They date from the Norman Conquest (in some cases forming a continuation of a Saxon tradition) and throughout the rest of the medieval period. Individual residences were in use for varying lengths of time; some continued in use into the Post Medieval period. Such dwellings were the houses or palaces of royalty, bishops and the highest ranks of the nobility, usually those associated with the monarch. The monument includes the site of the magnate's residence and manorial centre of Steeton Hall and the upstanding medieval gatehouse. Included in the scheduling are earthwork remains of the precinct wall, which surrounded the manorial complex and further earthwork remains of structures and garden terraces, both within the precinct and immediately adjacent to it. Upstanding garden and field walls within the precinct area are also included. The monument lies on the southern side of shallow valley with the hall and gatehouse lying on level ground and the precinct extending into the surrounding fields. Part of the medieval Steeton Hall still stands, but has been added to and altered, particularly in the 17 <sup>th</sup> and 19 <sup>th</sup> centuries. When the abbey was suppressed in 1539, the property was described as a mansion house with a dovecote and orchard, all surrounded by a moat. The western part of the site now has a house built around 1800 (Grade II listed). During the 17<sup>th</sup> century the courtyard house was subordinated into a grandiose scheme begun by Thomas Wentworth, Earl of Strafford in c.1630 and continued by Sir John Lewis in c.1660. During the early 18<sup>th</sup> century Lady Betty Hastings made stylistic alterations to the principal facades and probably to the interior of what was now a country house and estate. Further alterations to the interior were made during the 19<sup>th</sup> century and 20<sup>th</sup> century with these, and earlier alterations, obscuring the development history of the rooms.</p> <p>Interior features of note include a stone arched fireplace visible within a cupboard, surviving elements of the Medieval chapel which were eventually converted into a parlour (now known as Lady Betty Hasting' parlour) by the Witham family and decorated with a wooden fireplace surround and overmantel in the Renaissance style, dated 1588.
