Many lack the confidence to engage, and some genuinely feel that their views won't make a difference anyway.

This creates a real imbalance because while the developers are well resourced, supported by teams of professionals, the local people most affected are left feeling powerless. The human impact and imbalance cannot be overstated. We believe that the process should discover more effective ways to support and empower local views.

This means not just consulting them, but genuinely including them in decision making. The principle of fairness dictates that those who are most impacted should not be the ones that are least able to participate. The parish council would ask the examining authority to keep this in mind as the process moves forward that meaningful participation requires not only access, but also understanding and confidence. Without that, the people at risk overlooking are the very people we meant to serve. Thank you.
