultural land for the nearby rural settlements that are scattered throughout the Study Area. Since the enclosure of the landscape in the Post-medieval period, isolated rural farmsteads and their associated farmland have encompassed the majority of the Order Limits. This pattern of utilisation can be seen reflected through earlier historic mapping such as both Chapman's 1774 Map of Nottinghamshire and Sanderson's 1835 Map of Nottinghamshire and Derbyshire (not reproduced). Analysis of this earlier 19th-century mapping and Ordnance Survey mapping from the later 19th century indicates little change within this rural landscape despite the influence of the Industrial Revolution. As can be seen in **Figure A11.1.9** the vast majority of the Order Limits lies within open agricultural land which is likely to not have been previously developed.
- There are areas within the Order Limits which have been subject to some level of development, such as in the north where the post-medieval Ossington Hall and Park extended into the Order Limits (**Figure A11.1.10**). This was a designed landscape garden, the areas which encompass the Order Limits were open pastures with designed footpaths and scattered trees planted throughout. The areas within the Order Limits were maintained until the early 20th century when as a result of the construction of RAF Ossington they were redeveloped into the airfield, after the airfield had been decommissioned in the 1950s it was returned to agricultural land as can be seen today.
- A further post-medieval designed landscape in the north-east of the Order Limits can be seen near Carlton-on-Trent, where the gardens of Carlton Hall extend into the east of the Order Limits (**Figure A11.1.10**). Similar to Ossington Hall, the areas of the park that fall within the Order Limits area are characterised as open pasture with designed footpaths and scattered trees planted throughout.
- Into the 20th century, RAF Ossington was established within the north-west extent of the Order Limits as a Second World War airbase. The airbase was constructed between 1941 and 1942 in the typical form of an A-shaped bomber airfield with 3 hard runways. Whilst activity at the airfield decreased following the end of WWII it was still in use until 1959, areas of hardstanding can still be seen within the landscape, however, much of the runways and above-ground structures were demolished or repurposed following the closure of the airfield. The remaining extent of the disused airfield that can still be seen within the Order Limits can be seen depicted on the 1960 OS mapping (Figure A11.1.11).
- The 1960 OS Mapping also highlights the unchanged nature of the Order Limits into the 20th century, with the landscape still defined by open agricultural fields. The most significant difference between the 19th century and the 20th century is the removal of internal field boundaries (**Figure A11.1.12**).



A11.1.4 POTENTIAL IMPACTS AND ARCHAEOLOGICAL SIGNIFICANCE

A11.1.4.1 POTENTIAL IMPACTS

- Impacts on archaeological remains may occur during construction, operation or decommissioning of the Development. The majority of impacts are expected to occur during construction the sources of the impacts are discussed below.
- There is not anticipated to be any additional land-take during the operational phase as the Development will have been constructed and will be operational. However, as a worst-case scenario, it is possible that mid-life maintenance and replacement of infrastructure may be required on an ad hoc basis during the operational phase of the Development which may result in impacts on archaeological remains.
- At the end of the 40-year operational phase for the Development, the solar PV modules and associated infrastructure will be removed to decommission the Development. Whilst the methodology for decommissioning is not set out in detail, the process for removing the built form of the Development is not expected to require any additional land-take beyond that of the construction period. There would therefore be no additional impacts to buried archaeological remains outside of those areas required for construction and operation.
- 333 The methods of construction of the Development will entail the following sources of ground disturbance and excavations:
 - Solar PV modules The Solar PV modules are installed on metal framework with piled foundations to a depth of 0.5 m to 2 m. The driven piles will damage/disturb any archaeological remains that are present within their footprint (although below-ground volume affected by the mounting poles is less than 1%). Activities associated with the installation of the piles such as movement of construction vehicles also have the potential to affect any buried archaeological remains in areas of wet or saturated ground.
 - Cables Figure 5.1 of the ES [EN010162/APP/6.3.5.1] shows that the area identified for cables has a width of typically 60 m. Approximately 30 m is required for the cable trench and working area (12m trench and 9m either side working area) the additional 30 m allows flexibility to avoid buried archaeological remains through design alteration. Construction activities which will require below ground works within the cable corridor will comprise site preparation, a cable trench, other buried equipment associated with the cables, access tracks, planting and vegetation management, and enabling works including construction compounds.
 - Mitigation/Enhancement Areas within the Order Limits are proposed for mitigation and enhancement measures. Proposals for mitigation and enhancement are set out in Masterplan, shown on Figure 5.2 of the ES [EN010162/APP/6.3.5.2], Operations, which may involve below ground activities, during the construction phase for the mitigation and



enhancement may include, site preparation and clearance access tracks, the installation of fencing, SUDS, planting and vegetation management, paths, signage and information boards and enabling works including construction compounds. In the areas characterised as mitigation/enhancement, the nature of the works is expected to be relatively localised and the depth of below ground works required in these areas is considered to be varied and for the most part negligible.

- Intermediate Substations Up to four intermediate Substations will be required within the Order Limits. The areas presented are also larger than the areas that will be required to allow for some flexibility in design. Below-ground activities associated with the intermediate substations that have the potential to affect buried archaeological remains include site preparation, underground cabling, foundations for control rooms, indoor and outdoor switchgear equipment, access tracks and parking, enabling works, SUDS and planting/vegetation management.
- BESS/400 kV compound Buried archaeological assets may be subject to adverse effects during the construction phase through the following activities associated with the construction of the BESS: site preparation, underground cabling, indoor and outdoor switchgear equipment, foundations for the compound and battery storage.
- National Grid Staythorpe Substation Connection and Consented Staythorpe BESS Connection – These works will connect the Development to the existing infrastructure. Modifications will be required at the existing National Grid Substation at Staythorpe and the adjacent Staythorpe BESS (consented but not yet built at the time of writing). The below ground works associated with these modifications that could affect below ground archaeological remains would comprise site preparation and underground cabling.
- Access Works Access Works associated with the Development are focussed around existing roads but may involve some below ground activities in areas outside of the existing roads. Below ground effects may occur for activities such as site preparation, road widening, creation of passing places, accesses from existing highways and planting/vegetation management.
- The aforementioned works have the potential to result in the damage to or loss of any buried archaeological features which may be present within their footprint. Any adverse impact to buried archaeological features would be permanent and irreversible in nature.
- This physical loss would result in harm to the significance of such remains, without mitigation or offsetting. This potential adverse effect could be reduced through the implementation of an appropriate scheme of archaeological mitigation.
- The most extensive element of the Development proposals in terms of area covered are the Solar PV Modules which account for 1025 ha or approximately 58% of the land within the Order Limits. However, a low



proportion of below-ground volume will be affected by the mounting poles (less than 1% of the area occupied by the panels). The installation of cabling and the excavations of foundations for substations and the BESS area would have a more concentrated impact on a smaller proportion of the land to be developed where these elements occupy approximately 135 ha or roughly 7.6% of the Order Limits.

- Topsoil removal and levelling works for the establishment of site compounds, facilities and car parks would also risk exposure and damage to any buried archaeological remains present within the affected areas.
- These activities have the potential to lead to a physical impact on any buried archaeological remains which would lead to a loss, up to and including a total loss, of their archaeological interest and thus their significance.

A11.1.4.2 CONDITIONS FOR SURVIVAL

- 339 Much of the Order Limits is undeveloped farmland and therefore any existing disturbance to buried archaeological remains that may be present would be largely restricted to truncation caused by ploughing.
- Impacts which are likely to have compromised the preservation of any archaeological remains (if present) include: the installation of the pylons for overhead lines, the installation of utility cabling and pipework, erection of agricultural buildings and trackways.
- Despite the possibility of modern cultivation and minor modern intrusions, the presence of some visible earthworks and those archaeological anomalies identified through the geophysical surveying within the Study Area indicates that conditions for survival of buried remains within the Development area should be favourable. This has been corroborated by the results of the preliminary programme of trial trenching that was undertaken across 5 areas of the Order Limits; Maplebeck, North Muskham, Cromwell North and Central, and Castle Hill. The programme revealed a moderate density of archaeological remains, alongside clusters of archaeological activity of prehistoric and uncertain date. It was noted that those areas which were situated closer to the banks of the River Trent had a lower level of artefactual evidence which is likely a result of the land being used as peripheral land and water management areas as opposed to areas of domestic or operational use³⁷.

A11.1.4.3 ARCHAEOLOGICAL INTEREST AND SIGNIFICANCE

- The archaeological interest of any buried archaeological remains within the Order Limits is derived from the information they may yield about past human activity. The degree to which this information can contribute to local, regional, national and international research determines the heritage significance of the remains.
- 343 Based upon a review of the available information, parts of the Order Limits are situated in areas of archaeological interest. This interest is primarily

- derived from the potential for evidence of past human activity during the Neolithic, Romano-British, medieval and post-medieval periods.
- The eastern section of the Order Limits is positioned along the River Trent, where evidence of early prehistoric activity is sparse and restricted to dispersed lithic scatters largely around the settlements of South and North Muskham. Evidence of this kind is likely only to be able to inform local research objectives and could be characterised as of low significance.
- The most substantial evidence for early occupation dates from the Neolithic to Romano-British periods. Numerous lithic and pottery finds alongside funerary features from the Neolithic and Bronze Age are scattered across the east of the Study Area along the banks of the River Trent. The most significant of these features being the possible Neolithic henge at South Muskham and a possible Bronze Age barrow cemetery both of which were identified via aerial photography. At Cromwell a Bronze Age round barrow was identified and excavated in the 1950s. Monuments of this kind, if they survive well, have the potential to contribute to regional and national research and could be characterised as of medium or high significance.
- Substantial cropmarks have been identified in and around the settlements of Little Carlton and South Muskham, which could indicate the presence of Iron Age settlements. These cropmarks include features such as enclosures of various forms with internal features, and with possible pit alignment, as well as a possible double-ring ditch. These possible Iron Age settlements are situated within an already existing prehistoric landscape, and Iron Age pottery sherds have been uncovered within and around the areas of interest. The extensive and apparently well-preserved pattern of late prehistoric settlement has potential to inform research at local, regional and national level into the development of Iron Age society and, possibly, the degree to which it continued into the Roman period. Remains of this kind could be characterised, depending on the degree of coherence and level of survival, as of low, medium or high significance.
- 347 The Romano-British archaeological record within the Order Limits, largely consists of pottery finds and crop marks indicating possible Roman settlement activity. One of these groups of features has been identified north-west of Little Carlton as a series of angular features and pit alignments with smaller rectangular enclosures. A complex of contiguous enclosures have been identified from aerial photography as a possible Romano-British settlement, located to the west of South Muskham. Further north, within the settlement of Cromwell aerial photography has also identified cropmarks of a rectangular enclosure, possibly a Roman villa, which extends within the Order Limits. The Great North Road follows sections of the Roman Road of Ermine Street which connected London to Lincoln and York. These remains have the potential to inform research at local, regional and national level into subjects such as continuity and change between the Late Iron Age and Roman periods, the extent and nature of Romanisation and the nature of the Roman rural economy. Remains of this kind could be characterised, depending on the degree of coherence and level of survival, as of low, medium or high significance.
- 348 Settlement in the Study Area increased during the medieval period with many of the current villages tracing their origins to this period which includes



several moated sites in the west of the Study Area, which are now scheduled monuments. A number of parish churches in the Study Area also date to the medieval period. There is also evidence within the Order Limits in the form of high levels of medieval pottery, largely identified during field walking, which probably reflect manuring of agricultural land. Aerial photography, geophysical survey and trial trenching have all revealed extensive survival of ridge and furrow cultivation which probably dates to the medieval period. Evidence of this nature can contribute to understanding of the medieval agricultural landscape at a local level and could characterised as of low significance.

- The character of the Study Area remains relatively unchanged into the postmedieval period with the primary activities undertaken agricultural in nature. The most noticeable change was the establishment of regular fields through the enclosure process and the expansion of the settlement centres with many buildings in the historic cores tracing their origins to this period.
- Most significantly the Study Area lay within an important landscape relating to the 17th century English Civil War, with the main quarters of the Scots army lying within the Order Limits between the Kelham and Muskham bridges. A number of scheduled monuments and non-designated earthworks relating to civil war defences and siege works around Newark are recorded to the south-east of the Order Limits. As well as the military encampment, gunflints have also been identified in and around South Muskham and Kelham. The Civil War siegeworks and defences represent a uniquely well preserved example of early modern conflict archaeology unparalleled nationally which is reflected in the level of protection afforded to the remains. The remains have been and continue to be the subject of study at a national and trans-national level. Remains of this kind could be characterised, as of high or very high significance.
- Further substantial changes during the period include the establishment of Averham Park, in the south-west of the Study Area which was an 18th century Hunting Park associated with the Grade II* listed hunting lodge. Ossington Hall and Park, in the north of the Order Limits was an 18th century Hall and associated landscaped gardens, although the buildings have largely been demolished the landscape remains largely intact. Remains of this nature have potential to contribute to research at local, regional and national level into the changes in rural economy and elite display in the period between the 16th and nineteenth centuries. Remains of this kind could be characterised, depending on the degree of coherence and level of survival, as of low, medium or high significance.
- There are also connections to some of the most significant events of the early to mid-20th century as evidenced by the presence of war memorials in many of the settlements and a former Second World War airfield located within the north-west of the Order Limits. However, as the majority of the airfield has been removed and none of the runways are present the potential for further below-ground archaeology is limited (although the battle headquarters may survive). Where present the lack of coherence and poor survival would limit the research potential to local interest. Remains of this kind could be characterised as of low significance.



A11.1.5 CONCLUSION

- This assessment has established that there is an archaeological interest within the Order Limits. This interest relates to a potential, not untypical of Lowland England, for earlier prehistoric remains associated with activity of mobile populations and the transition to sedentary settlement practices, Iron Age to Romano-British occupation activity and medieval and post-medieval agricultural remains. There is little or no evidence for remains of Neolithic or Bronze Age settlements or for the Anglo-Saxon period
- Buried archaeological remains within the Order Limits have not generally been affected by major developments. This would imply an increased likelihood of any buried archaeological remains being well-preserved, however results from trial trenching suggest that in some areas truncation of remains has resulted from extensive use of deep ploughing. The highest potential is for possible archaeological remains from the Neolithic, Bronze Age, Iron Age, the Romano British and the medieval periods. Such remains could be up to high heritage significance, depending on a number of factors including their preservation. There is also a potential for remains from the post-medieval period and later which are likely to be agricultural in nature alongside those associated with a Second World War airfield.
- The need for, scale, scope, and nature of any further assessment and/or archaeological works following grant of the DCO would be approved following consultation with the Local Planning Authority (LPA). An Outline Archaeological Mitigation Strategy (AMS) (TA A11.8 [EN010162/APP/6.4.11.8]) which sets out the proposed approach to further evaluation and subsequent mitigation has been submitted with the DCO.



Para. 208	Local planning authorities should identify and assess the particular significance of any heritage asset that may be affected by a proposal (including by development affecting the setting of a heritage asset) taking account of the available evidence and any necessary expertise. They should take this into account when considering the impact of a proposal on a heritage asset, to avoid or minimise any conflict between the heritage asset's conservation and any aspect of the proposal.		
Para. 209	Where there is evidence of deliberate neglect of, or damage to, a heritage asset, the deteriorated state of the heritage asset should not be taken into account in any decision.		
Para. 210	In determining applications, local planning authorities should take account of: a) the desirability of sustaining and enhancing the significance of heritage assets and putting them to viable uses consistent with their conservation;		
	b) the positive contribution that conservation of heritage assets can make to sustainable communities including their economic vitality; and c) the desirability of new development making a positive contribution to local character and distinctiveness.		
Para. 212	When considering the impact of a proposed development on the significance of a designated heritage asset, great weight should be given to the asset's conservation (and the more important the asset, the greater the weight should be). This is irrespective of whether any potential harm amounts to substantial harm, total loss or less than substantial harm to its significance.

Para. 213	Any harm to, or loss of, the significance of a designated heritage asset (from its alteration or destruction, or from development within its setting), should require clear and convincing justification. Substantial harm to or loss of: a) grade II listed buildings, or grade II registered parks or gardens, should be exceptional;		
	b) assets of the highest significance, notably scheduled monuments, protected wreck sites, registered battlefields, grade I and II* listed buildings, grade I and II* registered parks and gardens, and World Heritage Sites, should be wholly exceptional ⁷⁵ .		
	⁷⁵ Non-designated heritage assets of archaeological interest, which are demonstrably of equivalent significance to scheduled monuments, should be considered subject to the policies for designated heritage assets.		
Para. 214	Where a proposed development will lead to substantial harm to (or total loss of significance of) a designated heritage asset, local planning authorities should refuse consent, unless it can be demonstrated that the substantial harm or total loss is necessary to achieve substantial public benefits that outweigh that harm or loss, or all of the following apply: a) the nature of the heritage asset prevents all reasonable uses of the site; and		
	b) no viable use of the heritage asset itself can be found in the medium term through appropriate marketing that will enable its conservation; and		
	c) conservation by grant-funding or some form of not for profit, charitable or public ownership is demonstrably not possible; and		
	d) the harm or loss is outweighed by the benefit of bringing the site back into use.		
Para. 215	Where a development proposal will lead to less than substantial harm to the significance of a designated heritage asset, this harm should be weighed against the public benefits of the proposal including, where appropriate, securing its optimum viable use.		
Para. 216	The effect of an application on the significance of a non-designated heritage asset should be taken into account in determining the application. In weighing applications that directly or indirectly affect non-designated heritage assets, a balanced judgement will be required having regard to the scale of any harm or loss and the significance of the heritage asset.		
Para. 218	Local planning authorities should require developers to record and advance understanding of the significance of any heritage assets to be lost (wholly or in part) in a manner proportionate to their importance and the impact, and to make

	this evidence (and any archive generated) publicly accessible ⁷⁶ . However, the ability to record evidence of our past should not be a factor in deciding whether such loss should be permitted.		
	⁷⁶ Copies of evidence should be deposited with the relevant historic environment record, and any archives with a local museum or other public depository.		
Para. 219	Local planning authorities should look for opportunities for new development within Conservation Areas and World Heritage Sites, and within the setting of heritage assets, to enhance or better reveal their significance. Proposals that preserve those elements of the setting that make a positive contribution to the asset (or which better reveal its significance) should be treated favourably.		
Para. 220	Not all elements of a Conservation Area or World Heritage Site will necessarily contribute to its significance. Loss of a building (or other element) which makes a positive contribution to the significance of the Conservation Area or World Heritage Site should be treated either as substantial harm under paragraph 207 or less than substantial harm under paragraph 208, as appropriate, taking into account the relative significance of the element affected and its contribution to the significance of the Conservation Area or World Heritage Site as a whole.		
Para. 221	Local planning authorities should assess whether the benefits of a proposal for enabling development, which would otherwise conflict with planning policies but which would secure the future conservation of a heritage asset, outweigh the disbenefits of departing from those policies.		







Figure A11.1.1a: Site, Study Area and Report Areas







Figure A11.1.1b: Site, Study Area and Report Areas







Figure A11.1.1c: Site, Study Area and Report Areas







Figure A11.1.1d: Site, Study Area and Report Areas







Figure A11.1.2a Site, Study Area and Designated Heritage Assets








Figure A11.1.2b Site, Study Area and Designated Heritage Assets









Figure A11.1.2d Site, Study Area and Designated Heritage Assets






Figure A11.1.3a: Site, Study Area, and HER Data (Palaeolithic – Romano-British)
