North London Reinforcement Project-Non Material Change Application

Non-material changes to the National Grid (North London Reinforcement Project) Order (S.I. 2014 No. 1052) (the 2014 order). Application under Section 153 of, and Schedule 6 to, the Planning Act 2008. Pursuant to regulation 7 of the Infrastructure Planning (Changes to, and Revocation of, Development Consent Orders) Regulations 2011 (the 2011 Regulations).

No Archaeological Issues

I received a consultation notification on the above on 12 May 2026.

The Greater London Archaeological Advisory Service (GLAAS) gives advice on archaeology and planning. Our advice follows the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) and the GLAAS Charter.

NPPF section 16 and the London Plan (2021 Policy HC1) make the conservation of archaeological interest a material planning consideration.

Having considered the proposals with reference to information held in the Greater London Historic Environment Record and made available in connection with this development, I conclude that the proposal is unlikely to have a significant effect on heritage assets of archaeological interest.



The Greater London Archaeological Advisory Service has been advising National Grid on compliance with archaeological mitigation for the North London Reinforcement Project. We are satisfied that this amendment will have no archaeological impact.

This response relates solely to archaeological considerations. If necessary, Historic England's Development Advice Team should be consulted separately regarding statutory matters.
