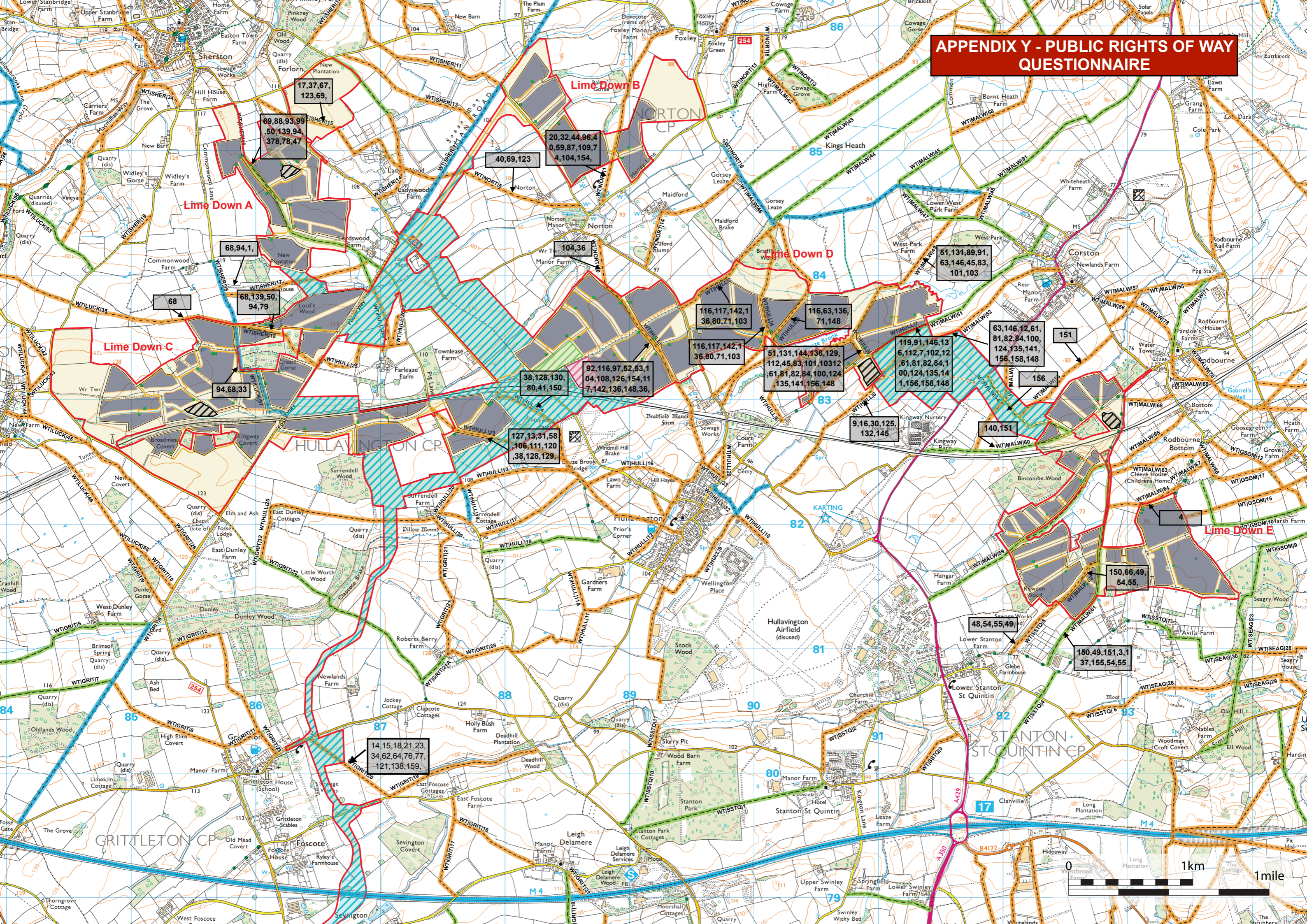

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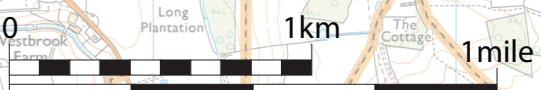

I would be very concerned about the destruction of habitat caused by a development the size of Heathrow Airport all around this route. The impact this would have on the movement patterns of the wildlife, birdlife and human life would likely be extreme. Although we have not had detail from the developer, as local inhabitants we know that the project could not be achieved without significant detrimental consequences. There looks likely to be destruction to habitat areas and hedgerow, during a build phase there would be incessant noise of pile driving and traffic (2-3 years). Due to the large scale nature and cost of the project there will likely be security which we hear from other solar developments include continuous NOISE of inverters, battery storage site (close to this path and homes) and also security LIGHTING. To reiterate this area is bordering the Cotswold National Landscape and local government and people have for centuries looked after and protected the landscape. Because of this love and care it is a unique and special place. I don't say this lightly. I beg anyone to visit and not agree. Permitting this development here would be running roughshod over years of careful environmental protection. Of course we must work out how to generate power for us to use but let's do so at a local level and without destroying this unique environment that holds incredible value at a time when human population NEEDS the natural world more than ever. To summarise industrialising this area would forever destroy this landscape and setting There would be zero enjoyment and we would have little interest in living or walking in this area.
