I am writing to you regarding Norwich to Tilbury and the adequacy of the consultation carried out to date, as we prepare our application for development consent.

Once the application for development consent is submitted, the Planning Inspectorate will assess whether we have complied with the pre-application procedure. As part of this process, under section 55(4)(b) of the PA2008, the Inspectorate will ask local authorities to submit an Adequacy of Consultation Representation to assist in deciding whether to accept the application for examination.

At the pre-application stage of the Nationally Significant Infrastructure Planning process, the Planning Act 2008: Pre-application stage for Nationally Significant Infrastructure Projects guidance and The Nationally Significant Infrastructure Projects: 2024 Pre-Application Prospectus introduced the Adequacy of Consultation Milestone (AoCM).

The AoCM is a written submission to the Inspectorate to allow for early consideration of the adequacy of consultation carried out by the applicant at pre-application stage. The Guidance recommends the AoCM to be no later than around 3 months before the intended date of submission of the application.

The Norwich to Tilbury AoCM will address the following aspects:

- the consultation undertaken to date;
- how the approaches set out in the Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC) have been met; and
- the way in which the consultation responses are shaping the application.

Both the Guidance and Prospectus state that the submission should also include, if available, the views and any relevant supporting material from local authorities.

As you may recall, we consulted you on the draft SoCC in March 2024. The SoCC was then finalised and published in April 2024, having regard to the responses received. The table at the end of this letter sets out the commitments made in the SoCC and how we complied with them.

I would be grateful if you would please respond by **05 May 2025** whether your Council is satisfied that National Grid has met the obligations in relation to the adequacy of consultation undertaken to date, as set out in the SoCC.

RE: ADEQUACY OF CONSULTATION FEEDBACK

Thank you for providing Basildon Borough Council with the opportunity to respond regarding the adequacy of the consultation process for the Norwich to Tilbury scheme to date. This response should be viewed alongside the submission from ECC and other host local authorities for the project.

To the best of the Council's knowledge, it is believed that National Grid has correctly identified the parties to be consulted, has complied with their duty to consult all relevant parties and carried out consultation events in line with its Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC).

However, the Council does have some observations on the process, as set out below.

The Council had regard to the information contained in the table accompanying your letter of 14th April 2025, which gave 21 days to issue a response on the adequacy of consultation. Although this was useful in terms of assessing compliance with commitments in the SoCC, it is considered that this does not comprehensively reflect the actions carried out in connection with the targeted consultation exercises in the first quarter of 2025.

The Council understands that formal stakeholder responses to the 2024 statutory consultation were appraised, and that these subsequently informed the range of localised changes proposed to the scheme's design. In turn, those proposed changes were then subject to a round of consultation (the various targeted localised consultations) in early 2025.

However, none of the feedback to last year's statutory consultation is published in the public domain. Without a "Schedule of Changes" style document being available to outline the changes proposed and explain the reasoning behind National Grid's decisions to action certain amendments and disregard others, it is difficult to gauge the merit of the changes which have been proposed, and stakeholders are unable to fully comprehend the impacts of the scheme at particular locations along the route as the data is not in the public domain.

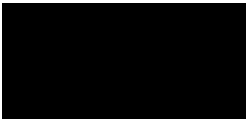
This is detrimental to the transparency of the overall process and to the design evolution of the project. Although the changes proposed through the targeted consultation within Basildon borough were relatively minor and raised no concerns, this may not be the case elsewhere on the route.

The Council understands that, in addition to the changes that were publicised and consulted on during the targeted consultation periods, there are other changes to the scheme design which were not included in the process, and, subsequently, were not subject to consultation. The Council understands this is because, in National Grid's view, some of these changes were considered to be of such a minor nature that they have no material impact on the proposed development. However, any concentration of non-material changes can be aggregated to have a bearing on their materiality, and how these would be experienced by residents of the area.

Transparency is important in the planning process, and National Grid must acknowledge the importance of feedback from residents and community representatives to ensure that the final proposal is the most appropriate. As such, all stakeholders must be provided with comprehensive information in order that they can fully understand (and thus comment on), the effect of the proposed localised changes on their properties and assets, or their general business operations where this is relevant.

Thank you for your letter dated 14th April 2025 in which you ask Braintree District Council (BDC) for comments on the adequacy of consultation carried out to date on this project during the pre-application stage, prior to the formal requirements of Section 55(4) at the acceptance stage of the DCO process.

1. Purpose of The Adequacy of Consultation Milestone (AoCM)

- 1.1. The Adequacy of Consultation Milestone (AoCM) is intended to allow early consideration of the adequacy of consultation undertaken by the applicant, to minimise any risk at the acceptance stage, of the application progressing to examination. It will help inform the Planning Inspectorate's decision on whether the consultation arrangements have been sufficient for the level of complexity of the proposed project.
- 1.2. Consultation with the public and other key stakeholders is not only a statutory requirement but is also fundamental to securing public confidence in the process. It is therefore important that as a minimum, consultation is conducted in accordance with Sections 42, 47 & 48 of the Planning Act and the published Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC).
- 1.3. In providing this response, we have had regard to the information contained in the table accompanying your letter of 14th April and although useful in terms of assessing compliance with commitments in the SoCC, it is considered it fails to comprehensively reflect what actions have been carried out in connection with the targeted consultation undertaken earlier this year. This is set out in more detail within this response.

2. Summary of Pre-Application Consultation

- 2.1. National Grid Electricity Transmission (NGET) have carried out the following consultations to which BDC has responded as part of its ongoing engagement with ECC and local residents and stakeholders.
 - i. Non-Statutory Consultation (First) – held between 21 April 2022 and 16 June 2022.

- ii. Non-Statutory Consultation (Second) – held between 27 June 2023 and 21 August 2023.
- iii. Statutory Consultation – held between Wednesday 10 April and Tuesday 18 June 2024 (extended until 26 July 2024).
- iv. Statutory Consultation – held between Wednesday 10 April and Tuesday 18 June 2024 (extended until 26 July 2024).
- v. Targeted Consultation for Essex – held between Tuesday 25 February until Thursday 27 March 2025.

3. Statutory Requirements

- 3.1. BDC's comments are centred around the pre-application stage of the DCO process and as requested, this response gives BDC's opinion as to whether National Grid Electricity Transmission (NGET), has to date complied with the following duties under the Planning Act 2008:

- Section 42 – Duty to consult
- Section 47 – Duty to consult the local community
- Section 48 – Duty to publicise

4. Section 42 – Duty to Consult

- 4.1. Section 42 of the Planning Act 2008 prescribes who should be consulted on the proposal.

The applicant must consult the following about the proposed application –

- a) *such persons as may be prescribed,*
 - a. *the Marine Management Organisation (MMO), in any case where the proposed development would affect, or would be likely to affect, any of the areas specified in subsection (2),*
- b) *each local authority that is within section 43,*
- c) *the Greater London Authority if the land is in Greater London, and*
- d) *each person who is within one or more of the categories set out in section 44.*

Subsection a) refers to 'such persons as may be prescribed'. These persons are listed in Schedule 1 to the Infrastructure Planning (Applications: Prescribed Forms and Procedure) Regulations 2009.

- 4.2. BDC is satisfied that NGET has correctly identified the parties to be consulted as required by Section 42 and to the best of BDC's knowledge, has complied with their duty to consult those parties.

5. Section 47 – Duty to Consult Local Community

- 5.1. Section 47 of the Planning Act 2008 obliges developers to prepare a Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC) in consultation with the relevant Local Authorities, publish that SoCC and then undertake statutory consultation in conformity with that statement.

- 1. The applicant must prepare a statement setting out how the applicant proposes to consult, about the proposed application, people living in the vicinity of the land.
- 2. Before preparing the statement, the applicant must consult each local authority that is within section 43(1) about what is to be in the statement.

3. The deadline for the receipt by the applicant of a local authority's response to consultation under subsection (2) is the end of the period of 28 days that begins with the day after the day on which the local authority receives the consultation documents.
4. In subsection (3) "the consultation documents" means the documents supplied to the local authority by the applicant for the purpose of consulting the local authority under subsection (2).
5. In preparing the statement, the applicant must have regard to any response to consultation under subsection (2) that is received by the applicant before the deadline imposed by subsection (3).
6. Once the applicant has prepared the statement, the applicant must—
 - (za) make the statement available for inspection by the public in a way that is reasonably convenient for people living in the vicinity of the land,
 - (a) publish, in a newspaper circulating in the vicinity of the land, a notice stating where and when the statement can be inspected, and
 - (b) publish the statement in such manner as may be prescribed.
7. The applicant must carry out consultation in accordance with the proposals set out in the statement.

- a. Section 42 of the Planning Act 2008 prescribes who should be consulted on the proposal.

- 5.2. The statutory consultation was subsequently held between 10 April 2024 and 26 July 2024 with the targeted consultation for Essex taking place between 25 February 2025 to 27 March 2025.
- 5.3. BDC has no reason to doubt that NGET undertook the consultation in a way that was in accordance with the published SoCC and accordingly has complied with the duties set out in Section 47 of the Planning Act.
- 5.4. It should be noted that the statutory consultation was extended to acknowledge the general election held on 4 July. This extension was welcomed by BDC.

6. Section 48 – Duty to Publicise

- 6.1. Section 48 of the Planning Act 2008 obliges developers to publicise their proposals by means of notices in local and national newspapers.
 1. The applicant must publicise the proposed application in the prescribed manner.
 2. Regulations made for the purposes of subsection (1) must, in particular, make provision for publicity under subsection (1) to include a deadline for receipt by the applicant of responses to the publicity.
- 6.2. BDC has no reason to doubt that NGET published the required notices and that the content of those notices complied with the requirements set out in the regulations. BDC therefore considers NGET has to the best of our knowledge and subject to the review of Consultation Report, complied with their duty to publicise under this section of the Planning Act 2008.

7. Position regarding Statutory Requirements

- 7.1. Taking the above comments into account and subject to the review of the Consultation Report, it is BDC's current opinion that NGET has carried out sufficient pre-application consultation on the proposed Norwich to Tilbury project in accordance with the agreed SoCC and in line with Sections 42, 47 and 48 of the Planning Act 2008.
- 7.2. While BDC recognises the challenges a project of this scale and complexity presents, and notwithstanding our current opinion of the minimum statutory tests being complied with, there are several observations on the consultation process and how it could be enhanced which we have set out below. These comments have been provided in the interest of ensuring that consultation on this NSIP is carried out effectively and positively, allowing communities and stakeholders to fully engage, and have their comments properly recorded and considered in a transparent process of design iteration.

8. Observations on Consultation (to date)

Consultation Feedback

- 8.1. Unfortunately, unlike for the non-statutory consultation, no feedback has been published in response to the statutory consultation undertaken in 2024. Moreover, it is understood that responses from this statutory consultation have informed the localised changes proposed to the scheme under the targeted consultation. However, without sight of any feedback on the issues raised by the public/stakeholders in their responses, it is difficult to understand the rationale behind or the merits of the changes proposed, when compared to those issues also raised by residents/stakeholders that it was felt did not warrant any change to the scheme and therefore, were not addressed.
- 8.2. It is considered this is detrimental to the transparency of the overall process and design evolution of the Project. BDC would encourage NGET to be more transparent in their publication of feedback drawing upon best practice examples on how to effectively communicate this at pre-application stage in a clear and transparent way, possibly making greater use of the community newsletter and project updates.
- 8.3. BDC would also welcome early sight of the draft consultation report so we can understand better the matters which have been raised and work collaboratively to address issues where we can.

Targeted Consultation

- 8.4. As per our Targeted Consultation response (dated 27 March 2025), BDC understands that in addition to the changes that were publicised and consulted on through the targeted consultation, there are other changes to the scheme design that were not included in this process. It is understood this is because some are considered to be of such a minor nature that they have no material impact on the proposed development as experienced by residents.
- 8.5. The importance of feedback from residents and community representatives in developing the most appropriate proposal is clearly recognised, and it is therefore important that residents are provided with comprehensive information in order that they can fully understand (and thus comment on), the effect of the proposed localised changes on their properties.
- 8.6. While it is acknowledged these changes may not be the most significant, BDC considers that to local residents who may reside close to them their significance may be greater,

and they should therefore have been given an opportunity to comment on them. The concentration of non-material changes may also have a bearing on their materiality and how they are experienced by local residents.

- 8.7. BDC is also concerned about the impact on confidence in the process if residents subsequently identify these changes and raise concerns about their effects. It would also refer to Planning Inspectorate's Nationally Significant Infrastructure Projects: Advice on Good Design which highlights the importance of transparency in the process and emphasises that a good design process includes an "effective, intentional, transparent and deliverable process".
- 8.8. Officers have previously and repeatedly, requested a list of these non-material changes, and it is extremely disappointing that residents are not being made aware of these non-material changes as well as those currently being consulted on.
- 8.9. Overall, it is considered this decision could mean it is difficult for stakeholders to fully comprehend the impacts of the scheme at particular locations.

Bespoke Consultation Zones

- 8.10. In our response to the draft SoCC provided by NGET in respect of the targeted consultation, it was noted that only those in the consultation zones would receive direct notifications. BDC highlighted the importance of community engagement around these proposed changes and the likely negative perception of the wider stakeholder group should specific re-consultation be carried out. While it is acknowledged that notification of changes for some areas was published in the community newsletter, this in BDC's opinion didn't go far enough to address the likely negative perception issues (as above).

9. Comments in respect of ES

- 9.1. BDC recognises that this is a large and complex project and welcomes the extensive engagement to date across a range of technical subjects that are informing the ES. However, it is felt that progress on the SoCG is being hampered by the lack of available detailed information to enable matters to be agreed early in the process. This makes it difficult for BDC to reach an informed position on various aspects of the project at this time.
- 9.2. BDC remains committed to front loading the resolution of issues through the pre-application phase and this situation is likely to create additional pressures at examination. This is compounded by the focus on progressing towards a fixed submission date for the DCO which is likely to impact on the time available to consider options and comments received. Additional time for the public to comment on the targeted consultation (an increase from 4 weeks to 6 weeks) was also requested in BDC's response to the draft SOCC but not agreed.
- 9.3. It is important to note that there is no suggestion of any intent by NGET to delay providing information or deliberately make understanding the full extent of the scheme's impacts difficult, but to achieve a good understanding of the scheme and its impacts requires a substantial amount of work and resources including time. It is therefore important that parties continue to work together, and that proportionate time is made available to consider and respond to the information as it is made available.
- 9.4. BDC remains hopeful that many of these outstanding matters can be satisfactorily addressed through our ongoing engagement with NGET informing the SoCG prior to the examination.

10. Scheme Revisions

- 10.1. As would be expected for a scheme of this scale and complexity, there are numerous examples where changes have been made to the proposed scheme since the first non-statutory consultation was undertaken in 2022. The fact that changes have been made as a result of consultation is of course welcomed, and BDC supports many of the changes made. We do consider however that in many cases the changes proposed do not go far enough to address the issue in question, especially across Essex more generally. Moreover, we believe that predominantly, the changes made are relatively minor in nature and to date there has not been agreement to any of the more substantive changes that have been requested by BDC and other stakeholders.
- 10.2. There remains a concern therefore that NGET have not addressed legitimate concerns held by BDC and other stakeholders on aspects of the scheme that are most in need of change whether it be because of cost or impact on programme and have not weighted the effect on new developments and communities sufficiently. It follows that if the DCO application is accepted, BDC intend to support other stakeholders to continue making representations to NGET and if necessary to the examination on changes necessary to make the scheme acceptable locally.

11. Summary & Conclusion

- 11.1. With reference to your request for comments on the adequacy of consultation carried out to date on this project during the pre-application stage, BDC is of the opinion that the consultation conducted has been sufficient to meet the legal tests at S42, 47 & 48 of the Planning Act 2008.
- 11.2. BDC welcomes and appreciates the consultation and level of engagement to date and looks forward to this positive relationship continuing. It is though considered that the project is being progressed to the extent that some of the potential changes which could have significant and obvious benefit have not been fully considered. As a result, whilst BDC and other stakeholders are working closely with NGET to develop the Statements of Common Ground, many issues remain.
- 11.3. For these reasons we believe it will be particularly important for NGET to continue meaningful engagement with stakeholders over the coming months in an effort to resolve as many of the outstanding issues as possible prior to the submission of the DCO.

Norwich to Tilbury Adequacy of Consultation Milestone

Thank you for your letter dated 14th April 2025 in which you ask Brentwood Borough Council (BBC) for comments on the adequacy of consultation carried out to date on this project during the pre-application stage, prior to the formal requirements of Section 55(4) at the acceptance stage of the DCO process.

BBC is of the understanding that the Adequacy of Consultation Milestone (AoCM) allows early assessment of whether the applicant's consultation efforts meet the required standards, reducing the risk of delays at the application acceptance stage. It helps the Planning Inspectorate determine if the consultation was appropriate for the project's complexity.

Public and stakeholder consultation is both a legal requirement and essential for building trust in the process. At a minimum, it must comply with Sections 42, 47, and 48 of the Planning Act and align with the published Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC).

BBC note National Grid Electricity Transmission (NGET) have carried out the following consultations to which the Council has responded as part of its ongoing engagement:

- I. Non-Statutory Consultation (First) – held between 21 April 2022 and 16 June 2022.
- II. Non-Statutory Consultation (Second) – held between 27 June 2023 and 21 August 2023.
- III. Statutory Consultation – held between Wednesday 10 April and Tuesday 18 June 2024 (extended until 26th July 2024). iv)
- IV. Targeted Consultation for Essex – held between Tuesday 25 February until Thursday 27 March 2025

In preparing this response, we considered the table included with your letter dated 14 April. Our comments are centered around the pre application stage of the DCO process and as requested, this response gives BBC's opinion as to whether NGET, has to date complied with the following duties under the Planning Act 2008:

- Section 42 – Duty to consult
- Section 47 – Duty to consult the local community
- Section 48 – Duty to publicise

Section 42 – Duty to Consult

Section 42 of the Planning Act 2008 prescribes who should be consulted on the proposal. BBC is satisfied that NGET has correctly identified the parties to be consulted as required by

Section 42 and to the best of BBC's knowledge, has complied with their duty to consult those parties.

Section 47 – Duty to Consult Local Community

Section 47 of the Planning Act 2008 obliges developers to prepare a Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC) in consultation with the relevant Local Authorities, publish that SoCC and then undertake statutory consultation in conformity with that statement.

BBC acknowledges that NGET conducted the consultation in accordance with the published SoCC and fulfilled its obligations under Section 47 of the Planning Act. The extension of the statutory consultation to accommodate the 4th July general election was noted and welcomed by BBC.

Section 48 – Duty to Publicise

Section 48 of the Planning Act 2008 obliges developers to publicise their proposals by means of notices in local and national newspapers.

BBC acknowledges that NGET published the required notices in compliance with regulatory content standards. BBC therefore considers that NGET has met its duty to publicise under the Planning Act 2008.

Position regarding Statutory Requirements

Given the above, it is BBC's opinion that NGET has carried out sufficient pre-application consultation on the proposed Norwich to Tilbury project in accordance with the agreed SoCC and in line with Sections 42, 47 and 48 of the Planning Act 2008. While BBC considers that the minimum statutory requirements have been met, the Council wishes to take this opportunity to formally record the following concerns.

Consultation Feedback

Unlike the non-statutory consultation, no feedback has been published following the 2024 statutory consultation. While it is understood that responses informed the localised changes presented in the targeted consultation, the absence of published feedback makes extremely difficult to assess the rationale behind these changes. It also raises questions about why some issues prompted revisions while others did not. It is believed this lack of transparency undermines confidence in the consultation process and the project's design evolution.

Moving forward BBC would greatly welcome early access to the draft Consultation Report to better understand the issues raised and to collaborate on addressing them where possible.

Targeted Consultation

BBC understands that, beyond the changes consulted on during the targeted consultation, additional design changes have been made to the scheme. These were not included in the consultation, reportedly due to their minor nature and perceived lack of material impact on residents.

While it is acknowledged these changes may not be the most significant, BBC emphasises the importance of providing residents and community representatives with clear, comprehensive information to help them understand and respond to any localised changes affecting their properties.

Even minor changes can have a significant impact on those living nearby, and residents should have been given the opportunity to comment. It is disappointing that residents are not being made aware of these non-material changes as well as those consulted on.

Scheme Revisions

Given the scale and complexity of the scheme, it is understandable that numerous changes have been made since the initial non-statutory consultation in 2022. BBC welcomes the fact that consultation has led to some revisions and supports many of the changes introduced. However, we believe that in many instances, the adjustments do not sufficiently address the underlying concerns. Most of the changes appear to be relatively minor, and to date, none of the more significant modifications requested by BBC and other stakeholders - particularly those relating to the potential impact on the viability of Dunton Hills Garden Village - have been agreed to.

This raises ongoing concerns that NGET has not adequately responded to the legitimate issues raised by BBC and others, especially where changes are most needed. These may have been overlooked due to cost implications or potential delays to the programme. Furthermore, the impact on emerging developments and new communities does not appear to have been given appropriate weight.

Should the DCO application be accepted, BBC intends to continue engaging with NGET and, if necessary, raise these matters during the examination process to advocate for the changes we believe are essential to ensure the scheme is locally acceptable.

Closing remarks

In response to your request for comments on the adequacy of consultation during the pre-application stage, BBC considers that the consultation has met the legal requirements under Sections 42, 47, and 48 of the Planning Act 2008.

However, we are concerned that the project has progressed in a way that may have limited consideration of certain potential changes that could offer clear and significant benefits. While BBC continues to work closely with NGET on the Statements of Common Ground, key issues remain unresolved.

It is therefore essential that NGET maintains meaningful engagement with stakeholders, including BBC, in the coming months to address as many of these outstanding matters as possible ahead of the DCO submission.

Response to Adequacy of Consultation Milestone

Thank you for your email dated 14 April 2025 asking Chelmsford City Council (CCC) for representations on the Adequacy of Consultation Milestone (AoCM).

Purpose of AoCM

The purpose of the AoCM is to allow early consideration of the adequacy of consultation undertaken by the applicant, to minimise any risk of the application not being accepted at the acceptance stage. It will help inform the Planning Inspectorate's decision on whether the consultation arrangements have been sufficient for the level of complexity of the proposed project.

Scope of CCC's comments

For the avoidance of doubt, these comments are made without prejudice to CCC's Adequacy of Consultation Response which will be made to the Planning Inspectorate under Section 55(4)(b) of the Planning Act 2008.

Our comments are centred around the pre application stage of the Development Consent Order (DCO) process and give CCC's consideration of whether the consultation arrangements proposed by National Grid (NG) to date are adequate for the level of the complexity of the proposed project.

Statutory requirements

CCC is aware that National Grid have a duty to comply with the following sections under the Planning Act 2008.

- Section 42 – Duty to consult
- Section 47 – Duty to consult the local community
- Section 48 – Duty to publicise

CCC will provide a full response as to whether NG has complied with these sections of the Planning Act in its Adequacy of Consultation response to the Planning Inspectorate.

Pre-application consultation

The following pre-application consultation has been undertaken so far:

- Non-Statutory Consultation (First) – held between 21 April 2022 and 16 June 2022.
- Non-Statutory Consultation (Second) – held between 27 June 2023 and 21 August 2023.
- Statutory Consultation – held between Wednesday 10 April 2024 and Tuesday 18 June 2024 (extended until 26th July 2024).
- Targeted Consultation – held between Tuesday 25 February 2025 until Thursday 27 March 2025.

Statement of Community Consultation

Section 47 of the Planning Act 2008 requires developers to prepare a Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC) in consultation with the relevant Local Authorities, publish that SoCC and then undertake statutory consultation in conformity with that statement.

NG sent CCC a draft SoCC on 1st December 2023 and we responded on 5th January 2024. The SoCC was then published for consultation in March 2024 and CCC sent a formal response on 2nd April 2024. A further draft SoCC in respect of the proposed Targeted Consultation was issued on 4th December 2024 with CCC submitting comments on 18th December 2024.

A Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC) compliance table has been submitted as part of this Adequacy of Consultation Milestone. It details National Grids commitments within the SoCC and explains how NG have complied with it, but it does not explain how NG has considered CCC's comments, nor those of other stakeholders and Members of the Public. Neither does it refer to the Targeted Consultation dated February to March this year.

It is understood that a Consultation Report; prepared in accordance with Section 37(c) of the Planning Act, will be submitted upon submission of the application and will address these concerns. In the absence of this report, it is not possible to determine whether the consultation has sufficiently considered the relevant parties concerns or whether further changes to the scheme; that would warrant additional consultation, are necessary.

Observations on Consultation

In the interests of engaging with the process, CCC has several observations on the consultation undertaken to date which are set out below.

Absence of feedback

No feedback has been published in response to the Statutory Consultation undertaken in 2024. This is concerning because it is understood that responses from the Statutory Consultation have informed the localised changes proposed to the scheme under the Targeted Consultation. Without first seeing any feedback on the issues raised in the responses received from the public / stakeholders, it is difficult for CCC to understand the rationale behind or the merits of the changes proposed under the Targeted Consultation. and Statement of Community Consultation For example, what prompted these changes, what were they in response to and why were they necessary? Further, there is silence on what other

changes were proposed by interested parties and stakeholders but were discounted by NG. For example, what did not warrant a change to the scheme and why?

The lack of information makes it difficult to determine whether additional consultation is required and is detrimental to the transparency of the overall process and the design evolution of the proposal.

Targeted Consultation - General

CCC is aware that NG are seeking to undertake further changes to the proposal without consultation. It is understood this is because some changes are considered by NG to be of a minor nature such that they would have no material impact on the proposal.

The lack of transparency on this matter is concerning as the concept of materiality is enshrined in planning law. In the absence of details of the proposed changes, it is impossible to form a view as to whether the changes are material or not and to determine the appropriate level of consultation required.

The importance of consultation and feedback from residents and other stakeholders is central to planning. It is important that they are provided with comprehensive information to enable them to respond to the effect of the proposed localised changes and that changes are made clearly and transparently.

The results and outcomes of the consultation should be published as soon as they are available and should be communicated clearly to help residents and stakeholders understand the outcomes of the consultation and what the next steps will be.

This need for transparency is highlighted in the Planning Inspectorate's Nationally Significant Infrastructure Projects: Advice on Good Design which emphasises that a good design process includes an "effective, intentional, transparent and deliverable process". It is important that residents and stakeholders understand how their comments have informed the design review of the process.

Although a change may appear to be of a minor nature to NG, a resident / stakeholder may take a differing view, and the significance of these changes may be perceived by them to be greater. For example, the movement of a pylon closer / further along the proposed alignment could materially affect a resident's perception of outlook and living conditions. Should the DCO be granted, residents/stakeholders residing near to the pylons would have to live with them in perpetuity. It is thus critical that residents and stakeholders are given the opportunity to comment on all changes affecting them and for their concerns to be considered, before moving onto the next step of the process.

CCC is further concerned that a high amount of non-material changes could lead to a cumulative change in the nature of the proposal; such that the proposal submitted for examination is materially different to the proposal presented at Statutory Consultation stage. Should this be the case, it is likely that additional Statutory Consultation may be required before the examination can commence.

Officers have previously and repeatedly requested a list of non-material changes, but these have not been forthcoming and it is extremely disappointing that this information has not been provided.

Targeted Consultation – Great and Little Waltham

At the time of writing, CCC, has raised substantive concerns to the Targeted Consultation proposals affecting Great Waltham and Little Waltham and has proposed three alternative options, If agreed by NG, they would require further consultation prior to the submission of the proposal for examination.

CCC and NG are now seeking to work together in attempt to understand and where possible resolve these concerns before examination, but it is clear that more meaningful and responsive engagement with CCC, residents and stakeholders is needed to address these concerns.

Environmental Statement (ES)

Since the Statutory Consultation, CCC appreciate that information that has been shared by NG over this period. However, CCC and other stakeholders have consistently requested additional information / amendments to the proposal in relation to the ES which has not been forthcoming.

The lack of information makes it difficult for CCC to reach an informed position on various aspects of the project as the key evidence base informing the ES is still under preparation. This affects the ability of CCC and stakeholders to inform and have meaningful discussions in attempt to resolve outstanding issues relating to the ES. This includes, but is not limited to, full identification of the level of harm that may or may not be caused by the proposal in ES terms and the need for mitigation and its effect on harm.

Submission documents

CCC recognises this is a large and complex project and welcomes the engagement undertaken so far, but to date, CCC has not seen any of the draft submission documents, including the draft DCO itself. CCC has repeatedly been requesting this information since January 2025; reiterating the need to consider the terms and content of the DCO.

CCC is particularly concerned about the timescales for discharging the requirements; as CCC will be responsible for these discharging in the event that the DCO is granted and wants to ensure that the proposed timeframes are reasonable and deliverable. CCC now understand that this information will not be shared until June 2025 at the earliest meaning the timeframe to consider and obtain legal advice in respect of the DCO prior to submission of the proposal is limited.

CCC is keen to frontload the resolution of concerns at pre-submission stage and as it is aware of the pressures of the examination process. With the submission timetable being set for late August, CCC is concerned that it will have insufficient time to interpret and productively respond to the different technical elements of the examination.

In relation to the Statement of Common Ground (SoCG), this is being hampered by the lack of available detailed information to enable matters to be agreed/disagreed. This makes it difficult for CCC to reach an informed position on various aspects of the proposal at this time.

Conclusion

CCC acknowledges and welcomes NG's involvement to date and reiterates that it remains committed to working closely with NG. CCC appreciates National Grids desire to submit the proposal in late August, but is concerned that in the interests of programme, aspects of the proposal are being fast tracked. CCC is concerned that NG have not addressed legitimate concerns held by CCC and other stakeholders because of cost or impact on the programme and have not weighted these concerns appropriately.

Accordingly CCC considers that a late August submission is likely to be premature and implores NG to undertake more active and meaningful engagement with CCC, stakeholders and residents.

Adequacy of Consultation Milestone**

Statutory Requirements

Our comments are centred around the pre application stage of the DCO process and as requested, this response gives CCC's informal opinion as to whether National Grid Electricity Transmission (NGET), has to date complied with the following duties under the Planning Act 2008:

- Section 42 – Duty to consult
- Section 47 – Duty to consult the local community
- Section 48 – Duty to publicise

Section 42 – Duty to Consult

Section 42 of the Planning Act 2008 prescribes who should be consulted on the proposal.

The applicant must consult the following about the proposed application –

- (a) *such persons as may be prescribed,*
- (aa) *the Marine Management Organisation (MMO), in any case where the proposed development would affect, or would be likely to affect, any of the areas specified in subsection (2),*
- (b) *each local authority that is within section 43,*
- (c) *the Greater London Authority if the land is in Greater London, and*
- (d) *each person who is within one or more of the categories set out in section 44.*

Subsection a) refers to 'such persons as may be prescribed'. These persons are listed in Schedule 1 to the Infrastructure Planning (Applications: Prescribed Forms and Procedure) Regulations 2009

CCC is satisfied that NGET has correctly identified the parties to be consulted as required by Section 42 and to the best of our knowledge, has complied with their duty to consult those parties.

Section 47 – Duty to Consult Local Community

Section 47 of the Planning Act 2008 obliges developers to prepare a Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC) in consultation with the relevant Local Authorities, publish that SoCC and then undertake statutory consultation in conformity with that statement.

- (1) *The applicant must prepare a statement setting out how the applicant proposes to consult, about the proposed application, people living in the vicinity of the land.*
- (2) *Before preparing the statement, the applicant must consult each local authority that is within section 43(1) about what is to be in the statement.*
- (3) *The deadline for the receipt by the applicant of a local authority's response to consultation under subsection (2) is the end of the period of 28 days that begins with the day after the day on which the local authority receives the consultation documents.*
- (4) *In subsection (3) "the consultation documents" means the documents supplied to the local authority by the applicant for the purpose of consulting the local authority under subsection (2).*
- (5) *In preparing the statement, the applicant must have regard to any response to consultation under subsection (2) that is received by the applicant before the deadline imposed by subsection (3).*
- (6) *Once the applicant has prepared the statement, the applicant must—*
 - (za) *make the statement available for inspection by the public in a way that is reasonably convenient for people living in the vicinity of the land,*
 - (a) *publish, in a newspaper circulating in the vicinity of the land, a notice stating where and when the statement can be inspected, and*
 - (b) *publish the statement in such manner as may be prescribed.*
- (7) *The applicant must carry out consultation in accordance with the proposals set out in the statement.*

CCC has no reason to doubt that NGET undertook the consultation in a way that was in accordance with the published SoCC and accordingly has complied with the duties set out in Section 47 of the Planning Act.
It should be noted that the statutory consultation was extended due to the advent of a general election.

Section 48 – Duty to Publicise

Section 48 of the Planning Act 2008 obliges developers to publicise their proposals by means of notices in local and national newspapers.

- (1) *The applicant must publicise the proposed application in the prescribed manner.*
- (2) *Regulations made for the purposes of subsection (1) must, in particular, make provision for publicity under subsection (1) to include a deadline for receipt by the applicant of responses to the publicity.*

CCC has no reason to doubt that NGET published the required notices and that the content of those notices complied with the requirements set out in the regulations. CCC therefore considers NGET has complied with their duty to publicise under this section of the PA 2008.

Position regarding Statutory Requirements

Taking the above comments into account, it is CCC's current opinion that NGET has carried out adequate pre-application consultation on the proposed Norwich to Tilbury project in accordance with the agreed SoCC and in line with Sections 42, 47 and 48 of the Planning Act 2008, noting that in practice the legal requirements are a low bar.

Notwithstanding this CCC does have several observations on the consultation process thus far as follows and questions if the consultation has met the *Gunning* principles and in particular question if consultation (both stat and non-stat) has taken place when the scheme was at a sufficiently formative stage.

Feedback (or lack of)

Unfortunately, no feedback has been published in response to the statutory consultation undertaken in 2024. It is understood that responses from this statutory consultation have informed the localised changes proposed to the scheme under the targeted consultation. However, without first seeing any feedback on the issues raised in the responses received from the public / stakeholders, it is difficult to understand the rationale behind or the merits of, the changes proposed when compared with those issues raised by residents / stakeholders that it was felt did not warrant any change to the scheme and therefore, were not addressed. This is considered this is detrimental to the transparency of the overall process and design evolution of the Project.

Targeted Consultation

CCC understands that in addition to the changes that were publicised and consulted on through the targeted consultation, there are other changes to the scheme design that were not included in this process. It is understood this is because some are considered to be of such a minor nature that they have no material impact on the proposed development as experienced by residents. The importance of feedback from residents and community representatives in developing the most appropriate proposal is clearly recognised and it is therefore important, that residents are provided with comprehensive information in order that they can fully understand (and thus comment on), the effect of the proposed localised changes on their properties. While it is acknowledged these changes may not be the most significant, CCC considers that to local residents who may reside close to them, their significance may be greater, and they should therefore have been given an opportunity to comment on them. The concentration of non-material changes may also have a bearing on their materiality and how they are experienced by local residents. CCC is also concerned about the impact on confidence in the process if residents subsequently identify these changes and raise concerns about their effects. It would also refer to Planning Inspectorate's Nationally Significant Infrastructure Projects: Advice on Good Design which highlight the importance of transparency in the process and emphasises that a good design process includes an "effective, intentional, transparent and deliverable process". It is disappointing that residents are not being made aware of these non-material changes as well as those currently being consulted on. Overall, it is considered this decision could mean it is difficult for stakeholders to fully comprehend the impacts of the scheme at particular locations.

Scheme Revisions

As would be expected for a scheme of this scale and complexity, there are numerous examples where changes have been made to the proposed scheme since the first non-statutory consultation was undertaken in 2022. The fact that changes have been made as a result of consultation is of course welcomed but CCC consider that in many cases the changes proposed do not go far enough to address the issue in question and in some cases - for example Langham, the changes are more damaging than previous iteration. Moreover, we believe that predominantly, the changes made are relatively minor in nature and to date there hasn't been agreement to any of the more substantive changes that have been requested by CCC or other LPAs and other stakeholders especially with regards to alternatives to OHLs. There remains a concern therefore that NGET have not addressed legitimate concerns held by CCC and other stakeholders on aspects of the scheme that are most in need of change whether it be because of cost or impact on programme and have not weighted the effect on new developments and communities sufficiently. It follows that if the DCO application is accepted, CCC intend to continue making representations to NGET and if necessary to the examination on changes that we think are required to the scheme to make it acceptable locally.

Webinars

The webinars held in connection with the statutory consultation were welcome, but attendance may have been limited by the fact that they were held at the same time albeit, on different days. It would have been better if the webinars were offered at a variety of times to reflect the different life patterns for local communities.

Conclusion

With reference to your request for comments on the adequacy of consultation carried out to date on this project during the pre-application stage, CCC is of the opinion that actions in respect of consultation have been sufficient to meet the legal tests at S42, 47 & 48 of the PA 2008.

CCC of course, welcomes and appreciates the consultation and level of engagement to date, and looks forward to this positive relationship continuing. However, it is considered that the process is being progressed to the extent that some of the potential changes to the project which could have significant and obvious benefit have not been fully considered. As a result, whilst CCC and other stakeholders are working closely with NGET to develop the Statements of Common Ground, many issues remain.

Adequacy of Consultation Milestone

Thank you for your letter dated 14th April 2025 in which you ask Essex County Council (ECC) for comments on the adequacy of consultation carried out to date on this project during the pre-application stage, prior to the formal requirements of Section 55(4) at the acceptance stage of the DCO process.

Purpose of AoCM

The Adequacy of Consultation Milestone (AoCM) is intended to allow early consideration of the adequacy of consultation undertaken by the applicant, to minimise any risk at the acceptance stage, of the application progressing to examination. It will help inform the Planning Inspectorate's decision on whether the consultation arrangements have been sufficient for the level of complexity of the proposed project.

Consultation with the public and other key stakeholders is not only a statutory requirement but is also fundamental to securing public confidence in the process. It is therefore important that as a minimum, consultation is conducted in accordance with Sections 42, 47 & 48 of the Planning Act and the published Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC).

In providing this response, we have had regard to the information contained in the table accompanying your letter of 14th April and although useful in terms of assessing compliance with commitments in the SoCC, it is considered it fails to comprehensively reflect what actions have been carried out in connection with the targeted consultation undertaken earlier this year.

Summary of Pre-Application Consultation

National Grid Electricity Transmission (NGET) have carried out the following consultations to which the County Council has responded as part of its ongoing engagement with ECC and local residents and stakeholders.

- i) Non-Statutory Consultation (First) – held between 21 April 2022 and 16 June 2022.
- ii) Non-Statutory Consultation (Second) – held between 27 June 2023 and 21 August 2023.

- iii) Statutory Consultation – held between Wednesday 10 April and Tuesday 18 June 2024 (extended until 26th July 2024).
- iv) Targeted Consultation for Essex – held between Tuesday 25 February until Thursday 27 March 2025 (period for comments to be made extended at the outset until Friday 11th March due to timing of consultation and availability of staff)

Statutory Requirements

Our comments are centred around the pre application stage of the DCO process and as requested, this response gives ECC’s opinion as to whether National Grid Electricity Transmission (NGET), has to date complied with the following duties under the Planning Act 2008:

- Section 42 – Duty to consult
- Section 47 – Duty to consult the local community
- Section 48 – Duty to publicise

Section 42 – Duty to Consult

Section 42 of the Planning Act 2008 prescribes who should be consulted on the proposal.

The applicant must consult the following about the proposed application –

- (a) such persons as may be prescribed,*
- (aa) the Marine Management Organisation (MMO), in any case where the proposed development would affect, or would be likely to affect, any of the areas specified in subsection (2),*
- (b) each local authority that is within section 43,*
- (c) the Greater London Authority if the land is in Greater London, and*
- (d) each person who is within one or more of the categories set out in section 44.*

Subsection a) refers to ‘such persons as may be prescribed’. These persons are listed in Schedule 1 to the Infrastructure Planning (Applications: Prescribed Forms and Procedure) Regulations 2009

ECC is satisfied that NGET has correctly identified the parties to be consulted as required by Section 42 and to the best of ECC’s knowledge, has complied with their duty to consult those parties.

Section 47 – Duty to Consult Local Community

Section 47 of the Planning Act 2008 obliges developers to prepare a Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC) in consultation with the relevant Local Authorities, publish that SoCC and then undertake statutory consultation in conformity with that statement.

- (1) The applicant must prepare a statement setting out how the applicant proposes to consult, about the proposed application, people living in the vicinity of the land.*
- (2) Before preparing the statement, the applicant must consult each local authority that is within section 43(1) about what is to be in the statement.*
- (3) The deadline for the receipt by the applicant of a local authority's response to consultation under subsection (2) is the end of the period of 28 days that begins with the day after the day on which the local authority receives the consultation documents.*

- (4) *In subsection (3) “the consultation documents” means the documents supplied to the local authority by the applicant for the purpose of consulting the local authority under subsection (2).*
- (5) *In preparing the statement, the applicant must have regard to any response to consultation under subsection (2) that is received by the applicant before the deadline imposed by subsection (3).*
- (6) *Once the applicant has prepared the statement, the applicant must—*
 - (za) *make the statement available for inspection by the public in a way that is reasonably convenient for people living in the vicinity of the land,*
 - (a) *publish, in a newspaper circulating in the vicinity of the land, a notice stating where and when the statement can be inspected, and*
 - (b) *publish the statement in such manner as may be prescribed.*
- (7) *The applicant must carry out consultation in accordance with the proposals set out in the statement.*

ECC received a draft SoCC on 1st March 2024 and we responded with comments on 27th March 2024. The SOCC was then published 10th April 2024. A further draft SOCC in respect of the proposed targeted consultation was issued on 4th December 2024 with ECC submitting comments on 18th December 2024.

The statutory consultation was subsequently held between 10th April 2024 and 26th July 2024 with the targeted consultation for Essex taking place between 25 February 2025 to 27 March 2025.

ECC has no reason to doubt that NGET undertook the consultation in a way that was in accordance with the published SoCC and accordingly has complied with the duties set out in Section 47 of the Planning Act.

It should be noted that the statutory consultation was extended to acknowledge the general election held on 4th July. This extension was welcomed by ECC.

Section 48 – Duty to Publicise

Section 48 of the Planning Act 2008 obliges developers to publicise their proposals by means of notices in local and national newspapers.

- (1) *The applicant must publicise the proposed application in the prescribed manner.*
- (2) *Regulations made for the purposes of subsection (1) must, in particular, make provision for publicity under subsection (1) to include a deadline for receipt by the applicant of responses to the publicity.*

ECC has no reason to doubt that NGET published the required notices and that the content of those notices complied with the requirements set out in the regulations. ECC therefore considers NGET has to the best of our knowledge and subject to the review of Consultation Report, complied with their duty to publicise under this section of the Planning Act 2008.

Position regarding Statutory Requirements

Taking the above comments into account and subject to the review of the Consultation Report, it is ECC’s current opinion that NGET has carried out sufficient pre-application consultation on the proposed Norwich to Tilbury project in accordance with the agreed SoCC and in line with Sections 42, 47 and 48 of the Planning Act 2008.

While ECC recognises the challenges a project of this scale and complexity presents, and notwithstanding our current opinion the minimum statutory tests being complied with, there are several observations on the consultation process and how it could be enhanced which we have set out below. These comments have been provided in the interest of ensuring that consultation on this NSIP is carried out effectively and positively, allowing communities and stakeholders to fully engage, and have their comments properly recorded and considered in a transparent process of design iteration.

Observations on Consultation.

Consultation Feedback

Unfortunately, unlike that for the non-statutory consultation, no feedback has been published in response to the statutory consultation undertaken in 2024. Moreover, it is understood that responses from this statutory consultation have informed the localised changes proposed to the scheme under the targeted consultation. However, without sight of any feedback on the issues raised by the public / stakeholders in their responses, it is difficult to understand the rationale behind or the merits of, the changes proposed, when compared to those issues also raised by residents / stakeholders that it was felt did not warrant any change to the scheme and therefore, were not addressed.

It is considered this is detrimental to the transparency of the overall process and design evolution of the Project. ECC would encourage NGET to be more transparent in their publication of feedback drawing upon best practice examples on how to effectively communicate this at pre application stage in a clear and transparent way, possibly making greater use of the community newsletter and project updates.

ECC would also welcome early sight of the draft consultation report so we can understand better the matters which have been raised and work collaboratively to address issues where we can.

Targeted Consultation

ECC understands that in addition to the changes that were publicised and consulted on through the targeted consultation, there are other changes to the scheme design that were not included in this process. It is understood this is because some are considered to be of such a minor nature that they have no material impact on the proposed development as experienced by residents.

The importance of feedback from residents and community representatives in developing the most appropriate proposal is clearly recognised and it is therefore important, that residents are provided with comprehensive information in order that they can fully understand (and thus comment on), the effect of the proposed localised changes on their properties.

While it is acknowledged these changes may not be the most significant, ECC considers that to local residents who may reside close to them, their significance may be greater, and they should therefore have been given an opportunity to comment on them. The concentration of non-material changes may also have a bearing on their materiality and how they are experienced by local residents.

ECC is also concerned about the impact on confidence in the process if residents subsequently identify these changes and raise concerns about their effects. It would also refer to Planning Inspectorate's Nationally Significant Infrastructure Projects: Advice on Good Design which highlights the importance of transparency in the process and emphasises that a good design process includes an "effective, intentional, transparent and deliverable process".

Officers have previously and repeatedly, requested a list of these non-material changes, and it is extremely disappointing that residents are not being made aware of these non-material changes as well as those currently being consulted on.

Overall, it is considered this decision could mean it is difficult for stakeholders to fully comprehend the impacts of the scheme at particular locations.

Bespoke Consultation Zones

In our response to the draft SoCC provided by NGET in respect of the targeted consultation, it was noted that only those in the consultation zones would receive direct notifications. ECC highlighted the importance of community engagement around these proposed changes and in the absence of full details around the consultation zones and the extent of neighbour notification, queried how the boundaries to the consultation zones were to be drawn given the potential for excluding many who may be interested in the project.

ECC therefore requested that it be consulted on the bespoke consultation zones to help validate the extent of the consultation zones but received no feedback on this request. While the need to progress with the targeted consultation was noted, notwithstanding the subsequent delays to the commencement of the targeted consultation, it is considered taking the Council up on its offer would have assisted with the transparency and robustness of the approach to targeted consultation.

Comments in respect of ES

ECC recognises this is a large and complex project and welcomes the extensive engagement to date across a range of technical subjects that are informing the ES. However, it is felt progress on the SoCG is being hampered by the lack of available detailed information to enable matters to be agreed early in the process. This makes it difficult for ECC to reach an informed position on various aspects of the project at this time.

ECC remains committed to front loading the resolution of issues through the pre application phase and this situation is likely to create additional pressures at examination. This is compounded by the focus on progressing towards a fixed submission date for the DCO which is likely to impact on the time available to consider options and comments received. An example being that for the draft SoCG sent to District Council's where only 21 days was given for comments. Additional time for the public to comment on the targeted consultation (an increase from 4 weeks to 6 weeks) was also requested in ECC's response to the draft SOCC but not agreed .

It is important to note that there is no suggestion of any intent by NGET to delay providing information or deliberately make understanding the full extent of the scheme's impacts difficult, but to achieve a good understanding of the scheme and its impacts, this requires a substantial amount of work and resources including time. It is therefore important that parties continue to work together, and that proportionate time is made available to consider and respond to the information as it is made available.

ECC remains hopeful that many of these outstanding matters can be satisfactorily addressed through our ongoing engagement with NGET informing the SoCG prior to the examination.

Scheme Revisions

As would be expected for a scheme of this scale and complexity, there are numerous examples where changes have been made to the proposed scheme since the first non-statutory consultation was undertaken in 2022. The fact that changes have been made as a result of consultation is of course welcomed, and ECC supports many of the changes made. We do consider however that in many cases the changes proposed do not go far enough to address the issue in question. Moreover, we believe that predominantly, the changes made are relatively minor in nature and to date there has not been agreement to any of the more substantive changes that have been requested by ECC and other stakeholders especially in connection with the concerns around the impact on the viability of Dunton Hills Garden Village.

There remains a concern therefore that NGET have not addressed legitimate concerns held by ECC and other stakeholders on aspects of the scheme that are most in need of change whether it be because of cost or impact on programme, and have not weighted the effect on new developments and communities sufficiently. It follows that if the DCO application is accepted, ECC intend to continue making representations to NGET and if necessary to the examination on changes that we think are required to the scheme to make it acceptable locally.

Webinars

The webinars held in connection with the statutory consultation were welcome, but attendance may have been limited by the fact that they were held at the same time albeit, on different days. It would have been better if the webinars were offered at a variety of times to reflect the different life patterns for local communities.

It is also felt that on occasion webinars were not always attended by representatives from NGET with sufficient detailed knowledge of the issues to enable questions to be comprehensively responded to. For example, during an Essex event for the targeted consultation attended by officers, the NGET representatives were unable to answer questions around Dunton Hills Garden Village.

Conclusion

With reference to your request for comments on the adequacy of consultation carried out to date on this project during the pre-application stage, ECC is of the opinion that the consultation conducted has been sufficient to meet the legal tests at S42, 47 & 48 of the PA 2008.

ECC of course, welcomes and appreciates the consultation and level of engagement to date, and looks forward to this positive relationship continuing. It is though considered that the project is being progressed to the extent that some of the potential changes which could have significant and obvious benefit have not been fully considered. As a result, whilst ECC and other stakeholders are working closely with NGET to develop the Statements of Common Ground, many issues remain.

For these reasons we believe it will be particularly important for NGET to continue meaningful engagement with stakeholders including ECC over the coming months in an effort to resolve as many of the outstanding issues as possible prior to the submission of the DCO.

The Adequacy of Consultation Milestone (AoCM) is intended to allow early consideration of the adequacy of consultation undertaken by the applicant, to minimise any risk at the acceptance stage, of the application progressing to examination. It will help inform the Planning Inspectorate's decision on whether the consultation arrangements have been sufficient for the level of complexity of the proposed project.

Consultation with the public and other key stakeholders is not only a statutory requirement but is also fundamental to securing public confidence in the process. It is therefore important that as a minimum, consultation is conducted in accordance with Sections 42, 47 & 48 of the Planning Act and the published Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC).

In providing this response, we have had regard to the information contained in the table accompanying your letter of 14th April.

Summary of Pre-Application Consultation

National Grid Electricity Transmission (NGET) have carried out the following consultations to which the SCC has responded.

- i) Non-Statutory Consultation (First) – held between 21 April 2022 and 16 June 2022.
- ii) Non-Statutory Consultation (Second) – held between 27 June 2023 and 21 August 2023.
- iii) Statutory Consultation – held between Wednesday 10 April and Tuesday 18 June 2024 (extended until 26th July 2024).
- iv) Targeted Consultation for Suffolk – held between Thursday 30 January until Monday 3 March 2025.

Statutory Requirements

Our comments are centred around the pre application stage of the DCO process and as requested, this response gives SCC's opinion as to whether NGET, has to date complied with the following duties under the Planning Act 2008:

- Section 42 – Duty to consult
- Section 47 – Duty to consult the local community
- Section 48 – Duty to publicise

Section 42 – Duty to Consult

Section 42 of the Planning Act 2008 prescribes who should be consulted on the proposal.

The applicant must consult the following about the proposed application –

- (a) such persons as may be prescribed,*
- (aa) the Marine Management Organisation (MMO), in any case where the proposed development would affect, or would be likely to affect, any of the areas specified in subsection (2),*
- (b) each local authority that is within section 43,*
- (c) the Greater London Authority if the land is in Greater London, and*
- (d) each person who is within one or more of the categories set out in section 44.*

Subsection a) refers to 'such persons as may be prescribed'. These persons are listed in Schedule 1 to the Infrastructure Planning (Applications: Prescribed Forms and Procedure) Regulations 2009

SCC is generally satisfied that NGET has correctly identified the parties to be consulted as required by Section 42 and to the best of ECC's knowledge, has complied with their duty to consult those parties. **However, the operator of Raydon Airfield has made it known to National Grid Electricity Generation and SCC that they have not been consulted throughout all of the pre-application consultation stages.**

Section 47 – Duty to Consult Local Community

Section 47 of the Planning Act 2008 obliges developers to prepare a Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC) in consultation with the relevant Local Authorities, publish that SoCC and then undertake statutory consultation in conformity with that statement.

(1) The applicant must prepare a statement setting out how the applicant proposes to consult, about the proposed application, people living in the vicinity of the land.

(2) Before preparing the statement, the applicant must consult each local authority that is within section 43(1) about what is to be in the statement.

(3) The deadline for the receipt by the applicant of a local authority's response to consultation under subsection (2) is the end of the period of 28 days that begins with the day after the day on which the local authority receives the consultation documents.

(4) In subsection (3) “the consultation documents” means the documents supplied to the local authority by the applicant for the purpose of consulting the local authority under subsection (2).

(5) In preparing the statement, the applicant must have regard to any response to consultation under subsection (2) that is received by the applicant before the deadline imposed by subsection (3).

(6) Once the applicant has prepared the statement, the applicant must— (za) make the statement available for inspection by the public in a way that is reasonably convenient for people living in the vicinity of the land, (a) publish, in a newspaper circulating in the vicinity of the land, a notice stating where and when the statement can be inspected, and (b) publish the statement in such manner as may be prescribed.

(7) The applicant must carry out consultation in accordance with the proposals set out in the statement.

SCC received a draft SoCC on 1st March 2024 and we responded with comments on the 2nd April 2024. The SOCC was then published 10th April 2024.

The statutory consultation was subsequently held between 10th April 2024 and 26th July 2024 with a further non-statutory consultation for Suffolk taking place between 25 February 2025 to 27 March 2025. It should be noted that the statutory consultation was extended to acknowledge the general election held on 4th July. This extension was welcomed by SCC.

SCC is generally satisfied that NGET undertook the consultation in a way that was in accordance with the published SoCC and accordingly has complied with the duties set out in Section 47 of the Planning Act. **However, Section 5.3 of the SoCC includes reference to Primary Consultation Zone which includes people and businesses with property postcodes within 1km of the project's red line boundary including Raydon Airfield.**

Section 48 – Duty to Publicise

Section 48 of the Planning Act 2008 obliges developers to publicise their proposals by means of notices in local and national newspapers.

(1) The applicant must publicise the proposed application in the prescribed manner.

(2) Regulations made for the purposes of subsection (1) must, in particular, make provision for publicity under subsection (1) to include a deadline for receipt by the applicant of responses to the publicity.

SCC has no reason to doubt that NGET published the required notices and that the content of those notices complied with the requirements set out in the regulations. SCC therefore considers NGET has to the best of our knowledge and subject to the review of Consultation Report, complied with their duty to publicise under this section of the Planning Act 2008.

Norwich to Tilbury Project Proposals by National Grid Electricity Transmission

Adequacy of Consultation Milestone

Planning Act 2008 (as amended) – Sections 42, 47, 48 and 55

I refer to your letter dated 14 April 2025, inviting Tendring District Council (TDC) to comment on the adequacy of consultation undertaken to date by National Grid in relation to the Norwich to Tilbury project during the pre-application stage.

The adequacy of consultation for a Nationally Significant Infrastructure Project (NSIP) is an important consideration and should be viewed in the context of ensuring that all relevant parties have had a fair and meaningful opportunity to engage with the proposals. In particular, for a project of this scale and complexity, effective consultation is not only a statutory requirement but also fundamental to securing public confidence and informed participation. Our response has been prepared with reference to the summary table accompanying your letter of 14 April, as well as National Grid's Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC).

We include a summary of the relevant sections of the legislation outlining the statutory requirements and our understanding of its purpose, followed by TDC's position after each section.

Section 42 – Duty to Consult Prescribed Bodies and Land Interests

Section 42 of the Planning Act 2008 sets out the duty on applicants to consult prescribed consultees prior to submitting a Development Consent Order (DCO) application. This includes:

- **Local Authorities:** Those within or near the proposed development area.
- **Prescribed Bodies:** As defined under secondary legislation, including statutory bodies such as the Environment Agency and Natural England.
- **Land Interests:** Including landowners, tenants, and others with interests in affected land.
- **The Greater London Authority** (where applicable).

The purpose of this section is to ensure consultation is conducted in the prescribed manner and at a sufficiently early stage to allow prescribed consultees to engage with the project (and the consultation phase) and respond effectively.

TDC's Position on Section 42

TDC finds no reason to dispute that National Grid correctly identified and consulted the parties required under Section 42. On this basis, we are satisfied that the statutory duty under this section has been met.

Section 47 – Duty to Consult the Local Community

Section 47 requires the applicant to prepare a SoCC and consult local authorities on its content before conducting community consultation. Specifically, it requires the applicant to:

1. Prepare and consult on the SoCC.
2. Consider local authority feedback on the SoCC.
3. Publicise the final SoCC.
4. Undertake consultation in accordance with it.

The purpose of this section is to enable early and effective engagement with people living in the area likely to be affected, and to gather local views and identify potential issues before submission of the application.

TDC's Position on Section 47

While National Grid assert that it has fulfilled its obligations under Section 47, TDC remains concerned that the consultation failed to deliver effective and meaningful engagement. Despite numerous efforts to engage with National Grid, particularly concerning the site selection methodology, the rationale for siting the East Anglia Connection Node (EACN) in the Tendring peninsula, and the exclusion of alternative routes, we have received limited or unsatisfactory responses, hindering our ability to engage constructively.

The SoCC states that consultation should cover “all aspects of the proposed development.” However, its focus has been too narrowly confined to refining a preferred route without adequate explanation of the alternatives or the reasons for their exclusion. Moreover, fundamental questions—such as the need for the project, choice of technology, and strategic route options—appear to have been treated as closed matters, with the consultation process centred on adjusting minor elements of a pre-determined scheme.

TDC understands that alternative options have been internally reviewed and discounted without meaningful public engagement. There is no published rationale or supporting evidence that clearly explains why all other potentially viable options were not considered or shared publicly.

The lack of published feedback following the 2024 statutory consultation makes it difficult to assess how National Grid has considered stakeholder responses or justified its decisions, and therefore TDC is not convinced that the consultation process has managed to capture or reflect the concerns of communities most directly affected, especially those in north-western Tendring.

Section 48 – Duty to Publicise

Section 48 requires the applicant to publicise the proposed application before submission. This includes:

- Publication in at least one national and one local newspaper.

- A brief description of the development.
- Details of document inspection locations.
- Instructions on how to respond.
- A deadline (minimum 28 days from publication).

The purpose of this requirement is to ensure the wider public is informed and able to engage in the process.

TDC's Position on Section 48

TDC has no evidence to suggest National Grid failed to meet the public notification requirements under Section 48. Based on available information, we accept that National Grid has complied with its duty to publicise the project appropriately.

For completeness, **Section 55 (Acceptance of Applications)** of the Planning Act 2008 outlines the criteria that the Planning Inspectorate, on behalf of the Secretary of State, must apply when deciding whether to accept a Development Consent Order (DCO) application for examination.

The key requirements are as follows:

1. Form and Content of the Application:

The application must be submitted in the prescribed form and comply with the relevant regulations, notably the Infrastructure Planning (Applications: Prescribed Forms and Procedure) Regulations 2009.

2. Accompanying Documents:

The application must include all necessary supporting documentation, such as:

- An Environmental Statement (where required),
- A Consultation Report (outlining how consultation duties have been fulfilled),
- A draft DCO,
- Land and Works Plans, among others.

3. Compliance with Consultation Duties:

The applicant must demonstrate that it has met the statutory consultation requirements set out in:

- Section 42 – Duty to consult prescribed bodies and those with an interest in land,
- Section 47 – Duty to consult the local community,
- Section 48 – Duty to publicise the proposed application.

4. Adequacy of Consultation:

The Planning Inspectorate must be satisfied that the consultation has been carried out effectively and in accordance with the statutory requirements, based on the evidence provided in the Consultation Report.

5. Suitability for Examination:

The application must not be frivolous or vexatious and must appear, on its face, to be capable of resulting in the grant of development consent.

This section is included for information only, to support the completeness and clarity of our response. Tendring District Council does not propose to comment on the adequacy of National Grid's compliance with Section 55 because this section merely contains the overview of what is required to ensure acceptance of a DCO application.

Other Matters

Targeted Consultation and Non-Material Changes

TDC understands that certain design changes were not included in the latest (now completed) targeted consultation, on the grounds that National Grid considers them to be of minor significance. While they may be minor in engineering terms, these changes may have significant perceived or actual impacts for residents living close to the affected areas.

It is vital that communities are fully informed of **all** changes—whether material or not—so they can understand how the development may affect them and respond accordingly. The cumulative impact of numerous “non-material” changes can be significant and should not be progressed without public consultation.

TDC, alongside Essex County Council, has requested a list of these non-material changes. It is disappointing that this has not been provided, and it undermines public confidence in the transparency and inclusiveness of the consultation process. We refer to the Planning Inspectorate's guidance on good design, which stresses the importance of an **intentional, transparent, and effective** design process. This principle should equally apply to the consultation process, and we would strongly argue that **intentional, transparent, and effective** design of such a large scale project is even more critical and the pre-submission consultation phase.

Conclusion

In summary:

- Section 42: TDC is satisfied that statutory consultees were correctly identified and consulted.
- Section 47: TDC considers that the consultation with the local community has been inadequate in terms of scope, clarity, and meaningful engagement.
- Section 48: TDC acknowledges that the duty to publicise appears to have been met.
- Other Concerns: The exclusion of certain changes from public consultation raises concerns about transparency, and risks undermining public trust in the process.

TDC remains committed to constructive engagement with National Grid and other stakeholders but emphasises the need for a more open and inclusive approach moving forward—particularly if trust and confidence are to be maintained throughout this NSIP process.

Thurrock Council's response to the Norwich to Tilbury Adequacy of Consultation Milestone, in relation to section 55(4)(b) of the Planning Act 2008.

Thank you for inviting Thurrock Council to comment on the adequacy of consultation undertaken by National Grid Electricity Transmission (National Grid) for the project titled Norwich to Tilbury. This letter comprises the council's comments on the consultation that has been undertaken so far.

1. Responding to the Statement of Community Consultation

- 1.1. National Grid has laid out its commitments to consultation in the Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC), published in April 2024, including its process for advertising and encouraging engagement with the consultation.
- 1.2. At this milestone, National Grid has also laid out the actions it has taken to meet each of these commitments through the 2023 non-statutory consultation and the 2024 statutory consultation.
- 1.3. The council does not fundamentally object to the ways that the 2023 and 2024 consultations are described as complying with National Grid's commitments.
- 1.4. The way in which these and other consultations have been carried out has, however, presented some issues which have limited the extent to which the council has been able to meaningfully contribute to improving the project's outcomes. These issues are laid out in section 2 of this letter.
- 1.5. National Grid has not included at this milestone the ways in which the two rounds of targeted consultation (one statutory and one non-statutory) held in 2025 have followed these processes or contributed to meeting these commitments, other than item number 69:

6.3.1. If, following the statutory consultation, National Grid considers it is necessary to undertake further statutory consultation, this would be undertaken, so far as relevant, practicable and proportionate, in accordance with the principles and methods set out in this SoCC or any update to it.

The council has identified several issues with the 2025 targeted consultation process

and would like to see National Grid explain how it believes the targeted consultations have followed the principles and methods set out in the SoCC. These issues are laid out in section 3 of this letter.

2. Issues identified with consultation and engagement

- 2.1. The timelines for consultation laid out by National Grid have been overly demanding of council officers, who have frequently found it difficult to review and respond to the required documents in time to meet the set deadlines.
- 2.2. The narrow timeframes have also meant that the council has been unable to take its responses to the recent targeted consultations, for example, to Cabinet, resulting in the submission of responses which may not fully represent the council's views.
- 2.3. Narrow timeframes have also been exacerbated, at times, by poor responsiveness from National Grid or those acting on its behalf when asked for further information relevant to the council's response to consultation.
- 2.4. The volume of different documents being circulated at one time, often with similar content or titles, and on occasion with mistakes, has made it difficult for consultees to be clear on which documents relate to which elements of the project and must be responded to by which deadlines, and to do so accordingly. This has been especially true during the period of targeted consultation, alongside which a significant number of other documents have been shared with the council for comment. The council feels it would have been able to engage more usefully with the various consultations if there had been some attempt to space them out.
- 2.5. In general, there has been a lack of necessary or helpful information provided alongside requests for comments from the council, which has made it difficult for the council to engage with and contribute to proposals in a meaningful way. This is particularly true of the Environmental Statement and documents relating to it.
- 2.6. It appears that the pressure on National Grid to submit the application by a highly ambitious deadline has left and continues to leave little room for genuine discussion of different options or contribution to improving the outcomes of the project, which is disappointing to the council.

3. Issues identified with the targeted consultations

- 3.1. National Grid has made it clear that the proposed changes recently subject to targeted consultation (Thurrock 1, 2 and 3) have been informed by feedback received in the statutory consultation undertaken in 2024. This feedback has not been shared with the council. This has left the council unable to fully understand the context of these targeted consultations, including the details of any feedback to which National Grid has decided does not warrant a change to the proposals.
- 3.2. The council is also concerned that residents have not been adequately notified of the full extent of changes to the design and alignment of the scheme since the statutory consultation on the basis that National Grid considers them to be non-material and has not included them in the targeted consultation.

4. Conclusion

- 4.1. The council agrees that the 2023 non-statutory consultation and 2024 statutory consultation have been carried out in line with the SoCC, as described by National Grid

at this adequacy of consultation milestone.

- 4.2. The council does not feel, however, that all of the consultation and engagement processes – and, in particular, the 2025 targeted consultations – have been undertaken so as to adequately support full and meaningful engagement from the council.

Thank you for your letter dated 6th May 2025 provided in response to our request for comments on the adequacy of consultation carried out to date on the proposed Norwich to Tilbury project (the Project) during the pre-application stage, part of the Planning Inspectorate's Adequacy of Consultation Milestone. National Grid notes that the response from Basildon Council should be viewed alongside the submission from Essex County Council and other host local authorities for the Project.

National Grid notes and welcomes the comment from Basildon Council that, to the best of the Council's knowledge, it is believed that National Grid has correctly identified the parties to be consulted, has complied with our duty to consult all relevant parties and carried out consultation events in line with the Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC).

The letter from Basildon Council contains some observations on the consultation undertaken: National Grid has sought to respond to the points raised below and would welcome further discussion during our regular scheduled meetings.

Absence of Feedback

A summary of the feedback received at statutory consultation and how National Grid has had regard to that feedback will be provided within the Consultation Report to be submitted with the application for development consent, in accordance with Section 37(3)(c) of the Planning Act 2008. National Grid is happy to discuss making the application available to technical consultees such as Basildon Council and the other host local authorities digitally shortly after it is submitted.

Responses received to the statutory consultation carried out in 2024 have informed and continue to inform the developing design of the Project. Each piece of feedback has been read and where a change to the design was requested, this has been and continues to be considered by the project team. This process and the outcomes will be documented within the Consultation Report, including those changes requested that have not been taken forward and why.

Basildon Council is correct that feedback has informed the series of targeted consultations undertaken earlier this year. The feedback received, if relevant to the potential changes being presented for consultation, was set out in the Consultation Leaflets for the targeted consultations within the section titled '*What we are proposing to change in your area and why*'.

Targeted Consultation

The process National Grid has followed for undertaking the targeted community consultations is appropriate and proportionate in accordance with the relevant legislation and guidance issued pursuant to Section 50 of the Planning Act 2008 and associated guidance published in April 2024 titled 'Planning Act 2008: Pre-application stage for Nationally Significant Infrastructure Projects'

(<https://www.gov.uk/guidance/planning-act-2008-pre-application-stage-for-nationally-significant-infrastructure-projects>).

Section 50 of the Planning Act 2008 states that an applicant “*must have regard to any guidance issued under this section*”. Paragraph 020 of the guidance states:

“Once applicants have completed the consultation process set out in their SoCC, where a proposed application is amended in the light of responses to consultation then, unless those amendments materially and substantially change the proposed application or materially changes its effects as a whole, the amendments themselves should not trigger a need for further consultation. The amendments can be reported as part of the consultation report submitted with the application.

Only where the project taken as a whole changes very significantly, and to such a large degree that what is being taken forward is fundamentally different from what was previously consulted on, should re-consultation on the proposed application as a whole be considered.

In understanding whether there has been a material and substantial change, applicants should take into account the following guiding factors:

- the degree of change as compared to the proposals previously consulted upon as a whole;*
- the number of materially worse environmental effects as compared to what has been the subject of previous consultations; and*
- the level of public interest, and the likelihood that such interest would merit further consideration in the context of that change.*

For any material change to a part of the proposed application where the project as a whole is not fundamentally changed, for example in the case of linear aspects where new information leads to a new alignment for a particular section of the proposal, a bespoke and targeted approach to further consultation can be adopted, which can address the specific consultation obligations arising proportionately.

Targeted consultation can be statutory or non-statutory or a combination of the two depending on whether new persons needing to be consulted under section 42 of the Planning Act (<https://www.legislation.gov.uk/ukpga/2008/29/section/42>) have been identified, but such targeted consultation will not require the production of PEI provided proportionate and appropriate information on environmental implications of any changes, where necessary, is provided.”

National Grid has and continues to review each change to the design against the wording of the guidance, in isolation and collectively. This has led to a bespoke and targeted approach to further consultation, with each targeted community consultation accompanied by an Environment Implications of the Change document, in line with the applicant’s duty to have regard to the guidance issued. These targeted community consultations are in addition to the ongoing landowner engagement and working with statutory and non-statutory organisations.

Given the nature and volume of the minor changes which have been made (and/or are still under consideration) that have not been the subject of targeted community consultation, it is not a proportionate exercise to produce a comprehensive list of every single amendment (nor is it required by the guidance). However, National Grid has summarised in discussions previously the type of changes made and is happy to hold another workshop with Basildon Council to run through the type of changes made that have not been the subject of targeted community consultation.

National Grid looks forward to continuing the positive, collaborative relationship with Basildon Council and working together to develop the SoCG and resolve issues where possible.

These targeted community consultations are in addition to the ongoing landowner engagement and working with statutory and non-statutory organisations.

Given the nature and volume of the minor changes which have been made (and/or are still under consideration) that have not been the subject of targeted community consultation, it is not a proportionate exercise to produce a comprehensive list of every single amendment (nor is it required by the guidance). However, National Grid has summarised in discussions previously the type of changes made and is happy to hold another workshop with BDC to run through the type of changes.

Bespoke Consultation Zones

In accordance with the guidance, a bespoke and targeted approach to further consultation was undertaken, which included bespoke consultation zones for each targeted consultation to include nearby properties which are likely to be affected. These were created following the principle that each consultation zone should be appropriate and proportionate in relation to the type and potential impact of the change. Where it was appropriate to do so, potential changes were grouped with a single consultation zone covering the grouped changes.

The principle of using bespoke community consultation zones was discussed with all host authorities as part of discussions regarding the targeted consultation strategy and approach ahead of time, and feedback taken on board. It was not practicable to share the consultation zones with the host authorities in advance of the targeted consultations; they were published as an appendix to the targeted consultation strategy at the launch of each series of consultations and no feedback on the extent of the zones was received from the host local authorities in their responses to the targeted consultations.

In addition to sending a letter to each property that fell within the relevant consultation zone, National Grid sought to raise awareness of the project and public consultation with stakeholders and the public more broadly, including by:

- notifying the local and regional media via press release
- notifying the local parish / parish council, and offering a briefing via Teams
- publishing full details of the targeted consultations on the project website
- notifying our contact database via our regular project update e-mail newsletter
- providing contact information for the community relations team widely within materials posted within the consultation zones, to local authorities and parish councils
- running an advert in local media titles on / following consultation launch
- notifying hard to reach groups as identified within the SoCC

This approach and the bespoke consultation zones are considered to be proportionate and appropriate to the proposed changes and in line with government guidance.

Comments in respect of the Environmental Statement (ES)

National Grid notes and appreciates that BDC welcomes the extensive engagement to date across a range of technical subjects that are informing the ES. The focus of the discussions to date has been on the scope of the ES, the methodologies used and the baseline data collected, together with draft management plans and outline mitigation strategies. The ES is currently being drafted and therefore National Grid look forward to sharing it with the host local authorities when available, as well as continuing to work alongside BDC on progressing the draft statement of common ground (SoCG), frontloading the resolution of matters where possible.

At all stages National Grid has and continues to be open to extensions to suggested deadlines, all requests for extensions to time have been granted and the project team welcomes open dialogue on potential resource constraints, including the provision of additional resources through the planning performance agreement with BDC.

National Grid is also hopeful that most of the outstanding matters can be satisfactorily addressed through our ongoing engagement with BDC informing the SoCG prior to the examination.

Targeted consultation timeframe

The locations of the targeted community consultations were geographically focussed and built upon the information provided during the previous consultations. Given the nature of the changes and the consultations already undertaken in the areas affected, a 30-day consultation was appropriate and proportionate for the public to respond.

Scheme Revisions

National Grid welcomes that BDC supports many of the changes made as a result of consultation since the first non-statutory consultation on the Project was undertaken in 2022. Alongside the 2023 and 2024 consultations, a Design Development Report has been published which presents the substantive changes that have been made to the Project since the previous consultation, describing how the Project has evolved in response to feedback and further environmental and engineering studies.

All of our consultations on the Project (non-statutory consultations in 2022 and 2023, our statutory consultation in 2024 and the targeted consultations in 2025) were held at a formative stage where final decisions on the proposals are still to be made and we have taken and continue to take on board feedback on our proposals at each stage.

Following every consultation period, each piece of feedback received has been read (or is under consideration) and given due regard, and where a change to the design was requested, this has been and continues to be considered by the project team. This process and the outcomes have been documented in the published 2022 and 2023 Feedback Reports, and will be documented within the Consultation Report, including those changes requested that have not been taken forward and why.

Further back check and reviews of the Project are being undertaken in response to feedback to the 2024 statutory consultation, and in the light of ongoing surveys and assessments, and the continuing engagement with BDC and other stakeholders in relation to specific locations and the Norwich to Tilbury route as a whole is welcomed.

Conclusion

National Grid notes and welcomes the confirmation that BDC is of the opinion that the consultation conducted has been sufficient to meet the legal tests at S42, 47 & 48 of the Planning Act 2008, and that the consultation and level of engagement to date is welcomed and appreciated. National Grid also looks forward to this positive relationship continuing and working alongside BDC to develop the SoCG and resolve issues where possible.

2024 consultations, a Design Development Report has been published which presents the substantive changes that have been made to the Project since the previous consultation, describing how the Project has evolved in response to feedback and further environmental and engineering studies.

Noting the specific mention of Dunton Hills Garden Village and BCC's request for the route to be placed underground in this location, the 2024 Design Development Report (paragraphs 5.3.21 and 5.4.211) describes how the route for the overhead line alignment has been amended to adopt the existing gas pipeline corridor in this location. The presence of the gas pipeline creates a corridor free from built development, due to established safety requirements.

The route of any alternative underground cable connection in this location would likely lead to the loss of between 2 to 3 hectares of development land (as no development could occur above the cables). Given the absence of a clear basis in NPS EN-5 for the use of underground cable in this location, the ability for detailed masterplanning to reduce potential visual effects and the additional cost implications of the additional cable (of around a minimum 2 km), and the potential loss of development land, National Grid does not consider it appropriate to change from overhead line for the 2024 preferred draft alignment in this location.

Further back check and reviews of the Project are being undertaken in response to feedback to the 2024 statutory consultation, and in the light of ongoing surveys and assessments, and the continuing engagement with BCC and other stakeholders in relation to Dunton Hills Garden Village and the Norwich to Tilbury route as a whole is welcomed.

Conclusion

National Grid notes and welcomes the confirmation that BBC considers that the consultation has met the legal requirements under Sections 42, 47, and 48 of the Planning Act 2008. National Grid continues to progress the Norwich to Tilbury Project in line with the relevant legislation and guidance, including our licence obligations.

National Grid looks forward to continuing the positive, collaborative relationship with BBC and working together to develop the SoCG and resolve issues where possible.

Further back check and reviews of the Project are being undertaken in response to feedback to the 2024 statutory consultation, and in the light of ongoing surveys and assessments, and the continuing engagement with CCC and other stakeholders in relation to specific locations and the Norwich to Tilbury route as a whole is welcomed.

Webinars

For the statutory consultation, six webinars were held and 209 people attended. The webinars were recorded and were made available on the project website for those that were unable to attend. A range of experts were available for each webinar to answer questions. Where a question could not be answered on the webinar – for whatever reason – it was managed offline or people were encouraged to write in by email, post or by phone.

Conclusion

National Grid notes and welcomes the confirmation that CCC is of the opinion that the actions in respect of consultation have been sufficient to meet the legal tests at S42, 47 & 48 of the Planning Act 2008, and that the consultation and level of engagement to date is welcomed and appreciated. National Grid continues to progress the Norwich to Tilbury Project in line with the relevant legislation and guidance, including our licence obligations. National Grid also looks forward to the positive relationship with CCC continuing and working alongside CCC to develop the SoCG and resolve issues where possible.

National Grid notes and welcomes Essex County Council's (ECC's) confirmation that, based on the information available and to the best of ECC's knowledge, the Council is satisfied that the consultation for the Project has been conducted in accordance with Sections 42, 47 & 48 of the Planning Act 2008 and the published Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC).

In response to the request for a compliance with commitments table for the targeted community consultations, a table is being included in the Adequacy of Consultation Milestone Report and will also be contained within the Consultation Report to be submitted with the application for development consent.

National Grid also welcomes the continued engagement with ECC on the Project under the pre-application planning performance agreement, through regular monthly project and topic specific meetings and ad hoc workshops as required.

In addition to confirmation that it is ECC's current opinion that National Grid has carried out sufficient pre-application consultation on the proposed Project in accordance with the agreed SoCC and in line with Sections 42, 47 and 48 of the Planning Act 2008, it is noted that further observations on consultation were provided within ECC's response. National Grid has sought to respond to the points raised below and would welcome further discussion during our regular scheduled meetings.

Consultation Feedback

A summary of the feedback received at statutory consultation and how National Grid has had regard to that feedback will be provided within the Consultation Report to be submitted with the application for development consent, in accordance with Section 37(3)(c) of the Planning Act 2008. National Grid is happy to discuss making the application available to technical consultees such as ECC and the other host local authorities digitally shortly after it is submitted.

Responses received to the statutory consultation carried out in 2024 have informed and continue to inform the developing design of the Project. Each piece of feedback has been read and where a change to the design was requested, this has been and continues to be considered by the project team. This process and the outcomes will be documented within the Consultation Report, including those changes requested that have not been taken forward and why.

ECC is correct that feedback has informed the series of targeted consultations undertaken earlier this year. The feedback received, if relevant to the potential changes being presented for consultation, was

set out in the Consultation Leaflets for the targeted consultations within the section titled ‘What we are proposing to change in your area and why’.

Targeted Community Consultations

The process National Grid has followed for undertaking the targeted community consultations is appropriate and proportionate in accordance with the relevant legislation and guidance issued pursuant to Section 50 of the Planning Act 2008 and associated guidance published in April 2024 titled ‘Planning Act 2008: Pre-application stage for Nationally Significant Infrastructure Projects’ (<https://www.gov.uk/guidance/planning-act-2008-pre-application-stage-for-nationally-significant-infrastructure-projects>).

Section 50 of the Planning Act 2008 states that an applicant “*must have regard to any guidance issued under this section*”. Paragraph 020 of the guidance states:

“Once applicants have completed the consultation process set out in their SoCC, where a proposed application is amended in the light of responses to consultation then, unless those amendments materially and substantially change the proposed application or materially changes its effects as a whole, the amendments themselves should not trigger a need for further consultation. The amendments can be reported as part of the consultation report submitted with the application.

Only where the project taken as a whole changes very significantly, and to such a large degree that what is being taken forward is fundamentally different from what was previously consulted on, should re-consultation on the proposed application as a whole be considered.

In understanding whether there has been a material and substantial change, applicants should take into account the following guiding factors:

- the degree of change as compared to the proposals previously consulted upon as a whole;*
- the number of materially worse environmental effects as compared to what has been the subject of previous consultations; and*
- the level of public interest, and the likelihood that such interest would merit further consideration in the context of that change.*

For any material change to a part of the proposed application where the project as a whole is not fundamentally changed, for example in the case of linear aspects where new information leads to a new alignment for a particular section of the proposal, a bespoke and targeted approach to further consultation can be adopted, which can address the specific consultation obligations arising proportionately.

Targeted consultation can be statutory or non-statutory or a combination of the two depending on whether new persons needing to be consulted under section 42 of the Planning Act (<https://www.legislation.gov.uk/ukpga/2008/29/section/42>) have been identified, but such targeted consultation will not require the production of PEI provided proportionate and appropriate information on environmental implications of any changes, where necessary, is provided.”

National Grid has and continues to review each change to the design against the wording of the guidance, in isolation and collectively. This has led to a bespoke and targeted approach to further consultation, with each targeted community consultation accompanied by an Environment Implications of the Change document, in line with the applicant’s duty to have regard to the guidance issued. These targeted community consultations are in addition to the ongoing landowner engagement and working with statutory and non-statutory organisations.

Given the nature and volume of the minor changes which have been made (and/or are still under consideration) that have not been the subject of targeted community consultation, it is not a proportionate

exercise to produce a comprehensive list of every single amendment (nor is it required by the guidance). However, National Grid has summarised in discussions previously the type of changes made and is happy to hold another workshop with ECC to run through the type of changes

Bespoke Consultation Zones

In accordance with the guidance, a bespoke and targeted approach to further consultation was undertaken, which included bespoke consultation zones for each targeted consultation to include nearby properties which are likely to be affected. These were created following the principle that each consultation zone should be appropriate and proportionate in relation to the type and potential impact of the change. Where it was appropriate to do so, potential changes were grouped with a single consultation zone covering the grouped changes.

The principle of using bespoke community consultation zones was discussed with all host authorities as part of discussions regarding the targeted consultation strategy and approach ahead of time, and feedback taken on board. It was not practicable to share the consultation zones with the host authorities in advance of the targeted consultations, they were published as an appendix to the targeted consultation strategy at the launch of each series of consultations and no feedback on the extent of the zones was received from the host local authorities in their responses to the targeted consultations.

In addition to sending a letter to each property that fell within the relevant consultation zone, National Grid sought to raise awareness of the project and public consultation with stakeholders and the public more broadly, including by:

- notifying the local and regional media via press release
- notifying the local parish / parish council, and offering a briefing via Teams
- publishing full details of the targeted consultations on the project website
- notifying our contact database via our regular project update e-mail newsletter
- providing contact information for the community relations team widely within materials posted within the consultation zones, to local authorities and parish councils
- running an advert in local media titles on / following consultation launch
- notifying hard to reach groups as identified within the SoCC

This approach and the bespoke consultation zones are considered to be proportionate and appropriate to the proposed changes and in line with government guidance.

Comments in respect of the Environmental Statement (ES)

National Grid notes and appreciates that ECC welcomes the extensive engagement to date across a range of technical subjects that are informing the ES. The focus of the discussions to date has been on the scope of the ES, the methodologies used and the baseline data collected, together with draft management plans and outline mitigation strategies. The ES is currently being drafted and therefore National Grid look forward to sharing it with the host local authorities when available, as well as continuing to work alongside ECC on progressing the draft statement of common ground (SoCG), frontloading the resolution of matters where possible.

At all stages National Grid has and continues to be open to extensions to suggested deadlines, all requests for extensions to time have been granted and the project team welcomes open dialogue on potential resource constraints, including the provision of additional resources through the planning performance agreement with ECC.

National Grid is also hopeful that most of the outstanding matters can be satisfactorily addressed through our ongoing engagement with ECC informing the SoCG prior to the examination.

Targeted consultation timeframe

The locations of the targeted community consultations were geographically focussed and built upon the information provided during the previous consultations. Given the nature of the changes and the

consultations already undertaken in the areas affected, a 30-day consultation was appropriate and proportionate for the public to respond.

Scheme Revisions

National Grid welcomes that ECC supports many of the changes made as a result of consultation since the first non-statutory consultation on the Project was undertaken in 2022. Alongside the 2023 and 2024 consultations, a Design Development Report has been published which presents the substantive changes that have been made to the Project since the previous consultation, describing how the Project has evolved in response to feedback and further environmental and engineering studies.

Noting the specific mention of Dunton Hills Garden Village and ECC's request for the route to be placed underground in this location, the 2024 Design Development Report (paragraphs 5.3.21 and 5.4.211) describes how the route for the overhead line alignment has been amended to adopt the existing gas pipeline corridor in this location. The presence of the gas pipeline creates a corridor free from built development, due to established safety requirements.

The route of any alternative underground cable connection in this location would likely lead to the loss of between 2 to 3 hectares of development land (as no development could occur above the cables). Given the absence of a clear basis in NPS EN-5 for the use of underground cable in this location, the ability for detailed masterplanning to reduce potential visual effects and the additional cost implications of the additional cable (of around a minimum 2 km), and the potential loss of development land, National Grid does not consider it necessary to change from overhead line for the 2024 preferred draft alignment in this location.

Further back check and reviews of the Project are being undertaken in response to feedback to the 2024 statutory consultation, and in the light of ongoing surveys and assessments, and the continuing engagement with ECC and other stakeholders in relation to Dunton Hills Garden Village and the Norwich to Tilbury route as a whole is welcomed.

The project team welcomes open dialogue on potential resource constraints, including the provision of additional resources through the planning performance agreement with Thurrock Council.

During and outside the consultation periods, National Grid has always sought to respond to technical queries from the host local authorities and other technical bodies in a timely manner, providing further information where it is available.

Environmental Statement (ES)

Input to these documents from all host local authorities through the draft document reviews and regular, scheduled thematic groups is welcomed. Given this engagement, we would welcome further discussion with Thurrock Council on the specifics of the concerns raised in relation to the Environmental Statement and reiterate the open offer to discuss potential resource constraints, including the provision of additional resources through the planning performance agreement with Thurrock Council.

The ES is currently being drafted and therefore National Grid look forward to sharing it with the host local authorities when available, as well as continuing to work alongside Thurrock Council on progressing the draft statement of common ground (SoCG), frontloading the resolution of matters where possible.

National Grid continues to progress the Norwich to Tilbury Project in line with the relevant legislation and guidance, including our licence obligations.

Issues identified with the targeted consultations

Consultation Feedback

A summary of the feedback received at statutory consultation and how National Grid has had regard to that feedback will be provided within the Consultation Report to be submitted with the application for development consent, in accordance with Section 37(3)(c) of the Planning Act 2008. National Grid is happy to discuss making the application available to technical consultees such as Thurrock Council and the other host local authorities digitally shortly after it is submitted.

Responses received to the statutory consultation carried out in 2024 have informed and continue to inform the developing design of the Project. Each piece of feedback has been read and where a change to the design was requested, this has been and continues to be considered by the project team. This process and the outcomes will be documented within the Consultation Report, including those changes requested that have not been taken forward and why.

Thurrock Council is correct that feedback has informed the series of targeted consultations undertaken earlier this year. The feedback received, if relevant to the potential changes being presented for consultation, was set out in the Consultation Leaflets for the targeted consultations within the section titled 'What we are proposing to change in your area and why'.

Targeted Community Consultations

The process National Grid has followed for undertaking the targeted community consultations is appropriate and proportionate in accordance with the relevant legislation and guidance issued pursuant to Section 50 of the Planning Act 2008 and associated guidance published in April 2024 titled 'Planning Act 2008: Pre-application stage for Nationally Significant Infrastructure Projects'

(<https://www.gov.uk/guidance/planning-act-2008-pre-application-stage-for-nationally-significant-infrastructure-projects>).

Section 50 of the Planning Act 2008 states that an applicant "must have regard to any guidance issued under this section". Paragraph 020 of the guidance states:

"Once applicants have completed the consultation process set out in their SoCC, where a proposed application is amended in the light of responses to consultation then, unless those amendments materially and substantially change the proposed application or materially changes its effects as a whole, the amendments themselves should not trigger a need for further

consultation. The amendments can be reported as part of the consultation report submitted with the application.

Only where the project taken as a whole changes very significantly, and to such a large degree that what is being taken forward is fundamentally different from what was previously consulted on, should re-consultation on the proposed application as a whole be considered.

In understanding whether there has been a material and substantial change, applicants should take into account the following guiding factors:

- the degree of change as compared to the proposals previously consulted upon as a whole;*
- the number of materially worse environmental effects as compared to what has been the subject of previous consultations; and*
- the level of public interest, and the likelihood that such interest would merit further consideration in the context of that change.*

For any material change to a part of the proposed application where the project as a whole is not fundamentally changed, for example in the case of linear aspects where new information leads to a new alignment for a particular section of the proposal, a bespoke and targeted approach to further consultation can be adopted, which can address the specific consultation obligations arising proportionately.

Targeted consultation can be statutory or non-statutory or a combination of the two depending on whether new persons needing to be consulted under section 42 of the Planning Act (<https://www.legislation.gov.uk/ukpga/2008/29/section/42>) have been identified, but such targeted consultation will not require the production of PEI provided proportionate and appropriate information on environmental implications of any changes, where necessary, is provided."

National Grid has and continues to review each change to the design against the wording of the guidance, in isolation and collectively. This has led to a bespoke and targeted approach to further consultation, with each targeted community consultation accompanied by an Environment Implications of the Change document, in line with the applicant's duty to have regard to the guidance issued. These targeted community consultations are in addition to the ongoing landowner engagement and working with statutory and non-statutory organisations.

Given the nature and volume of the minor changes which have been made (and/or are still under consideration) that have not been the subject of targeted community consultation, it is not a proportionate exercise to produce a comprehensive list of every single amendment (nor is it required by the guidance). However, National Grid has summarised in discussions previously the type of changes made and is happy to hold another workshop with Thurrock Council to run through the type of changes.

Conclusion

National Grid notes and welcomes the confirmation that Thurrock Council agrees that the 2024 statutory consultation was undertaken in accordance with the SoCC, as described by National Grid at this adequacy of consultation milestone. National Grid continues to progress the Norwich to Tilbury Project in line with the relevant legislation and guidance, including our licence obligations, and looks forward to working alongside Thurrock Council to develop the SoCG and resolve issues where possible.

It should also clearly respond to concerns raised by local authorities, which were included in the AoCM, such as Tendring District Council's concerns about the consultation not being meaningful or effective.</p> <p>The PA2008 does not require an applicant to share draft submission documents during consultation periods. 1. Introduction

1.1 Purpose of this Report

- 1.1.1 The purpose of this report is to describe how National Grid Electricity Transmission (referred to as 'National Grid' in this report), the Applicant, has undertaken the consultation to date on Norwich to Tilbury (referred to as the 'Project' in this report), during preparation of the application for development consent. The report also confirms the approach to statutory consultation set out in the Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC) and provides a summary of how responses to consultation have shaped the application for development consent.
- 1.1.2 In Spring 2024, the Government introduced new guidance:
- (1) PA 2008: Pre-application stage for Nationally Significant Infrastructure Projects* ('the Guidance') (published 30 April 2024)
 - (2) Nationally Significant Infrastructure Projects: 2024 Pre-application Prospectus* ('the Prospectus') (published 16 May 2024)
- 1.1.3 Both the Guidance and the Prospectus outline the requirements and expectations for preparing an application for development consent, including the introduction of an early Adequacy of Consultation Milestone (AoCM) report. In particular:
- The AoCM should be early enough to enable applicants to consider how to undertake additional engagement that may be required, but sufficiently towards the end of the pre-application stage to assess the consultation that has been undertaken. A suggested period is around 3 months prior to the intended submission date;
 - The applicant must submit a short statement on the elements of consultation which have been carried out compared with the components sets out in the Programme Document and the Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC). It should include views and any supporting material from host Local Planning Authorities (LPAs), if available; and
 - The AoCM is an informal, but important, milestone that gives the opportunity for the Planning Inspectorate to check in on the consultation that has been undertaken and identify any concerns that may delay acceptance of the application.
- 1.1.4 This AoCM report has been prepared by National Grid as part of the development of the application for a Development Consent Order (DCO) for the Project. This document sets out:
- A general overview and approach for consultation and engagement undertaken for the Project (Chapter 2);
 - Details of the 2022 non-statutory consultation, including who National Grid consulted, the consultation activities undertaken, and how the feedback responses shaped the Project (Chapter 3);

- Details of the 2023 non-statutory consultation, including who National Grid consulted, the consultation activities undertaken, and how the feedback responses shaped the Project (Chapter 4);
 - The development, consultation and publication of the SoCC, including how National Grid complied with the SoCC (Chapter 5);
 - Details of the 2024 statutory consultation, including who National Grid consulted (in accordance with the Planning Act 2008), how National Grid consulted (in accordance with the Planning Act 2008), and how the feedback responses have and continue to be considered (Chapter 6);
 - Details of the 2025 targeted consultations, including who National Grid consulted and the consultation activities undertaken (feedback responses currently being considered) (Chapter 7);
 - Views and supporting material from host and neighbouring local planning authorities (LPAs) on the adequacy of consultation for the Project (Chapter 8); and
 - Details of further engagement with persons with an interest in land (PILs) (Chapter 9).
- 1.1.5 Appendix A sets out how National Grid has complied with the requirements under section 42, section 47, section 48 and section 49 of the Planning Act 2008 (PA 2008) and relevant guidance.
- 1.1.6 Under section 55(4)(b) of the PA 2008, at the acceptance stage, the Planning Inspectorate will seek the formal views from local authorities regarding the adequacy of consultation.

1.2 Project Overview

- 1.2.1 The Project is subject to ongoing consultation and design evolution and as currently proposed is defined as a Nationally Significant Infrastructure Project (NSIP) under Section 14(1)(b) and Section 16 of the PA 2008 as it comprises new overhead electricity transmission connections of more than 2 kilometres (km) in length, with an operating voltage above 132 kilovolts (kV).
- 1.2.2 For the purpose of section 115 of the PA 2008, development consent may also be granted for associated development, which for this Project is likely to include two new 400 kV substations, Cable Sealing End (CSE) compounds, underground cables, lower voltage diversions, and mitigation works.
- 1.2.3 A DCO is required to authorise the construction and operation of the Project. Consequently, an application for a DCO will be submitted to the Secretary of State for the Department of Energy Security and Net Zero in accordance with the PA 2008.

1.3 Norwich to Tilbury

- 1.3.1 Norwich to Tilbury (referred to as the 'Project' in this report) is a proposal by National Grid to reinforce the high voltage power network in East Anglia. The reinforcement is needed because the existing transmission network, even with current upgrading, will not have sufficient capacity for the new renewable energy (a substantial proportion of which is generated by offshore wind) that is expected to connect to the network over the next ten years and beyond. Completion of the Project, together with other new

reinforcements across the country will meet this future energy transmission demand both in East Anglia and across the UK.

- 1.3.2 The Project proposes the reinforcement of the transmission network between the existing Norwich Main Substation in Norfolk and Tilbury Substation in Essex, via Bramford Substation, the new East Anglia Connection Node (EACN) substation and the new Tilbury North substation.

2. Overview of Consultation and Engagement Undertaken

2.1 Overview

- 2.1.1 National Grid is committed to engaging with those communities considered to be affected by its activities. National Grid's Stakeholder, Community and Amenity Policy incorporates National Grid's Schedule 9 Statement relating to the preservation of amenity and makes the following commitments to consultation when undertaking electricity works:
- National Grid will promote genuine and meaningful stakeholder and community engagement;
 - National Grid will meet and, where appropriate, exceed the statutory requirements for consultation or engagement, and will adopt the following principles to help National Grid meet this commitment:
 - Seek to identify and understand the views and opinions of all the stakeholders and communities who may be affected by National Grid's works;
 - Provide opportunities for engagement from the early stages of the process where options and alternatives are being considered and there is the greatest scope to influence the design of the works;
 - Endeavour to enable constructive debate to take place, creating open and two-way communication processes;
 - Ensure that benefits, constraints and adverse impacts of proposed works are communicated openly for meaningful stakeholder and community comment and discussion. National Grid will be clear about any aspects of the works that cannot be altered;
 - Utilise appropriate methods and effort in engaging stakeholders and communities, proportionate to the scale and impact of the works; and
 - Provide feedback on how views expressed have been considered and the outcomes of any engagement process or activity.
- 2.1.2 These principles informed the approach to consultation/engagement at each stage of the Project, the SoCC and the way in which representations received have been dealt with by the Project team. During the development of new infrastructure in the UK, it has been necessary for National Grid to develop procedures and expertise in how to effectively communicate, engage and consult with stakeholders as part of Project development, in line with National Grid's commitments discussed above.
- 2.1.3 National Grid's consultation experience extends from its development of new gas and electricity transmission projects both prior to and since the introduction of the PA 2008. From this experience, the Project has been able to draw upon effective, tried and tested methods of consultation and engagement and has been able to adapt these to the local area.

- 2.1.4 National Grid developed and refined the consultation strategy for each round of consultation alongside productive dialogue with the LPAs. Engagement was held to ensure a collaborative approach was taken to planning the consultation.
- 2.1.5 Prior to the 2022 and 2023 non-statutory consultations, National Grid undertook LPA briefings, sought feedback on the draft consultation strategies and undertook draft consultation strategy workshops. More information about this approach is detailed in the 2022 Non-statutory Consultation Report and 2023 Non-statutory Consultation Feedback Report.
- 2.1.6 Similarly, prior to the 2024 statutory consultation, National Grid consulted with LPAs on the proposed content of the SoCC. Information about LPA consultation on the SoCC is detailed in Chapter 5 of this report.
- 2.1.7 National Grid also consulted LPAs on the draft targeted consultation strategies, detailed in Chapter 7 of this report.
- 2.1.8 In accordance with the AoCM guidance, National Grid consulted LPAs on the adequacy of consultation for the Project, which is detailed in Chapter 8 of this report.
- 2.1.9 Feedback on the adequacy of consultation was received from the Essex Suffolk Norfolk Pylons Action Group who appointed Charles Banner KC to provide his legal opinions on the 2022 and 2023 non-statutory consultations, and again on the 2024 statutory consultation. These opinions raise legal points on the adequacy of consultation based on the application of the Gunning Principles. Parliament had the Gunning Principles well in mind in framing the statutory consultation requirements for DCO applications. National Grid have complied fully with the specific statutory requirements and the relevant guidance on consultation applicable to DCO applications which embody the Gunning Principles. These legal opinions will be appended to the Consultation Report together with our response in due course.
- 2.1.10 For the Project, National Grid has sought to engage thoroughly with affected stakeholders throughout Project development, whether these stakeholders are individuals, organisations or prescribed consultees. National Grid has built upon its own knowledge and experience of consultation by agreeing strategies and methods of engagement with affected LPAs in advance of formal consultation.
- 2.1.11 Consideration of the feedback received through consultation and wider stakeholder engagement has been a major contributing factor in the development of the Project. Consultation has been completed at an early stage in the development of proposals to allow consultees to have an opportunity to influence the Project

•

2.2 Approach to Community Consultation

- 2.2.1 Undertaking consultation at a series of Project stages ensured a balance between consulting early, whilst also having the necessary detail for consultees to provide meaningful feedback. To support this, at each stage of the consultation process, clear parameters were set out to explain to consultees the information presented and how feedback can influence the Project during each specific stage of consultation.
- 2.2.2 National Grid's approach to consultation in support of the Project has been to carry out non-statutory, statutory, and targeted consultation, according to the requirements of the PA 2008.

- 2.2.3 The first non-statutory consultation was held between 21 April 2022 and 16 June 2022. This was followed by a second non-statutory consultation held between Tuesday 27 June 2023 and Monday 21 August 2023 and a statutory consultation between 10 April 2024 and 26 July 2024. National Grid held a series of further targeted consultations, as follows:
- Norfolk and Suffolk targeted non-statutory consultation was held between 30 January 2025 and 3 March 2025;
 - Essex and Thurrock targeted non-statutory consultation was held between 25 February 2025 and 27 March 2025; and
 - Thurrock 3 targeted statutory consultation was held between 18 March 2025 and 17 April 2025.
- 2.2.4 At the 2022 non-statutory consultation, National Grid presented information on how the Project was evolving from the evaluation of strategic options to a preliminary preferred graduated swathe within which new infrastructure (pylons and underground cables) could be located as well as a proposed new substation site on the Tendring Peninsula. Following the conclusion of this consultation, National Grid analysed the feedback received and, along with further technical studies and design work, developed the Project design ahead of the 2023 non-statutory consultation.
- 2.2.5 At the 2023 non-statutory consultation, National Grid presented a preferred draft alignment showing potential pylon positions, underground cables, CSE compounds and connection substations. The feedback received at this consultation was considered alongside the findings of our ongoing environmental assessments and technical studies to help identify the proposals presented at statutory consultation.
- 2.2.6 At the 2024 statutory consultation, National Grid presented a preferred draft alignment showing potential pylon positions, underground cables, new CSE compounds and new connection substations. The feedback received at this consultation was considered alongside the findings of environmental and engineering studies to help identify the proposals presented at targeted consultation.
- 2.2.7 At the 2025 targeted consultations, National Grid presented proposed changes to the proposals in specific areas. At the Norfolk and Suffolk non-statutory targeted consultation, National Grid presented proposed changes to the location of temporary construction laydown areas, minor changes to the Order Limits, and a new temporary construction compound. At the Essex and Thurrock non-statutory targeted consultation, National Grid presented proposed minor changes to the Order Limits and changes to the location of temporary construction compounds and laydown areas. At the Thurrock 3 statutory targeted consultation, National Grid presented proposed changes to the substation connection point at the southern end of the route, including proposals to construct a new substation. Each round of targeted consultation included proportionate and appropriate information on the environmental implications of any changes. The feedback received during each targeted consultation is currently being considered to help refine the Project before submission. Changes made as a result of this feedback will be detailed in the Consultation Report which will be submitted as part of the Application.
- 2.2.8 At the non-statutory, statutory, and targeted consultations National Grid sought to identify and understand the views and opinions of all the stakeholders and communities who may be affected by the proposed Project. National Grid consulted with stakeholders at an early stage to ensure technical advice and local knowledge was taken into account in the early development of the Project. These stakeholders included

local councils, elected representatives, local residents, landowners, hard-to-reach groups, and local interest groups.

- 2.2.9 National Grid gave the stakeholders and members of the public digital and non-digital opportunities to engage with the proposals through a dedicated website, public information events and webinar events as well as via email, phone and Freepost.
- 2.2.10 For both the non-statutory and statutory community consultations, National Grid identified a Primary Consultation Zone (PCZ) for the Project, which was based on a 1 km buffer from the scheme proposals. The PCZ was updated for each round of non-statutory and statutory consultation. At the launch of each stage of non-statutory and statutory consultation, National Grid wrote to all homes within the PCZ and placed adverts in local papers and on social media. For each round of non-statutory consultation, the PCZ contained approximately 50,000 addresses. For the statutory consultation, the PCZ was updated to reflect the Project's evolution and contained approximately 77,000 addresses. Paper copies of the key consultation documents were also placed at inspection points in publicly accessible venues – libraries and, where possible, council offices – along the route. Alternative formats of the documents were available on request.
- 2.2.11 National Grid also identified a Secondary Consultation Zone (SCZ) for the non-statutory and statutory consultations, which extended to 4 km from the edge of the proposals. The purpose of the SCZ was to identify stakeholders who were less likely to be directly affected by the proposed Project but may still be impacted, for instance by construction traffic and long-distance views. The SCZ was used to identify the relevant newspapers in circulation in the SCZ for the purpose of advertising the consultation. The SCZ was also used to identify MPs to consult, who all or part of their constituencies lay within the SCZ.
- 2.2.12 For the targeted non-statutory consultations, National Grid identified bespoke consultation zones for each targeted consultation location to include nearby properties likely to be affected. These were created following the principle that each consultation zone should be appropriate and proportionate in relation to the type and potential impact of the change. Where it was appropriate, potential changes were grouped with a single consultation zone covering the grouped changes.
- 2.2.13 For each targeted statutory consultation, National Grid identified a consultation zone which included people and businesses with property postcodes within 1 km of the proposed new substation location, permanent assets and changes to the overhead lines. The zone also included postcodes 250 m from the proposed Order Limits for the modifications to the existing overhead lines, and postcodes 250 m from primary access routes.

2.3 Consultation Components in the Programme Document

- 2.3.1 In accordance with the Guidance (see 1.1.2) and the Prospectus (1.1.2), National Grid must set out how elements of consultation have been carried out compared with components in the Programme Document.
- 2.3.2 National Grid prepared a Programme Document in accordance with the Guidance (see 1.1.2) which set out an anticipated timeline of activities proposed to ensure an effective pre-application process. The Programme Document was published on the Project website.

- 2.3.3 Table 2-1 sets out how National Grid undertook consultation in line with the components set out in the Programme Document.
- 2.3.4 A copy of the Programme Document is available in the Document Library on the Project website <https://www.nationalgrid.com/electricity-transmission/network-and-infrastructure/infrastructure-projects/norwich-to-tilbury/document-library>.

3. 2022 Non-statutory Consultation

3.1 Purpose of the Consultation

- 3.1.1 The first non-statutory consultation ran for eight weeks between 21 April 2022 and 16 June 2022. The purpose of this consultation was to:
- Introduce and provide an overview of the proposed Project to the public;
 - Explain the need to build the reinforcement;
 - Set out options considered and the reasons for preferring the corridor and graduated swathe;
 - Present and explain the graduated swathe and corridor which was preferred at that time;
 - Present and explain the substation site which was preferred at that time;
 - Ensure stakeholders and consultees had the opportunity to provide feedback in a meaningful and influential manner; and
 - Outline next steps and programme and how proposals would be developed further.

3.2 Who National Grid Consulted

- 3.2.1 The 2022 non-statutory consultation was open to anyone with an interest in the proposed Project. A consultation zone was developed to inform consultation activities.
- 3.2.2 National Grid established a PCZ, which extended 1km from the proposals, to capture stakeholders who may be most affected by the proposals. All relevant stakeholders within the PCZ were informed about the Project through a direct mailout of a Project Newsletter on the launch of the consultation.
- 3.2.3 National Grid identified a SCZ, which extended to 4 km from the edge of the proposals. The purpose of the SCZ was to identify stakeholders who were less likely to be directly affected by the Project but may be impacted by construction traffic and long-distance views. The SCZ was used to identify the relevant newspapers in circulation in the SCZ for the purpose of advertising the consultation. The SCZ was also used to identify MPs to consult, who all or part of their constituencies lay within the SCZ. All members of the public, including those within the SCZ could register to receive all Project information and engage as they wish.
- 3.2.4 During the 2022 non-statutory consultation, the following groups and stakeholders were notified about the consultation:
- Parish councils representing parishes within both consultation zones and in the immediate vicinity;
 - MPs representing constituencies within and bordering both consultation zones;
 - Elected representatives in local authorities where the Project is situated, including dedicated briefings for lead members during the 2022 non-statutory consultation period as requested;

- ‘Seldom heard groups’ within both consultation zones, representing people who are unlikely to respond to traditional consultation techniques and may need additional support to access materials; and
- Local interest groups, such as residents’ associations, community groups and groups with particular specialisms, such as local heritage or wildlife.

3.3 How National Grid Consulted

3.3.1 National Grid’s consultation activities for the 2022 non-statutory consultation included:

- Setting up a Project specific website, email, and dedicated telephone information line;
- Mailing a consultation newsletter directly to properties in the PCZ within 1 km of the proposals;
- Producing consultation materials, including the 2022 Project Background Document, Corridor and Preliminary Routeing and Siting Study (CPRSS), Community Newsletter, exhibition banners, posters, maps of the proposal and feedback questionnaire;
- Holding online and in person events, including webinars, and offering telephone appointments;
- Making information and materials available at inspection locations in close proximity to the Project; and
- Media and social media promotional activity.

3.3.2 Table 3-1 provides an overview of the key activities conducted during the 2022 non-statutory consultation. Full details are provided in the 2022 Non-statutory Consultation Feedback Report available on the Project website.

3.4 Feedback Received

- 3.4.1 A total of 3,787 responses were received during the consultation period from community stakeholders and consultees, along with members of the local community. This comprised of:
- 496 paper response forms;
 - 2,138 online response forms;
 - 1,085 emails submitted via the Project inbox; and
 - 68 letters.
- 3.4.2 Although some feedback was received after the close of consultation, all responses received have been considered and reported on in the 2022 Non-statutory Consultation Feedback Report, which is available on the Project website.

3.5 Evolution of the Project Presented at 2022 Non-statutory Consultation

- 3.5.1 Feedback received in response to the 2022 non-statutory consultation helped to shape and guide the development of the proposed Project. As a result of consultation feedback and engagement with PILs, changes to the proposed Project were made which have been summarised (in broad terms) below.

Changes Outside the Preferred Corridor

- 3.5.2 The following broad summaries identifies some of the changes to the proposed Project shaped by consultation feedback.

Section A South Norfolk

- The corridor was diverted to the east of Worthing Ling before re-joining the preferred corridor to the south-west of Diss. This change was referred to as 'East of Worthing Ling'.

Section B Mid Suffolk

- The corridor was diverted to the east, south of Offton, and would then run alongside the existing 132 kV overhead line to the north and east of Flowton to Bramford Substation. This change was referred to as 'North of Flowton'.

Section C and D Babergh, Tendring and Colchester

- An amendment to the route was identified to the north and east of Notley Enterprise Park and at the northern edge of the Dedham Vale National Landscape (an AONB). This change was referred to as 'West of Great Wenham'.

Section F Chelmsford

- The draft alignment was straightened slightly to the west of Writtle. This change was referred to as 'West of Writtle'. This change was made to avoid a historic landfill site south-east of Newney Green and to avoid positioning the pylons on unsuitable ground.

Section G Basildon and Brentwood (and Chelmsford east of Ingatestone)

- An amendment to the route was identified to the east of Ingatestone to reduce potential impacts on heritage assets. This change was referred to as 'Further east at Ingatestone'.

Changes Within the Preferred Corridor

Section B Mid Suffolk

- The route was amended to broadly parallel the existing 132 kV overhead line to the north-west of Barking and Barking Tye; and
- The alignment was moved further east within the corridor south of Bramford near Burstall.

Section C and D Babergh, Tendring and Colchester

- The route was altered to avoid oversailing properties and gardens at Aldham;
- The extent of underground cables was increased from south of the Dedham Vale AONB through to the East Anglia Connection Node (EACN) substation. This also enabled an adjustment of the overhead line alignment near Ardleigh; and
- The proposed overhead line near Great Horkesley was changed to underground cables for a distance of approximately 4 km.

Section E Braintree

- The technology was changed in this area from overhead line to underground cable to cross under the existing 400 kV overhead line north of Fairstead.

Section F Chelmsford

- The draft alignment was amended to pass to the east of Bushy Wood to increase the distance from properties.

Section G Basildon and Brentwood (and Chelmsford east of Ingatestone)

- The alignment was restricted to the eastern edge of the proposed corridor to reduce the interaction with the Dunton Hills Garden Village development.

Section H Thurrock

- The technology was amended from the north of the Lower Thames Crossing into Tilbury Substation from overhead line to underground cable.

4. 2023 Non-statutory Consultation

4.1 Purpose of the Consultation

- 4.1.1 National Grid held a second round of non-statutory consultation from 21 June 2023 to 21 August 2023. The purpose of this consultation was to:
- Provide an overview of the updated proposals to the public;
 - Present the 2023 preferred draft alignment;
 - Explain where changes were made to the proposals since the 2022 non-statutory consultation, including how the feedback received had informed the proposals;
 - Provide a further opportunity for stakeholders and consultees to provide feedback on the work to date; and
 - Outline the next steps and the programme and how the proposals will be further developed and how feedback has been taken into account.

4.2 Who National Grid Consulted

- 4.2.1 The 2023 non-statutory consultation was open to anyone with an interest in the Project. A consultation zone was developed to assist engagement with the local community.
- 4.2.2 National Grid established a PCZ, which extended 1 km from the proposals, to capture stakeholders who may be most affected by the proposals. All relevant stakeholders within the PCZ were informed about the Project through a direct mailout of a Project newsletter on the launch of the consultation.
- 4.2.3 National Grid identified a SCZ, which extended to 4 km from the edge of the proposals. The purpose of the SCZ was to identify stakeholders who were less likely to be directly affected by the Project but may be impacted by construction traffic and long-distance views. The SCZ was used to identify the relevant newspapers in circulation in the SCZ for the purpose of advertising the consultation. The SCZ was also used to identify MPs to consult, who all or part of their constituencies lay within the SCZ. All members of the public, including those within the SCZ could register to receive all Project information and engage as they wish.
- 4.2.4 During the 2023 non-statutory consultation, the following groups and stakeholders were notified about the consultation:
- Parish councils representing parishes within both consultation zones and in the immediate vicinity;
 - MPs representing constituencies within and bordering both consultation zones;
 - Elected representatives in local authorities where the Project is situated, including dedicated briefings for lead members during the 2022 non-statutory consultation period as requested;

- ‘Seldom heard groups’ within both consultation zones, representing people who are unlikely to respond to traditional consultation techniques and may need additional support to access materials; and
- Local interest groups, such as residents’ associations, community groups and groups with particular specialisms, such as local heritage or wildlife.

4.3 How National Grid Consulted

4.3.1 National Grid’s consultation activities for the 2023 non-statutory consultation included:

- Setting up a Project specific website including an interactive map, public consultation pages and consultation materials, as well as dedicated email and telephone information line;
- Mailing a consultation newsletter directly to properties in the PCZ within 1 km of the proposals;
- Producing materials to support consultation, including the 2023 Project Background Document, 2023 Strategic Options Backcheck and Review, maps of proposals showing the 2023 preferred draft alignment, 2023 Design Development Report, 2022 Non-statutory Consultation Feedback Report, Community Newsletter, exhibition banners, feedback questionnaire, and 2023 Non-statutory Public Consultation Strategy;
- Holding in person events and offering remote sessions including webinars and telephone appointments;
- Making information and materials available at inspection locations in close proximity to the Project; and
- Media and social media promotional activity.

4.3.2 Table 4-1 provides an overview of the key activities conducted during the 2023 non-statutory consultation. Full details are provided in the 2023 Non-statutory Consultation Feedback Report available [here](#).

4.4 Feedback Received

- 4.4.1 A total of 4,167 feedback submissions were received during the consultation period. This comprised of:
- 138 paper response forms;
 - 1,473 online response forms;
 - 2,498 emails sent to the Project inbox; and
 - 58 letters.
- 4.4.2 Although some feedback was received after the close of consultation, all responses received have been considered and reported on in the 2023 Non-statutory Consultation Feedback Report, which is available on the Project website.

4.5 Evolution of the Project Presented at 2023 Non-statutory Consultation

- 4.5.1 Feedback received from the 2023 non-statutory consultation helped to shape and guide the development of the proposed Project. As a result of consultation feedback and engagement with PILs changes to the proposed Project were made which have been summarised (in broad terms) below.

Changes Identified in Response to the 2023 Non-statutory Consultation

- 4.5.2 The following broad summaries identifies some of the changes to the proposed Project shaped by consultation feedback.

Section A South Norfolk

- An amendment to the route was identified to the east of Ingatestone to reduce impacts on heritage assets. This change was referred to as 'Further east at Ingatestone';

- The position of pylon RG12 (now RG13) was moved slightly north to avoid an archaeology site identified at this location;
- The location of pylon RG44 was amended to move it out of / to the edge of the open view to the north-west from Hoggs Barn. Pylon RG43 was also repositioned to benefit from further screening;
- A change was made between pylon RG46 and RG50 to move the preferred draft alignment further east away from woodland and private nature reserve at Brick Kiln Lane; and
- A change was made between pylon RG70 and RG73 which removed the single angle pylon at RG72 and replaced it with two angle pylons each with smaller direction changes. This change subsequently moved the 2023 preferred draft alignment further west in this area.

Section B Mid Suffolk

- The alignment was modified by approximately 2 km in the Waveney Valley between pylon RG84 and RG90. This created the potential for the use of underground cable on a slightly modified alignment, which was referred to as the Waveney Valley Alternative;
- The alignment was moved further east of Wortham near Brook Farm Airstrip between pylon RG90 and RG100. This moved pylons RG91, RG92, RG93 and RG94 further east;
- The alignment was moved to the west between pylons RG118 and RG123 to enable pylons to be positioned closer to field boundaries. The alignment also moved further east between RG123 and RG130, away from Hempnalls Hall;
- Pylon RG161 (amended to RG162) was moved to the south-west by approximately 50 m;
- Pylons RG173 and RG176 (amended to RG177) were repositioned to lower ground in order to reduce visual impacts. RG174 also moved to be closer to a field boundary; and
- The alignment was amended south of Offton between pylons RG191 to RG200 to reduce impacts on the equestrian business at RG196. This moved the alignment further away from residential properties along Ipswich Road.

Section C Babergh and Tendring

- Pylon JC16 was moved further west, increasing the separation between the pylon and the closest property from approximately 90 m to 180 m;
- The CSE compound was moved to the north of Raydon Airfield, which also moved the alignment from pylons JC26 to JC34 further north away from Little Wenham and Great Wenham; and
- Pylons JC21 and JC22 was moved further north-east to site further away from the public footpath and a farmer's field entry point.

Section D Colchester

- The split in the underground cable (east of Great Horkesley) was removed, which moved the alignment further south. This meant the Project no longer impacted Knowles Barn Farm; and
- There was a change to the alignment and pylon positions around TB54, TB55 and TB56, which moved the alignment further east and south-east from properties at the edge of Aldham.

Section E Braintree

- Changes were made between pylon TB89 (amended to TB88) and TB92 (amended to TB91) which moved them to the western edge of the field to reduce the visual impact. This also moved the alignment further towards the western edge of Ruffian's Wood to reduce impacts on a dog walking business;
- Pylon TB93 was moved out of direct views of a property to the north;
- The western CSE compound at Fairstead was moved to the east; and
- The alignment was moved further south between pylon TB103 in Section E and pylon TB132 in Section F (amended to TB131 and TB133).

Section F Chelmsford

- An amendment was made to the alignment between pylons TB147 and TB154 (amended to TB148 and TB155) to move it further away from properties; and
- Pylon TB174 was moved slightly further south and the alignment around pylon TB180 was moved towards the south field boundary.

Section G Basildon and Brentwood (and Chelmsford east of Ingatestone)

- The alignment between pylon TB220 and TB221 was moved further west, adopting the existing gas pipeline corridor, to reduce effects on residential properties and listed buildings in the Dunton Wayletts area; and
- Pylon TB224 was moved slightly west.

Changes Made as a Result of New Information

- 4.5.3 Where it became available, new information was taken into consideration in the development of the Project. New information was obtained outside the 2023 non-statutory consultation through discussions with landowners and other engagement with technical stakeholders.
- 4.5.4 The following broad summaries identifies some of the changes to the proposed Project shaped by new information.

Section A South Norfolk

- An amendment was made to the alignment between pylon RG1 and RG7 (now RG8) south of Norwich Main Substation to reduce potential impacts on a proposed battery storage development. The alignment was moved west, requiring an additional pylon;

- Pylon RG30 was moved slightly further north, which also moved pylon RG29 slightly further north; and
- A minor realignment to the west increased the separation from South Norfolk Model Flying Club to approximately 200 m to reduce potential impacts.

Section B Mid Suffolk

- The alignment between pylons RG90 and RG100 was changed to reduce interaction with a solar farm development. This moved pylons RG93 and RG94 further east;
- The alignment of the existing 132 kV overhead line was adopted for approximately 2 km, between pylon RG103 (now RG102) and RG116 (now RG117), and then a realignment south to the west of Burgate Road was made to reduce potential impacts on nearby historical assets. This change also moved the alignment further away from Mellis Common;
- Pylon RG135 (now RG136) was moved slightly further south to reduce impact on agricultural operations; and
- The alignment was adjusted further east between pylon RG147 (now RG148) and RG152 (now RG153) to move the alignment out of a farmed field.

Section C Babergh and Tendring

- The underground cable construction swathe was restricted to avoid trees in the area around pylon TB11 and TB12;
- The alignment was moved slightly further south between TB4 and TB7 to the southern edge of the fishing lake; and
- The underground cable construction swathe was narrowed in order to retain woodland to the south of Boundlands Farm.

Section D Colchester

- An amendment was made to the alignment between TB41 (now TB40) and TB45 (now TB44) which moved it slightly further east to avoid a new private reservoir. This also removed pylon TB43, reducing the visual effects.

Section G Basildon and Brentwood (and Chelmsford east of Ingatestone)

- An additional pylon was added in the vicinity of Thurrock Airfield to keep pylon heights to a minimum at this location.

5. Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC)

5.1 Development of the SoCC

- 5.1.1 In accordance with Section 47 of the 2008 Act, a draft SoCC was prepared, consulted on with host authorities, finalised and published ahead of commencing statutory consultation on the Project.

5.2 Consultation on the SoCC

- 5.2.1 In accordance with Section 47(2) of the PA 2008, National Grid consulted with each of the host authorities identified pursuant to Section 43(1) of the PA 2008 about the proposed content of the draft SoCC.
- 5.2.2 The following 13 host authorities were consulted with on the draft SoCC:
- Babergh District Council;
 - Basildon Borough Council;
 - Braintree District Council;
 - Brentwood Borough Council;
 - Chelmsford City Council;
 - Colchester City Council;
 - Essex County Council;
 - Mid Suffolk District Council;
 - Norfolk County Council;
 - South Norfolk Council;
 - Suffolk County Council;
 - Tendring District Council; and
 - Thurrock Council.
- 5.2.3 Prior to formal consultation under Section 42(2), National Grid engaged with the host authorities to ensure a productive and collaborative approach was taken to planning the statutory consultation. This included:
- Delivering a presentation on the draft SoCC on 23 November 2023; and
 - Providing an early draft SoCC on 1 December 2023. Officers were invited to review and comment on the draft SoCC during an 'informal' 35 day consultation period, between 2 December 2023 until 5 January 2024.
- 5.2.4 Feedback on the early draft SoCC was received from eight host authorities including:

- Babergh District Council;
- Brentwood Borough Council;
- Chelmsford City Council;
- Colchester City Council;
- Mid Suffolk District Council;
- Norfolk County Council;
- South Norfolk Council; and
- Suffolk County Council.

- 5.2.5 Amongst the comments received, there was feedback from Brentwood Borough Council about the proposed timing of the consultation coinciding with the local elections in Spring/Summer 2024. Other comments related to the availability of the consultation materials and suggested making them available in libraries in hard copy format to increase accessibility. There were also additional requests for information events to run in Mid Suffolk and South Norfolk.
- 5.2.6 All comments were considered and changes to the initial draft of the SoCC were made. A summary of the feedback received and the changes that were made to the early draft SoCC will be presented in the Consultation Report.
- 5.2.7 Following the informal engagement and consultation on the early draft SoCC (December 2023), the host authorities were sent a formal consultation notification on 1 March 2024.
- 5.2.8 In accordance with Section 47(2) of the PA 2008, formal consultation on the updated draft SoCC took place between 2 March 2024 and 2 April 2024. Officers were invited to review and comment on the draft SoCC during the 'formal' 32 day consultation period.
- 5.2.9 The draft SoCC (March 2024) reflected the changes incorporated following informal consultation on the early draft SoCC (December 2023).
- 5.2.10 Formal feedback on the draft SoCC was received from eleven host authorities including:
- Babergh District Council;
 - Basildon Borough Council;
 - Braintree District Council;
 - Brentwood Borough Council;
 - Chelmsford City Council;
 - Colchester City Council;
 - Essex County Council;
 - Mid Suffolk District Council;
 - Norfolk County Council;
 - Tendring District Council; and
 - Thurrock Council.
- 5.2.11 Amongst the comments received, there was feedback to:

- Ensure that the interactive mapping system is user-friendly, allowing postcode input for relevant information and provide detailed clear maps;
- Provide opportunities for meaningful interaction with National Grid online or via telephone, allowing residents to submit queries and receive responses; and
- Include where to find documents online, and clearly state locations and timings of community events with ample notice as well as a printable format of the questionnaire for public to send feedback by post.

5.2.12 The comments received were considered and several amendments were made to the draft SoCC. A summary of the feedback received and the changes that were made to the draft SoCC will be presented in the Consultation Report.

5.3 Publication of the SoCC

5.3.1 In accordance with Section 47(6)(za) of the PA 2008, the SoCC was made available for inspection by the public in a way that is reasonably convenient for people likely to be impacted by the proposals. The SoCC was available for inspection:

- On the Project website for the start of consultation on 10 April 2024;
- As reference copies at the inspection points (as consulted and agreed with local authorities) along the route and at public information events as detailed in **Table 5-1 below**; and
- As a printed or alternative format copy upon request.

6. Statutory Consultation

6.1 Purpose of the Consultation

- 6.1.1 National Grid held a statutory consultation for a period of 15 weeks, from 10 April 2024 to 26 July 2024. This includes a five-week extension to the consultation following the announcement of the General Election. The purpose of this consultation was to seek views and feedback on the proposed draft Project both taken as a whole and its elements including:
- The preferred draft alignment for a new 400 kV electricity transmission connection of around 184 km running from Norwich Main Substation to Tilbury Substation via Bramford Substation including approximately 159 km of new overhead line and approximately 25 km of underground cabling;
 - Six new CSE compounds (where high-voltage underground cables join onto an overhead line) and associated permanent accesses;
 - A new East Anglia Connection Node (EACN) substation, which would connect clean energy from offshore wind generation to the energy network so the energy can reach homes and businesses where it's needed;
 - An alternative design at Waveney Valley, substituting approximately 2 km of pylons with underground cabling;
 - Substation extension works at the existing Norwich Main, and Bramford substations and works within the existing Tilbury Substation; and
 - Temporary works including access roads, tracks, compounds and associated with the Project's construction.
- 6.1.2 National Grid also consulted on the Preliminary Environmental Information Report (PEIR).

6.2 Who National Grid Consulted

- 6.2.1 The statutory consultation was open to anyone who was interested in the Project. National Grid welcomed all views and has had regard to all comments and feedback when developing the Project proposals.
- 6.2.2 Under Section 47 of the PA 2008, National Grid has a duty to consult the local community. The SoCC detailed the approach to consultation. Two consultation zones were developed to assist engagement with the local community. These used the same buffers as the non-statutory consultations. The PCZ extended 1 km from the draft Order Limits and the SCZ extended to at least 4 km from the draft Order Limits (and included the PCZ).
- 6.2.3 In addition to the local community, National Grid consulted with prescribed bodies and local authorities under Section 42(1)(a), (b) and (c) of the PA 2008. PILs, under Section 42(1)(d) and Section 44 were also consulted with.

Prescribed Consultees under Section 42(1)(a)

- 6.2.4 In accordance with Section 42(1)(a) of the PA 2008, National Grid consulted with all applicable ‘prescribed’ bodies. Persons prescribed under Section 42(1)(a) are listed in column 1 of Schedule 1 of the Infrastructure Planning (Applications: Prescribed Forms and Procedure) Regulations 2009 (as amended) (the “APFP Regulations”).
- 6.2.5 Section 42(1)(aa) requires consultation with the Marine Management Organisation (MMO). As this is an inland development the MMO were not consulted as part of the statutory consultation.
- 6.2.6 The following activities were undertaken to consult Section 42(1)(a) consultees:
- On 10 April 2024 a consultation letter was sent along with a copy of the Project Community Newsletter and Section 48 notice;
 - An email was also sent on 10 April 2024 containing the letter and Section 48 notice;
 - A letter was sent on 5 June 2024 detailing the five week extension and new consultation deadline. Along with the letter, consultees were also sent a copy of the updated Section 48 notice;
 - An email containing the letter and Section 48 notice was also sent on 5 June 2024; and
 - In April 2024 an updated list of persons prescribed under Section 42(1)(a) was published. The statutory consultation for the Project had already commenced when this list was introduced, and so the previous version of the list was used. On a precautionary basis, a letter was sent on the 26 June 2024 to the East of England ambulance service as a newly identified stakeholder.

Prescribed Consultees under Section 42(1)(b) and Section 43

- 6.2.7 In accordance with Section 42(1)(b), National Grid consulted with each local authority within Section 43. These are:
- A local authority is within this section if the land is in the authority’s area;
 - A local authority (“A”) is within this section if: (a) the land is in the area of another local authority (“B”), (aa) B is a unitary council or a lower-tier district council, and (b) any part of the boundary of A’s area is also a part of the boundary of B’s area; and
 - If the land is in the area of an upper-tier county council (“C”), a local authority (“D”) is within this section if: (a) D is not a lower-tier district council, and (b) any part of the boundary of D’s area is also part of the boundary of C’s area.
- 6.2.8 Section 42(1)(b) local authorities are listed in **Table 6-1**.
- 6.2.9 The following activities were undertaken to consult Section 42(1)(b) consultees:
- On 10 April 2024 a consultation letter was sent along with a copy of the Project Community Newsletter and Section 48 notice;
 - An email was also sent on 10 April 2024 containing the letter and Section 48 notice;
 - A letter was sent on 5 June 2024 detailing the five week extension and new consultation deadline. Along with the letter, consultees were also sent a copy of the updated Section 48 notice; and

- An email containing the letter and Section 48 notice was also sent on 5 June 2024.

Prescribed Consultees under Section 42(1)(c)

- 6.2.10 Section 42(1)(c) requires consultation with the Greater London Authority (GLA) if the land is in Greater London. The Project is not within the GLA area and did not require consultation with the Section 42(1)(c) consultee.

Prescribed Consultees under Section 42(1)(d) and Section 44

- 6.2.11 In accordance with Section 42(1)(d) and Section 44 of the PA 2008, National Grid consulted with PILs, as set out below:
- Category 1: an owner, lessee, tenant (whatever the tenancy period) or occupier of the land;
 - Category 2: a person interested in the land, or has the power to sell and convey the land, or to release the land; and
 - Category 3: a person who would or might be entitled to make a relevant claim:
 - As a result of the implementing of the order;
 - As a result of the order having been implemented; or
 - As a result of use of the land once the order has been implemented.
- 6.2.12 National Grid carried out diligent inquiry to identify and consult with those with an interest in the affected land. This involved:
- Desktop referencing through extraction of Land Registry data, requests for land interest information from landowners and other desktop activities to identify open spaces and rights of way;
 - Posting land interest questionnaires (LIQs) to all parties identified as having an interest in the affected land; and
 - Site referencing through site visits to understand occupation details for properties.
- 6.2.13 Unknown land interests required further steps to be taken to establish ownership. This included the erection of site notices requesting information in prominent locations. The notices were kept on site and monitored regularly.
- 6.2.1 To identify Category 3 parties associated with Part 1 claims ahead of the Section 42 consultation, technical specialists involved in preparing the EIA advised on the anticipated impacts of relevant environmental factors to inform where properties might have an adverse effect as a result of the operation of the Project to check that those with a potential claim were included. At the point of statutory consultation, environmental assessments were still ongoing. Therefore, a precautionary approach was used to include all properties in the proximity of potential important noise effects based on previous project experience.
- 6.2.2 Where a PIL had contacted National Grid to advise they are to be represented by a land agent, their land agent was advised by email that the LIQ was recently issued to their client(s) and if requested provided with a copy of the LIQ document. Land agents were contacted to discuss the LIQ and request it be completed and returned unless their client had already provided the information.
- 6.2.3 The following activities were undertaken to consult Section 42(1)(d) and Section 44 consultees:

- A consultation letter was sent to Section 42(1)(d) and Section 44 consultees;
- Letters were issued to 5,016 PILs during the week commencing 8 April 2024;
- Any newly identified PILs were written to on a weekly basis;
- A letter was sent to 5,108 PILs on the week commencing 10 June 2024 detailing the five-week extension and new consultation deadline; and
- Any newly identified PILs were written to when at least 28 days remained of the consultation window.

Notifying the Secretary of State under Section 46

- 6.2.4 In accordance with Section 46 of the PA 2008, National Grid notified the Planning Inspectorate of the upcoming statutory consultation by email, formatted as a letter on 8 April 2024. Enclosed with the email was the following information:
- Letters sent to Section 42 consultees;
 - Section 48 notice; and
 - Consultation feedback questionnaire.
- 6.2.5 Formal acknowledgement of the receipt of the Section 46 letter was issued by email to National Grid on 9 April 2024, as published on the Inspectorate's website.

Consulting the Local Community under Section 47

- 6.2.6 In accordance with Section 47 of the PA 2008, National Grid consulted the local community about the proposed application.
- 6.2.7 This was done in line with the SoCC, which was published on 10 April 2024. The Section 47 notice was published in three local newspapers on 10 April 2024 and 11 April 2024.
- 6.2.8 It could be accessed on the Project website at the start of statutory consultation on 10 April 2024.
- 6.2.9 Two consultation zones were developed to inform engagement with the local community:
- The PCZ, which included people and businesses with property postcodes within 1 km of the Project's draft Order Limits (representing the anticipated extent of land in which the Project may take place). The PCZ amounted to approximately 77,000 addresses. Where appropriate, the PCZ was extended to include whole streets and postcodes rather than the 1 km boundary dissecting hamlets or neighbourhoods; and
 - The SCZ, which comprised of a 4 km buffer around the draft Order Limits, whereby wider publicity of the Project took place.
- 6.2.10 National Grid also consulted the following groups and individuals, as committed in the SoCC:
- Members of Parliament (MPs) representing constituencies within and bordering both consultation zones;

- Elected representatives in local authorities where the Project is situated, including dedicated briefings for lead members during the statutory consultation period as requested; and
- ‘Seldom heard groups’ within both consultation zones, representing people who are unlikely to respond to traditional consultation techniques and may need additional support to access materials. National Grid undertook research to identify local seldom heard organisations and local with local authorities and other bodies as needed to identify additional groups.

6.3 How National Grid Consulted

- 6.3.1 In accordance with Section 48 of the PA 2008 National Grid published the Section 48 notice in five newspapers at the launch of the consultation on 10 April 2024.
- 6.3.2 The Section 48 notice was republished on 12 June 2024 detailing the five-week consultation period extension.
- 6.3.3 Copies of the Section 48 notice were also placed at 46 locations along the route placed approximately 5 km from each other. Site notices were also placed on 605 parcels of un-registered land.
- 6.3.4 In accordance with Regulation 13 of The Infrastructure Planning (Environmental Impact Assessment) Regulations 2017 (the EIA Regulations) all prescribed Section 42(1)(a) consultees including environmental bodies were sent a copy of the Section 48 notice.
- 6.3.5 National Grid’s consultation activities for the statutory consultation included:
- Setting up a Project specific website including an interactive map, public consultation pages and consultation materials, as well as dedicated email and telephone information line;
 - Mailing a consultation pack directly to properties in the PCZ within 1 km of the draft Order Limits;
 - Sending a consultation letter to all identified non-prescribed consultees;
 - Providing monthly notifications to Project update subscribers;
 - Producing materials to support consultation, including a 2024 Project Background Document, Community Newsletter, Preliminary Environmental Information Report (PEIR) and Non-Technical Summary (NTS), 2024 Design Development Report, 2024 Strategic Options Back Check and Review, 2023 Non-statutory Consultation Feedback Report, Project maps, consultation banners, Interactive Map, consultation notices, SoCC, and feedback questionnaire;
 - Holding online and in person events- including webinars;
 - Making information and materials available at inspection locations in close proximity to the Project; and
 - Media and social media promotional activity.
- 6.3.6 Table 6-2 provides an overview of the key activities conducted during the statutory consultation. Full details will be provided in the Consultation Report which will be submitted with the application.

The approach taken was defined as part of the development of the SoCC, giving LPAs the opportunity to influence this approach. The methods and tools as identified within the SoCC are included in **Table 6-3**.
- 6.3.8 To reach the majority of seldom heard groups, the Project website was available throughout the consultation period, and the online questionnaire was available at all times during the consultation period to allow consultees to respond at a time that suited them. In terms of publicity a mix of social media and traditional newspaper advertising was used to broaden the reach of the consultation.

6.4 Feedback Received

- 6.4.1 A total of 12,996 feedback submissions were received during the 2024 statutory consultation period from community stakeholders and consultees, along with members of the local community. This comprised of:
- 433 paper response forms;
 - 1,877 online response forms;
 - 6,499 emails sent to the Project inbox; and
 - 4,187 letters (including 4,099 slips of the same feedback).
- 6.4.2 Responses were received from 91 Section 42(1)(a) consultees.
- 6.4.3 Responses were received from 24 Section 42(1)(b) consultees.
- 6.4.4 Responses were received from 37 non-prescribed consultees and key stakeholder organisations.
- 6.4.5 All responses received will be considered and reported on in the Consultation Report, which will be provided as part of the Application.

6.5 Evolution of the Project Presented at 2024 Statutory Consultation

- 6.5.1 Feedback received from the statutory consultation has and continues to shape the Project through proposed changes to the location and design of permanent and temporary infrastructure. This is demonstrated through carrying out a series of targeted consultations as detailed in Chapter 7. A summary of feedback received and how we had regard to feedback will be detailed in the Consultation Report which will be submitted as part of the Application.

7. 2025 Targeted Consultations

7.1 Purpose of the Consultations

7.1.1 National Grid held further targeted consultations to provide stakeholders and the public the opportunity to provide feedback on proposed changes to the proposals in specific areas.

7.1.2 As the proposed changes would not fundamentally change the Project as a whole, a targeted consultation approach was used in line with guidance in paragraph 20 of the PA 2008: Pre-application stage for Nationally Significant Infrastructure Projects issued in April 2024 by the Department for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities (now Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government) which states:

‘In understanding whether there has been a material and substantial change, applicants should take into account the following guiding factors:

- *the degree of change as compared to the proposals previously consulted upon as a whole;*
- *the number of materially worse environmental effects as compared to what has been the subject of previous consultations; and*
- *the level of public interest, and the likelihood that such interest would merit further consideration in the context of that change.*

‘For any material change to a part of the proposed application where the project as a whole is not fundamentally changed, for example in the case of linear aspects where new information leads to a new alignment for a particular section of the proposal, a bespoke and targeted approach to further consultation can be adopted, which can address the specific consultation obligations arising proportionately.

“Targeted consultation can be statutory or non-statutory or a combination of the two depending on whether new persons needing to be consulted under section 42 of the Planning Act have been identified, but such targeted consultation will not require the production of PEI provided proportionate and appropriate information on environmental implications of any changes, where necessary, is provided.’

7.1.3 National Grid took a combined approach of statutory and non-statutory targeted consultations as follows:

- Norfolk and Suffolk targeted non-statutory community consultation: Thursday 30 January to Monday 3 March 2025;
- Essex and Thurrock targeted non-statutory community consultation: Tuesday 25 February to Thursday 27 March 2025; and
- Thurrock 3 targeted statutory community consultation: Tuesday 18 March to Thursday 17 April 2025.

7.1.4 A targeted statutory community consultation for Thurrock 3 was decided as the proposed changes to existing overhead lines and primary access routes in Tilbury could affect new communities, residents and landowners in the area.

- 7.1.5 The targeted consultations had the following aims:
- Provide an overview of the updated proposals to local communities and stakeholders in locations where changes are being considered to the proposal;
 - Explain why changes are being proposed to the proposals since the 2024 statutory consultation;
 - Outline the environmental implications of proposed changes (EIC);
 - Ensure all local stakeholders and consultees have the opportunity to provide feedback on the work to date; and
 - Outline the next steps and the programme and how the proposals will be further developed and how feedback would be taken into account.

7.2 ‘Targeted Consultation Strategy’ document

- 7.2.1 The approach to the Norfolk, Suffolk, Essex and Thurrock targeted non-statutory community consultations was set out in the draft Targeted Consultation Strategy document. This outlined why further targeted consultations were taking place, who and how National Grid were consulting and how to provide feedback.
- 7.2.2 LPAs in which National Grid was to hold targeted consultations were invited to briefing sessions on the strategy for the targeted community consultations. These briefing sessions took place on 19, 20 and 27 November 2024. Further to these briefings, LPAs were provided with the draft Targeted Consultation Strategy document via email on 4 December 2024 and were asked to provide feedback on the strategy. All feedback was considered and where practicable taken on board by National Grid. A copy of the feedback received will be provided in the Consultation Report.
- 7.2.3 A final version of the Targeted Consultation Strategy document, including maps of the consultation zones in Norfolk, Suffolk, Essex and Thurrock, was published on the Project website on 30 January 2025 and can be viewed on the Document Library <https://www.nationalgrid.com/electricity-transmission/network-and-infrastructure/infrastructure-projects/norwich-to-tilbury/document-library>.

7.6 Who National Grid Consulted

- 7.6.1 The targeted consultations were open to anyone with an interest in the Project. Bespoke consultation zones were developed to assist engagement with the local communities where proposed changes were being considered.
- 7.6.2 Consultation zones were created following the principle that each consultation zone should be appropriate and proportionate in relation to the type and potential impact of

the change. Where it was appropriate to do so, potential changes were grouped with a single consultation zone covering the grouped changes.

- 7.6.3 For the Norfolk and Suffolk targeted consultations, four consultation zones were established in Norfolk and six consultation zones were created in Suffolk. For the Essex and Thurrock targeted consultations, 13 consultation zones were established in Essex and two consultation zones were created in Thurrock.
- 7.6.4 Consultation on Thurrock 3 was undertaken as targeted statutory consultation and therefore National Grid had a duty to consult the local community in accordance with Section 47 of the PA 2008. A two-tier consultation zone was developed to assist engagement with the local community where changes were being considered, consistent with the approach taken during 2024 statutory consultation. This involved a 1 km consultation zone around the proposed new substation location, permanent assets and changes to the overhead lines, a 250 m zone from the proposed Order Limits for the modifications to the existing overhead lines, and a 250 m zone from primary access routes.
- 7.6.5 During all targeted consultations, the following groups and stakeholders were notified about the consultations:
- Parish councils representing parishes where any proposed changes fell within their parish boundary;
 - MPs representing constituencies where the location of the proposed changes fell into all or part of the constituency;
 - Elected representatives in local authorities where the location of the proposed changes fell into all or part of their ward;
 - PILs within the order limits of the relevant consultation zones;
 - ‘Seldom heard groups’ within a relevant consultation zone, representing people who are unlikely to respond to traditional consultation techniques and may need additional support to access materials; and
 - Local interest groups, such as residents’ associations, community groups and groups with particular specialisms, such as local heritage or wildlife.
- 7.6.6 In addition to the local community and stakeholders, for the Thurrock 3 targeted statutory consultation National Grid also consulted with prescribed bodies and local authorities under Section 42(1)(a) and (b) of the PA 2008. PILs, under Section 42(1)(d) and Section 44 were also consulted with.

- Producing materials to support consultation, including Norwich to Tilbury – Targeted Consultation Strategy, consultation leaflets specific to each location reference including the relevant maps, Environmental Implication of Change (EIC) documents relevant to each location reference, and a feedback questionnaire;
- Holding webinars and telephone appointments;
- Notifying the contact database via the regular Project update email newsletter; and
- Local and regional media promotional activity.

7.7.2 For the Thurrock 3 targeted statutory consultation, additional consultation activities included:

- Producing additional materials including Targeted Statutory Consultation Strategy, Consultation Summary Document, Design Development Report, and exhibition banners;
- Holding in-person events; and
- Making information and materials available at inspection locations in close proximity to the proposed changes.

9. Consultation and Engagement after Targeted Consultations

9.1 Introduction

- 9.1.1 This chapter sets out the additional consultation and engagement which took place in the period between the close of the targeted consultation and submission of the AoCM.
- 9.1.2 The additional consultation and engagement was undertaken following certain localised amendments made to the design of the Project and also in light of ongoing diligent inquiry.
- 9.1.3 Land referencing had been carried out to identify changes in land ownership and other interests in land following the close of targeted consultation. Updates were requested from Land Registry and newly identified PILs were issued with a land interest questionnaire (LIQ). These were followed up using contact details where available and site visits.

9.2 Additional Section 42 Consultation with Section 44 Parties-PILs

- 9.2.1 Additional consultation and engagement is ongoing with PILs.
- 9.2.2 The ongoing additional consultation and engagement is in accordance with the principles and methods set out in the Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC).
- 9.2.3 This additional consultation and engagement includes:
 - Consultation with PILs that have been previously consulted but are now impacted differently; and
 - Consultation under section 42(1)(d) of the Act with new PILs identified after the close of the targeted consultations, which may have arisen from design changes having introduced new land parcels into the Order Limits; from changes in land ownership within the previous Order Limits; or from ongoing diligent inquiry identifying new interests.
- 9.2.4 Further information about the additional consultation and engagement after the targeted consultations, including responses to issues raised and a summary of changes made, will be included in the Consultation Report at DCO submission.

10. Conclusion

- 10.1.1 At each stage of pre-application consultation National Grid has undertaken consultation in accordance with the approach identified and in accordance with the Planning Act 2008, including Section 42, 47, and 48, as demonstrated in Appendix A.
- 10.1.2 National Grid has at all times during pre-application consultation given due consideration to all responses received at consultation and whilst it is not always possible to amend the design in response to such comments, a significant number of changes have been made and the Project has developed accordingly.
- 10.1.3 National Grid shared its approach to consultation during the statutory consultation within the SoCC. National Grid refined the engagement strategies and the SoCC alongside productive dialogue with host authorities, which included both informal and formal consultation on the draft document. National Grid complied with commitments outlined in the SoCC.
- 10.1.4 In accordance with the requirements under the Planning Act 2008, National Grid will prepare a Consultation Report which will provide details of each stage of consultation undertaken received as part of the pre application process and a summary of the responses received.
- 10.1.5 In light of the above, National Grid considers that the consultation of the Project has met the test of adequacy.

At the pre-application stage of the Nationally Significant Infrastructure Planning process, the Planning Act 2008: Pre-application stage for Nationally Significant Infrastructure Projects guidance and The Nationally Significant Infrastructure Projects: 2024 Pre-Application Prospectus introduced the Adequacy of Consultation Milestone (AoCM).

The AoCM is a written submission to the Inspectorate to allow for early consideration of the adequacy of consultation carried out by the applicant at pre-application stage. The Guidance recommends the AoCM to be no later than around 3 months before the intended date of submission of the application.

The Norwich to Tilbury AoCM will address the following aspects:

- the consultation undertaken to date;
- how the approaches set out in the Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC) have been met; and
- the way in which the consultation responses are shaping the application.

Both the Guidance and Prospectus state that the submission should also include, if available, the views and any relevant supporting material from local authorities.

RE: ADEQUACY OF CONSULTATION FEEDBACK

Thank you for providing Basildon Borough Council with the opportunity to respond regarding the adequacy of the consultation process for the Norwich to Tilbury scheme to date. This response should be viewed alongside the submission from ECC and other host local authorities for the project.

To the best of the Council's knowledge, it is believed that National Grid has correctly identified the parties to be consulted, has complied with their duty to consult all relevant parties and carried out consultation events in line with its Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC).

However, the Council does have some observations on the process, as set out below.

The Council had regard to the information contained in the table accompanying your letter of 14th April 2025, which gave 21 days to issue a response on the adequacy of consultation. Although this was useful in terms of assessing compliance with commitments in the SoCC, it is considered that this does not comprehensively reflect the actions carried out in connection with the targeted consultation exercises in the first quarter of 2025.

The Council understands that formal stakeholder responses to the 2024 statutory consultation were appraised, and that these subsequently informed the range of localised changes proposed to the scheme's design. In turn, those proposed changes were then subject to a round of consultation (the various targeted localised consultations) in early 2025.

However, none of the feedback to last year's statutory consultation is published in the public domain. Without a "Schedule of Changes" style document being available to outline the changes proposed and explain the reasoning behind National Grid's decisions to action certain amendments and disregard others, it is difficult to gauge the merit of the changes which have been proposed, and stakeholders are unable to fully comprehend the impacts of the scheme at particular locations along the route as the data is not in the public domain.

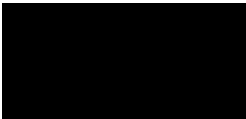
This is detrimental to the transparency of the overall process and to the design evolution of the project. Although the changes proposed through the targeted consultation within Basildon borough were relatively minor and raised no concerns, this may not be the case elsewhere on the route.

The Council understands that, in addition to the changes that were publicised and consulted on during the targeted consultation periods, there are other changes to the scheme design which were not included in the process, and, subsequently, were not subject to consultation. The Council understands this is because, in National Grid's view, some of these changes were considered to be of such a minor nature that they have no material impact on the proposed development. However, any concentration of non-material changes can be aggregated to have a bearing on their materiality, and how these would be experienced by residents of the area.

Transparency is important in the planning process, and National Grid must acknowledge the importance of feedback from residents and community representatives to ensure that the final proposal is the most appropriate. As such, all stakeholders must be provided with comprehensive information in order that they can fully understand (and thus comment on), the effect of the proposed localised changes on their properties and assets, or their general business operations where this is relevant.

Thank you for your letter dated 14th April 2025 in which you ask Braintree District Council (BDC) for comments on the adequacy of consultation carried out to date on this project during the pre-application stage, prior to the formal requirements of Section 55(4) at the acceptance stage of the DCO process.

1. Purpose of The Adequacy of Consultation Milestone (AoCM)

- 1.1. The Adequacy of Consultation Milestone (AoCM) is intended to allow early consideration of the adequacy of consultation undertaken by the applicant, to minimise any risk at the acceptance stage, of the application progressing to examination. It will help inform the Planning Inspectorate's decision on whether the consultation arrangements have been sufficient for the level of complexity of the proposed project.
- 1.2. Consultation with the public and other key stakeholders is not only a statutory requirement but is also fundamental to securing public confidence in the process. It is therefore important that as a minimum, consultation is conducted in accordance with Sections 42, 47 & 48 of the Planning Act and the published Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC).
- 1.3. In providing this response, we have had regard to the information contained in the table accompanying your letter of 14th April and although useful in terms of assessing compliance with commitments in the SoCC, it is considered it fails to comprehensively reflect what actions have been carried out in connection with the targeted consultation undertaken earlier this year. This is set out in more detail within this response.

2. Summary of Pre-Application Consultation

- 2.1. National Grid Electricity Transmission (NGET) have carried out the following consultations to which BDC has responded as part of its ongoing engagement with ECC and local residents and stakeholders.
 - i. Non-Statutory Consultation (First) – held between 21 April 2022 and 16 June 2022.

- ii. Non-Statutory Consultation (Second) – held between 27 June 2023 and 21 August 2023.
- iii. Statutory Consultation – held between Wednesday 10 April and Tuesday 18 June 2024 (extended until 26 July 2024).
- iv. Statutory Consultation – held between Wednesday 10 April and Tuesday 18 June 2024 (extended until 26 July 2024).
- v. Targeted Consultation for Essex – held between Tuesday 25 February until Thursday 27 March 2025.

3. Statutory Requirements

- 3.1. BDC's comments are centred around the pre-application stage of the DCO process and as requested, this response gives BDC's opinion as to whether National Grid Electricity Transmission (NGET), has to date complied with the following duties under the Planning Act 2008:

- Section 42 – Duty to consult
- Section 47 – Duty to consult the local community
- Section 48 – Duty to publicise

4. Section 42 – Duty to Consult

- 4.1. Section 42 of the Planning Act 2008 prescribes who should be consulted on the proposal.

The applicant must consult the following about the proposed application –

- a) *such persons as may be prescribed,*
 - a. *the Marine Management Organisation (MMO), in any case where the proposed development would affect, or would be likely to affect, any of the areas specified in subsection (2),*
- b) *each local authority that is within section 43,*
- c) *the Greater London Authority if the land is in Greater London, and*
- d) *each person who is within one or more of the categories set out in section 44.*

Subsection a) refers to 'such persons as may be prescribed'. These persons are listed in Schedule 1 to the Infrastructure Planning (Applications: Prescribed Forms and Procedure) Regulations 2009.

- 4.2. BDC is satisfied that NGET has correctly identified the parties to be consulted as required by Section 42 and to the best of BDC's knowledge, has complied with their duty to consult those parties.

5. Section 47 – Duty to Consult Local Community

- 5.1. Section 47 of the Planning Act 2008 obliges developers to prepare a Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC) in consultation with the relevant Local Authorities, publish that SoCC and then undertake statutory consultation in conformity with that statement.

- 1. The applicant must prepare a statement setting out how the applicant proposes to consult, about the proposed application, people living in the vicinity of the land.
- 2. Before preparing the statement, the applicant must consult each local authority that is within section 43(1) about what is to be in the statement.

3. The deadline for the receipt by the applicant of a local authority's response to consultation under subsection (2) is the end of the period of 28 days that begins with the day after the day on which the local authority receives the consultation documents.
4. In subsection (3) "the consultation documents" means the documents supplied to the local authority by the applicant for the purpose of consulting the local authority under subsection (2).
5. In preparing the statement, the applicant must have regard to any response to consultation under subsection (2) that is received by the applicant before the deadline imposed by subsection (3).
6. Once the applicant has prepared the statement, the applicant must—
 - (za) make the statement available for inspection by the public in a way that is reasonably convenient for people living in the vicinity of the land,
 - (a) publish, in a newspaper circulating in the vicinity of the land, a notice stating where and when the statement can be inspected, and
 - (b) publish the statement in such manner as may be prescribed.
7. The applicant must carry out consultation in accordance with the proposals set out in the statement.

- a. Section 42 of the Planning Act 2008 prescribes who should be consulted on the proposal.

- 5.2. The statutory consultation was subsequently held between 10 April 2024 and 26 July 2024 with the targeted consultation for Essex taking place between 25 February 2025 to 27 March 2025.
- 5.3. BDC has no reason to doubt that NGET undertook the consultation in a way that was in accordance with the published SoCC and accordingly has complied with the duties set out in Section 47 of the Planning Act.
- 5.4. It should be noted that the statutory consultation was extended to acknowledge the general election held on 4 July. This extension was welcomed by BDC.

6. Section 48 – Duty to Publicise

- 6.1. Section 48 of the Planning Act 2008 obliges developers to publicise their proposals by means of notices in local and national newspapers.
 1. The applicant must publicise the proposed application in the prescribed manner.
 2. Regulations made for the purposes of subsection (1) must, in particular, make provision for publicity under subsection (1) to include a deadline for receipt by the applicant of responses to the publicity.
- 6.2. BDC has no reason to doubt that NGET published the required notices and that the content of those notices complied with the requirements set out in the regulations. BDC therefore considers NGET has to the best of our knowledge and subject to the review of Consultation Report, complied with their duty to publicise under this section of the Planning Act 2008.

7. Position regarding Statutory Requirements

- 7.1. Taking the above comments into account and subject to the review of the Consultation Report, it is BDC's current opinion that NGET has carried out sufficient pre-application consultation on the proposed Norwich to Tilbury project in accordance with the agreed SoCC and in line with Sections 42, 47 and 48 of the Planning Act 2008.
- 7.2. While BDC recognises the challenges a project of this scale and complexity presents, and notwithstanding our current opinion of the minimum statutory tests being complied with, there are several observations on the consultation process and how it could be enhanced which we have set out below. These comments have been provided in the interest of ensuring that consultation on this NSIP is carried out effectively and positively, allowing communities and stakeholders to fully engage, and have their comments properly recorded and considered in a transparent process of design iteration.

8. Observations on Consultation (to date)

Consultation Feedback

- 8.1. Unfortunately, unlike for the non-statutory consultation, no feedback has been published in response to the statutory consultation undertaken in 2024. Moreover, it is understood that responses from this statutory consultation have informed the localised changes proposed to the scheme under the targeted consultation. However, without sight of any feedback on the issues raised by the public/stakeholders in their responses, it is difficult to understand the rationale behind or the merits of the changes proposed, when compared to those issues also raised by residents/stakeholders that it was felt did not warrant any change to the scheme and therefore, were not addressed.
- 8.2. It is considered this is detrimental to the transparency of the overall process and design evolution of the Project. BDC would encourage NGET to be more transparent in their publication of feedback drawing upon best practice examples on how to effectively communicate this at pre-application stage in a clear and transparent way, possibly making greater use of the community newsletter and project updates.
- 8.3. BDC would also welcome early sight of the draft consultation report so we can understand better the matters which have been raised and work collaboratively to address issues where we can.

Targeted Consultation

- 8.4. As per our Targeted Consultation response (dated 27 March 2025), BDC understands that in addition to the changes that were publicised and consulted on through the targeted consultation, there are other changes to the scheme design that were not included in this process. It is understood this is because some are considered to be of such a minor nature that they have no material impact on the proposed development as experienced by residents.
- 8.5. The importance of feedback from residents and community representatives in developing the most appropriate proposal is clearly recognised, and it is therefore important that residents are provided with comprehensive information in order that they can fully understand (and thus comment on), the effect of the proposed localised changes on their properties.
- 8.6. While it is acknowledged these changes may not be the most significant, BDC considers that to local residents who may reside close to them their significance may be greater,

and they should therefore have been given an opportunity to comment on them. The concentration of non-material changes may also have a bearing on their materiality and how they are experienced by local residents.

- 8.7. BDC is also concerned about the impact on confidence in the process if residents subsequently identify these changes and raise concerns about their effects. It would also refer to Planning Inspectorate's Nationally Significant Infrastructure Projects: Advice on Good Design which highlights the importance of transparency in the process and emphasises that a good design process includes an "effective, intentional, transparent and deliverable process".
- 8.8. Officers have previously and repeatedly, requested a list of these non-material changes, and it is extremely disappointing that residents are not being made aware of these non-material changes as well as those currently being consulted on.
- 8.9. Overall, it is considered this decision could mean it is difficult for stakeholders to fully comprehend the impacts of the scheme at particular locations.

Bespoke Consultation Zones

- 8.10. In our response to the draft SoCC provided by NGET in respect of the targeted consultation, it was noted that only those in the consultation zones would receive direct notifications. BDC highlighted the importance of community engagement around these proposed changes and the likely negative perception of the wider stakeholder group should specific re-consultation be carried out. While it is acknowledged that notification of changes for some areas was published in the community newsletter, this in BDC's opinion didn't go far enough to address the likely negative perception issues (as above).

9. Comments in respect of ES

- 9.1. BDC recognises that this is a large and complex project and welcomes the extensive engagement to date across a range of technical subjects that are informing the ES. However, it is felt that progress on the SoCG is being hampered by the lack of available detailed information to enable matters to be agreed early in the process. This makes it difficult for BDC to reach an informed position on various aspects of the project at this time.
- 9.2. BDC remains committed to front loading the resolution of issues through the pre-application phase and this situation is likely to create additional pressures at examination. This is compounded by the focus on progressing towards a fixed submission date for the DCO which is likely to impact on the time available to consider options and comments received. Additional time for the public to comment on the targeted consultation (an increase from 4 weeks to 6 weeks) was also requested in BDC's response to the draft SOCC but not agreed.
- 9.3. It is important to note that there is no suggestion of any intent by NGET to delay providing information or deliberately make understanding the full extent of the scheme's impacts difficult, but to achieve a good understanding of the scheme and its impacts requires a substantial amount of work and resources including time. It is therefore important that parties continue to work together, and that proportionate time is made available to consider and respond to the information as it is made available.
- 9.4. BDC remains hopeful that many of these outstanding matters can be satisfactorily addressed through our ongoing engagement with NGET informing the SoCG prior to the examination.

10. Scheme Revisions

- 10.1. As would be expected for a scheme of this scale and complexity, there are numerous examples where changes have been made to the proposed scheme since the first non-statutory consultation was undertaken in 2022. The fact that changes have been made as a result of consultation is of course welcomed, and BDC supports many of the changes made. We do consider however that in many cases the changes proposed do not go far enough to address the issue in question, especially across Essex more generally. Moreover, we believe that predominantly, the changes made are relatively minor in nature and to date there has not been agreement to any of the more substantive changes that have been requested by BDC and other stakeholders.
- 10.2. There remains a concern therefore that NGET have not addressed legitimate concerns held by BDC and other stakeholders on aspects of the scheme that are most in need of change whether it be because of cost or impact on programme and have not weighted the effect on new developments and communities sufficiently. It follows that if the DCO application is accepted, BDC intend to support other stakeholders to continue making representations to NGET and if necessary to the examination on changes necessary to make the scheme acceptable locally.

11. Summary & Conclusion

- 11.1. With reference to your request for comments on the adequacy of consultation carried out to date on this project during the pre-application stage, BDC is of the opinion that the consultation conducted has been sufficient to meet the legal tests at S42, 47 & 48 of the Planning Act 2008.
- 11.2. BDC welcomes and appreciates the consultation and level of engagement to date and looks forward to this positive relationship continuing. It is though considered that the project is being progressed to the extent that some of the potential changes which could have significant and obvious benefit have not been fully considered. As a result, whilst BDC and other stakeholders are working closely with NGET to develop the Statements of Common Ground, many issues remain.
- 11.3. For these reasons we believe it will be particularly important for NGET to continue meaningful engagement with stakeholders over the coming months in an effort to resolve as many of the outstanding issues as possible prior to the submission of the DCO.

Thank you for your letter dated 14th April 2025 in which you ask Brentwood Borough Council (BBC) for comments on the adequacy of consultation carried out to date on this project during the pre-application stage, prior to the formal requirements of Section 55(4) at the acceptance stage of the DCO process.

BBC is of the understanding that the Adequacy of Consultation Milestone (AoCM) allows early assessment of whether the applicant's consultation efforts meet the required standards, reducing the risk of delays at the application acceptance stage. It helps the Planning Inspectorate determine if the consultation was appropriate for the project's complexity.

Public and stakeholder consultation is both a legal requirement and essential for building trust in the process. At a minimum, it must comply with Sections 42, 47, and 48 of the Planning Act and align with the published Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC).

BBC note National Grid Electricity Transmission (NGET) have carried out the following consultations to which the Council has responded as part of its ongoing engagement:

- I. Non-Statutory Consultation (First) – held between 21 April 2022 and 16 June 2022.
- II. Non-Statutory Consultation (Second) – held between 27 June 2023 and 21 August 2023.
- III. Statutory Consultation – held between Wednesday 10 April and Tuesday 18 June 2024 (extended until 26th July 2024). iv)
- IV. Targeted Consultation for Essex – held between Tuesday 25 February until Thursday 27 March 2025

In preparing this response, we considered the table included with your letter dated 14 April. Our comments are centered around the pre application stage of the DCO process and as requested, this response gives BBC's opinion as to whether NGET, has to date complied with the following duties under the Planning Act 2008:

- Section 42 – Duty to consult
- Section 47 – Duty to consult the local community
- Section 48 – Duty to publicise

Section 42 – Duty to Consult

Section 42 of the Planning Act 2008 prescribes who should be consulted on the proposal. BBC is satisfied that NGET has correctly identified the parties to be consulted as required by

Section 42 and to the best of BBC's knowledge, has complied with their duty to consult those parties.

Section 47 – Duty to Consult Local Community

Section 47 of the Planning Act 2008 obliges developers to prepare a Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC) in consultation with the relevant Local Authorities, publish that SoCC and then undertake statutory consultation in conformity with that statement.

BBC acknowledges that NGET conducted the consultation in accordance with the published SoCC and fulfilled its obligations under Section 47 of the Planning Act. The extension of the statutory consultation to accommodate the 4th July general election was noted and welcomed by BBC.

Section 48 – Duty to Publicise

Section 48 of the Planning Act 2008 obliges developers to publicise their proposals by means of notices in local and national newspapers.

BBC acknowledges that NGET published the required notices in compliance with regulatory content standards. BBC therefore considers that NGET has met its duty to publicise under the Planning Act 2008.

Position regarding Statutory Requirements

Given the above, it is BBC's opinion that NGET has carried out sufficient pre-application consultation on the proposed Norwich to Tilbury project in accordance with the agreed SoCC and in line with Sections 42, 47 and 48 of the Planning Act 2008. While BBC considers that the minimum statutory requirements have been met, the Council wishes to take this opportunity to formally record the following concerns.

Consultation Feedback

Unlike the non-statutory consultation, no feedback has been published following the 2024 statutory consultation. While it is understood that responses informed the localised changes presented in the targeted consultation, the absence of published feedback makes extremely difficult to assess the rationale behind these changes. It also raises questions about why some issues prompted revisions while others did not. It is believed this lack of transparency undermines confidence in the consultation process and the project's design evolution.

Moving forward BBC would greatly welcome early access to the draft Consultation Report to better understand the issues raised and to collaborate on addressing them where possible.

Targeted Consultation

BBC understands that, beyond the changes consulted on during the targeted consultation, additional design changes have been made to the scheme. These were not included in the consultation, reportedly due to their minor nature and perceived lack of material impact on residents.

While it is acknowledged these changes may not be the most significant, BBC emphasises the importance of providing residents and community representatives with clear, comprehensive information to help them understand and respond to any localised changes affecting their properties.

Even minor changes can have a significant impact on those living nearby, and residents should have been given the opportunity to comment. It is disappointing that residents are not being made aware of these non-material changes as well as those consulted on.

Scheme Revisions

Given the scale and complexity of the scheme, it is understandable that numerous changes have been made since the initial non-statutory consultation in 2022. BBC welcomes the fact that consultation has led to some revisions and supports many of the changes introduced. However, we believe that in many instances, the adjustments do not sufficiently address the underlying concerns. Most of the changes appear to be relatively minor, and to date, none of the more significant modifications requested by BBC and other stakeholders - particularly those relating to the potential impact on the viability of Dunton Hills Garden Village - have been agreed to.

This raises ongoing concerns that NGET has not adequately responded to the legitimate issues raised by BBC and others, especially where changes are most needed. These may have been overlooked due to cost implications or potential delays to the programme. Furthermore, the impact on emerging developments and new communities does not appear to have been given appropriate weight.

Should the DCO application be accepted, BBC intends to continue engaging with NGET and, if necessary, raise these matters during the examination process to advocate for the changes we believe are essential to ensure the scheme is locally acceptable.

Closing remarks

In response to your request for comments on the adequacy of consultation during the pre-application stage, BBC considers that the consultation has met the legal requirements under Sections 42, 47, and 48 of the Planning Act 2008.

However, we are concerned that the project has progressed in a way that may have limited consideration of certain potential changes that could offer clear and significant benefits. While BBC continues to work closely with NGET on the Statements of Common Ground, key issues remain unresolved.

It is therefore essential that NGET maintains meaningful engagement with stakeholders, including BBC, in the coming months to address as many of these outstanding matters as possible ahead of the DCO submission.

Scope of CCC's comments

For the avoidance of doubt, these comments are made without prejudice to CCC's Adequacy of Consultation Response which will be made to the Planning Inspectorate under Section 55(4)(b) of the Planning Act 2008.

Our comments are centred around the pre application stage of the Development Consent Order (DCO) process and give CCC's consideration of whether the consultation arrangements proposed by National Grid (NG) to date are adequate for the level of the complexity of the proposed project.

CCC will provide a full response as to whether NG has complied with these sections of the Planning Act in its Adequacy of Consultation response to the Planning Inspectorate.

- Non-Statutory Consultation (First) – held between 21 April 2022 and 16 June 2022.
- Non-Statutory Consultation (Second) – held between 27 June 2023 and 21 August 2023.
- Statutory Consultation – held between Wednesday 10 April 2024 and Tuesday 18 June 2024 (extended until 26th July 2024).
- Targeted Consultation – held between Tuesday 25 February 2025 until Thursday 27 March 2025.

Statement of Community Consultation

Section 47 of the Planning Act 2008 requires developers to prepare a Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC) in consultation with the relevant Local Authorities, publish that SoCC and then undertake statutory consultation in conformity with that statement.

NG sent CCC a draft SoCC on 1st December 2023 and we responded on 5th January 2024. The SoCC was then published for consultation in March 2024 and CCC sent a formal response on 2nd April 2024. A further draft SoCC in respect of the proposed Targeted Consultation was issued on 4th December 2024 with CCC submitting comments on 18th December 2024.

A Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC) compliance table has been submitted as part of this Adequacy of Consultation Milestone. It details National Grids commitments within the SoCC and explains how NG have complied with it, but it does not explain how NG has considered CCC's comments, nor those of other stakeholders and Members of the Public. Neither does it refer to the Targeted Consultation dated February to March this year.

It is understood that a Consultation Report; prepared in accordance with Section 37(c) of the Planning Act, will be submitted upon submission of the application and will address these concerns. In the absence of this report, it is not possible to determine whether the consultation has sufficiently considered the relevant parties concerns or whether further changes to the scheme; that would warrant additional consultation, are necessary.

Observations on Consultation

In the interests of engaging with the process, CCC has several observations on the consultation undertaken to date which are set out below.

Absence of feedback

No feedback has been published in response to the Statutory Consultation undertaken in 2024. This is concerning because it is understood that responses from the Statutory Consultation have informed the localised changes proposed to the scheme under the Targeted Consultation. Without first seeing any feedback on the issues raised in the responses received from the public / stakeholders, it is difficult for CCC to understand the rationale behind or the merits of the changes proposed under the Targeted Consultation. and Statement of Community Consultation For example, what prompted these changes, what were they in response to and why were they necessary? Further, there is silence on what other

changes were proposed by interested parties and stakeholders but were discounted by NG. For example, what did not warrant a change to the scheme and why?

The lack of information makes it difficult to determine whether additional consultation is required and is detrimental to the transparency of the overall process and the design evolution of the proposal.

Targeted Consultation - General

CCC is aware that NG are seeking to undertake further changes to the proposal without consultation. It is understood this is because some changes are considered by NG to be of a minor nature such that they would have no material impact on the proposal.

The lack of transparency on this matter is concerning as the concept of materiality is enshrined in planning law. In the absence of details of the proposed changes, it is impossible to form a view as to whether the changes are material or not and to determine the appropriate level of consultation required.

The importance of consultation and feedback from residents and other stakeholders is central to planning. It is important that they are provided with comprehensive information to enable them to respond to the effect of the proposed localised changes and that changes are made clearly and transparently.

The results and outcomes of the consultation should be published as soon as they are available and should be communicated clearly to help residents and stakeholders understand the outcomes of the consultation and what the next steps will be.

This need for transparency is highlighted in the Planning Inspectorate's Nationally Significant Infrastructure Projects: Advice on Good Design which emphasises that a good design process includes an "effective, intentional, transparent and deliverable process". It is important that residents and stakeholders understand how their comments have informed the design review of the process.

Although a change may appear to be of a minor nature to NG, a resident / stakeholder may take a differing view, and the significance of these changes may be perceived by them to be greater. For example, the movement of a pylon closer / further along the proposed alignment could materially affect a resident's perception of outlook and living conditions. Should the DCO be granted, residents/stakeholders residing near to the pylons would have to live with them in perpetuity. It is thus critical that residents and stakeholders are given the opportunity to comment on all changes affecting them and for their concerns to be considered, before moving onto the next step of the process.

CCC is further concerned that a high amount of non-material changes could lead to a cumulative change in the nature of the proposal; such that the proposal submitted for examination is materially different to the proposal presented at Statutory Consultation stage. Should this be the case, it is likely that additional Statutory Consultation may be required before the examination can commence.

Officers have previously and repeatedly requested a list of non-material changes, but these have not been forthcoming and it is extremely disappointing that this information has not been provided.

Targeted Consultation – Great and Little Waltham

At the time of writing, CCC, has raised substantive concerns to the Targeted Consultation proposals affecting Great Waltham and Little Waltham and has proposed three alternative options, If agreed by NG, they would require further consultation prior to the submission of the proposal for examination.

CCC and NG are now seeking to work together in attempt to understand and where possible resolve these concerns before examination, but it is clear that more meaningful and responsive engagement with CCC, residents and stakeholders is needed to address these concerns.

Environmental Statement (ES)

Since the Statutory Consultation, CCC appreciate that information that has been shared by NG over this period. However, CCC and other stakeholders have consistently requested additional information / amendments to the proposal in relation to the ES which has not been forthcoming.

The lack of information makes it difficult for CCC to reach an informed position on various aspects of the project as the key evidence base informing the ES is still under preparation. This affects the ability of CCC and stakeholders to inform and have meaningful discussions in attempt to resolve outstanding issues relating to the ES. This includes, but is not limited to, full identification of the level of harm that may or may not be caused by the proposal in ES terms and the need for mitigation and its effect on harm.

Submission documents

CCC recognises this is a large and complex project and welcomes the engagement undertaken so far, but to date, CCC has not seen any of the draft submission documents, including the draft DCO itself. CCC has repeatedly been requesting this information since January 2025; reiterating the need to consider the terms and content of the DCO.

CCC is particularly concerned about the timescales for discharging the requirements; as CCC will be responsible for these discharging in the event that the DCO is granted and wants to ensure that the proposed timeframes are reasonable and deliverable. CCC now understand that this information will not be shared until June 2025 at the earliest meaning the timeframe to consider and obtain legal advice in respect of the DCO prior to submission of the proposal is limited.

CCC is keen to frontload the resolution of concerns at pre-submission stage and as it is aware of the pressures of the examination process. With the submission timetable being set for late August, CCC is concerned that it will have insufficient time to interpret and productively respond to the different technical elements of the examination.

In relation to the Statement of Common Ground (SoCG), this is being hampered by the lack of available detailed information to enable matters to be agreed/disagreed. This makes it difficult for CCC to reach an informed position on various aspects of the proposal at this time.

Conclusion

CCC acknowledges and welcomes NG's involvement to date and reiterates that it remains committed to working closely with NG. CCC appreciates National Grids desire to submit the proposal in late August, but is concerned that in the interests of programme, aspects of the proposal are being fast tracked. CCC is concerned that NG have not addressed legitimate concerns held by CCC and other stakeholders because of cost or impact on the programme and have not weighted these concerns appropriately.

Accordingly CCC considers that a late August submission is likely to be premature and implores NG to undertake more active and meaningful engagement with CCC, stakeholders and residents.

Adequacy of Consultation Milestone**

Statutory Requirements

Our comments are centred around the pre application stage of the DCO process and as requested, this response gives CCC's informal opinion as to whether National Grid Electricity Transmission (NGET), has to date complied with the following duties under the Planning Act 2008:

- Section 42 – Duty to consult
- Section 47 – Duty to consult the local community
- Section 48 – Duty to publicise

Section 42 – Duty to Consult

Section 42 of the Planning Act 2008 prescribes who should be consulted on the proposal.

The applicant must consult the following about the proposed application –

- (a) such persons as may be prescribed,*
- (aa) the Marine Management Organisation (MMO), in any case where the proposed development would affect, or would be likely to affect, any of the areas specified in subsection (2),*
- (b) each local authority that is within section 43,*
- (c) the Greater London Authority if the land is in Greater London, and*
- (d) each person who is within one or more of the categories set out in section 44.*

Subsection a) refers to 'such persons as may be prescribed'. These persons are listed in Schedule 1 to the Infrastructure Planning (Applications: Prescribed Forms and Procedure) Regulations 2009

CCC is satisfied that NGET has correctly identified the parties to be consulted as required by Section 42 and to the best of our knowledge, has complied with their duty to consult those parties.

Section 47 – Duty to Consult Local Community

Section 47 of the Planning Act 2008 obliges developers to prepare a Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC) in consultation with the relevant Local Authorities, publish that SoCC and then undertake statutory consultation in conformity with that statement.

- (1) The applicant must prepare a statement setting out how the applicant proposes to consult, about the proposed application, people living in the vicinity of the land.*
- (2) Before preparing the statement, the applicant must consult each local authority that is within section 43(1) about what is to be in the statement.*
- (3) The deadline for the receipt by the applicant of a local authority's response to consultation under subsection (2) is the end of the period of 28 days that begins with the day after the day on which the local authority receives the consultation documents.*
- (4) In subsection (3) "the consultation documents" means the documents supplied to the local authority by the applicant for the purpose of consulting the local authority under subsection (2).*
- (5) In preparing the statement, the applicant must have regard to any response to consultation under subsection (2) that is received by the applicant before the deadline imposed by subsection (3).*
- (6) Once the applicant has prepared the statement, the applicant must—*
 - (za) make the statement available for inspection by the public in a way that is reasonably convenient for people living in the vicinity of the land,*
 - (a) publish, in a newspaper circulating in the vicinity of the land, a notice stating where and when the statement can be inspected, and*
 - (b) publish the statement in such manner as may be prescribed.*
- (7) The applicant must carry out consultation in accordance with the proposals set out in the statement.*

CCC has no reason to doubt that NGET undertook the consultation in a way that was in accordance with the published SoCC and accordingly has complied with the duties set out in Section 47 of the Planning Act. It should be noted that the statutory consultation was extended due to the advent of a general election.

Section 48 – Duty to Publicise

Section 48 of the Planning Act 2008 obliges developers to publicise their proposals by means of notices in local and national newspapers.

- (1) *The applicant must publicise the proposed application in the prescribed manner.*
- (2) *Regulations made for the purposes of subsection (1) must, in particular, make provision for publicity under subsection (1) to include a deadline for receipt by the applicant of responses to the publicity.*

CCC has no reason to doubt that NGET published the required notices and that the content of those notices complied with the requirements set out in the regulations. CCC therefore considers NGET has complied with their duty to publicise under this section of the PA 2008.

Position regarding Statutory Requirements

Taking the above comments into account, it is CCC's current opinion that NGET has carried out adequate pre-application consultation on the proposed Norwich to Tilbury project in accordance with the agreed SoCC and in line with Sections 42, 47 and 48 of the Planning Act 2008, noting that in practice the legal requirements are a low bar.

Notwithstanding this CCC does have several observations on the consultation process thus far as follows and questions if the consultation has met the *Gunning* principles and in particular question if consultation (both stat and non-stat) has taken place when the scheme was at a sufficiently formative stage.

Feedback (or lack of)

Unfortunately, no feedback has been published in response to the statutory consultation undertaken in 2024. It is understood that responses from this statutory consultation have informed the localised changes proposed to the scheme under the targeted consultation. However, without first seeing any feedback on the issues raised in the responses received from the public / stakeholders, it is difficult to understand the rationale behind or the merits of, the changes proposed when compared with those issues raised by residents / stakeholders that it was felt did not warrant any change to the scheme and therefore, were not addressed. This is considered this is detrimental to the transparency of the overall process and design evolution of the Project.

Targeted Consultation

CCC understands that in addition to the changes that were publicised and consulted on through the targeted consultation, there are other changes to the scheme design that were not included in this process. It is understood this is because some are considered to be of such a minor nature that they have no material impact on the proposed development as experienced by residents. The importance of feedback from residents and community representatives in developing the most appropriate proposal is clearly recognised and it is therefore important, that residents are provided with comprehensive information in order that they can fully understand (and thus comment on), the effect of the proposed localised changes on their properties. While it is acknowledged these changes may not be the most significant, CCC considers that to local residents who may reside close to them, their significance may be greater, and they should therefore have been given an opportunity to comment on them. The concentration of non-material changes may also have a bearing on their materiality and how they are experienced by local residents. CCC is also concerned about the impact on confidence in the process if residents subsequently identify these changes and raise concerns about their effects. It would also refer to Planning Inspectorate's Nationally Significant Infrastructure Projects: Advice on Good Design which highlight the importance of transparency in the process and emphasises that a good design process includes an "effective, intentional, transparent and deliverable process". It is disappointing that residents are not being made aware of these non-material changes as well as those currently being consulted on. Overall, it is considered this decision could mean it is difficult for stakeholders to fully comprehend the impacts of the scheme at particular locations.

Scheme Revisions

As would be expected for a scheme of this scale and complexity, there are numerous examples where changes have been made to the proposed scheme since the first non-statutory consultation was undertaken in 2022. The fact that changes have been made as a result of consultation is of course welcomed but CCC consider that in many cases the changes proposed do not go far enough to address the issue in question and in some cases - for example Langham, the changes are more damaging than previous iteration. Moreover, we believe that predominantly, the changes made are relatively minor in nature and to date there hasn't been agreement to any of the more substantive changes that have been requested by CCC or other LPAs and other stakeholders especially with regards to alternatives to OHLs. There remains a concern therefore that NGET have not addressed legitimate concerns held by CCC and other stakeholders on aspects of the scheme that are most in need of change whether it be because of cost or impact on programme and have not weighted the effect on new developments and communities sufficiently. It follows that if the DCO application is accepted, CCC intend to continue making representations to NGET and if necessary to the examination on changes that we think are required to the scheme to make it acceptable locally.

Webinars

The webinars held in connection with the statutory consultation were welcome, but attendance may have been limited by the fact that they were held at the same time albeit, on different days. It would have been better if the webinars were offered at a variety of times to reflect the different life patterns for local communities.

Conclusion

With reference to your request for comments on the adequacy of consultation carried out to date on this project during the pre-application stage, CCC is of the opinion that actions in respect of consultation have been sufficient to meet the legal tests at S42, 47 & 48 of the PA 2008. CCC of course, welcomes and appreciates the consultation and level of engagement to date, and looks forward to this positive relationship continuing. However, it is considered that the process is being progressed to the extent that some of the potential changes to the project which could have significant and obvious benefit have not been fully considered. As a result, whilst CCC and other stakeholders are working closely with NGET to develop the Statements of Common Ground, many issues remain.

Adequacy of Consultation Milestone

Thank you for your letter dated 14th April 2025 in which you ask Essex County Council (ECC) for comments on the adequacy of consultation carried out to date on this project during the pre-application stage, prior to the formal requirements of Section 55(4) at the acceptance stage of the DCO process.

Purpose of AoCM

The Adequacy of Consultation Milestone (AoCM) is intended to allow early consideration of the adequacy of consultation undertaken by the applicant, to minimise any risk at the acceptance stage, of the application progressing to examination. It will help inform the Planning Inspectorate's decision on whether the consultation arrangements have been sufficient for the level of complexity of the proposed project.

Consultation with the public and other key stakeholders is not only a statutory requirement but is also fundamental to securing public confidence in the process. It is therefore important that as a minimum, consultation is conducted in accordance with Sections 42, 47 & 48 of the Planning Act and the published Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC).

In providing this response, we have had regard to the information contained in the table accompanying your letter of 14th April and although useful in terms of assessing compliance with commitments in the SoCC, it is considered it fails to comprehensively reflect what actions have been carried out in connection with the targeted consultation undertaken earlier this year.

Summary of Pre-Application Consultation

National Grid Electricity Transmission (NGET) have carried out the following consultations to which the County Council has responded as part of its ongoing engagement with ECC and local residents and stakeholders.

- i) Non-Statutory Consultation (First) – held between 21 April 2022 and 16 June 2022.
- ii) Non-Statutory Consultation (Second) – held between 27 June 2023 and 21 August 2023.

- iii) Statutory Consultation – held between Wednesday 10 April and Tuesday 18 June 2024 (extended until 26th July 2024).
- iv) Targeted Consultation for Essex – held between Tuesday 25 February until Thursday 27 March 2025 (period for comments to be made extended at the outset until Friday 11th March due to timing of consultation and availability of staff)

The statutory consultation was subsequently held between 10th April 2024 and 26th July 2024 with the targeted consultation for Essex taking place between 25 February 2025 to 27 March 2025.

ECC has no reason to doubt that NGET undertook the consultation in a way that was in accordance with the published SoCC and accordingly has complied with the duties set out in Section 47 of the Planning Act.

It should be noted that the statutory consultation was extended to acknowledge the general election held on 4th July. This extension was welcomed by ECC.

Section 48 – Duty to Publicise

Section 48 of the Planning Act 2008 obliges developers to publicise their proposals by means of notices in local and national newspapers.

- (1) *The applicant must publicise the proposed application in the prescribed manner.*
- (2) *Regulations made for the purposes of subsection (1) must, in particular, make provision for publicity under subsection (1) to include a deadline for receipt by the applicant of responses to the publicity.*

ECC has no reason to doubt that NGET published the required notices and that the content of those notices complied with the requirements set out in the regulations. ECC therefore considers NGET has to the best of our knowledge and subject to the review of Consultation Report, complied with their duty to publicise under this section of the Planning Act 2008.

Position regarding Statutory Requirements

Taking the above comments into account and subject to the review of the Consultation Report, it is ECC’s current opinion that NGET has carried out sufficient pre-application consultation on the proposed Norwich to Tilbury project in accordance with the agreed SoCC and in line with Sections 42, 47 and 48 of the Planning Act 2008.

While ECC recognises the challenges a project of this scale and complexity presents, and notwithstanding our current opinion the minimum statutory tests being complied with, there are several observations on the consultation process and how it could be enhanced which we have set out below. These comments have been provided in the interest of ensuring that consultation on this NSIP is carried out effectively and positively, allowing communities and stakeholders to fully engage, and have their comments properly recorded and considered in a transparent process of design iteration.

Observations on Consultation.

Consultation Feedback

Unfortunately, unlike that for the non-statutory consultation, no feedback has been published in response to the statutory consultation undertaken in 2024. Moreover, it is understood that responses from this statutory consultation have informed the localised changes proposed to the scheme under the targeted consultation. However, without sight of any feedback on the issues raised by the public / stakeholders in their responses, it is difficult to understand the rationale behind or the merits of, the changes proposed, when compared to those issues also raised by residents / stakeholders that it was felt did not warrant any change to the scheme and therefore, were not addressed.

It is considered this is detrimental to the transparency of the overall process and design evolution of the Project. ECC would encourage NGET to be more transparent in their publication of feedback drawing upon best practice examples on how to effectively communicate this at pre application stage in a clear and transparent way, possibly making greater use of the community newsletter and project updates.

ECC would also welcome early sight of the draft consultation report so we can understand better the matters which have been raised and work collaboratively to address issues where we can.

Overall, it is considered this decision could mean it is difficult for stakeholders to fully comprehend the impacts of the scheme at particular locations.

Bespoke Consultation Zones

In our response to the draft SoCC provided by NGET in respect of the targeted consultation, it was noted that only those in the consultation zones would receive direct notifications. ECC highlighted the importance of community engagement around these proposed changes and in the absence of full details around the consultation zones and the extent of neighbour notification, queried how the boundaries to the consultation zones were to be drawn given the potential for excluding many who may be interested in the project.

ECC therefore requested that it be consulted on the bespoke consultation zones to help validate the extent of the consultation zones but received no feedback on this request. While the need to progress with the targeted consultation was noted, notwithstanding the subsequent delays to the commencement of the targeted consultation, it is considered taking the Council up on its offer would have assisted with the transparency and robustness of the approach to targeted consultation.

Comments in respect of ES

ECC recognises this is a large and complex project and welcomes the extensive engagement to date across a range of technical subjects that are informing the ES. However, it is felt progress on the SoCG is being hampered by the lack of available detailed information to enable matters to be agreed early in the process. This makes it difficult for ECC to reach an informed position on various aspects of the project at this time.

ECC remains committed to front loading the resolution of issues through the pre application phase and this situation is likely to create additional pressures at examination. This is compounded by the focus on progressing towards a fixed submission date for the DCO which is likely to impact on the time available to consider options and comments received. An example being that for the draft SoCG sent to District Council's where only 21 days was given for comments. Additional time for the public to comment on the targeted consultation (an increase from 4 weeks to 6 weeks) was also requested in ECC's response to the draft SOCC but not agreed .

It is important to note that there is no suggestion of any intent by NGET to delay providing information or deliberately make understanding the full extent of the scheme's impacts difficult, but to achieve a good understanding of the scheme and its impacts, this requires a substantial amount of work and resources including time. It is therefore important that parties continue to work together, and that proportionate time is made available to consider and respond to the information as it is made available.

ECC remains hopeful that many of these outstanding matters can be satisfactorily addressed through our ongoing engagement with NGET informing the SoCG prior to the examination.

Scheme Revisions

As would be expected for a scheme of this scale and complexity, there are numerous examples where changes have been made to the proposed scheme since the first non-statutory consultation was undertaken in 2022. The fact that changes have been made as a result of consultation is of course welcomed, and ECC supports many of the changes made. We do consider however that in many cases the changes proposed do not go far enough to address the issue in question. Moreover, we believe that predominantly, the changes made are relatively minor in nature and to date there has not been agreement to any of the more substantive changes that have been requested by ECC and other stakeholders especially in connection with the concerns around the impact on the viability of Dunton Hills Garden Village.

There remains a concern therefore that NGET have not addressed legitimate concerns held by ECC and other stakeholders on aspects of the scheme that are most in need of change whether it be because of cost or impact on programme, and have not weighted the effect on new developments and communities sufficiently. It follows that if the DCO application is accepted, ECC intend to continue making representations to NGET and if necessary to the examination on changes that we think are required to the scheme to make it acceptable locally.

Webinars

The webinars held in connection with the statutory consultation were welcome, but attendance may have been limited by the fact that they were held at the same time albeit, on different days. It would have been better if the webinars were offered at a variety of times to reflect the different life patterns for local communities.

It is also felt that on occasion webinars were not always attended by representatives from NGET with sufficient detailed knowledge of the issues to enable questions to be comprehensively responded to. For example, during an Essex event for the targeted consultation attended by officers, the NGET representatives were unable to answer questions around Dunton Hills Garden Village.

Conclusion

With reference to your request for comments on the adequacy of consultation carried out to date on this project during the pre-application stage, ECC is of the opinion that the consultation conducted has been sufficient to meet the legal tests at S42, 47 & 48 of the PA 2008.

ECC of course, welcomes and appreciates the consultation and level of engagement to date, and looks forward to this positive relationship continuing. It is though considered that the project is being progressed to the extent that some of the potential changes which could have significant and obvious benefit have not been fully considered. As a result, whilst ECC and other stakeholders are working closely with NGET to develop the Statements of Common Ground, many issues remain.

For these reasons we believe it will be particularly important for NGET to continue meaningful engagement with stakeholders including ECC over the coming months in an effort to resolve as many of the outstanding issues as possible prior to the submission of the DCO.

NORWICH TO TILBURY DCO APPLICATION ADEQUACY OF CONSULTATION MILESTONE

Thank you for your letter dated 14th April 2025 in which you ask Suffolk County Council (SCC) for comments on the adequacy of consultation carried out to date on this project during the pre-application stage, prior to the formal requirements of Section 55(4) at the acceptance stage of the DCO process.

Purpose of AoCM

The Adequacy of Consultation Milestone (AoCM) is intended to allow early consideration of the adequacy of consultation undertaken by the applicant, to minimise any risk at the acceptance stage, of the application progressing to examination. It will help inform the Planning Inspectorate's decision on whether the consultation arrangements have been sufficient for the level of complexity of the proposed project.

Consultation with the public and other key stakeholders is not only a statutory requirement but is also fundamental to securing public confidence in the process. It is therefore important that as a minimum, consultation is conducted in accordance with Sections 42, 47 & 48 of the Planning Act and the published Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC).

In providing this response, we have had regard to the information contained in the table accompanying your letter of 14th April.

Summary of Pre-Application Consultation

National Grid Electricity Transmission (NGET) have carried out the following consultations to which the SCC has responded.

- i) Non-Statutory Consultation (First) – held between 21 April 2022 and 16 June 2022.
- ii) Non-Statutory Consultation (Second) – held between 27 June 2023 and 21 August 2023.
- iii) Statutory Consultation – held between Wednesday 10 April and Tuesday 18 June 2024 (extended until 26th July 2024).
- iv) Targeted Consultation for Suffolk – held between Thursday 30 January until Monday 3 March 2025.

Statutory Requirements

Our comments are centred around the pre application stage of the DCO process and as requested, this response gives SCC's opinion as to whether NGET, has to date complied with the following duties under the Planning Act 2008:

- Section 42 – Duty to consult
- Section 47 – Duty to consult the local community
- Section 48 – Duty to publicise

Section 42 – Duty to Consult

Section 42 of the Planning Act 2008 prescribes who should be consulted on the proposal.

The applicant must consult the following about the proposed application –

- (a) such persons as may be prescribed,*
- (aa) the Marine Management Organisation (MMO), in any case where the proposed development would affect, or would be likely to affect, any of the areas specified in subsection (2),*
- (b) each local authority that is within section 43,*
- (c) the Greater London Authority if the land is in Greater London, and*
- (d) each person who is within one or more of the categories set out in section 44.*

Subsection a) refers to 'such persons as may be prescribed'. These persons are listed in Schedule 1 to the Infrastructure Planning (Applications: Prescribed Forms and Procedure) Regulations 2009

SCC is generally satisfied that NGET has correctly identified the parties to be consulted as required by Section 42 and to the best of ECC's knowledge, has complied with their duty to consult those parties. **However, the operator of Raydon Airfield has made it known to National Grid Electricity Generation and SCC that they have not been consulted throughout all of the pre-application consultation stages.**

Section 47 – Duty to Consult Local Community

Section 47 of the Planning Act 2008 obliges developers to prepare a Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC) in consultation with the relevant Local Authorities, publish that SoCC and then undertake statutory consultation in conformity with that statement.

(1) The applicant must prepare a statement setting out how the applicant proposes to consult, about the proposed application, people living in the vicinity of the land.

(2) Before preparing the statement, the applicant must consult each local authority that is within section 43(1) about what is to be in the statement.

(3) The deadline for the receipt by the applicant of a local authority's response to consultation under subsection (2) is the end of the period of 28 days that begins with the day after the day on which the local authority receives the consultation documents.

(4) In subsection (3) “the consultation documents” means the documents supplied to the local authority by the applicant for the purpose of consulting the local authority under subsection (2).

(5) In preparing the statement, the applicant must have regard to any response to consultation under subsection (2) that is received by the applicant before the deadline imposed by subsection (3).

(6) Once the applicant has prepared the statement, the applicant must— (za) make the statement available for inspection by the public in a way that is reasonably convenient for people living in the vicinity of the land, (a) publish, in a newspaper circulating in the vicinity of the land, a notice stating where and when the statement can be inspected, and (b) publish the statement in such manner as may be prescribed.

(7) The applicant must carry out consultation in accordance with the proposals set out in the statement.

SCC received a draft SoCC on 1st March 2024 and we responded with comments on the 2nd April 2024. The SOCC was then published 10th April 2024.

The statutory consultation was subsequently held between 10th April 2024 and 26th July 2024 with a further non-statutory consultation for Suffolk taking place between 25 February 2025 to 27 March 2025. It should be noted that the statutory consultation was extended to acknowledge the general election held on 4th July. This extension was welcomed by SCC.

SCC is generally satisfied that NGET undertook the consultation in a way that was in accordance with the published SoCC and accordingly has complied with the duties set out in Section 47 of the Planning Act. **However, Section 5.3 of the SoCC includes reference to Primary Consultation Zone which includes people and businesses with property postcodes within 1km of the project's red line boundary including Raydon Airfield.**

Section 48 – Duty to Publicise

Section 48 of the Planning Act 2008 obliges developers to publicise their proposals by means of notices in local and national newspapers.

(1) The applicant must publicise the proposed application in the prescribed manner.

(2) Regulations made for the purposes of subsection (1) must, in particular, make provision for publicity under subsection (1) to include a deadline for receipt by the applicant of responses to the publicity.

SCC has no reason to doubt that NGET published the required notices and that the content of those notices complied with the requirements set out in the regulations. SCC therefore considers NGET has to the best of our knowledge and subject to the review of Consultation Report, complied with their duty to publicise under this section of the Planning Act 2008.

Norwich to Tilbury Project Proposals by National Grid Electricity Transmission

Adequacy of Consultation Milestone

Planning Act 2008 (as amended) – Sections 42, 47, 48 and 55

I refer to your letter dated 14 April 2025, inviting Tendring District Council (TDC) to comment on the adequacy of consultation undertaken to date by National Grid in relation to the Norwich to Tilbury project during the pre-application stage.

The adequacy of consultation for a Nationally Significant Infrastructure Project (NSIP) is an important consideration and should be viewed in the context of ensuring that all relevant parties have had a fair and meaningful opportunity to engage with the proposals. In particular, for a project of this scale and complexity, effective consultation is not only a statutory requirement but also fundamental to securing public confidence and informed participation. Our response has been prepared with reference to the summary table accompanying your letter of 14 April, as well as National Grid's Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC).

We include a summary of the relevant sections of the legislation outlining the statutory requirements and our understanding of its purpose, followed by TDC's position after each section.

Section 42 – Duty to Consult Prescribed Bodies and Land Interests

Section 42 of the Planning Act 2008 sets out the duty on applicants to consult prescribed consultees prior to submitting a Development Consent Order (DCO) application. This includes:

- **Local Authorities:** Those within or near the proposed development area.
- **Prescribed Bodies:** As defined under secondary legislation, including statutory bodies such as the Environment Agency and Natural England.
- **Land Interests:** Including landowners, tenants, and others with interests in affected land.
- **The Greater London Authority** (where applicable).

The purpose of this section is to ensure consultation is conducted in the prescribed manner and at a sufficiently early stage to allow prescribed consultees to engage with the project (and the consultation phase) and respond effectively.

TDC's Position on Section 42

TDC finds no reason to dispute that National Grid correctly identified and consulted the parties required under Section 42. On this basis, we are satisfied that the statutory duty under this section has been met.

Section 47 – Duty to Consult the Local Community

Section 47 requires the applicant to prepare a SoCC and consult local authorities on its content before conducting community consultation. Specifically, it requires the applicant to:

1. Prepare and consult on the SoCC.
2. Consider local authority feedback on the SoCC.
3. Publicise the final SoCC.
4. Undertake consultation in accordance with it.

The purpose of this section is to enable early and effective engagement with people living in the area likely to be affected, and to gather local views and identify potential issues before submission of the application.

TDC's Position on Section 47

While National Grid assert that it has fulfilled its obligations under Section 47, TDC remains concerned that the consultation failed to deliver effective and meaningful engagement. Despite numerous efforts to engage with National Grid, particularly concerning the site selection methodology, the rationale for siting the East Anglia Connection Node (EACN) in the Tendring peninsula, and the exclusion of alternative routes, we have received limited or unsatisfactory responses, hindering our ability to engage constructively.

The SoCC states that consultation should cover “all aspects of the proposed development.” However, its focus has been too narrowly confined to refining a preferred route without adequate explanation of the alternatives or the reasons for their exclusion. Moreover, fundamental questions—such as the need for the project, choice of technology, and strategic route options—appear to have been treated as closed matters, with the consultation process centred on adjusting minor elements of a pre-determined scheme.

TDC understands that alternative options have been internally reviewed and discounted without meaningful public engagement. There is no published rationale or supporting evidence that clearly explains why all other potentially viable options were not considered or shared publicly.

The lack of published feedback following the 2024 statutory consultation makes it difficult to assess how National Grid has considered stakeholder responses or justified its decisions, and therefore TDC is not convinced that the consultation process has managed to capture or reflect the concerns of communities most directly affected, especially those in north-western Tendring.

Section 48 – Duty to Publicise

Section 48 requires the applicant to publicise the proposed application before submission. This includes:

- Publication in at least one national and one local newspaper.

- A brief description of the development.
- Details of document inspection locations.
- Instructions on how to respond.
- A deadline (minimum 28 days from publication).

The purpose of this requirement is to ensure the wider public is informed and able to engage in the process.

TDC's Position on Section 48

TDC has no evidence to suggest National Grid failed to meet the public notification requirements under Section 48. Based on available information, we accept that National Grid has complied with its duty to publicise the project appropriately.

For completeness, **Section 55 (Acceptance of Applications)** of the Planning Act 2008 outlines the criteria that the Planning Inspectorate, on behalf of the Secretary of State, must apply when deciding whether to accept a Development Consent Order (DCO) application for examination.

The key requirements are as follows:

1. Form and Content of the Application:

The application must be submitted in the prescribed form and comply with the relevant regulations, notably the Infrastructure Planning (Applications: Prescribed Forms and Procedure) Regulations 2009.

2. Accompanying Documents:

The application must include all necessary supporting documentation, such as:

- An Environmental Statement (where required),
- A Consultation Report (outlining how consultation duties have been fulfilled),
- A draft DCO,
- Land and Works Plans, among others.

3. Compliance with Consultation Duties:

The applicant must demonstrate that it has met the statutory consultation requirements set out in:

- Section 42 – Duty to consult prescribed bodies and those with an interest in land,
- Section 47 – Duty to consult the local community,
- Section 48 – Duty to publicise the proposed application.

4. Adequacy of Consultation:

The Planning Inspectorate must be satisfied that the consultation has been carried out effectively and in accordance with the statutory requirements, based on the evidence provided in the Consultation Report.

5. Suitability for Examination:

The application must not be frivolous or vexatious and must appear, on its face, to be capable of resulting in the grant of development consent.

This section is included for information only, to support the completeness and clarity of our response. Tendring District Council does not propose to comment on the adequacy of National Grid's compliance with Section 55 because this section merely contains the overview of what is required to ensure acceptance of a DCO application.

Other Matters

Targeted Consultation and Non-Material Changes

TDC understands that certain design changes were not included in the latest (now completed) targeted consultation, on the grounds that National Grid considers them to be of minor significance. While they may be minor in engineering terms, these changes may have significant perceived or actual impacts for residents living close to the affected areas.

It is vital that communities are fully informed of **all** changes—whether material or not—so they can understand how the development may affect them and respond accordingly. The cumulative impact of numerous “non-material” changes can be significant and should not be progressed without public consultation.

TDC, alongside Essex County Council, has requested a list of these non-material changes. It is disappointing that this has not been provided, and it undermines public confidence in the transparency and inclusiveness of the consultation process. We refer to the Planning Inspectorate's guidance on good design, which stresses the importance of an **intentional, transparent, and effective** design process. This principle should equally apply to the consultation process, and we would strongly argue that **intentional, transparent, and effective** design of such a large scale project is even more critical and the pre-submission consultation phase.

Conclusion

In summary:

- Section 42: TDC is satisfied that statutory consultees were correctly identified and consulted.
- Section 47: TDC considers that the consultation with the local community has been inadequate in terms of scope, clarity, and meaningful engagement.
- Section 48: TDC acknowledges that the duty to publicise appears to have been met.
- Other Concerns: The exclusion of certain changes from public consultation raises concerns about transparency, and risks undermining public trust in the process.

TDC remains committed to constructive engagement with National Grid and other stakeholders but emphasises the need for a more open and inclusive approach moving forward—particularly if trust and confidence are to be maintained throughout this NSIP process.

Thurrock Council's response to the Norwich to Tilbury Adequacy of Consultation Milestone, in relation to section 55(4)(b) of the Planning Act 2008.

Thank you for inviting Thurrock Council to comment on the adequacy of consultation undertaken by National Grid Electricity Transmission (National Grid) for the project titled Norwich to Tilbury. This letter comprises the council's comments on the consultation that has been undertaken so far.

1. Responding to the Statement of Community Consultation

- 1.1. National Grid has laid out its commitments to consultation in the Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC), published in April 2024, including its process for advertising and encouraging engagement with the consultation.
- 1.2. At this milestone, National Grid has also laid out the actions it has taken to meet each of these commitments through the 2023 non-statutory consultation and the 2024 statutory consultation.
- 1.3. The council does not fundamentally object to the ways that the 2023 and 2024 consultations are described as complying with National Grid's commitments.
- 1.4. The way in which these and other consultations have been carried out has, however, presented some issues which have limited the extent to which the council has been able to meaningfully contribute to improving the project's outcomes. These issues are laid out in section 2 of this letter.
- 1.5. National Grid has not included at this milestone the ways in which the two rounds of targeted consultation (one statutory and one non-statutory) held in 2025 have followed these processes or contributed to meeting these commitments, other than item number 69:

6.3.1. If, following the statutory consultation, National Grid considers it is necessary to undertake further statutory consultation, this would be undertaken, so far as relevant, practicable and proportionate, in accordance with the principles and methods set out in this SoCC or any update to it.

The council has identified several issues with the 2025 targeted consultation process

and would like to see National Grid explain how it believes the targeted consultations have followed the principles and methods set out in the SoCC. These issues are laid out in section 3 of this letter.

2. Issues identified with consultation and engagement

- 2.1. The timelines for consultation laid out by National Grid have been overly demanding of council officers, who have frequently found it difficult to review and respond to the required documents in time to meet the set deadlines.
- 2.2. The narrow timeframes have also meant that the council has been unable to take its responses to the recent targeted consultations, for example, to Cabinet, resulting in the submission of responses which may not fully represent the council's views.
- 2.3. Narrow timeframes have also been exacerbated, at times, by poor responsiveness from National Grid or those acting on its behalf when asked for further information relevant to the council's response to consultation.
- 2.4. The volume of different documents being circulated at one time, often with similar content or titles, and on occasion with mistakes, has made it difficult for consultees to be clear on which documents relate to which elements of the project and must be responded to by which deadlines, and to do so accordingly. This has been especially true during the period of targeted consultation, alongside which a significant number of other documents have been shared with the council for comment. The council feels it would have been able to engage more usefully with the various consultations if there had been some attempt to space them out.
- 2.5. In general, there has been a lack of necessary or helpful information provided alongside requests for comments from the council, which has made it difficult for the council to engage with and contribute to proposals in a meaningful way. This is particularly true of the Environmental Statement and documents relating to it.
- 2.6. It appears that the pressure on National Grid to submit the application by a highly ambitious deadline has left and continues to leave little room for genuine discussion of different options or contribution to improving the outcomes of the project, which is disappointing to the council.

3. Issues identified with the targeted consultations

- 3.1. National Grid has made it clear that the proposed changes recently subject to targeted consultation (Thurrock 1, 2 and 3) have been informed by feedback received in the statutory consultation undertaken in 2024. This feedback has not been shared with the council. This has left the council unable to fully understand the context of these targeted consultations, including the details of any feedback to which National Grid has decided does not warrant a change to the proposals.
- 3.2. The council is also concerned that residents have not been adequately notified of the full extent of changes to the design and alignment of the scheme since the statutory consultation on the basis that National Grid considers them to be non-material and has not included them in the targeted consultation.

4. Conclusion

- 4.1. The council agrees that the 2023 non-statutory consultation and 2024 statutory consultation have been carried out in line with the SoCC, as described by National Grid

at this adequacy of consultation milestone.

- 4.2. The council does not feel, however, that all of the consultation and engagement processes – and, in particular, the 2025 targeted consultations – have been undertaken so as to adequately support full and meaningful engagement from the council.

Bespoke Consultation Zones

In accordance with the guidance, a bespoke and targeted approach to further consultation was undertaken, which included bespoke consultation zones for each targeted consultation to include nearby properties which are likely to be affected. These were created following the principle that each consultation zone should be appropriate and proportionate in relation to the type and potential impact of the change. Where it was appropriate to do so, potential changes were grouped with a single consultation zone covering the grouped changes.

The principle of using bespoke community consultation zones was discussed with all host authorities as part of discussions regarding the targeted consultation strategy and approach ahead of time, and feedback taken on board. It was not practicable to share the consultation zones with the host authorities in advance of the targeted consultations; they were published as an appendix to the targeted consultation strategy at the launch of each series of consultations and no feedback on the extent of the zones was received from the host local authorities in their responses to the targeted consultations.

In addition to sending a letter to each property that fell within the relevant consultation zone, National Grid sought to raise awareness of the project and public consultation with stakeholders and the public more broadly, including by:

- notifying the local and regional media via press release
- notifying the local parish / parish council, and offering a briefing via Teams
- publishing full details of the targeted consultations on the project website
- notifying our contact database via our regular project update e-mail newsletter
- providing contact information for the community relations team widely within materials posted within the consultation zones, to local authorities and parish councils
- running an advert in local media titles on / following consultation launch
- notifying hard to reach groups as identified within the SoCC

This approach and the bespoke consultation zones are considered to be proportionate and appropriate to the proposed changes and in line with government guidance.

Comments in respect of the Environmental Statement (ES)

National Grid notes and appreciates that BDC welcomes the extensive engagement to date across a range of technical subjects that are informing the ES. The focus of the discussions to date has been on the scope of the ES, the methodologies used and the baseline data collected, together with draft management plans and outline mitigation strategies. The ES is currently being drafted and therefore National Grid look forward to sharing it with the host local authorities when available, as well as continuing to work alongside BDC on progressing the draft statement of common ground (SoCG), frontloading the resolution of matters where possible.

At all stages National Grid has and continues to be open to extensions to suggested deadlines, all requests for extensions to time have been granted and the project team welcomes open dialogue on potential resource constraints, including the provision of additional resources through the planning performance agreement with BDC.

National Grid is also hopeful that most of the outstanding matters can be satisfactorily addressed through our ongoing engagement with BDC informing the SoCG prior to the examination.

Targeted consultation timeframe

The locations of the targeted community consultations were geographically focussed and built upon the information provided during the previous consultations. Given the nature of the changes and the consultations already undertaken in the areas affected, a 30-day consultation was appropriate and proportionate for the public to respond.

Scheme Revisions

National Grid welcomes that BDC supports many of the changes made as a result of consultation since the first non-statutory consultation on the Project was undertaken in 2022. Alongside the 2023 and 2024 consultations, a Design Development Report has been published which presents the substantive changes that have been made to the Project since the previous consultation, describing how the Project has evolved in response to feedback and further environmental and engineering studies.

All of our consultations on the Project (non-statutory consultations in 2022 and 2023, our statutory consultation in 2024 and the targeted consultations in 2025) were held at a formative stage where final decisions on the proposals are still to be made and we have taken and continue to take on board feedback on our proposals at each stage.

Following every consultation period, each piece of feedback received has been read (or is under consideration) and given due regard, and where a change to the design was requested, this has been and continues to be considered by the project team. This process and the outcomes have been documented in the published 2022 and 2023 Feedback Reports, and will be documented within the Consultation Report, including those changes requested that have not been taken forward and why.

Further back check and reviews of the Project are being undertaken in response to feedback to the 2024 statutory consultation, and in the light of ongoing surveys and assessments, and the continuing engagement with BDC and other stakeholders in relation to specific locations and the Norwich to Tilbury route as a whole is welcomed.

Conclusion

Noting the specific mention of Dunton Hills Garden Village and BCC's request for the route to be placed underground in this location, the 2024 Design Development Report (paragraphs 5.3.21 and 5.4.211) describes how the route for the overhead line alignment has been amended to adopt the existing gas pipeline corridor in this location. The presence of the gas pipeline creates a corridor free from built development, due to established safety requirements.

The route of any alternative underground cable connection in this location would likely lead to the loss of between 2 to 3 hectares of development land (as no development could occur above the cables). Given the absence of a clear basis in NPS EN-5 for the use of underground cable in this location, the ability for detailed masterplanning to reduce potential visual effects and the additional cost implications of the additional cable (of around a minimum 2 km), and the potential loss of development land, National Grid does not consider it appropriate to change from overhead line for the 2024 preferred draft alignment in this location.

Further back check and reviews of the Project are being undertaken in response to feedback to the 2024 statutory consultation, and in the light of ongoing surveys and assessments, and the continuing engagement with BCC and other stakeholders in relation to Dunton Hills Garden Village and the Norwich to Tilbury route as a whole is welcomed.

Conclusion

National Grid notes and welcomes the confirmation that BBC considers that the consultation has met the legal requirements under Sections 42, 47, and 48 of the Planning Act 2008. National Grid continues to progress the Norwich to Tilbury Project in line with the relevant legislation and guidance, including our licence obligations.

National Grid looks forward to continuing the positive, collaborative relationship with BBC and working together to develop the SoCG and resolve issues where possible.

Following the submission of our application for development consent Chelmsford City Council (CCC) will have an opportunity to provide feedback to the Planning Inspectorate in an Adequacy of Consultation response.

A Consultation Report prepared in accordance with Section 37(3)(c) of the Planning Act will be submitted with the application for development consent and will provide a summary of the feedback received in response to the 2024 statutory consultation, and targeted community consultations in 2025, and how National Grid has had regard to that feedback.

A Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC) compliance table was provided as part of our letter to you dated 14th April 2025. A compliance with commitments table for the targeted community consultations is being included in the Adequacy of Consultation Milestone Report and will also be included in the Consultation Report to be submitted with the application for development consent.

The letter from CCC contains some observations on the consultation undertaken, National Grid has sought to respond to the points raised below and would welcome further discussion during our regular scheduled meetings.

Absence of Feedback

A summary of the feedback received at statutory consultation and how National Grid has had regard to that feedback will be provided within the Consultation Report to be submitted with the application for development consent, in accordance with Section 37(3)(c) of the Planning Act 2008. National Grid is happy to discuss making the application available to technical consultees such as CCC and the other host local authorities digitally shortly after it is submitted.

Responses received to the statutory consultation carried out in 2024 have informed and continue to inform the developing design of the Project. Each piece of feedback has been read and where a change to the design was requested, this has been and continues to be considered by the project team. This process and the outcomes will be documented within the Consultation Report, including those changes requested that have not been taken forward and why.

CCC is correct that feedback has informed the series of targeted consultations undertaken earlier this year. The feedback received, if relevant to the potential changes being presented for consultation, was set out in the Consultation Leaflets for the targeted consultations within the section titled '*What we are proposing to change in your area and why*'.

Targeted Consultation - General

The process National Grid has followed for undertaking the targeted community consultations is appropriate and proportionate in accordance with the relevant legislation and guidance issued pursuant to Section 50 of the Planning Act 2008 and associated guidance published in April 2024 titled 'Planning Act 2008: Pre-application stage for Nationally Significant Infrastructure Projects' (<https://www.gov.uk/guidance/planning-act-2008-pre-application-stage-for-nationally-significant-infrastructure-projects>).

Section 50 of the Planning Act 2008 states that an applicant “*must have regard to any guidance issued under this section*”. Paragraph 020 of the guidance states:

However, National Grid has summarised in discussions previously the type of changes made and is happy to hold another workshop with CCC to run through the type of changes made that have not been the subject of targeted community consultation

Targeted Consultation – Great and Little Waltham

National Grid welcomes the ongoing engagement with CCC on the Project, including in relation to Great and Little Waltham, and will continue to undertake back checks and reviews as appropriate in light of any new information and ongoing surveys and assessments.

Environmental Statement (ES)

National Grid notes the appreciation of CCC that information has been shared by National Grid. The focus of the discussions to date has been on the scope of the ES, the methodologies used and the baseline data collected, together with draft management plans and outline mitigation strategies. The ES is currently being drafted and therefore National Grid look forward to sharing it with the host local authorities when available, as well as continuing to work alongside CCC on progressing the draft statement of common ground (SoCG), frontloading the resolution of matters where possible.

Where additional information has been requested and is available to share, the project team has sought to do so. Amendments to the proposed design of the Project have and continue to be considered, and will be reported within the Consultation Report to be submitted with the application for development consent, in accordance with Section 37(3)(c) of the Planning Act 2008.

National Grid is hopeful that many of the outstanding matters can be satisfactorily addressed through our ongoing engagement with CCC informing the SoCG prior to the examination.

Submission Documents

National Grid also notes and welcomes the engagement undertaken so far with CCC, including in relation to the draft Development Consent Order, Explanatory Memorandum and draft Requirements. Drafts of these documents are being worked up, alongside ongoing discussions with the host local authorities in relation to the associated management plans.

Conclusion

National Grid notes and welcomes the acknowledgement from CCC of National Grid's engagement to date. National Grid continues to progress the Norwich to Tilbury Project in line with the relevant legislation and guidance, including our licence obligations. National Grid looks forward to this positive relationship continuing and working alongside CCC to develop the SoCG and resolve issues where possible.

The principle of using bespoke community consultation zones was discussed with all host authorities as part of discussions regarding the targeted consultation strategy and approach ahead of time, and feedback taken on board. It was not practicable to share the consultation zones with the host authorities in advance of the targeted consultations, they were published as an appendix to the targeted consultation strategy at the launch of each series of consultations and no feedback on the extent of the zones was received from the host local authorities in their responses to the targeted consultations.

In addition to sending a letter to each property that fell within the relevant consultation zone, National Grid sought to raise awareness of the project and public consultation with stakeholders and the public more broadly, including by:

- notifying the local and regional media via press release
- notifying the local parish / parish council, and offering a briefing via Teams
- publishing full details of the targeted consultations on the project website
- notifying our contact database via our regular project update e-mail newsletter
- providing contact information for the community relations team widely within materials posted within the consultation zones, to local authorities and parish councils
- running an advert in local media titles on / following consultation launch
- notifying hard to reach groups as identified within the SoCC

This approach and the bespoke consultation zones are considered to be proportionate and appropriate to the proposed changes and in line with government guidance.

Comments in respect of the Environmental Statement (ES)

National Grid notes and appreciates that ECC welcomes the extensive engagement to date across a range of technical subjects that are informing the ES. The focus of the discussions to date has been on the scope of the ES, the methodologies used and the baseline data collected, together with draft management plans and outline mitigation strategies. The ES is currently being drafted and therefore National Grid look forward to sharing it with the host local authorities when available, as well as continuing to work alongside ECC on progressing the draft statement of common ground (SoCG), frontloading the resolution of matters where possible.

At all stages National Grid has and continues to be open to extensions to suggested deadlines, all requests for extensions to time have been granted and the project team welcomes open dialogue on potential resource constraints, including the provision of additional resources through the planning performance agreement with ECC.

National Grid is also hopeful that most of the outstanding matters can be satisfactorily addressed through our ongoing engagement with ECC informing the SoCG prior to the examination.

The position of TDC with respect of Section 47 of the Planning Act 2008 is also noted, specifically in relation to the rationale for siting the East Anglia Connection Node (EACN) substation, the consideration of alternatives, the need for the Project, the choice of technology and strategic route options.

National Grid is confident that the consultation undertaken was fully compliant with the published Statement of Community Consultation and legislative requirements under Section 47.

All of our consultations on the project (non-statutory consultations in 2022 and 2023, our statutory consultation in 2024 and the targeted consultations in 2025) were held at a formative stage where final decisions on the proposals are still to be made and we have taken and continue to take on board feedback on our proposals at each stage.

Following every consultation period, each piece of feedback received has been read and given due regard, and where a change to the design was requested, this has been and continues to be considered by the project team. This process and the outcomes have been documented in the published 2022 and 2023 Feedback Reports, and will be documented within the Consultation Report, including those changes requested that have not been taken forward and why.

A summary of the feedback received at statutory consultation and how National Grid has had regard to that feedback will be provided within the Consultation Report to be submitted with the application for development consent, in accordance with Section 37(3)(c) of the Planning Act 2008. National Grid is happy to discuss making the application available to technical consultees such as TDC and the other host local authorities digitally shortly after it is submitted.

National Grid welcomes the continued engagement with TDC on the Project under the pre-application planning performance agreement, through regular monthly project and topic specific meetings and ad hoc workshops as required.

It is noted that further observations on consultation were provided within TDC's response. National Grid has sought to respond to the points raised below and would welcome further discussion during our regular scheduled meetings.

Targeted Community Consultations

The process National Grid has followed for undertaking the targeted community consultations is appropriate and proportionate in accordance with the relevant legislation and guidance issued pursuant to Section 50 of the Planning Act 2008 and associated guidance published in April 2024 titled 'Planning Act 2008: Pre-application stage for Nationally Significant Infrastructure Projects' (<https://www.gov.uk/guidance/planning-act-2008-pre-application-stage-for-nationally-significant-infrastructure-projects>).

Section 50 of the Planning Act 2008 states that an applicant “*must have regard to any guidance issued under this section*”. Paragraph 020 of the guidance states:

“Once applicants have completed the consultation process set out in their SoCC, where a proposed application is amended in the light of responses to consultation then, unless those amendments materially and substantially change the proposed application or materially changes its effects as a whole, the amendments themselves should not trigger a need for further consultation. The amendments can be reported as part of the consultation report submitted with the application.

Only where the project taken as a whole changes very significantly, and to such a large degree that what is being taken forward is fundamentally different from what was previously consulted on, should re-consultation on the proposed application as a whole be considered.

In understanding whether there has been a material and substantial change, applicants should take into account the following guiding factors:

- the degree of change as compared to the proposals previously consulted upon as a whole;*
- the number of materially worse environmental effects as compared to what has been the subject of previous consultations; and*
- the level of public interest, and the likelihood that such interest would merit further consideration in the context of that change.*

For any material change to a part of the proposed application where the project as a whole is not fundamentally changed, for example in the case of linear aspects where new information leads to a new alignment for a particular section of the proposal, a bespoke and targeted approach to further consultation can be adopted, which can address the specific consultation obligations arising proportionately.

Targeted consultation can be statutory or non-statutory or a combination of the two depending on whether new persons needing to be consulted under section 42 of the Planning Act (<https://www.legislation.gov.uk/ukpga/2008/29/section/42>) have been identified, but such targeted consultation will not require the production of PEI provided proportionate and appropriate information on environmental implications of any changes, where necessary, is provided.”

This has led to a bespoke and targeted approach to further consultation, with each targeted community consultation accompanied by an Environment Implications of the Change document, in line with the applicant's duty to have regard to the guidance issued. These targeted community consultations are in addition to the ongoing landowner engagement and working with statutory and non-statutory organisations.

Given the nature and volume of the minor changes which have been made (and/or are still under consideration) that have not been the subject of targeted community consultation, it is not a proportionate exercise to produce a comprehensive list of every single amendment (nor is it required by the guidance). However, National Grid has summarised in discussions previously the type of changes made and is happy to hold another workshop with TDC to run through the type of changes.

Conclusion

National Grid notes and welcomes the confirmation that TDC is satisfied that statutory consultees were correctly identified and consulted under Section 42 and that the duty to publicise appears to have been met under Section 48. National Grid is confident that the consultation undertaken was fully compliant with the published Statement of Community Consultation and legislative requirements under Section 47. In response to the request for a compliance with commitments table for the targeted community consultations, this will be included in the Adequacy of Consultation Milestone Report and will also be contained within the Consultation Report to be submitted with the application for development consent.

National Grid also welcomes the continued engagement with Thurrock Council on the Project under the pre-application planning performance agreement, through regular monthly project and topic specific meetings and ad hoc workshops as required.

It is noted that further observations on consultation were provided within Thurrock Council's response. National Grid has sought to respond to the points raised below and would welcome further discussion during our regular scheduled meetings.

Issues identified with consultation and engagement

Timelines for Consultation

Our statutory consultation undertaken in 2024 ran for a period of 15 weeks, and this gave sufficient time for the public and to technical consultees to review the information provided and contact the Project team with any questions to enable them to provide an informed response. National Grid follows advice and guidance provided in relation to consultation for a Project of this nature and are confident we go over and above any statutory requirements to engage fully with all stakeholders.

The locations of the targeted community consultations were geographically focussed and built upon the information provided during the previous consultations. Given the nature of the changes and the consultations already undertaken in the areas affected, a 30-day consultation was appropriate and proportionate for the public and technical consultees to respond.

At all stages National Grid has and continues to be open to extensions to deadlines, including to accommodate Cabinet or Committee meeting cycles, all requests for extensions to time have been granted. The project team welcomes open dialogue on potential resource constraints, including the provision of additional resources through the planning performance agreement with Thurrock Council.

During and outside the consultation periods, National Grid has always sought to respond to technical queries from the host local authorities and other technical bodies in a timely manner, providing further information where it is available.

Environmental Statement (ES)

The focus of the discussions to date has been on the scope of the ES, the methodologies used and the baseline data collected, together with draft management plans and outline mitigation strategies. Input to these documents from all host local authorities through the draft document reviews and regular, scheduled thematic groups is welcomed. Given this engagement, we would welcome further discussion with Thurrock Council on the specifics of the concerns raised in relation to the Environmental Statement and reiterate the open offer to discuss potential resource constraints, including the provision of additional resources through the planning performance agreement with Thurrock Council.

The ES is currently being drafted and therefore National Grid look forward to sharing it with the host local authorities when available, as well as continuing to work alongside Thurrock Council on progressing the draft statement of common ground (SoCG), frontloading the resolution of matters where possible.

National Grid continues to progress the Norwich to Tilbury Project in line with the relevant legislation and guidance, including our licence obligations.

Thurrock Council is correct that feedback has informed the series of targeted consultations undertaken earlier this year. The feedback received, if relevant to the potential changes being presented for consultation, was set out in the Consultation Leaflets for the targeted consultations within the section titled 'What we are proposing to change in your area and why'.
