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#### 1. Introduction

#### 1.1 Purpose of the document

- This Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC) sets out how National Grid Electricity Transmission (National Grid) intends to consult statutory consultees, stakeholders, affected residents and local communities on its proposals to build an offshore high voltage direct current (HVDC) link between Suffolk and Kent (and associated infrastructure), ahead of its application for development consent.
- The Sea Link Project ("the proposed Project") requires consent from the relevant Secretary of State via a Development Consent Order (DCO). This document has therefore been prepared in accordance with section 47(1) of the Planning Act 2008 ("the Planning Act"), which requires applicants to prepare a statement explaining how they will consult with the local community regarding their proposals, and to carry out preapplication consultation in accordance with this statement.
- As the proposed Project is an 'EIA Development', this SoCC therefore also sets out how National Grid intends to publicise and consult on the preliminary environmental information, in accordance with Regulation 12 of The Infrastructure Planning (Environmental Impact Assessment) Regulations 2017 ("the EIA Regulations").
- In accordance with section 47(2) of the Planning Act, National Grid has consulted with and had regard to comments from the following local authorities whilst developing the SoCC:
  - Suffolk County Council
  - East Suffolk District Council
  - Kent County Council
  - Thanet District Council
  - Dover District Council
- The listed local authorities were consulted for 28 days, between 22 June and 20 July 2023 on the contents of this SoCC.

#### 1.2 Nationally Significant Infrastructure Projects

- Offshore transmission cables and their associated onshore infrastructure do not meet the criteria to be considered Nationally Significant Infrastructure Projects (NSIPs) under the Planning Act, meaning that permission for their construction is not normally sought via an application for development consent.
- However, on 4 March 2022 National Grid wrote to the Secretary of State for Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy<sup>1</sup> ("the Secretary of State") to ask that they issue a direction on whether the proposed Project can be treated as a development for which development consent is required.

- On 31 March 2022, the Secretary of State issued a direction confirming that the proposed Project be treated as such, in accordance with section 35(1) of the Planning Act.
- Development consent is therefore required before construction of the proposed Project can begin. However, ancillary works (such as the reconductoring of the existing 400 kilovolt (kV) line between Canterbury and Richborough) may be progressed through separate consenting regimes or permitted development rights.
- Since the section 35(1) direction was issued, plans for the proposed Project have evolved to potentially include the installation of a new 400 kV overhead electric line of more than 2 km in length. Should this be the case, this element would meet the criteria to be classified as an NSIP under the Planning Act, meaning that development consent would be required for this aspect of the proposed Project, irrespective of the direction issued under section 35(1).
- The application for development consent will be submitted to, and examined by, the Planning Inspectorate on behalf of the Secretary of State. The Planning Inspectorate will provide a recommendation to the Secretary of State, who will ultimately decide whether to grant the development consent for the proposed Project. The development consent order process is explained in further detail in Figure 2.3.
- Before submitting an application to the Planning Inspectorate, the Planning Act requires National Grid to carry out consultation, including with people living in the vicinity of the land where the proposed Project is to be sited.
- The early involvement of local communities, including local authorities and stakeholders, leads to applications that are better understood by all parties. It also helps National Grid identify valuable information about the potential impacts of a scheme, providing the opportunity for mitigation measures to be considered and, where appropriate, built into designs, before an application is submitted and considered.

#### 1.3 Environmental Impact Assessment


- On 24 October 2022, National Grid submitted a Scoping Report to the Secretary of State for Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy, to inform the Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) for the proposed Project.
- Within this Scoping Report, National Grid gave formal notification under Regulation 8(1)(b) of the EIA Regulations that it considers the proposed Project to meet the criteria outlined in Schedule 3 of the EIA Regulations to be considered as 'EIA Development'.
- A scoping opinion for the proposed Project was adopted by the Planning Inspectorate (on behalf of the Secretary of State) on 1 December 2022.

#### 1.4 About National Grid Electricity Transmission plc

- National Grid sits at the heart of Great Britain's energy system, connecting millions of people and businesses to the energy they use every day. We bring energy to life: in the heat, light and power we bring to our customer's homes and businesses; in the way that we support our communities and help them to grow; and in the way we show up in the world. It is our vision to be at the heart of a clean, fair and affordable energy future.
- 1.4.2 Within the National Grid Group there are distinctly separate legal entities, each with their individual responsibilities and roles (see Figure 1.1). The roles of these are

- summarised below. The proposed Project is being promoted by National Grid Electricity Transmission.
- 1.4.3 **National Grid Electricity Transmission (National Grid)** holds the transmission licence for England and Wales under the Electricity Act 1989. National Grid owns, builds, and maintains the high voltage electricity transmission system in England and Wales the overhead lines, buried cables and substations that carry power around the country.
- In 2022, Western Power Distribution became part of the National Grid Group and is now **National Grid Electricity Distribution (NGED)**. It is the local distribution network operator for the Midlands, South West of England and South Wales.
- The **Electricity System Operator (ESO)** controls the movement of electricity around the country, transporting power from generators (such as wind farms) to local distribution network operators, like NGED and UK Power Networks (UKPN), ensuring that supply meets demand.
- National Grid Ventures sits outside the core regulated businesses, investing in technologies and partnerships that help accelerate our move to a clean energy future. That includes interconnectors connecting the UK with countries across the North Sea, allowing trade between energy markets and efficient use of renewable energy resources.
- 1.4.7 Both National Grid and the ESO are licensed by the Government as electricity transmission companies and are regulated by the Office of Gas and Electricity Markets (Ofgem), which sets price controls and monitors how the companies develop and operate their networks on behalf of consumers.

National Grid has a statutory duty to develop and maintain an efficient, coordinated and economical system of electricity transmission under the Electricity Act 1989 ("the Electricity Act"). This includes a statutory obligation to offer to connect any new generating stations or interconnectors applying to connect to the transmission system.

- National Grid is also required, under section 38 of the Electricity Act, to comply with the provisions of Schedule 9 of the Electricity Act. Schedule 9 requires licence holders, in the formulation of proposals to transmit electricity, to preserve amenity by:
  - Schedule 9(1)(a) '...have regard to the desirability of preserving natural beauty, of conserving flora, fauna and geological or physiographical features of special interest and of protecting sites, buildings and objects of architectural, historic or archaeological interest;' and
  - Schedule 9(1)(b) '...do what [it] reasonably can to mitigate any effect which the proposals would have on the natural beauty of the countryside or on any such flora, fauna, features, sites, buildings or objects'.
- How we set out to meet these environmental responsibilities and our commitments relating to engagement and consultation about proposals, is explained in our <a href="Stakeholder">Stakeholder</a>, Community and Amenity Policy.

## 2. The Sea Link Project

#### 2.1 Background

- 2.1.1 The way we power the things we love is changing. In the years ahead, more of our energy will come from renewable and low carbon sources of electricity as part of the transition towards a net zero future.
- There has already been a significant shift in how energy is generated in the UK. Last year, coal was responsible for meeting just 1.5% of our energy needs, compared to 43% back in 2012. This is because more of the energy we use is coming from offshore wind, nuclear power and trading energy through interconnectors with other neighbouring countries. At the same time, demand for electricity is set to increase as other sectors of the economy are decarbonised through electrification, such as heating and transport.
- 2.1.3 Whilst the existing high voltage electricity network has been sufficient until now, it does not have the capability needed to reliably and securely transport all the energy that will be connected in the years ahead. To make sure everyone has access to the clean, affordable energy they need in the decades ahead, we need to deliver the largest overhaul of the electricity grid in generations.
- As much of the new renewable and low carbon electricity generation planned for the UK is expected to be installed along the east coast, National Grid is investing significantly in upgrading the existing network. It also needs to build new infrastructure, such as Sea Link, to ensure that power can be transported from where it is generated to where it is needed.
- 2.1.5 All of this work forms part of The Great Grid Upgrade National Grid's programme to deliver over five times the amount of electricity transmission infrastructure in the next seven years than has been built in the last 30 years.

#### 2.2 The proposed Project

- National Grid (NGET) is seeking your views on the Sea Link Project ('proposed Project') which involves the reinforcement of the electricity transmission network between Suffolk and Kent, predominantly via offshore High Voltage Direct Current (HVDC) link.
- To enable us to transmit electricity from Suffolk to Kent, onshore infrastructure will be required at both ends of the reinforcement.
- 2.2.3 The proposed Project is therefore split into three distinctive elements, comprising:
  - Suffolk Onshore Scheme;
  - Offshore Scheme: and
  - Kent Onshore Scheme.
- The Suffolk Onshore Scheme requires construction of the following key infrastructure to facilitate the HVDC Link:
  - construction of a new converter station within approx. 9 km inland on the Suffolk Coast

- connection into the proposed Friston Substation, or construction of the proposed Friston Substation (if required)
- installation of an underground High Voltage Alternating Current (HVAC) connection between the proposed Friston Substation and the new proposed converter station
- installation of HVDC underground cables between the landfall on the Suffolk coast and the new proposed Friston Substation
- construction of a Transition Joint Bay (TJB) to connect the HVDC marine cables with onshore HVDC cables at the landfall on the Suffolk coast.
- It is anticipated that Friston Substation will be constructed under the extant development consent secured by Scottish Power Renewables (SPR) for the East Anglia One (EA1) North and Two (EA2) Offshore Windfarm Projects. Should the proposed Friston Substation not be installed under these consents, it would be constructed under the separate development consent being sought for the proposed Project, which also includes Friston Substation.

#### 2.3 Consultation and engagement to date

- National Grid held a non-statutory consultation on the proposed Project between 24 October and 18 December 2022.
- 2.3.2 The consultation had the following aims:
  - to introduce the proposed Project to the public, providing an overview of the proposed Project and why the reinforcement is needed
  - to set out options that have been considered and the decision-making undertaken so far

- to present early plans, including proposed cable corridors, HVDC converter sites and landfall locations
- to provide an opportunity for stakeholders and those interested in the project to give their feedback on our work-to-date
- to outline the next steps and onward programme for the development of the proposed Project.
- Over the course of the non-statutory consultation, the Project Team held four face-to-face public information events, two landowner information events, six online webinars and nine stakeholder briefings. The consultation was advertised through a mixture of direct mailings, email updates, newspaper, and social media adverts. Consultation materials were made available online and for inspection at 20 deposit points in the vicinity of the proposed Project. Dedicated contact channels were also established for those who had questions about the proposed Project. This engagement and advertisement activity in Suffolk and Kent is summarised in **Table 2.1**.


- 2.3.4 National Grid provided a number of ways for members of the public and those interested in the consultation to give their feedback. These included:
  - completing an online feedback form on the Project's website (nationalgrid.com/sealink)
  - completing a paper feedback form or sending written comments by post (Freepost SEA LINK)
  - emailing feedback to the Project's email address (contact@sealink.nationalgrid.com)
  - calling the Project's information line (0808 134 9569)
- A total of 609 feedback responses to the consultation were received.
- Following a back-check and review of the prescribed consultees notified of the nonstatutory consultation, it was identified that some had not been contacted. National Grid wrote to the consultees on 22 February 2023 providing them with an eight-week period to provide feedback on the proposed Project.

- In addition to the consultation periods detailed previously, the proposed Project has engaged with key stakeholders through meetings and other forms of discussion on a regular basis. These stakeholders include local authorities, the Marine Management Organisation, Natural England, the Environment Agency, and Historic England.
- 2.3.8 More information on the non-statutory consultations carried out can be found in the Non-Statutory Consultation Report, which is part of the suite of documents published at statutory consultation. Archive documents from the non-statutory consultation will remain available on the Project's website. Paper copies will be available on request and subject to a printing charge outlined in **paragraph 3.5.8.**

#### 2.4 Project Timeline

Figure **2.2** sets out an indicative timeline for each stage of the proposed Project, from consultation through to the decision from the Secretary of State and construction.


Figure 2.2 Project Timeline

## 3. Consulting on the proposed application

#### 3.1 When will the consultation take place?

The statutory consultation will run for a period of eight weeks. It will take place between 24 October 2023 and 18 December 2023. All responses to the consultation must be received before 23:59 on the closing date. Postal responses will be accepted until 2 January 2024.

#### 3.2 What will be consulted on?

- 3.2.1 We will seek views and feedback on all aspects of the proposed Project, including the:
  - proposed onshore route of the HVDC cable, from landfall to converter station
  - proposed offshore route of the HVDC cable, from landfall to landfall
  - preferred landfall and converter station locations in Suffolk and Kent
  - proposed route of the HVAC link between the Suffolk converter station and Friston substation
  - proposed Friston substation
  - proposed technology type and route of the 400 kV link between the Minster converter station and the Canterbury to Richborough 400 kV overhead line
  - construction methodology
  - likely environmental affects arising from the proposed Project
  - approach to biodiversity net gain and mitigation of potential environmental impacts.
- The proposed Project continues to evolve in response to consultation feedback and further technical and design assessments. The statutory consultation presents a snapshot in time. Documents such as the Preliminary Environmental Information Report (PEIR) will allow consultation bodies to develop an informed view of the likely significant environmental effects of the development. It will outline any limitations on the current assessments. If any substantive changes are made to the design of the proposed Project following this statutory consultation, National Grid will consider whether there is a requirement for further consultation (see **section 4.3**).
- The full PEIR will be available on the Project's website, with a link to this shared with the relevant consultees set out in the EIA Regulations. Access to digital copies of the PEIR will be available at deposit points. Posted paper copies will be available on request and subject to a printing charge outlined in **paragraph 3.5.8**.
- As part of the application for development consent, an Environmental Statement (ES) will be prepared. This document will present an assessment of likely significant effects arising from the proposed Project and potential mitigation where appropriate, based on the details of the proposals submitted with the application for development consent.

#### 3.3 Who will be consulted?

- Principally, this consultation is open to anyone who is interested in the proposed Project. All views are welcomed, and National Grid will have regard to all comments and feedback when developing the details of the proposed Project for our application for development consent.
- Under section 47 of the Planning Act, National Grid has a duty to consult the local community. Two consultation zones have been developed to assist engagement with the local community.
- The Primary Consultation Zone (PCZ) extends 3 km from the proposed draft Order Limits for the proposed Project, whilst the Secondary Consultation Zone (SCZ) extends to at least 5 km from the draft Order Limits for the proposed Project (including the PCZ). The draft Order Limits are the proposed outer limits of the land required either on a temporary or permanent basis to deliver the proposed Project. Appendix A sets out the boundaries of these two consultation zones.
- 3.3.4 We will also consult the following groups and individuals:
  - Parish Councils representing parishes within the PCZ
  - Members of Parliament (MPs) representing constituencies within and bordering the PCZ and SCZ
  - elected representatives in local authorities where the proposed Project is situated
  - 'seldom heard groups' within both consultation zones who have been drawn to our attention, representing people who are unlikely to respond to traditional consultation techniques, and may need additional support to access materials
  - local interest groups, such as residents' associations, community groups and groups with particular specialisms, such as environmental groups
  - marine users such as fisheries, developers and existing infrastructure owners.
- In addition to the local community, National Grid will consult prescribed bodies<sup>2</sup> and local authorities as required under section 42(1)(a), (aa) and (b) of the Planning Act and undertake the relevant notification under the EIA Regulations. National Grid will also consult Persons with an Interest in Land (PILs) under section 42(1)(d).

#### 3.4 Consultation materials

Table 3.1 sets out the consultation materials that will be developed to help people understand the proposals for the proposed Project and provide their feedback.

#### 3.5 Promoting the consultation

- We will contact all addresses within the PCZ with a Consultation Pack (to include a newsletter, feedback form and freepost envelope). A map showing the PCZ can be found in **Appendix A**.
- The consultation will be advertised in local newspapers to provide details of where more information can be found, how to respond, and the dates of the public exhibitions. The newspapers will include:
  - Eastern Daily Press
  - East Anglian Daily Times
  - Ipswich Star
  - Kentish Gazette
  - Kent and Sussex Courier
- The circulation areas of these newspapers extend across both the PCZ and SCZ, and beyond.
- The consultation will also be promoted via statutory notices published in local and national newspapers, as well as in the London Gazette, Fishing News and Lloyd's List, giving details about the consultation in accordance with section 47 and 48 of the Planning Act. Site notices displaying this information will also be placed at key locations along the route of the proposed Project.
- We will work with parishes and local authorities across the PCZ to advertise the consultation in parish magazines, on council websites and on council social media channels. Posters will also be sent to parish councils to display and raise awareness of the consultation.
- Adverts will be placed on Facebook and Instagram to help raise general awareness of the consultation and target a broad range of demographics, including those that might not otherwise engage with the consultation. These social channels have been selected due to their success during the non-statutory consultation.

- Eight public information exhibitions will be held for communities to find out information about the proposed Project and the consultation and talk to representatives from the Project Team. The exhibitions will be held at suitable, publicly accessible venues that are within or near to the PCZ.
- Copies of all relevant consultation materials will be made available in print format at each exhibition. There will also be a series of banners to present the proposals for the proposed Project, including maps.
- Those attending the exhibitions will be encouraged to provide their feedback on the proposals.
- Table 3.3 outlines the dates, times and locations of each of the exhibitions.

- At least one of the public information events, in both Kent and Suffolk, will be held on a weekend, to ensure as broad a range of people as possible are able to attend the events.
- If, for any reason, it is unfortunately necessary to cancel a scheduled event, for example as a result of adverse weather, this information will be published on the proposed Project's website and a notice will be placed at the venue if practicable. In these circumstances National Grid will also consider organising additional events if deemed to be reasonably necessary.

#### 3.7 Webinars

Two webinars will be held during the first week of the consultation.

One webinar will focus on a summary of the proposals in Suffolk, whilst the other will summarise the proposals in Kent. Both sessions will include details of the marine proposals relevant to the proposed Project. **Table 3.4** provides a summary of the webinars that will take place.

- Telephone and video call appointment slots will be offered throughout the consultation period, whilst in-person appointments will be offered during weeks that a public information exhibition is taking place. We will seek to hold in-person appointments at venues closer to our proposals that would not have been suitable for a full public information exhibition.

# 4. Responses to the consultation

## 4.1 Methods of responding

- During the consultation period, feedback can be submitted in the following ways:

  - by email (<a href="mailto:contact@sealink.nationalgrid.com">contact@sealink.nationalgrid.com</a>)
- 4.1.2 Consultation responses received via any other method than those listed above, such as through social media, will not be formally recorded as part of the consultation.
- Responses provided orally, such as via telephone, will be accepted in exceptional circumstances on a case-by-case basis, where someone may not otherwise be able to respond to the consultation.
- 4.1.4 Feedback submissions sent by post will be accepted up until 2 January 2024.
- 4.1.5 Although they will not be formally included as consultation feedback, National Grid will endeavour to have regard to feedback received after the end of the consultation.

## 4.2 Presenting the results

- As set out in Figure **2.2**, following the close of the consultation all feedback will be collated, reviewed and analysed to understand key themes and concerns. Our proposals will be reviewed and, where practicable, refined in light of feedback.
- The proposed application will be finalised, taking into consideration the feedback received from the consultation in accordance with section 49 of the Planning Act.
- A Consultation Report will be produced as part of the application for development consent, as required by section 37 (3)(c) of the Planning Act. The report will include a summary of the consultation process undertaken in accordance with this SoCC and will set out how the feedback from the consultation has shaped and influenced the proposals as submitted within the application for development consent.
- 4.2.4 Responses to the consultation and extracts of responses may be published as part of the report unless specifically stated in the response. Any responses that are published will have all personal details redacted.
- Upon receipt of an application for development consent, the Planning Inspectorate will decide whether the application meets the required standards to proceed to examination and will determine whether the statutory consultation process has been adequate. As part of this process, local authorities will be invited to provide an adequacy of the consultation response to the Planning Inspectorate.
- The consultation report will be available online, alongside other application documents, once an application for development consent has been submitted. Paper copies will be available from the Project team on request and subject to a printing charge outlined in paragraph **3.5.8**.

#### 4.3 Further consultation

If, following the statutory consultation, National Grid considers it is necessary to undertake further targeted statutory consultation, this would be undertaken, so far as relevant and proportionate, in accordance with the principles and methods set out in this SoCC.

## 4.4 Other developers' consultations

- We are aware that a number of other organisations are developing proposals in the area, including:
  - National Grid Electricity Transmission's Bramford to Twinstead and Norwich to Tilbury (formerly known as East Anglia GREEN) network reinforcements
  - National Grid Ventures' LionLink (formerly known as EuroLink) and Nautilus interconnectors
  - North Falls offshore wind farm
  - Five Estuaries offshore wind farm.
- We will work to understand other local projects to ensure that the scope and context of this Project is clear in relation to the other consultations. This could include:
  - having headline information about the other consultations at our events
  - seeking to avoid holding events or running advertisements and press releases on the same dates and times as other consultations, where appropriate
  - ensuring that any responses submitted to our statutory consultation that are intended for another consultation is passed on to the relevant community relations or consultation team.

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

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the draft Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC) for the Sea Link project, I have provided my comments below.

<u>General comment</u> – Clarification is required regarding the scope of the SoCC, in sections of the document it appears as though the document is primarily focussed on the Suffolk proposals, whilst in other areas of the document the activities to be undertaken in Kent are included. It should be clear at the start of the document what proposals this SoCC relates to, in addition to this, if there is a separate SoCC for Kent, this should be clearly stated. It would be helpful if the front of the document was labelled accordingly to reflect this.

#### <u>Section 1.1 – Purpose of the document</u>

Paragraph 1.1.4 – Please can you amend 'East Suffolk District Council' to 'East Suffolk Council'.

#### <u>Section 1.2 – Nationally Significant Infrastructure Projects</u>

Paragraph 1.2.5 – It would be helpful to clarify within this paragraph that the section of 'new 400kV overhead electric line of more than 2km in length' is proposed within the Kent onshore section of the works to avoid any confusion being raised, that a section of overhead line is being proposed in East Suffolk.

#### <u>Section 2.2 – The proposed project</u>

Paragraph 2.2.4 – Is the following statement correct – 'installation of HVDC underground cables between the landfall on the Suffolk coast and the new proposed Friston Substation'. Should this not refer to the HVDC cables going to the proposed converter station? The proposals also do not include reference to the potential to provide ducting and colocation opportunities at the converter site for future projects, reference to this should be included.

Paragraph 2.2.5 – Reference is made to the extant consent secured by SPR for East Anglia One North and East Anglia Two but the acronym utilised for East Anglia One North is '(EA1)', this should be amended to '(EA1N)' to avoid confusion with the existing East Anglia One project connected at Bramford.

Section 2.2 – includes a breakdown of the elements which form part of the Suffolk Onshore Scheme but no details of the Offshore Scheme and Kent Onshore Scheme referenced in paragraph 2.2.3 are provided. It would be useful to include a brief summary of these elements in this section in addition to the Suffolk Onshore Scheme. Whilst it is recognised that these elements are out of scope of this SoCC, this provides useful background information. This would also be helpful as there is mention earlier in the document of some of the infrastructure required as part of the Kent proposals i.e. the new section of overhead line.

#### Section 2.3 – Consultation and engagement to date

Paragraph 2.3.5 – It is noted that 609 feedback responses were received during the non-statutory consultation, do you have information on how these responses broke down between the regions which could be included?

Paragraph 2.3.6 – Details of how this issue will be addressed within the statutory consultation to ensure it does not occur again should be included?

#### <u>Section 2.4 – Project Timeline</u>

Figure 2.2 – It is welcomed that a project timeline has been included in the SoCC, it would be beneficial if the timeline was more detailed, for example if it provided an indication of the quarter of the year that the events are likely to occur. Given the number of NSIPs facing the region, greater clarity on programme is needed for all stakeholders.

#### Section 3 – Consulting on the proposed application - Section 3.1 – When will the consultation take place?

Paragraph 3.1.1 – It is noted that postal responses will be accepted until 2 January and this is welcomed, but the deadline for electronic responses is 18 December. It is requested that the deadline for both the postal and electronic submission is 2 January, it can be made clear within the text that this additional time has been provided to ensure that postal submissions are received. It is however felt that separate deadlines, with a longer deadline provided for postal submissions, penalises those providing submissions electronically and makes submitting a response through the post more favourable, which would allow respondents to maximise time within the consultation. ESC would also welcome this additional time as there is concern that meeting a 8 week deadline will be challenging and previous NSIP projects have allowed a longer period than 8 weeks at the statutory consultation stage to take account of the significant volume of information to review.

#### Section 3.2 – What will be consulted on?

Paragraph 3.2.1 – The list provided does not include any reference to future projects, coordination, the potential to provide ducting or co-locate facilities which it is assumed that the project would want to receive comments in relation to during the consultation. Reference to this should be included.

In this section is important to provide clarity regarding the scope of the consultation which should include making a note of what will not be consulted upon, for example any coordinated options coming being taken forward following the grant of OCSS funding, if this is the case. This will help set clear expectations.

#### <u>Section 3.3 – Who will be consulted?</u>

Paragraph 3.3.4 – It is noted that SoCC states that only the parish councils within the PCZ will be consulted. It is requested that parishes within the SCZ should also be consulted.

In reference to the elected representatives, it should be clarified that this relates to the PCZ and SCZ.

Local residents have not been specifically identified within the bullet points in paragraph 3.3.4 and for clarity an additional bullet should be included to make this commitment. Whilst paragraph 3.3.5 references the local community, it is not clear if this is referring to the bullet points above or whether this is referring to residents within the PCZ and SCZ. Based on later paragraphs within the SoCC it is understood that local residents within the PCZ will be provided a consultation pack and therefore be directly consulted, this should be reflected in this section.

#### <u>Section 3.4 – Consultation materials</u>

Table 3.1 – It is stated that all the materials will be targeted at 'all those interested in the consultation' and reference made to Section 3.3. Whilst I can make a guess as to the exact meaning of this statement it is not clear and open to interpretation. For example will all those identified within Section 3.3 receive the materials identified automatically? Or do these have to be requested? The use of the term 'interested' also adds to the ambiguity of the statement.

It is welcomed that the newsletter will be posted to all properties within the PCZ. This should also be sent to all the stakeholders identified within Section 3.3.

It is noted that printed copies of the majority of documents will be available upon request at no extra charge which is welcomed. It is requested that the parish and town councils be contacted to ask whether they would like printed versions in advance of the consultation starting so that if this is required they do not need to worry about losing any time during the consultation making this request and waiting for it to be actioned.

The project update documents should also include a clear explanation of the need case as this has previously caused confusion.

Table 3.2 states that an interactive project map will be available which sounds like a very useful tool. It is requested that a layer be added to this map to provide details of the other consented and proposed projects affecting the same locality i.e. EA1N, EA2, SZC, Nautilus, LionLink. For the consented projects this could comprise the consented Order Limits and the proposed projects the current onshore options.

#### Section 3.5 – Promoting the consultation

Paragraph 3.5.4 – It is noted that site notices will be displayed at key locations along the route, this should include affected parish notice boards in addition to public rights of way adjacent to the Order Limits.

#### Section 3.6 – Public information exhibitions

Table 3.3 – It is considered that an information exhibition should be held in or as close to the areas where the permanent infrastructure is proposed. It is therefore considered that an exhibition should be held at Friston given the potential for a new substation to be required should the Friston substation not be constructed under the EA1N and EA2 DCOs. If Friston village hall is not considered appropriate, could an event not be held in Knodishall village hall?

The inclusion of events in the morning, afternoon, evening and weekends is welcomed. It is important that the representatives from NGET attending these events are not only fully briefed on the Sea Link project but are also fully informed about challenges being faced in East Suffolk by the other consented and proposed NSIPs.

#### Section 3.7 - Webinars

Paragraph 3.7.1 – Only two webinars are proposed to be held, one on the Suffolk proposals and one on the Kent proposals. During the previous non-statutory consultation 6 were held across the two counties. Whilst I appreciate that addition forms of sessions are being held i.e. 'Ask the Experts', webinars allow those who cannot attend the in person events to gain valuable information about the project in an easily digestible manner. It is requested that additional webinars are held within the first half of the consultation period.

Paragraph 3.7.6 – It is requested that the questions raised and answers during the webinars provided are included within a written document which is published on the website following the events.

#### Section 3.8 – 'Ask the Expert' sessions

Section 3.8 – the 'Ask the Expert' sessions are welcomed.

#### Section 3.9 – Stakeholder briefings and meetings

Paragraph 3.9.1 – it is considered that the elected representatives from the districts and country councils in both the PCZ and SCZ should be included in the offer of briefing meetings. It is also considered that parish and town councils within the SCZ should be offered a briefing meeting. The AONB Partnership is not identified within the organisations listed in 3.9.1, it is considered that they should be added to the list.

There is no mention in Section 3.9 of tourist boards such as the Destination Management Organisation who it would be useful to include.

#### <u>Section 3.10 – Seldom heard groups</u>

Section 3.10 refers to 'seldom heard groups', in addition to those identified a potentially hard to reach group are likely to also be second home owners, consideration should be given to this group within the SoCC given the nature of the area affected by the development.

#### Section 4 – Responses to the consultation – Section 4.1 – Methods of responding

Paragraph 4.1.4 – As referred to above, it is requested that all forms of submission are accepted until 2 January with reference made to the fact that this deadline has been extended to accommodate postal submissions. This then does not allow one form of submission to appear to be receiving preferential treatment over another.

#### Section 4.4 – Other developers' consultations

Paragraph 4.4.2 – It is requested that a representative from NGV in relation to both the Nautilus and LionLink projects is available at the in person consultation events and briefing sessions provided.

#### Appendix A

Appendix A – The background map utilised makes it difficult to interpret, a different background map may make this clearer. It is important that the PCZ and SCZ is easy to identify with reference to landmarks.

The map does not illustrate the onshore Order Limits, it is important that a drawing to illustrate the onshore area is provided within the SoCC. This drawing should be clear and easy to understand. This is also particularly important as the PCZ and SCZ have been identified based on a set distance from the onshore Order Limits.

#### **Statement of Community Consultation**

Thank you for consulting Dover District Council in respect of the draft Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC) which was received on 22<sup>nd</sup> June 2023, pursuant to the requirement under section 47(2) of the Planning Act 2008 (the Act) for National Grid to consult with each local authority regarding what is intended to be included in National Grids SoCC for the above project. Our comments are set out below, with reference to the relevant paragraphs of the SoCC.

#### Paragraph 3.3.4

A full list of consultees should be published to provide clarification of the seldom heard groups, local interest groups, community groups, groups with particular specialisms and marine users as no details are provided and there may be other groups, such as Sandwich Chamber of Commerce, which should be included.

#### Table 3.1

Newsletter – It should be confirmed within the description section that the website address for the National Grid Project will be included within the newsletter and that the locations of the public information exhibitions will also be included.

Plans and drawings – It is noted that these will be used throughout the consultation materials listed. These should be included in the project update document (at a minimum as appendices) to clearly show the locations and scale of different elements of the project within each area, to aid visualisation of the project. Maps should also be included.

#### Paragraph 3.5.1

No details are provided of many residents and business are located within the primary and secondary consultation zones. It would be useful if this could be specified. It is expected that all registered addresses within the primary consultation zone would be contacted – schools, religious buildings, as well as businesses etc. as part of the whole community within the vicinity of the project.

#### Paragraph 3.5.2

Advertisements would be placed within the listed newspapers, however it is not stated if the advertisements would also be placed on their associated websites. This may reach a wider

audience within the consultation zones who may not use social media, or may read online news articles only.

#### Paragraph 3.5.5

It is not clear if parish councils be requested to display posters (e.g. on parish noticeboards) and if so, what type of posters are intended. Posters to parish councils should also be sent in a digital format so that they can be shared via online parish newsletters and parish social media pages, preferably with interactive links to the National Grid project website where further information is available.

#### Paragraph 3.5.6

It should be clarified if the targeted advertisements on social media (Facebook and Instagram) would be limited to the primary consultation zone (PCZ) or would also include the secondary consultation zone (SCZ) and if they would be targeted to postcodes within the consultation zones. The SCZ would otherwise only appear to be covered by local newspaper advertisements and information provided at the deposit points of Ash Library and Sandwich Library.

#### Paragraph 3.6

It is noted that no public information exhibitions would be held within the Dover District. Whilst noting that there was a limited public turnout to the event held at the Sandwich Guildhall on Thursday 17<sup>th</sup> November 2022 in relation to the non-statutory consultation, subsequent discussions with the project team indicated that the consultation methods would be examined to encourage more engagement with the community within the Kent consultation zones. Whilst two events would be held within the Kent area, both would be within the Thanet District. No details of the exact times or locations of the public information exhibitions are included in the document and should be provided. This information should also be shared with nearby Parish and Town Councils (who's boundaries fall partly within the primary and secondary consultation zones) and included on posters, together with details of the time, date and website address for the webinar discussing the Kent proposals (Paragraph 3.7).

#### Paragraph 3.7.6

It should be confirmed if the recording of the webinar will be kept on the website for the duration of the consultation period and if information will be included on the same website page directing members of the public to information on how to register for a webinar or to submit a question.

#### Paragraph 3.9.1

It is noted that briefing meetings will be offered to parish councils where all or part of the parish falls within the PCZ. In respect of the Dover District, this includes Ash Parish Council, Woodnesborough Parish Council, Sandwich Town Council and Worth Parish Council.

Dover District Council appreciates the opportunity to make the above comments and trust that they will be of assistance and will be taken into account.

Thank you for providing Kent County Council (the County Council) with the opportunity to comment on the Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC) for the proposed National Grid Sea Link project which involves the reinforcement of the electricity transmission network between Suffolk and Kent.

The County Council welcomes this early engagement with the applicant and would welcome further opportunities throughout the planning, design and development of this proposal in respect of the County Council's statutory and non-statutory roles across Kent.

The County Council has reviewed the SoCC and would like to provide the following comments on the document, as set out below.

#### 2. The Sea Link Project

#### 2.2 The proposed Project

<u>Engagement:</u> The County Council recognises that the document summarises the main elements of the Suffolk Onshore Scheme, however, this level of detail has not been provided for the Kent Onshore Scheme. It is therefore recommended that the document is revised to include a summary of the key project infrastructure requirements for Kent.

In respect of paragraph 2.2.5, the County Council would advise that the following sentence is amended to provide clearer understanding for all those reading the document:

"It is anticipated that Friston Substation will be constructed under the extant existing development consent secured by Scottish Power Renewables (SPR) for the East Anglia One (EA1) North and Two (EA2) Offshore Windfarm Projects."

#### 2.3 Consultation and engagement to date

Table 2.1 - Key statistics from non-statutory consultation

<u>Engagement:</u> The County Council recommends that the formatting in Table 2.1 would benefit from a comprehensive review to ensure that the text size is consistent across the figures used.

In respect of paragraph 2.3.6, the County Council would suggest that the following sentence is simplified to provide clarity, as not all readers of the document will understand the definition of "prescribed consultees":

"Following a back-check and review of the prescribed consultees who had been notified of the non-statutory consultation, it was identified that some had not been contacted".

#### 2.4 Project Timeline

Figure 2.3 DCO process

<u>Engagement:</u> The County Council notes that the text in Figure 2.3 is blurred when viewing at 100% zoom on the screen. The County Council would therefore suggest that the resolution is improved to enable all users to access and view the document.

#### 3. Consulting on the proposed application

#### 3.2 What will be consulted on?

<u>Engagement:</u> In respect of paragraph 3.2.2, the County Council would advise replacing *"consultation bodies"* with '**consultees**' to cover all stakeholders, including residents.

It is noted that access to digital copies of the Preliminary Environmental Information Report (PEIR) will be made available at deposit points. The County Council requests clarification on this matter to confirm whether the document is referring to paper / hard copies at deposit points.

#### 3.3 Who will be consulted?

<u>Engagement:</u> The County Council recognises that parish councils representing parishes within the Primary Consultation Zone (PCZ) will be consulted. The County Council would request clarification as to why parishes within the Secondary Consultation Zone, or on the border of the PCZ, are not also being consulted.

<u>Engagement:</u> The County Council would advise that the fourth and ninth bullet points of the "Older people" seldom heard category are combined, to avoid repetition of the "Ask the Experts" engagement method. This is also recommended for the sixth and ninth paragraphs of the "People with limited mobility/disability" seldom heard category.

In respect of the engagement methods for the "People with visual impairments" seldom heard category, the County Council recommends that all documents on the website are digitally accessible.

The County Council would advise that a ten minute summary of the PEIR statutory consultation is provided to the "15-19 and 20-39 age groups" seldom heard category as an engagement method. The County Council would also request the inclusion of hard copies of questionnaires for young people.

Thank you for consulting Suffolk County Council (SCC) on your draft Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC) for the Sea Link grid reinforcement proposals.

Having reviewed the SoCC, SCC is satisfied that the proposed approach meets the current industry standard and reflects established practice in relation to Nationally Significant Infrastructure Projects (NSIPs).

However, an additional workstream, to facilitate effective and active dialogue between the host community and the project promoter is essential, when considering the following issues: -

- The scale, extent, and duration of the impact of the proposed development, both in isolation and in combination with other developments in the vicinity of the Sea Link scheme.
- The inability of the current consultation arrangements for NSIPs, to create an
  effective dialogue between host communities and the project promoter.
- The inability of established industry consultation practice to develop trust, or confidence, in either the process of consultation or its outcomes.<sup>1</sup>
- The role of the promoter as a regulated public monopoly, providing an essential service, and as a responsible corporate body that prioritises "our responsibilities to our different but interrelated stakeholder groups and wider society." 2

#### LOCATION: RICHBOROUGH, KENT

Thank you for providing us with the opportunity to comment on the draft Statement of Community Consultation (SOCC).

#### **Consultation Materials**

The consultation materials and presentation methods are considered to be comprehensive. The ability to request printed copies of the document to be posted free of charge (it is noted this excludes the PEIR) and also make an appointment to 'Ask the Experts' is welcomed.

Copies of all the consultation documents should be available on the proposed website as HTML and downloadable pdf documents, for ease of use for the community. Any pdf document should be capped in size to allow ease of viewing/download. The SOCC should be updated to reflect this.

The website should allow free-text responses to the proposal, to ensure that those that wish to comment in this manner rather than via a feedback form, are not excluded from the consultation process. The SOCC should be updated to reflect this.

The website shall meet level AA of the Web Content Accessibility Guidelines (WCAG 2.1) as a minimum, with the SOCC updated to state these requirements as well as including screen magnifiers and speech recognition tools as assisted technologies.

#### **Promoting the Consultation**

The Council considers that the extent of the Primary Consultation Zone (PCZ) of 3km is adequate and the intention to contact all addresses within the PCZ with a Consultation Pack is welcomed. The SOCC should include a draft of the consultation newsletter, feedback form, letters and emails to be sent to residents, businesses and interested parties, to allow for comment on this part of the consultation.

With regards to promoting the consultation we would suggest that in addition to the news outlets proposed, the consultation is advertised in local papers in Thanet namely the KM Thanet Extra (a free newspaper and online publication) and through the Isle of Thanet News (an online news outlet). The East Kent Mercury (which serves Deal and Sandwich within the Dover District) has also been suggested for completeness.

#### **Public Information Exhibitions**

It is recommended that a Central Ramsgate location (perhaps held at the Town Council) is added to the public information exhibitions/'Ask the Experts' sessions and the SOCC is updated to reflect this.

The public information exhibitions and 'Ask the Experts' sessions are to be held in the morning/afternoon. Details have not been provided as to the hours proposed for these but ideally the afternoon sessions would run until late afternoon/early evening to support engagement. It is noted that at least one public information event within the District will be held on a weekend and the webinars will be evening sessions.

#### **Stakeholder Briefings and Meetings**

The Council requests that stakeholder briefing meetings as identified under paragraph 3.9.1 occur prior to the consultation period for awareness and to ensure they have the chance to comment on the proposal during the statutory consultation period. The SOCC should be updated to reflect this.

#### **Seldom Heard Groups**

The Council will continue to work with National Grid to identify seldom heard groups within the District and improve inclusivity in consultation.

#### **Deposit Points**

Minster Library, Ramsgate Library and Newington Library have been identified as deposit point locations within the District. We would request that a full hard copy set of the documents is provided to Thanet District Council and a further set of hard copy documents are provided to the Council for display in Thanet Gateway.

#### **Responses to the Consultation**

The SOCC must clearly outline how personal data will be handled and protected through the consultation process in accordance with the provisions of the Data Protection Act. The SOCC should make clear that extracts of responses may be published as part of the Consultation Report and provide guidance on how those responding can withdraw their consent for this.

#### **Other Matters**

These comments are made without prejudice to the Council's formal position on the Development Consent Order application process.

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# Sea Link Document control

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#### 1. Introduction

#### 1.1 Purpose of the document

- This Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC) sets out how National Grid Electricity Transmission (NGET) intends to consult statutory consultees, stakeholders, affected residents and local communities on its proposals to build an offshore high voltage direct current (HVDC) link between Suffolk and Kent (and associated infrastructure), ahead of its application for development consent.
- The Sea Link Project ("the proposed Project") requires consent from the relevant Secretary of State via a Development Consent Order (DCO). This document has therefore been prepared in accordance with section 47(1) of the Planning Act 2008 ("the Planning Act"), which requires applicants to prepare a statement explaining how they will consult with the local community regarding their proposals, and to carry out preapplication consultation in accordance with this statement.
- As the proposed Project is an 'EIA Development' (meaning that it is subject to an environmental impact assessment or "EIA"), this SoCC therefore also sets out how NGET intends to publicise and consult on the preliminary environmental information, in accordance with Regulation 12 of The Infrastructure Planning (Environmental Impact Assessment) Regulations 2017 ("the EIA Regulations").
- In accordance with section 47(2) of the Planning Act, NGET has consulted with and had regard to comments from the following local authorities whilst developing the SoCC:
  - Suffolk County Council
  - East Suffolk Council
  - Kent County Council
  - Thanet District Council
  - Dover District Council
- The listed local authorities were consulted for 28 days, between 22 June and 20 July 2023 on the contents of this SoCC.

#### 1.2 Nationally Significant Infrastructure Projects

- Offshore transmission cables and their associated onshore infrastructure do not meet the criteria to be considered Nationally Significant Infrastructure Projects (NSIPs) under the Planning Act, meaning that permission for their construction is not normally sought via an application for development consent.
- However, on 4 March 2022 NGET wrote to the Secretary of State for Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy<sup>1</sup> ("the Secretary of State") to ask that they issue a direction on

- whether the proposed Project can be treated as a development for which development consent is required.
- On 31 March 2022, the Secretary of State issued a direction confirming that the proposed Project be treated as such, in accordance with section 35(1) of the Planning Act.
- Development consent is therefore required before construction of the proposed Project can begin. However, ancillary works (such as the reconductoring of the existing 400 kilovolt (kV) line between Canterbury and Richborough) may be progressed through separate consenting regimes or permitted development rights.
- Since the section 35(1) direction was issued, plans for the proposed Project have evolved to potentially include the installation of a new 400 kV overhead electric line of more than 2 km in length in Kent. Should this be the case, this element would meet the criteria to be classified as an NSIP under the Planning Act, meaning that development consent would be required for this aspect of the proposed Project, irrespective of the direction issued under section 35(1).
- The application for development consent will be submitted to, and examined by, the Planning Inspectorate on behalf of the Secretary of State. The Planning Inspectorate will provide a recommendation to the Secretary of State, who will ultimately decide whether to grant the development consent for the proposed Project. The development consent order process is explained in further detail in Figure 2.2.
- Before submitting an application to the Planning Inspectorate, the Planning Act requires NGET to carry out consultation, including with people living in the vicinity of the land where the proposed Project is to be sited.
- The early involvement of local communities, including local authorities and stakeholders, leads to applications that are better understood by all parties. It also helps NGET identify valuable information about the potential impacts of a scheme, providing the opportunity for mitigation measures to be considered and, where appropriate, built into designs, before an application is submitted and considered.

#### 1.3 Environmental Impact Assessment


- The proposed Project is an 'EIA Development'. On 24 October 2022, NGET submitted a Scoping Report to the Secretary of State for Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy, to inform the Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) for the proposed Project.
- 1.3.2 Within this Scoping Report, NGET gave formal notification under Regulation 8(1)(b) of the EIA Regulations that it considers the proposed Project to meet the criteria outlined in Schedule 3 of the EIA Regulations to be considered as 'EIA Development'.
- A scoping opinion for the proposed Project was adopted by the Planning Inspectorate (on behalf of the Secretary of State) on 1 December 2022.

#### 1.4 About National Grid Electricity Transmission plc

National Grid sits at the heart of Great Britain's energy system, connecting millions of people and businesses to the energy they use every day. We bring energy to life: in the heat, light and power we bring to our customer's homes and businesses; in the way that

- we support our communities and help them to grow; and in the way we show up in the world. It is our vision to be at the heart of a clean, fair and affordable energy future.
- 1.4.2 Within the National Grid Group there are distinctly separate legal entities, each with their individual responsibilities and roles (see Figure 1.1). The roles of these are summarised below. The proposed Project is being promoted by National Grid Electricity Transmission.
- National Grid Electricity Transmission (NGET) holds the transmission licence for England and Wales under the Electricity Act 1989. NGET owns, builds, and maintains the high voltage electricity transmission system in England and Wales the overhead lines, buried cables and substations that carry power around the country.
- In 2022, Western Power Distribution became part of the National Grid Group and is now **National Grid Electricity Distribution (NGED)**. It is the local distribution network operator for the Midlands, South West of England and South Wales.
- The **Electricity System Operator (ESO)** controls the movement of electricity around the country, transporting power from generators (such as wind farms) to local distribution network operators, like NGED and UK Power Networks (UKPN), ensuring that supply meets demand.
- National Grid Ventures sits outside the core regulated businesses, investing in technologies and partnerships that help accelerate our move to a clean energy future. That includes interconnectors connecting the UK with countries across the North Sea, allowing trade between energy markets and efficient use of renewable energy resources.
- 1.4.7 Both NGET and the ESO are licensed by the Government as electricity transmission companies and are regulated by the Office of Gas and Electricity Markets (Ofgem), which sets price controls and monitors how the companies develop and operate their networks on behalf of consumers.

- 1.4.8 NGET has a statutory duty to develop and maintain an efficient, coordinated and economical system of electricity transmission under the Electricity Act 1989 ("the Electricity Act"). This includes a statutory obligation to offer to connect any new generating stations or interconnectors applying to connect to the transmission system.
- NGET is also required, under section 38 of the Electricity Act, to comply with the provisions of Schedule 9 of the Electricity Act. Schedule 9 requires licence holders, in the formulation of proposals to transmit electricity, to preserve amenity by:
  - Schedule 9(1)(a) '...have regard to the desirability of preserving natural beauty, of conserving flora, fauna and geological or physiographical features of special interest and of protecting sites, buildings and objects of architectural, historic or archaeological interest;' and
  - Schedule 9(1)(b) '...do what [it] reasonably can to mitigate any effect which the proposals would have on the natural beauty of the countryside or on any such flora, fauna, features, sites, buildings or objects'.
- How we set out to meet these environmental responsibilities and our commitments relating to engagement and consultation about proposals, is explained in our Stakeholder, Community and Amenity Policy.

## 2. The Sea Link Project

#### 2.1 Background

- 2.1.1 The way we power the things we love is changing. In the years ahead, more of our energy will come from renewable and low carbon sources of electricity as part of the transition towards a net zero future.
- There has already been a significant shift in how energy is generated in the UK. Last year, coal was responsible for meeting just 1.5% of our energy needs, compared to 43% back in 2012. This is because more of the energy we use is coming from offshore wind, nuclear power and trading energy through interconnectors with other neighbouring countries. At the same time, demand for electricity is set to increase as other sectors of the economy are decarbonised through electrification, such as heating and transport.
- 2.1.3 Whilst the existing high voltage electricity network has been sufficient until now, it does not have the capability needed to reliably and securely transport all the energy that will be connected in the years ahead. To make sure everyone has access to the clean, affordable energy they need in the decades ahead, we need to deliver the largest overhaul of the electricity grid in generations.
- As much of the new renewable and low carbon electricity generation planned for the UK is expected to be installed along the east coast, National Grid is investing significantly in upgrading the existing network. It also needs to build new infrastructure, such as Sea Link, to ensure that power can be transported from where it is generated to where it is needed.
- All of this work forms part of The Great Grid Upgrade National Grid's programme to deliver over five times the amount of electricity transmission infrastructure in the next seven years than has been built in the last 30 years.

#### 2.2 The proposed Project

- 2.2.1 National Grid Electricity Transmission (NGET) is proposing to reinforce the network between Suffolk and Kent via a new, primarily offshore, 2 GW high voltage direct current (HVDC) link.
- Sea Link has been designed to increase the capability of the network to carry low carbon and renewable energy from where it is generated to homes and businesses across the country.
- 2.2.3 The proposed Project is split into three elements, which are outlined as follows:
  - Suffolk Onshore Scheme;
  - Offshore Scheme; and
  - Kent Onshore Scheme.
- The Suffolk Onshore Scheme requires construction of the following key infrastructure to facilitate the HVDC Link, including:

- a connection from the existing transmission network via the proposed Friston substation, including the National Grid part of the substation itself. The proposed Friston substation already has development consent as part of other third-party projects. If the proposed Friston substation has already been constructed under another consent, only a connection into the substation would be constructed by Sea Link
- a high voltage alternating current (HVAC) underground cable of approximately 1.7 km in length between the proposed Friston Substation and a proposed converter station (below)
- a 2 GW high voltage direct current (HVDC) converter station up to 26 metres high plus external equipment (such as lightning protection and railings for walkways) near Saxmundham
- a HVDC underground cable connection of approximately 10 km in length between the proposed converter station near Saxmundham, and a transition joint bay approximately 900 metres inshore from a landfall point (below) where the cable transitions from onshore to offshore technology
- a landfall on the Suffolk coast (between Aldeburgh and Thorpeness).
- Our proposals in Suffolk have been developed for Sea Link as a standalone project, but also include opportunities to co-locate infrastructure for up to two further projects at the converter station, along the cable corridors and at the landfall location.
- 2.2.6 The Offshore Scheme comprises:
  - approximately 130 km of subsea HVDC cable, running between the Suffolk landfall location (between Aldeburgh and Thorpeness), and the Kent landfall location at Pegwell Bay.
- 2.2.7 The Kent Onshore Scheme comprises:
  - a landfall point on the Kent coast at Pegwell Bay
  - a transition joint bay approximately 800 metres inshore to transition from offshore HVDC cable to onshore HVDC cable, before continuing underground for approximately 2 km to a proposed new converter station (below)
  - a 2 GW HVDC converter station, up to 26 metres high plus external equipment (such as lightning protection and railings for walkways), near Minster. A new substation would be located immediately adjacent
  - removal of up to 1 km of existing HVAC overhead line, and installation of approximately 2.25 km of new HVAC overhead line from the converter station and substation near Minster and the existing Richborough to Canterbury overhead line.
- The proposed Project also includes modifications to sections of existing overhead lines in Suffolk and Kent, diversions of third-party assets, and land drainage from the construction and operational areas. It also includes opportunities for environmental mitigation, compensation and enhancement (such as hedgerow creation, native tree planting or funding local wildlife groups).
- The construction phase will involve various temporary construction activities including working areas for construction equipment and machinery, site offices, storage,

accesses, bellmouths, and haul roads, as well as watercourse crossings and the diversion of public rights of way.

#### 2.3 Consultation and engagement to date

- NGET held a non-statutory consultation on the proposed Project between 24 October and 18 December 2022.
- 2.3.2 The consultation had the following aims:
  - to introduce the proposed Project to the public, providing an overview of the proposed Project and why the reinforcement is needed
  - to set out options that have been considered and the decision-making undertaken so far
  - to present early plans, including proposed cable corridors, HVDC converter sites and landfall locations
  - to provide an opportunity for stakeholders and those interested in the project to give their feedback on our work-to-date
  - to outline the next steps and onward programme for the development of the proposed Project.
- Over the course of the non-statutory consultation, the Project Team held four face-to-face public information events, two landowner information events, six online webinars and nine stakeholder briefings. The consultation was advertised through a mixture of direct mailings, email updates, newspaper, and social media adverts. Consultation materials were made available online and for inspection at 20 deposit points in the vicinity of the proposed Project. Dedicated contact channels were also established for those who had questions about the proposed Project. This engagement and advertisement activity in Suffolk and Kent is summarised in **Table 2.1**.



- 2.3.4 NGET provided a number of ways for members of the public and those interested in the consultation to give their feedback. These included:
  - completing an online feedback form on the Project's website (<u>nationalgrid.com/sealink</u>)
  - completing a paper feedback form or sending written comments by post (Freepost SEA LINK)
  - emailing feedback to the Project's email address (<a href="contact@sealink.nationalgrid.com">contact@sealink.nationalgrid.com</a>)
  - calling the Project's information line
- 2.3.5 340 responses to the feedback form on the proposals in Suffolk and 120 responses to the feedback form on the proposals in Kent were submitted as part of the non-statutory consultation.
- The list of consultees is kept under ongoing review. In instances where additional prescribed consultees were identified following non-statutory consultation, these were subsequently contacted and given the opportunity to engage with the proposed Project. We have continued to review the list of consultees as the proposed Project has developed, to ensure that it is maintained and up-to-date. All prescribed consultees will be contacted formally and consulted as part of the statutory consultation.
- In addition to the consultation periods detailed previously, the proposed Project has engaged with key stakeholders through meetings and other forms of discussion on a regular basis. These stakeholders include local authorities, the Marine Management Organisation, Natural England, the Environment Agency, and Historic England.
- 2.3.8 More information on the non-statutory consultations carried out can be found in the Non-Statutory Consultation Report, which is part of the suite of documents published at statutory consultation. Archive documents from the non-statutory consultation will remain available on the Project's website. Paper copies will be available on request and subject to a printing charge outlined in **paragraph 3.5.8.**

#### 2.4 Project Timeline

2.4.1 Figure **2.1** sets out an indicative timeline for each stage of the proposed Project, from consultation through to the decision from the Secretary of State and construction.


Figure 2.1 Project Timeline

## 3. Consulting on the proposed application

#### 3.1 When will the consultation take place?

The statutory consultation will run for a period of eight weeks. It will take place between 24 October 2023 and 18 December 2023. All responses to the consultation must be received before 23:59 on the closing date. Postal responses will be accepted until 2 January 2024.

#### 3.2 What will be consulted on?

- National Grid Electricity Transmission (NGET) will seek views and feedback on all aspects of the proposed Project, including the:
  - proposed Friston substation
  - proposed offshore route of the high voltage direct current (HVDC) cable, from landfall to landfall
  - proposed onshore route of the HVDC cable, from landfall to converter station
  - proposed landfall locations in Suffolk and Kent
  - proposed route of the high voltage alternating current (HVAC) link between the Suffolk converter station and the proposed Friston substation
  - potential for coordination and co-location of infrastructure with other forthcoming infrastructure projects
  - proposed HVAC overhead line between the Minster converter station and substation, and the Canterbury to Richborough 400 kV overhead line
  - construction methodology
  - likely environmental affects arising from the proposed Project
  - approach to biodiversity net gain and mitigation of potential environmental impacts.
- While comments are welcomed on all aspects of the proposed Project, this statutory consultation is not a means of influencing or contributing to separate exercises being undertaken by the Government and other bodies, such as the Offshore Coordination Support Scheme.
- The proposed Project continues to evolve in response to consultation feedback and further technical and design assessments. The statutory consultation presents a snapshot in time. Documents such as the Preliminary Environmental Information Report (PEIR) will allow consultees to develop an informed view of the likely significant environmental effects of the development. It will outline any limitations on the current assessments. If any substantive changes are made to the design of the proposed Project following this statutory consultation, NGET will consider whether there is a requirement for further consultation (see **section 4.3**).
- The full PEIR will be available on the Project's website, with a link to this shared with the relevant consultees set out in the EIA Regulations. Access to digital copies of the PEIR

will be available at deposit points, with printed paper copies of the PEIR only available on request and subject to a printing charge outlined in **paragraph 3.5.8**. Paper copies of the non-technical summary of the PEIR will be available at deposit points and on request. A fee will not be charged for paper copies of the non-technical summary of the PEIR.

As part of the application for development consent, an Environmental Statement (ES) will be prepared. This document will present an assessment of likely significant effects arising from the proposed Project and potential mitigation where appropriate, based on the details of the proposals submitted with the application for development consent.

#### 3.3 Who will be consulted?

- Principally, this consultation is open to anyone who is interested in the proposed Project. All views are welcomed, and NGET will have regard to all comments and feedback when developing the details of the proposed Project for our application for development consent.
- Under section 47 of the Planning Act, NGET has a duty to consult the local community. Two consultation zones have been developed to assist engagement with the local community.
- The Primary Consultation Zone (PCZ) extends 3 km from the proposed draft Order Limits for the proposed Project onshore, whilst the Secondary Consultation Zone (SCZ) extends to at least 5 km from the draft Order Limits for the proposed Project (including the PCZ) onshore. The draft Order Limits are the proposed outer limits of the land required either on a temporary or permanent basis to deliver the proposed Project. Appendix A sets out the boundaries of these two consultation zones.
- 3.3.4 NGET will also directly consult the following groups and individuals:
  - All residential and business addresses within the PCZ
  - Parish councils representing parishes within the PCZ
  - Members of Parliament (MPs) representing constituencies within and bordering the PCZ and SCZ
  - elected representatives in local authorities within the PCZ
  - 'seldom heard groups' within both consultation zones who have been drawn to our attention, representing people who are unlikely to respond to traditional consultation techniques, and may need additional support to access materials
  - relevant local interest groups, such as residents' associations, community groups and groups with particular specialisms, such as environmental groups
  - relevant marine users such as fisheries, developers and existing infrastructure owners.

In addition to the local community, NGET will consult prescribed bodies<sup>2</sup> and local authorities as required under section 42(1)(a), (aa) and (b) of the Planning Act and undertake the relevant notification under the EIA Regulations. NGET will also consult Persons with an Interest in Land (PILs) under section 42(1)(d).

#### 3.4 Consultation materials

All consultation materials will also be available on the Project's website. Information will be easy to access and will be presented in a variety of ways to suit user requirements. #### 3.5 Promoting the consultation

- NGET will contact all addresses within the PCZ with a Consultation Pack (to include a newsletter, feedback form and freepost envelope). A map showing the PCZ can be found in **Appendix A**.
- The consultation will be advertised in local newspapers to provide details of where more information can be found, how to respond, and the dates of the public exhibitions. The newspapers will include:
  - Eastern Daily Press
  - East Anglian Daily Times
  - Ipswich Star
  - Kentish Gazette
  - Kent and Sussex Courier
  - KM Thanet Extra
  - East Kent Mercury
- The circulation areas of these newspapers extend across both the PCZ and SCZ, and beyond.
- The consultation will also be promoted via statutory notices published in local and national newspapers, as well as in the London Gazette, Fishing News and Lloyd's List, giving details about the consultation in accordance with section 47 and 48 of the Planning Act. Site notices displaying this information will also be placed at key locations along the route of the proposed Project.

- 3.5.5 NGET will work with parishes and local authorities across the PCZ to advertise the consultation in parish magazines, on council websites and on council social media channels. Posters will also be sent to parish councils to display and raise awareness of the consultation.
- Adverts will be placed on Facebook and Instagram to help raise general awareness of the consultation and target a broad range of demographics across the PCZ and SCZ, including those that might not otherwise engage with the consultation. These social channels have been selected due to their success during the non-statutory consultation.
- In accordance with the Government's approach to digital communication, all consultation materials will be available on our website: <a href="mailto:nationalgrid.com/sealink">nationalgrid.com/sealink</a>. Those who have enquiries in relation to the documents, plans and maps will be able to call

- 3.5.9 NGET will also consider requests for alternative formats of documents, such as translations and large print, on a case-by-case basis to take into account individual circumstances. Requests can be made using the contact details provided in **3.5.8**.

#### 3.6 Public information exhibitions

- Nine public information exhibitions will be held for communities to find out information about the proposed Project and the consultation and talk to representatives from the Project Team. The exhibitions will be held at suitable, publicly accessible venues that are within or near to the PCZ.
- Copies of all relevant consultation materials will be made available in print format at each exhibition. There will also be a series of banners to present the proposals for the proposed Project, including maps.
- Those attending the exhibitions will be encouraged to provide their feedback on the proposals.
- 3.6.4 **Table 3.3** outlines the dates, times and locations of each of the exhibitions.

- At least one of the public information events, in both Kent and Suffolk, will be held on a weekend, to ensure as broad a range of people as possible are able to attend the events.
- If, for any reason, it is unfortunately necessary to cancel a scheduled event, for example as a result of adverse weather, this information will be published on the proposed Project's website and a notice will be placed at the venue if practicable. In these circumstances NGET will also consider organising additional events if deemed to be reasonably necessary.

#### 3.7 Webinars

- A total of five webinars will be held during the consultation period.
- Two webinars will focus on a summary of the proposals in Suffolk, whilst two will summarise the proposals in Kent. All four sessions will include details of the marine proposals relevant to the proposed Project.
- A fifth, pre-recorded webinar will be shared on the project website at the start of the consultation period, providing an overview of the onshore proposals in Suffolk and Kent, along with the marine proposals.

#### 3.8 'Ask the Experts' sessions

- 'Ask the Experts' sessions will provide an opportunity for those with more detailed questions about the proposed Project and/or those unable to attend a public exhibition or webinar to speak directly with members of the Project Team. These sessions will be delivered on an appointment-only basis and will be made available in person, via telephone call or video call.
- Telephone and video call appointment slots will be offered throughout the consultation period, whilst in-person appointments will be offered during weeks that a public information exhibition is taking place. NGET will seek to hold in-person appointments at venues closer to our proposals that would not have been suitable for a full public information exhibition.

#### 3.9 Stakeholder briefings and meetings

## 4. Responses to the consultation

#### 4.1 Methods of responding

- During the consultation period, feedback can be submitted in the following ways:
  - online via the Project's website (<u>nationalgrid.com/sealink</u>)
  - by post at Freepost SEA LINK
  - by email (contact@sealink.nationalgrid.com)
- 4.1.2 Consultation responses received via any other method than those listed above, such as through social media, will not be formally recorded as part of the consultation.
- Responses provided orally, such as via telephone, will be accepted in exceptional circumstances on a case-by-case basis, where someone may not otherwise be able to respond to the consultation.
- 4.1.4 Feedback submissions sent by post will be accepted up until 2 January 2024.
- 4.1.5 Although they will not be formally included as consultation feedback, National Grid Electricity Transmission (NGET) will endeavour to have regard to feedback received after the end of the consultation.
- 4.1.6 All feedback will be handled in accordance with all applicable laws concerning the protection of personal data, including the UK General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR).
- 4.1.7 More information on how NGET will use the information collected about respondents can be found in the consultation feedback form and on the Project's website during the consultation period.

#### 4.2 Presenting the results

- As set out in **Figure 2.1**, following the close of the consultation all feedback will be collated, reviewed and analysed to understand key themes and concerns. Our proposals will be reviewed and, where practicable, refined in light of feedback.
- The proposed application will be finalised, taking into consideration the feedback received from the consultation in accordance with section 49 of the Planning Act.
- A Consultation report will be produced as part of the application for development consent, as required by section 37 (3)(c) of the Planning Act. The report will include a summary of the consultation process undertaken in accordance with this SoCC and will set out how the feedback from the consultation has shaped and influenced the proposals as submitted within the application for development consent.
- 4.2.4 Responses to the consultation and extracts of responses may be published as part of the report unless specifically stated in the response. Any responses that are published will have all personal details redacted.
- Upon receipt of an application for development consent, the Planning Inspectorate will decide whether the application meets the required standards to proceed to examination

- and will determine whether the statutory consultation process has been adequate. As part of this process, local authorities will be invited to provide an adequacy of the consultation response to the Planning Inspectorate.
- The consultation report will be available online, alongside other application documents, once an application for development consent has been submitted. Paper copies will be available from the Project Team on request and subject to a printing charge outlined in **3.5.8**.

#### 4.3 Further consultation

If, following the statutory consultation, NGET considers it is necessary to undertake further targeted statutory consultation, this would be undertaken, so far as relevant and proportionate, in accordance with the principles and methods set out in this SoCC.

#### 4.4 Other developers' consultations

- The Project Team is aware that a number of other organisations are developing proposals in the area, including:
  - NGET's Bramford to Twinstead and Norwich to Tilbury (formerly known as East Anglia GREEN) network reinforcements
  - National Grid Ventures' LionLink (formerly known as EuroLink) and Nautilus interconnectors
  - North Falls offshore wind farm
  - Five Estuaries offshore wind farm.
- 4.4.2 NGET will work to understand other local projects to ensure that the scope and context of this Project is clear in relation to the other consultations. This could include:
  - having headline information about the other consultations at our events
  - seeking to avoid holding events or running advertisements and press releases on the same dates and times as other consultations, where appropriate
  - ensuring that any responses submitted to our statutory consultation that are intended for another consultation is passed on to the relevant community relations or consultation team.
- Although we will pass on any misdirected consultation responses and provide headline information about other projects at our events, is important to note that the events set out in this SoCC form part of the Sea Link statutory consultation only. Should attendees wish to comment on other local projects, they should engage directly with the relevant project team(s) and provide their feedback to these projects directly.

Figure A.1 Suffolk PCZ and SCZ map





Figure A.2 Kent PCZ and SCZ map


