



Transboundary screening undertaken by the Planning Inspectorate (the Inspectorate) on behalf of the Secretary of State (SoS) for the purposes of regulation 32 of the Infrastructure Planning (Environmental Impact Assessment) Regulations 2017 (the 2017 EIA Regulations)

Project name:	Connah's Quay Low Carbon Power Project
Address/Location:	The proposed development comprises a low carbon Combined Cycle Gas Turbine (CCGT) generating station fitted with Carbon Capture Plant (CCP) and supporting infrastructure on land at, and in the vicinity of, the existing Connah's Quay Power Station, Flintshire, North Wales (National Grid Reference 327347, 371374).

Date(s) screening undertaken:	First screening – 20 March 2024 following the applicant's request for a scoping opinion. Second screening – 26 January 2026 following submission of the application documents.

TRANSBOUNDARY SCREENING

The Inspectorate undertook transboundary screening of the proposed development in the Scoping Opinion, which was adopted on 20 March 2024. The Inspectorate concluded that the proposed development **is unlikely to have a significant effect either alone or cumulatively on the environment in a European Economic Area State**.
