Gatwick Airport – Northern Runway Project
Section 46 Planning Act 2008: Notification of Proposed Application
Statutory pre-application consultation between 9 September and 1 December 2021

Gatwick Airport Limited (referred to in this letter as "GAL") intends to apply to the Secretary of State under section 37 of the Planning Act 2008 (the "Act") for a Development Consent Order ("DCO") to authorise the alterations to the existing northern runway at Gatwick Airport which, together with the lifting of the current restrictions on its use, would enable dual runway operations, together with associated development (the "Project").

Together with the alterations to the northern runway, the Project would include the development of a range of infrastructure and facilities to allow increased airport passenger numbers and aircraft movements and to allow the Airport to make best use of its existing runways.

The Project would include alterations to the existing northern runway and corresponding enhancements to the taxiway system and parking stands to accommodate an increase in aircraft operations. Other elements of the Project would enable the increased airfield capacity to be accessed by passengers through additional processing capability and improved airport access. The Project would also include surface access (including highway) improvements and landscape/ecological planting and environmental mitigation.

Further, the Project includes proposals which may constitute new noise 'operating restrictions' as defined under Regulation (EU) No 598/2014. The consultation documents include information on the potential 'operating restrictions' and form part of the engagement being undertaken by GAL to reflect the consultation requirements of Regulation (EU) No 598/2014.

Please accept this letter as formal notification to the Secretary of State under section 46 of the Act.



Section 42 Consultation Documentation

In preparation for the submission of the application, GAL is commencing its formal pre-application consultation on the proposals for the Project pursuant to section 42 of the Act.

Consultation on the proposals will take place from 9 September 2021 to 11.59pm on 1 December 2021 (the "Consultation Period").



1 Introduction

- 1.1.1 London Gatwick Airport (Gatwick) is a key element of national infrastructure, the second busiest airport in the UK and one of the premier airports in Europe. The airport facilitates travel around the globe for business, leisure and visiting family and friends as well as facilitating inward investment, trade and the movement of important cargo supplies. The COVID-19 pandemic has illustrated the significant value the airport brings to the region in terms of employment and economic opportunities and prosperity. While we may have some years to go before air travel fully recovers to pre-pandemic traffic levels, we will emerge a fitter and stronger airport.
- 1.1.2 Innovative solutions are needed if we are to help build greater resilience in the UK's airports system, increase competition, offer greater choice to customers, and enhance jobs, trade, connectivity and tourism in the local region. By unlocking additional capacity, largely within the airport's existing footprint, we can grow in the most sustainable way, allowing Gatwick to continue to manage its environmental impacts.
- 1.1.3 Gatwick is currently served by a single main runway and has a further runway the northern (also known as the standby/emergency) runway, located to the north of the main runway. The northern runway is routinely used as a taxiway and when the main runway is closed for maintenance or an emergency.
- 1.1.4 Following expiry of a planning agreement restricting simultaneous use of the northern runway with the main runway, we are proposing to reposition the centreline of the northern runway to the north by 12 metres, to enable dual runway operations. Bringing the northern runway into routine use would also require a range of infrastructure and facilities works. Our proposals would enable an increase in passenger capacity to approximately 75.6 million passengers per annum (mppa) by 2038, compared to a maximum potential capacity based on existing consents of approximately 62.4 mppa within the same timescale.
- 1.1.5 This growth in capacity of greater than 10 million passengers per annum and the scale of the improvements we are proposing to the North and South Terminal roundabouts means the northern runway development, including the supporting infrastructure and facilities (the Northern Runway Project), is classed as a Nationally Sigificant Infrastructure Project (NSIP). Gatwick will need to make an application under the Planning Act 2008 (the 'Planning Act') for a permission known as a development consent order (DCO) to construct and operate the Northern Runway Project.
- 1.1.6 A key element of the DCO process is the statutory requirement for pre-application consultation with the local community and other stakeholders, including statutory consultees. Following preparation of our proposals and associated preliminary environmental information, plans will be published for consultation, allowing local residents, councils, businesses, community groups and others to have their say.
- 1.1.7 This Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC) has been prepared in line with Section 47 of the Planning Act and sets out how Gatwick will consult the local community about the Northern Runway Project. It includes, amongst other things:
 - when the consultation will be carried out;



- who will be consulted;
- where we will consult;
- how we will consult (including on preliminary environmental information); and
- how feedback from the consultation will be collected and used to inform our proposals.
- 1.1.8 In accordance with the Planning Act, we have consulted on the contents of the SoCC with the local authorities in whose area the proposed development is situated (the host authorities) Crawley Borough Council, Reigate and Banstead Borough Council, Mole Valley District Council, Tandridge District Council, Surrey County Council and West Sussex County Council. We have also engaged with a number of neighbouring local authorities Horsham District Council, Mid Sussex District Council, East Sussex District Council, and Kent County Council.



2 Overview of the process

- 2.1.1 Gatwick will apply to the Secretary of State under the Planning Act for development consent to build and operate the Northern Runway Project. The Planning Inspectorate will process the application on behalf of the Secretary of State. The application will, if accepted, be examined by an independent examing authority panel, who will then make a recommendation to the Secretary of State for Transport (SoS) who will make the final decision on it.
- 2.1.2 The key stages of the process for securing development consent for projects classed as NSIPs are set out in Diagram 2.1.1.

Diagram 2.1.1 Overview of the DCO process



Consultation

We publish our proposals, including preliminary environmental information, and consult local communities and stakeholders on their views.



Refine DCO and submit

All consultation feedback is taken into account as we finalise our proposals for submission to the Planning Inspectorate.



Acceptance

Following submission, the Planning Inspectorate has 28 days to determine whether our application meets the required standard for examination. This includes assessing whether our consultation process was adequate.



Pre-examination period

If the application is accepted, anyone can register with the Planning Inspectorate as an Interested Party to be given the opportunity to put forward their views at examination.



Examination

Interested Parties can submit their views in writing and ask to be allowed to speak at one of the public hearings held by the Planning Inspectorate over a six month period.



Recommendation and decision

Within three months of the end of examination, the Planning Inspectorate makes a recommendation for acceptance or refusal to the Secretary of State for Transport. The Secretary of State will usually take three months to review the recommendation and make a final decision.



Post-decision

If the Secretary of State approves the DCO, construction must begin within the specified time period.

3 The Northern Runway Project proposals

- 3.1.1 The Northern Runway Project proposes to make alterations to the existing northern runway which, along with lifting the current restrictions on its use, would enable dual runway operations. The resulting operation would allow:
 - all arrivals to continue to use the existing main runway;
 - shared departures between the existing main runway and the northern runway; and
 - controlled dependency between the two runways to enable safe crossing of the northern runway by arrivals.
- 3.1.2 It is anticipated that by 2038, these improvements could increase passenger throughput to approximately 75.6 mppa, compared to a maximum expected capacity (based on existing consents) of approximately 62.4 mppa within the same timescale without the Northern Runway Project. This represents an increase of approximately 13.2 mppa.
- 3.1.3 The land subject to the application for development consent extends to approximately 820 hectares, of which approximately 747 hectares lies within the ownership of Gatwick Airport Limited.
- 3.1.4 The Northern Runway Project includes the following key components:
 - amendments to the existing northern runway, including repositioning its centreline 12 metres further north to enable dual runway operations;
 - reconfiguration of taxiways;
 - pier and stand amendments (including a proposed new pier);
 - reconfiguration of other airfield facilities;
 - extensions to the existing airport terminals (North and South);
 - provision of additional hotel and office space;
 - provision of reconfigured car parking, including new car parks;
 - surface access (including highway) improvements;
 - reconfiguration of existing utilities, including surface water, foul drainage and power; and
 - landscape/ecological planting and environmental mitigation.
- 3.1.5 The Northern Runway Project and therefore the consultation does not include:
 - Airport regulation and economic licensing Gatwick is licensed to operate by the Civil Aviation Authority (CAA). At airports, the CAA regulates airspace policy, safety, consumer protection and economics, such as service levels and charges to our airline customers; and
 - Modernising of air space Future Airspace Strategy Implementation South (FASI-South) is a major review proposing to re-design airspace over London and the South East to improve services, reduce delays and the effects of noise. This work is being undertaken by NATS, in partnership with the Department for Transport (DfT) and the CAA and will be subject to a separate consenting process known as CAP 1616.



4 Environmental information

- 4.1.1 The Northern Runway Project is classed as an Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) development requiring an assessment of its likely significant effects on the environment under The Infrastructure Planning (Environmental Impact Assessment) Regulations 2017. Gatwick will therefore carry out an EIA and will submit a full Environmental Statement (ES) and non-technical summary as part of its application for development consent.
- 4.1.2 We will consult on preliminary environmental information, in the form of a Preliminary Environment Information Report (PEIR), which will form part of the pre-application consultation documents and will be available for the local community and stakeholders to examine during the pre-application consultation process¹.
- 4.1.3 The PEIR sets out our initial conclusions on the likely significant environmental effects of the Northern Runway Project and will indicate preliminary measures that we may need to implement in order to reduce, avoid and mitigate any residual environmental impacts.

5 Consultation

5.1 Our approach

- 5.1.1 Public consultation has changed in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. As in work and social interaction, there is now a greater reliance on virtual or online engagement activity.
- 5.1.2 Our consultation has been designed to provide certainty to consultees about the ways in which they can share their views, whilst also respecting public safety and allowing for any restrictions that may be in place during the consultation period.
- 5.1.3 We will use a mix of materials, methods and techniques to remove barriers, promote inclusivity, and encourage engagement from local communities.
- 5.1.4 Gatwick is committed to ensuring the local community has the opportunity to understand and provide feedback on our Northern Runway Project proposals. Our key objectives for achieving this through pre-application consultation include:
 - ensuring thorough, open, and transparent engagement and consultation on our proposals;
 - ensuring proposals are clearly presented, and issues easily understood;
 - providing sufficient opportunities for interested parties to understand and influence our plans;
 - gathering high quality responses to, and feedback on, our plans to help inform proposals; and
 - delivering a consultation exercise that meets the required standards for a DCO application.
- 5.1.5 The formal consultation that will be carried out in accordance with this SoCC will build on the consultation on our draft Master Plan 2018 which was carried out between 18 October 2018 and 10 January 2019.
- 5.1.6 It is intended that our formal consultation will take place in one main stage, from 9 September to 11.59pm on 1 December 2021. This may be supplemented by further stages of limited, focused consultation if necessary.
- 5.1.7 At the same time as consulting the local community, we will also consult a wide range of statutory consultees in accordance with Section 42 of the Planning Act, including:
 - the host and neighbouring local authorities (see 1.1.8 for details);
 - statutory bodies (such as the Environment Agency, Highways England and others); and
 - people with an interest in land that may be affected by the proposals.
- 5.1.8 The proposed application will also be publicised as required by Section 48 of the Planning Act.
- 5.1.9 Following completion of the consultation, we will consider all feedback, along with the results of on-going technical assessments, as we refine our proposals in preparation for submitting an application for a DCO.
- 5.1.10 A detailed consultation report explaining what consultation has taken place and how responses to the consultation have influenced the final proposals will form part of the DCO application. Once the application is submitted, the Planning Inspectorate will consider the submitted documents and also the adequacy of Gatwick's consultation as part of the process and decide whether or not to accept the application for examination.



5.2 Who we will consult

- 5.2.1 Our consultation will be open to anyone with an interest in the Northern Runway Project who considers that they may be directly, or indirectly impacted, or who has a view that they would like to be considered. We will use a mix of materials, methods and techniques that will remove barriers and encourage engagement from local communities, while also complying with any pandemic-related restrictions should they be in place during the Northern Runway Project consultation period.
- 5.2.2 To ensure consultation activity is targeted towards those living, working or otherwise using the areas likely to be most affected by the Northern Runway Project, we have defined two geographic zones an inner zone and an outer zone for consultation purposes.
- 5.2.3 We will publicise the consultation in both consultation zones using our website and local media, by placing adverts in local newspapers, through social media, and with posters on community noticeboards where appropriate.

Inner consultation zone

- The inner zone covers an area where people who live, work or otherwise use the areas closest to Gatwick may be affected by the Northern Runway Project. The inner zone contains the area covered by the indicative day and night noise contours in 2032 (with the northern runway in operation), which includes communities in the 'lowest observable adverse effect level' (LOAEL) for aircraft noise, as defined by government guidance².
- 5.2.5 Our Northern Runway Project newsletter will be sent to homes and businesses to further publicise the consultation within the inner zone at the beginning of consultation. Where possible, it is intended that Mobile Project Office (MPO) visits will be largely focused in this area.

Outer consultation zone

- 5.2.6 The outer zone covers those living and working further away from Gatwick Airport, but still potentially affected by the Northern Runway Project. It also covers communities where we know from previous engagement that there is a strong interest in the Airport.
- 5.2.7 The outer zone is shaped around the 'Gatwick Diamond' area³ and consultation will be undertaken within it to help gather feedback from communities further away from the Airport.

Hard to reach audiences


5.2.8 We understand that some individuals and groups within the community can prove more challenging to reach and their views may therefore be less frequently heard.

5.2.9 We will work with local authorities and organisations representing 'hard-to-reach' individuals and groups to ensure consultation activity and materials are presented in a way that allows them to engage. This could include, for example, mobile project office visits, alternative format materials, advertisements in specific publications, or additional support for those who cannot travel, have limited or no internet access, or who need help to read and understand documents. We will also provide a range of communications channels for anyone seeking information or answers to their questions about our proposals.

5.3 How we will consult

5.3.1 This section sets out how we intend to consult during our main round of consultation in 2021, which will run from 9 September to 11.59pm on 1 December 2021. Should we carry out any further stages of limited, focused consultation prior to submission of the DCO application, we will use some, but not necessarily all, of these means of consultation. We will work with the relevant local authorities to assist us in deciding the most appropriate activities for any further stages of consultation.



Consultation documents

- 5.3.2 Our proposals, options, and preliminary environmental information will be published for consultation in the following documents:
 - Consultation Summary Document: an accessible, non-technical summary of the Consultation Overview Document including options and easy to read diagrams and plans. It will also be made available in alternative formats and languages if requested.
 - Consultation Overview Document: includes information about the context in which we are
 operating and sets out an overview of our proposals and approach to managing their impacts.
 - Consultation Feedback Form: the main mechanism for collecting feedback from the local community. It will include easy to understand questions on our proposals, the answers to which will be considered as we refine our plans. It will also be made available in alternative formats and languages if requested.
 - **Preliminary Environment Information Report** (PEIR): containing preliminary environmental information related to the Northern Runway Project and includes a non-technical summary.
 - Other technical documents: including our Economic Impact Assessment; Noise Insulation Scheme; Outline Employment, Skills, and Business Strategy; and Land Use and Construction Phasing Plans.
- 5.3.3 All consultation documents will be available to download at the start of consultation from the Northern Runway Project website (www.gatwickairport.com/futureplans) and on USB drives, which will be provided free of charge for personal use on request.
- 5.3.4 A hard copy of the SoCC and consultation documents will be placed in appropriate public buildings (such as local libraries, community centres or civic buildings) in the vicinity of the land required for the Northern Runway Project and maintained throughout the consultation period, assuming pandemic restrictions allow. Details of the deposit locations are set out in Table 5.3.1 below. Should any of the deposit locations have to close for a prolonged period of time due to Covid-19 (or other) restrictions, then alternative arrangements will be considered for allowing members of the public access to the documents.
- 5.3.5 We will provide hard copies of the Consultation Summary Document and Consultation Questionnaire free of charge. We will review requests for hard copies of the other documents on a case-by-case basis. A fee to cover printing costs (up to a maximum of £500 for one full set of consultation documents) may be charged to the recipient.
- 5.3.6 For community members without broadband/computer access or who are unable to travel to view hard copies of the documents, we will loan (on request and for a limited period) tablets loaded with all consultation information.

Northern Runway Project website and virtual exhibition

- 5.3.7 From the start of consultation, the Northern Runway Project website will host all the consultation documents and other materials, including a virtual exhibition, interactive computer-generated imagery, and online questionnaire. It will include details of deposit points and mobile project office locations as well as allowing people to make appointments to speak to the team or request hard copy documents or USBs.
- 5.3.8 The interactive virtual exhibition will provide an alternative format for people to learn about the proposals. It will include information boards, links to documents and the online feedback form, and allow access to the Project's digital model.

Telephone surgeries

- 5.3.9 During consultation we will run telephone surgeries to allow members of the public to speak to technical experts about the Project. Telephone surgeries will require pre-booking around four topic areas: i) transport, ii) air quality and climate change, iii) noise, iv) general issues.
- 5.3.10 Telephone surgeries will take place at a variety of times and days of the week to help maximise opportunities for people to participate. Bookings will be possible through the website, by calling the project hotline, by email, or at the Mobile Project Office.

Mobile Project Office

- 5.3.11 Throughout the consultation, it is intended that a Mobile Project Office (MPO) will visit local communities to distribute materials (consultation summary document, questionnaire, USBs) for people to take away and assist those who may not be able to book a telephone surgery appointment online to arrange one. Completed feedback forms can also be left with the team at the MPO.
- 5.3.12 The MPO would be proposed to visit prominent local locations (such as supermarkets, leisure, and community centres) for up to three hours at a time, at a variety of times and days of the week (including weekends), to encourage participation in the consultation and to distribute consultation materials.
- 5.3.13 The planned MPO locations included in Table 5.3.2 have been selected through consideration of sites that allow safe and legal operation. Details of dates and times will be published online and in a newsletter (see para 5.3.18). As a result of the on-going Covid-19 pandemic, these venues may be subject to change at very short notice due to unforeseen circumstances arising on the day, but any changes in venue from those published below and in the newsletter would be signposted on the day on our website, social media and, if possible, at the venue.

1 Introduction

- 1.1.1 London Gatwick Airport (Gatwick) is a key element of national infrastructure, an economic engine for local and regional growth, and the airport of choice for millions of passengers. It contributes £5.3bn to the UK economy every year and supports over 85,000 jobs. As the UK heads into an important new chapter post-Brexit, our growing global connections are needed to support sustainable economic growth.
- 1.1.2 Innovative solutions are needed if we are to help build greater resilience in the UK's airpoiss system, increase competition, offer greater choice to customers, and enhance jobs, trade, connectivity and tourism in the local region. By unlocking additional capacity, largely within the airport's existing footprint, we can grow in the most sustainable way, allowing Catwick to continue to manage its environmental impacts.
- 1.1.3 Gatwick is currently served by a single main runway and has a further runway the northern (also known as the standby) runway, located to the north of the main runway. The northern runway is routinely used as a taxiway and when the main runway is closed for maintenance or an emergency.
- 1.1.4 Following expiry of a planning agreement restricting shoutaneous use of the northern runway with the main runway, we are proposing to alter it, repositioning its centreline to the north by 12 metres, to enable dual runway operations. Bringing the northern runway into routine use would also require a range of infrastructure and ficilities works, allowing an increase in passenger capacity to approximately 74 million passengers per annum (mppa) by 2038, compared to a maximum potential capacity based on existing facilities of 61 mppa within the same timescale.
- 1.1.5 This growth in capacity of greater than 10 million passengers per annum means the northern runway development, including the supporting infrastructure and facilities (the Project), is classed as a Nationally Sigificant Infrastructure Project (NSIP). Gatwick will need to make an application under the Planning Act 2008 (the 'Planning Act') for a permission known as a development consent order (DCO) to construct and operate the Project.
- 1.1.6 A key element of the process is the statutory requirement for pre-application consultation with the local community and other stakeholders, including statutory consultees. Following preparation of our proposals and associated preliminary environmental information, plans will be published for consultation, allowing local residents, councils, businesses, community groups and others to have their say.
- 1.1.7 This Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC) has been prepared in line with Section 47 of the Planning Act and sets out how Gatwick will consult the local community about the Project. It includes, amongst other things:
 - when the consultation will be carried out;
 - who will be consulted:
 - where we will consult;
 - how we will consult (including on preliminary environmental information); and
 - how feedback from the consultation will be collected and used to inform our proposals.



1.1.8 In accordance with the Planning Act, we have consulted on the contents of the SoCC with the local authorities in whose area the proposed development is situated - known as the host local authorities. Other neighbouring local authorities and the airport's consultative committee, GATCOM, have also been involved in developing our proposals for community consultation.

2 Overview of the process

- 2.1.1 Gatwick will apply to the Secretary of State for Transport under the Planning Act for Yev Jobment consent to build and operate the Project. The Planning Inspectorate (PINS), acting as the examining authority on behalf of the Secretary of State, will examine the proposal and make a recommendation to the Secretary of State on whether a DCO should be granted.
- 2.1.2 The key stages of the process for development consent for projects classed as NSIPs are set out in Diagram 2.1.1.

Diagram 2.1.1 Overview of application process

Preapplication The developer prepares the application and undertakes pre-application
consultation in accordance with the requirements of the Planning Act. Where
required, Environmental Impact Assessment is undertaken (involving
consultation on the scope of the process and on Preliminary Environmental
Information to inform an Environmental Statement).

Acceptance

 28 day period for the Planning Inspectorate to decide whether or not the application meets the standards required to proceed to the examination phase.

Preexamination Planning Inspectorate holds a preliminary meeting and sets the timetable for the examination. Stakeholders can register as an interested party.

Examination

Planning Inspectorate has six months to carry out the examination.

• Decision Planning Inspectorate issue a recommendation to the Secretary of State within three months of the end of the examination process. The Secretary of State has a three month period to issue a decision.

Postdecision Following issue of the decision, the developer can implement the project in accordance with the Development Consent Order (including its requirements for mitgation).



3 The Northern Runway project proposals

- 3.1.1 The Project proposes to make alterations to the existing northern runway which would enable dual runway operations in accordance with international standards. The resulting operation would allow:
 - all arrivals using the existing main runway;
 - shared departures between the existing main runway and the northern runway; and
 - controlled dependency between the two runways to enable safe crossing of the porther runway by arrivals.
- 3.1.2 It is anticipated that by 2038, these improvements could increase passenger broughout to approximately 74 mppa, compared to a maximum expected capacity based on existing facilities of 61 mppa within the same timescale. This represents an increase of approximately 13 mppa.
- 3.1.3 The land subject to the application for development consent extends to approximately 838 hectares, of which approximately 760 hectares lies within the american of Gatwick Airport Limited.
- 3.1.4 The Project includes the following key components:
 - alterations to the existing northern runway, including repositioning its centreline 12 metres further north to enable dual runway operations,
 - reconfiguration of taxiways;
 - pier and stand amendments (including proposed new pier);
 - reconfiguration of other airfield facilities for example the fire training area;
 - extensions to the North and South Terminals;
 - provision of additional hotel and office space;
 - provision of car parking including new surface and multi-storey car parks;
 - surface access improvements;
 - reconfiguration si existing utilities, including surface water, foul drainage and power; and
 - landscape/ecological planting and environmental mitigation.



4 Environmental information

- 4.1.1 The Project is classed as a development requiring assessment of likely significant effects on the environment under the Infrastructure Planning (Environmental Impact Assessment) Regulations 2017. Gatwick will therefore carry out an Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) and will submit a full Environmental Statement (ES) and non-technical summary as part of its application for a development consent order.
- 4.1.2 We will consult on preliminary environmental information, in the form of a Preliminary Environment Information Report (PEIR), which will form part of the consultation documents and will be available for the local community and stakeholders to examine during the consultation process¹.
- 4.1.3 The PEIR will present environmental information that has been collected and assessed by the date of the consultation in relation to the likely significant environmental effects of the Project and will indicate preliminary measures that we may need to implement it order to reduce, avoid and mitigate any residual environmental impacts.

5 Consultation

5.1 Our approach

- 5.1.1 Gatwick is committed to ensuring the local community has the opportunity to understand and provide feedback on our Project proposals. Our key objectives for achieving this through preapplication consultation include:
 - ensuring thorough, open, and transparent engagement and consultation on our proposals.
 - ensuring proposals are clearly presented, and issues easily understood;
 - providing sufficient opportunities for interested parties to understand and influence our plans;
 - gathering high quality responses to and feedback on our plans to help inform proposals; and
 - delivering a consultation exercise that meets the required standards for DCO application.
- 5.1.2 The formal consultation that will be carried out in accordance with this SoCC will build on the consultation on our draft Master Plan 2018 which was carried out between 18 October 2018 and 10 January 2019.

When we will hold the consultation

- 5.1.3 It is intended that our formal consultation will take place in one main stage, from [XX to XX 2020], for a minimum of eight weeks. This may be supplemented by further stages of limited, focused consultation if considered necessary.
- 5.1.4 At the same time as consulting the local community, we will also consult a wide range of statutory consultees in accordance with Section 42 of the Planning Act, including:
 - the host and neighbouring lovel authorities;
 - statutory bodies (such as the Environment Agency, Highways England and others); and
 - people with an interest in land that may be affected by the proposals.
- 5.1.5 The proposed application vill also be publicised in accordance with Section 48 of the Planning Act.

What will hopen following the consultation

- 5.1.6 Following ompletion of the consultation, we will consider all feedback, along with the results of on origing technical assessments, as we refine our proposals in preparation for submitting an application for a development consent order.
- 5.1.7 A detailed consultation report explaining what consultation has taken place and how responses to the consultation have influenced the final proposals will form part of the development consent order application. Once the application is submitted, PINS will consider the adequacy of Gatwick's consultation as part of the process and decide whether or not to accept the application for examination.

5.2 Who we will consult

5.2.1 Our consultation will be open to anyone with an interest in the Project who considers that they may be directly, or indirectly impacted, or who has a view that they would like to be considered.



- 5.2.2 To ensure consultation activity is targeted towards those living, working or otherwise using the areas likely to be most affected by the Project, we have defined two geographic zones an inner zone and an outer zone for consultation purposes.
- 5.2.3 We will publicise the consultation in both consultation zones using our website and local media, by placing adverts in local newspapers, through social media, and with posters on community noticeboards where appropriate.

Inner consultation zone


- The inner zone covers an area where people who live, work or otherwise use the areas accest to Gatwick may be affected by the Project. The area is broadly shaped around the 51 dB(A) Leq noise contour in 2038 with the Northern Runway in operation. This also covers communities in the 'lowest observable adverse effect level' (LOAEL) for aircraft noise, as defined by government guidance².
- 5.2.5 Our Project newsletter will be sent to homes and businesses within the inner zone at the beginning of the consultation to further publicise the event. Our exhibitions will be largely focused in this area.

Outer consultation zone

- 5.2.6 The outer zone covers those living and working introduced way from Gatwick Airport, but still potentially affected by the Project. It also covers communities where we know from previous engagement that there is a strong interest in the dirport.
- 5.2.7 The outer zone is broadly shaped around the 'Gatwick Diamond' area³ and consultation will be undertaken within it to help gather feedback from communities further away from the Airport, including through a number of exhibitions.
- 5.2.8 We understand that some individuals and groups within the community can prove more challenging to reach and their views may therefore be less frequently heard. We will work with organisations representing 'hard-to-reach' groups to ensure consultation activity and materials are presented in a way that allows these groups to engage. This could include, for example, bespoke presentations, alternative format materials, advertisements in specific publications, or additional support for those who cannot travel or who need help to read and understand documents.

 - Consultation Overview Document: includes information about the context in which we are
 operating and sets out an overview of our proposals and approach to managing their impacts.
 - Consultation Questionnaire: the main mechanism for collecting feedback from the local community. It will include easy to understand questions on our proposals, the answers to which will be considered as we refine our plans. It will also be made available in alternative formats and languages if requested.
 - Preliminary Environment Information Report (PEIR): containing preliminary environmental information related to the Project.
 - Other technical documents: including our Fotecast Data Book, Economic Impact Report, draft Noise Insultation Scheme, Draft Employment Skills and Business Support Strategy, PEIR Non-technical summary, and Land Use Masterplan drawing.
- 5.3.2 All of the documentation will be available online. Flard copies of these documents, and this SoCC, will be available to view at public exhibitions and in selected libraries and council offices during the formal consultation process. We will provide hard copies of the Consultation Summary Document and Consultation Questionnaire free of charge. We will review requests for hard copies of the other documents on a case-by-case basis. A fee to cover printing costs (up to a maximum of £500 for one full set of documents) may be charged to the recipient.

Publicity

5.3.3 We will publicise the consultation and associated activities in local media ahead of the start of the consultation period and will update local broadcast and print media channels on our activity during the conslutation.

Advertising

5.3.4 State ory notices will be published in line with Section 48 of the Planning Act.

Project website

All consultation material, the exhibition boards and this SoCC will be available to download from the Project website during the consultation period (www.gatwickairport.com/futureplans).

Social media

5.3.6 We will use social media to help publicise the consultation and encourage those with an interest to submit their feedback.

Newsletter

5.3.7 We will publicise the consultation programme, including information on location and timing of exhibitions and how people can respond, in a Project newsletter. The newsletter will be distributed to all homes and businesses that fall within the Inner Consultation Zone.

Exhibitions and events

- 5.3.8 We will hold 17 staffed (by Gatwick and its wider team) exhibitions with large-scale information panels outlining our proposals and a CGI/fly-through of the Project. Venues for exhibitions have been chosen for their availability, size, ease of access, and compliance with the Equalities Act 2010.
- 5.3.9 Exhibitions will take place at a variety of times and days of the week to help maximise opportunities for people to attend. Table 5.3.1 includes details of the planned exhibitions.

1 Introduction

- 1.1.1 London Gatwick Airport (Gatwick) is a key element of national infrastructure, the second busiest airport in the UK and one of the premier airports in Europe. The airport facilitates travel around the globe for business, leisure and visiting family and friends as well as facilitating inward investment, trade and the movement of important cargo supplies. The COVID-19 pandemic has illustrated the significant value the airport brings to the region in terms of employment and economic opportunities and prosperity. While we may have some years to go before air tavel fully recovers to pre-pandemic traffic levels, we will emerge a fitter and stronger airport.
- 1.1.2 Innovative solutions are needed if we are to help build greater resilience in the UK sailborts system, increase competition, offer greater choice to customers, and enhance jobs, trade, connectivity and tourism in the local region. By unlocking additional capacity, largely within the airport's existing footprint, we can grow in the most sustainable way, allowing Gatwick to continue to manage its environmental impacts.
- 1.1.3 Gatwick is currently served by a single main runway and hac a further runway the northern (also known as the standby) runway, located to the north of the main runway. The northern runway is routinely used as a taxiway and when the main runway is closed for maintenance or an emergency.
- 1.1.4 Following expiry of a planning agreement restricting simultaneous use of the northern runway with the main runway, we are proposing to reposition the centreline of the northern runway to the north by 12 metres, to enable dual runway operations. Bringing the northern runway into routine use would also require a range of infrastructure and facilities works, allowing an increase in passenger capacity to approximately 74 75 million passengers per annum (mppa) by 2038, compared to a maximum potential dapacity based on existing consents of 61 62 mppa within the same timescale.
- 1.1.5 This growth in capacity of greater than 10 million passengers per annum means the northern runway development, including the supporting infrastructure and facilities (the Northern Runway Project or NPP), is classed as a Nationally Sigificant Infrastructure Project (NSIP). Gatwick will need to make an application under the Planning Act 2008 (the 'Planning Act') for a permission known as a development consent order (DCO) to construct and operate the NRP.
- 1.1.6 A key element of the DCO process is the statutory requirement for pre-application consultation with the local community and other stakeholders, including statutory consultees. Following departation of our proposals and associated preliminary environmental information, plans will be hublished for consultation, allowing local residents, councils, businesses, community groups and others to have their say.
- 1.1.7 This Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC) has been prepared in line with Section 47 of the Planning Act and sets out how Gatwick will consult the local community about the NRP. It includes, amongst other things:
 - when the consultation will be carried out;
 - who will be consulted;
 - where we will consult;



- how we will consult (including on preliminary environmental information); and
- how feedback from the consultation will be collected and used to inform our proposals.
- 1.1.8 In accordance with the Planning Act, we have consulted on the contents of the SoCC with the local authorities in whose area the proposed development is situated (the host authorities) -Crawley Borough Council, Reigate and Banstead Borough Council, Mole Valley District Council, Tandridge District Council, Surrey County Council and West Sussex County Council. We have at Co. Acil.

2 Overview of the process

- 2.1.1 Gatwick will apply to the Secretary of State for Transport under the Planning Act for development consent to build and operate the NRP. The Planning Inspectorate, acting as the examining authority on behalf of the Secretary of State, will examine the proposal and make a recommendation to the Secretary of State on whether a DCO should be granted.
- 2.1.2 The key stages of the process for securing development consent for projects classed as NSIPs are set out in Diagram 2.1.1.

Diagram 2.1.1 Overview of the DCO process

Preapplication The developer prepares the application and undertakes pre-application consultation in accordance with the requirements of the Planning Act. Where required, Environmental Impact Assessment is undertaken (involving consultation on the scope of the process and on Preliminary Environmental Information to inform an Environmental Statement).

Acceptance

 28 day period for the Planning Inspectorate to decide whether or not the application meets the standards required to proceed to the examination phase.

Preexamination Planning Inspectorate holds a preliminary meeting and sets the timetable for the examination. Stakeholders can register as an interested party.

Examination 2 1

Planning Inspectorate has six months to carry out the examination.

Tecision

 Planning Inspectorate issue a recommendation to the Secretary of State within three months of the end of the examination process. The Secretary of State has a three month period to issue a decision.

Post-

 Following issue of the decision, the developer can implement the project in accordance with the Development Consent Order (including its requirements for mitgation).

3 The Northern Runway Project proposals

- 3.1.1 The Northern Runway Project (NRP) proposes to make alterations to the existing northern runway which would enable dual runway operations in accordance with international standards. The resulting operation would allow:
 - all arrivals to continue to use the existing main runway;
 - shared departures between the existing main runway and the northern runway; and
 - controlled dependency between the two runways to enable safe crossing of the norther runway by arrivals.
- 3.1.2 It is anticipated that by 2038, these improvements could increase passenger broughout to approximately 74 75 mppa, compared to a maximum expected capacity (based on existing consents) of 61 62 mppa within the same timescale without the NPR: This profesents an increase of approximately 13 mppa.
- 3.1.3 The land subject to the application for development consent extends to approximately 820 hectares, of which approximately 742 hectares lies within the owne ship of Gatwick Airport Limited.
- 3.1.4 The NRP includes the following key components:
 - amendments to the existing northern runway metading repositioning its centreline 12 metres further north to enable dual runway operations
 - reconfiguration of taxiways;
 - pier and stand amendments (including a proposed new pier);
 - reconfiguration of other airfield facilities
 - extensions to the existing airport terminals (North and South);
 - provision of additional note and office space;
 - provision of reconfigured sar parking, including new car parks;
 - surface access (including highway) improvements;
 - reconfiguration of existing utilities, including surface water, foul drainage and power; and
 - landscape/ecological planting and environmental mitigation.
- 3.1.5 The NR and herefore the consultation does not include:
 - Airpoit regulation and economic licensing Gatwick is licensed to operate by the Civil
 Avaition Authority (CAA). At airports, the CAA regulates airspace policy, safety, consumer
 plotection and economics, such as service levels and charges to our airline customers; and
 - Modernising of air space Future Airspace Strategy Implementation South (FASI-South) is a major review proposing to re-design airspace over London and the South East to improve services, reduce delays and the effects of noise. This work is being undertaken by NATS, in partnership with the Department for Transport (DoT) and the CAA.



4 Environmental information

- 4.1.1 The NRP is classed as a development requiring assessment of likely significant effects on the environment under The Infrastructure Planning (Environmental Impact Assessment) Regulations 2017. Gatwick will therefore carry out an Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) and will submit a full Environmental Statement (ES) and non-technical summary as part of its application for development consent.
- 4.1.2 We will consult on preliminary environmental information, in the form of a Preliminary Environment Information Report (PEIR), which will form part of the pre-application consultation documents and will be available for the local community and stakeholders to examine during the pre-application consultation process¹.
- 4.1.3 The PEIR will present environmental information that has been collected and assessed by the date of the consultation in relation to the likely significant environmental effects of the NRP and will indicate preliminary measures that we may need to implement it order to reduce, avoid and mitigate any residual environmental impacts.

5 Consultation

5.1 Our approach

- 5.1.1 Public consultation has changed in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. As in work and social interaction, there is now a greater reliance on virtual or online engagement activity.
- 5.1.2 Our consultation has been designed to provide certainty to consultees about the ways in which they can share their views, whilst respecting the restrictions necessary during the pandentic, including the ongoing need for social distancing.
- 5.1.3 We will use a mix of materials, methods and techniques to remove barriers, promote inclusivity, and encourage engagement from local communities.
- 5.1.4 Gatwick is committed to ensuring the local community has the opportunity to inderstand and provide feedback on our NRP proposals. Our key objectives for achieving this through preapplication consultation include:
 - ensuring thorough, open, and transparent engagement and consultation on our proposals;
 - ensuring proposals are clearly presented, and issues early inderstood;
 - providing sufficient opportunities for interested panies to understand and influence our plans;
 - gathering high quality responses to and feedback on our plans to help inform proposals; and
 - delivering a consultation exercise that mosts be required standards for a DCO application.
- 5.1.5 The formal consultation that will be carried out in accordance with this SoCC will build on the consultation on our draft Master Plan 2018 which was carried out between 18 October 2018 and 10 January 2019.
- 5.1.6 It is intended that our formal consultation will take place in one main stage, from [XX to XX 2021], for a minimum of nine weeks. This may be supplemented by further stages of limited, focused consultation if consideres necessary.
- 5.1.7 At the same time as consulting the local community, we will also consult a wide range of statutory consultees in accordance with Section 42 of the Planning Act, including:
 - the best and neighbouring local authorities (see 1.1.8 for details);
 - statutory bodies (such as the Environment Agency, Highways England and others); and
 - people with an interest in land that may be affected by the proposals.
- 5.1.8 The proposed application will also be publicised as required by Section 48 of the Planning Act.
- 5.1.9 Following completion of the consultation, we will consider all feedback, along with the results of on-going technical assessments, as we refine our proposals in preparation for submitting an application for a development consent order.
- 5.1.10 A detailed consultation report explaining what consultation has taken place and how responses to the consultation have influenced the final proposals will form part of the development consent order application. Once the application is submitted, the Planning Inspectorate will consider the submitted documents and also the adequacy of Gatwick's consultation as part of the process and decide whether or not to accept the application for examination.



5.2 Who we will consult

- 5.2.1 Our consultation will be open to anyone with an interest in the NRP who considers that they may be directly, or indirectly impacted, or who has a view that they would like to be considered. We will use a mix of materials, methods and techniques that will remove barriers and encourage engagement from local communities, while also complying with any pandemic-related restrictions should they be in place during the NRP consultation period.
- 5.2.2 To ensure consultation activity is targeted towards those living, working or otherwise using the areas likely to be most affected by the NRP, we have defined two geographic zones an inner zone and an outer zone for consultation purposes.
- 5.2.3 We will publicise the consultation in both consultation zones using our website and local media, by placing adverts in local newspapers, through social media, and with posters on community noticeboards where appropriate.

Inner consultation zone

- 5.2.4 The inner zone covers an area where people who live, work or otherwise use the areas closest to Gatwick may be affected by the NRP. The inner zone contains the area covered by the indicative day and night noise contours in 2029 (with the northern unway in operation), which includes communities in the 'lowest observable adverse effect level' (LOAEL) for aircraft noise, as defined by government guidance².
- 5.2.5 Our NRP newsletter will be sent to homes and by sinesses to further publicise the consultation within the inner zone at the beginning of consultation. Mobile Project Office (MPO) visits will be largely focused in this area.

Outer consultation zone

- 5.2.6 The outer zone covers those thing and working further away from Gatwick Airport, but still potentially affected by the NRP. It also covers communities where we know from previous engagement that there is a strong interest in the Airport.
- 5.2.7 The outer zone is shaped around the 'Gatwick Diamond' area³ and consultation will be undertaken within it to help gather feedback from communities further away from the Airport.

Hard to reach audiences

- 5.2.8 Ve understand that some individuals and groups within the community can prove more challenging to reach and their views may therefore be less frequently heard.
- We will work with local authorities and organisations representing 'hard-to-reach' individuals and groups to ensure consultation activity and materials are presented in a way that allows them to



engage. This could include, for example, mobile project office visits, alternative format materials, advertisements in specific publications, or additional support for those who cannot travel, have limited or no internet access, or who need help to read and understand documents. We will also provide a range of communications channels for anyone seeking information or answers to their questions about our proposals.

5.3 How we will consult

5.3.1 This section sets out how we intend to consult during our main round of consultation in [INSERT 2021]. Should we carry out any further stages of limited, focused consultation prior to submission of the DCO application, we will use some, but not necessarily all, of these means of consultation. We will work with the relevant local authorities to assist us in deciding the most appropriate activities for any further stages of consultation.

Consultation documents

- 5.3.2 Our proposals, options, and preliminary environmental information will be published to consultation in the following documents:
 - Consultation Summary Document: an accessible, non-technical summary of the Consultation Overview Document including options and easy to read diagrams and plans. It will also be made available in alternative formats and language of requested.
 - Consultation Overview Document: includes information about the context in which we are
 operating and sets out an overview of our proposals and approach to managing their impacts.
 - Consultation Feedback Form: the main mechanism for collecting feedback from the local community. It will include easy to understand questions on our proposals, the answers to which will be considered as we refine our plans. It will also be made available in alternative formats and languages if requested.
 - **Preliminary Environment Information Report** (PEIR): containing preliminary environmental information related to the NRP.
 - Other technical documents: including our Forecast Data Book; Economic Impact Report; draft Noise Insultation Scheme, Draft Employment, Skills and Business Strategy; the PEIR Non-technical summary; and Land Use Masterplan drawings.
- 5.3.3 All consultation documents will be available to download from the NRP website and on USB drives, which will be provided free of charge on request.
- A hard copy of the SoCC and consultation documents will be placed in two public buildings (such as local libraries community centres, civic buildings, or leisure centres) in each of the ten host/neighbouring local authority areas and maintained throughout the consultation period, assuming pandemic restrictions allow.
- 5.3.5 We will provide hard copies of the Consultation Summary Document and Consultation agreements of the other documents on case-by-case basis. A fee to cover printing costs (up to a maximum of £500 for one full set of consultation documents) may be charged to the recipient.
- 5.3.6 For community members without broadband/computer access or who are unable to travel to view hard copies of the documents, we will loan (on request and for a limited period) tablets loaded with all consultation information.

NRP website and virtual exhibition

5.3.7 The NRP website will host all of the consultation documents and other materials, including a virtual exhibition, interactive computer-generated imagery, and online questionnaire. It will include

- details of deposit points and mobile project office locations as well as allowing people to make appointments to speak to the team or request hard copy documents or USBs.
- 5.3.8 The interactive virtual exhibition will provide an alternative format for people to learn about the proposals. It will include information boards, links to documents and the online feedback form, and allow access to the project's digital model.

Telephone surgeries

- 5.3.9 During consultation we will run telephone surgeries to allow members of the public to speak to technical experts about the project. Telephone surgeries will require pre-booking around four topic areas transport, air quality and climate change, noise, plus general issues.
- 5.3.10 Telephone surgeries will take place at a variety of times and days of the week to help maximise opportunities for people to participate. Bookings will be possible through the website, by calling the project hotline, by email, or at the mobile project office.

Mobile Project Office

- 5.3.11 Over a period of at least six weeks during the consultation, a Mobile Project Office (MPO) van will visit local communities, offering access to consultation materials (including videos and the virtual exhibition), providing in-person contact for arranging telephone surgery bookings, and offering materials (consultation summary documents, and the readback form) for people to take away.
- 5.3.12 The MPO will visit prominent local locations (such as train stations, supermarkets, leisure centres) for up to four hours at a time, at a variety of times and days of the week (including weekends), to encourage participation in the consultation and to distribute consultation materials. The planned MPO locations are included in Table subject to compliance with any COVID-19 restrictions that may in in place during the consultation period and the availability of appropriate sites that allow safe and legal operation. Details of dates and times will be published in a newsletter beforehand (see para 5.3.17) and through publicity (see para 5.3.18).

Virtual presentations and events

- 5.3.13 We will seek to accommodate reasonable requests for virtual (Zoom, MS Teams etc) presentations and briefings from, for example, GATCOM, local authorities/panch councils, local community groups, residents' associations, MPs and others, during the consultation period.
- 5.3.14 We will identify opportunities from within our on-going education, community, business and other stakeholder engagement to share our proposals and gather feedback. Specific activities could include, for example, virtual workshops, roundtables, and business/supplier events.
- 5.3.15 Other activities may be carried out, if considered necessary and appropriate, to engage specific interests or 'hard-to-reach' groups on specific aspects of the NRP. This could include, for example, virtual workshops or focus groups.
- 5.3.16 Virtual workplace events will be held for staff at Catwick.

Newsletter

5.3.17 We will publicise the consultation, including information on accessing materials, the locations and timing of MPO visits, and how people can respond in a NRP newsletter. The newsletter will be distributed to all homes and cusinesses that fall within the Inner Consultation Zone.

Publicity and advertising

- 5.3.18 We will publicise the consultation and associated activities in local media ahead of the start of the consultation period and will update local broadcast and print media channels on our activity during the consultation.
- 5.3.19 Where publication timings allow, we will also use local authority newsletters to further engage with local communities.

Social media

5.3.21 We will use social media to help publicise the consultation and encourage those with an interest to submit their feedback.

Consultation hotline and email address

5.3.22 For more information on the consultation, to request copies of documents and USBs, or to arrange to speak to a member of the team, people can contact us by calling the NRP Hotline ([INSERT]) during normal business hours (Monday to Friday, 9am to 5.30pm). 

Gatwick Airport Limited ("GAL") is proposing to make alterations to Gatwick Airport's existing northern runway which, along with lifting the current restrictions on its use, would enable dual runway operations. Together with the alterations to the northern runway, the Project would include the development of a range of infrastructure and facilities to allow increased airport passenger numbers and aircraft movements and to allow the Airport to make best use of its existing runways.

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The Project includes proposals which may constitute new noise 'operating restrictions' as defined under Regulation 598/2014. The consultation documents include information on the potential 'operating restrictions', and form part of the engagement being undertaken by GAL to reflect the consultation requirements of Regulation 598/2014.

GAL intends to submit an application to the Secretary of State for a Development Consent Order ("DCO") for the Project.

GAL is now commencing formal pre-application consultation on the Project which will begin on 9 September 2021 and run to 11.59pm on 1 December 2021. The focus of this consultation is to obtain views on the proposals for the Project to inform its development and refinement ahead of submission of the DCO application

The Project is an Environmental Impact Assessment ("EIA") development and accordingly a Preliminary Environmental Information Report ("PEIR") has been produced and is included as part of the consultation materials. The PEIR sets out the preliminary findings of the EIA undertaken to date. A non-technical summary of the PEIR has also been prepared. GAL will carry out an EIA and submit a full Environmental Statement and non-technical summary as part of its DCO application.

The Statement of Community Consultation (produced in accordance with section 47 of the Planning Act 2008) sets out how we will consult with the local community and stakeholders about our proposals. The Statement can be viewed online free of charge at gatwickairport.com/futureplans, or at the deposit locations set out below from the start of the consultation period on 9 September 2021 to 1 December 2021.

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Copies of the Statement of Community Consultation and consultation materials are also available on USB or in hard copy on request. We will provide hard copies of the Consultation Summary Document and Consultation Questionnaire free of charge and will review requests for hard copies of the other documents or a case-by-case basis. GAL reserves the right to make a charge for the reasonable copying costs in respect of any documentation it is requested to provide in hard copy, up to a maximum of £500 for one full set of the consultation materials.

Those wanting to submit a consultation response must do so by the deadline of 11.59pm on 1 December 2021. A response can be provided in any of the following ways:

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



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Health service hiring dozens of managers on up to £270k

The NHS is hiring dozens of senior managers on salaries of up to £270,000 as MPs warned the government that it was "throwing other people's money down a bottomless pit".

Sajid Javid, the health secretary,

Sajid Javid, the health secretary, insisted that he would be "watchful for any waste and wokery" as ministers

privately expressed frustration that he had not set specific targets for the NHS despite billions in extra funding.

After a manifesto-breaking tax rise yesterday, the government attempted to address concerns that the NHS had been handed billions without clear commitments to improvements. Javid promised efficiencies in care, such as dedicated surgery centres and AI

analysis, saying that the NHS "cannot go on with business as usual".

But the health service was advertising for dozens of managers on salaries of up to £270,000. Chief executives of the 42 new integrated care systems created by the government's NHS bills are being sought on pay averaging £223,261. These bodies will bring together care from hospitals, GPs, mental health and


other services while aiming to integrate social care services with the NHS. This is separate from an integration white paper promised by ministers as part of their social care reforms.

The NHS will get an extra £15.8 billion over three years as part of a tax rise for every British worker. One minister said: "We have to make sure that this tax rise delivers what we say it's going to

deliver. They [the NHS] have to be held to account."

French anger at Patel plan to turn around migrants

● Home secretary orders rewrite of maritime law ● Boats would be stopped from entering UK waters

Priti Patel has ordered officials to rewrite maritime law to allow boats carrying migrants to be intercepted in the Channel, deepening a diplomatic rift with France over the crisis. Border Force officers will be trained

Border Force officers will be trained in new tactics to turn around small vessels after the home secretary lost patience with French inaction.

She told senior law officers to rewrite Britain's interpretation of international

maritime law to allow the Border Force to intercept boats as they attempted to enter British territorial waters.

Officers would then contact the French coastguard to inform it that vessels in French territorial waters were in need of rescue. That would place on France the legal responsibility for the migrant boats.

However, the French government said that the move would have "a negative impact on our co-operation". In a letter to Patel, Gérald Darmanin, the interior minister, also rejected Britain's request to set up a joint command centre in northern France that would include police and border force officers from both countries patrolling the coastline and the Channel. Darmanin said that the move would

Darmanin said that the move would breach the French authorities' sovereignty because their officers duties' were not solely dedicated to combating illegal Channel crossings. Patel has also offered the French a

Patel has also offered the French a British aircraft to monitor its coastline for migrant crossings. The French said that it would be up to Frontex, the EU's border agency, whether to accept the offer.

Patel met Darmanin yesterday to tell him that the "status quo was not working" for either Britain or France. An official statement on the meeting said that both countries had expected more action to stop the flow of migrants across France and into the UK. It is not known whether the plan to rewrite maritime law was discussed.

KPMG aims for a third of its staff to be working class

The accounting and consulting firm KPMG has become the first big business in Britain to set a target for the number of working-class staff.

It is aiming for 29 per cent of its partners and directors to come from the social group by 2030. It defined working class as having parents with "routine and manual" jobs, such as plumbers, electricians, butchers and van drivers.

All its 16,000 employees will receive training on "invisible barriers" that exist for people from lower socioeconomic backgrounds. The firm said that 23 per cent of its 582 partners and 20 per cent of its 1,297 directors were from working-class backgrounds. Those from such backgrounds were typically paid 8.6 per cent less than those whose parents worked in "higher managerial, administrative and professional" jobs, the firm said.

Bina Mehta, chairwoman of KPMG, who says she comes from a working-class background, said: "I'm a passionate believer that greater diversity improves business performance. Diversity brings fresh thinking and different perspectives to decision-making, which in turn delivers better outcomes for our clients"

Mehta was appointed chairwoman this year after her predecessor, Bill Michael, resigned after a backlash over comments he made to staff during a Zoom call. He dismissed unconscious bias as "complete and utter crap" and told staff to "stop moaning" about working conditions during the pandemic.

In Britain people who come from a privileged rather than a working-class background are 60 per cent more likely to be in a professional job, according to the Social Mobility Commission

the Social Mobility Commission.

Those from working-class backgrounds are becoming more upwardly mobile, the commission says. Last year 39 per cent of people from working-class families were in professional jobs, up from 33 per cent in 2014.

Man knocked out in racist abuse attack

A MAN was knocked unconscious and taken to hospital with facial injuries after he was allegedly racially abused and assaulted by two men in McDonald's in Tunbridge

The victim, aged in his 30s, was attacked inside the restaurant in Fountains Retail Park off Dowding

The incident took place between 11pm and 11.30pm on Friday (September 10).

A spokesman for McDonald's told the Courier on Wednesday: "We are aware of an incident that took place on September 10. We are supporting the police with their ongoing investigation."

Kent Police said it was reported that the victim was initially approached by a man who began making racially abusive comments towards him.

A second man is said to have then punched the victim in the face,

knocking him unconscious.

The victim needed treatment in hospital for the injuries to his face.

A police spokesman said: "Police have spoken to a number of witnesses and are continuing to examine potential CCTV evidence.

"They have now issued images of two men they would like to speak to.

"Anyone who recognises them, or who has information which may assist the investigation is asked to call Kent Police on 01622 604100. quoting reference 46/172835/21," he

Gatwick Northern Runway Project: Further Consultation

Draft proposed approach for local authority feedback June 2022

1. Introduction

1.1. Background

- 1.1.1. In autumn 2021, Gatwick carried out an extensive 12-week public consultation on our proposals to bring the existing northern runway into routine use alongside the main runway. Along with the proposed changes to the runway, we also consulted on plans for supporting infrastructure and facilities including road improvements, a new Pier, additional parking and hotels, and improvements to the existing terminal buildings.
- 1.1.2. The virtual-only consultation generated substantial feedback from local residents and businesses, local authorities, stakeholders and others, who generously shared their comments on the proposals. Since the close of the consultation in December 2021, we have been considering the feedback and carrying out further assessment work. We are also continuing to engage with statutory authorities to refine our proposals.
- 1.1.3. As a result, we have updated aspects of the design of our highways works and refined proposals for the project in some other areas. We now intend to undertake a targeted statutory consultation on the updated highways proposals. At the same time, we will also publish the refined project proposals to seek informal feedback before finalising our DCO application.

1.2. Statement of Community Consultation

- 1.2.1. In August 2021, we published a Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC), which set out our approach to public consultation (autumn 2021) on the Northern Runway Project. The SoCC also included our intended approach to any future consultation on particular issues and topics:
 - "...Should we carry out any further stages of limited, focused consultation prior to submission of the DCO application, we will use some, but not necessarily all, of these means of consultation. We will work with the relevant local authorities to assist us in deciding the most appropriate activities for any further stages of consultation." (Paragraph 5.3.1)
- 1.2.2. This is in line with government guidance on pre-application consultation which recommends project applicants work with local authorities to develop plans for consultation that is 'appropriate to the scale and nature of the project and where its impacts will be experienced'. And that it 'should be thorough, effective and proportionate.'
- 1.2.3. This paper sets out our proposed approach to a hybrid (targeted statutory/wider non-statutory) consultation.



2. Consultation approach

2.1. When we will consult

2.1.1. We are planning to hold a 28-day consultation starting in June 2022 and completing prior to the start of the school summer holidays. As this consultation only includes discrete changes to elements of the highway design and a limited number of more general project updates, this period is considered to be sufficient and allow a proportionate time for stakeholders and members of the public to review and comment on our updated proposals.

2.2. Who we will consult

- 2.2.1. For the targeted statutory element of the consultation, we will be writing to the prescribed persons and generally focusing activity on the area most likely to be affected by the updated highways proposals (see Figure 2.1 below). This area has been defined taking account of Noise Important Areas for road noise (as recognised by National Highways and local highway authorities) located close to the A23 London Road and Airport Way, and other areas potentially impacted by the highways proposals.
- 2.2.2. A wide-reaching advertising and publicity campaign will raise awareness of the consultation and encourage those outside of the targeted consultation area to get involved.
- 2.2.3. We understand that some individuals and groups within the community may find it more challenging to take part in consultations and their views may therefore be less frequently heard. We will ensure consultation materials are presented in a way that allows them to engage. We will also provide a range of communications channels for anyone seeking information or answers to their questions about our proposals. Using our experience with hard-to-reach audiences during the main round of consultation, we will target those individuals and groups most affected by the updated highways proposals.

2.3. How we will consult

Our approach

Following the success of our virtual-only consultation in 2021, we intend to use the same approach in June 2022, providing a mix of materials, methods and techniques to remove barriers, promote inclusivity, and encourage engagement. This includes writing to those directly affected by the highway design updates to invite their feedback as part of the statutory element of the consultation as well as publishing documents appropriate for a range of audiences, and offering a range of ways for people to understand the proposals and get involved.

Consultation documents

- 2.3.1. Our updated highways proposals and wider project updates will be published for consultation in the following:
 - A Consultation Document setting out the updated aspects of the design of our highways
 proposals and their likely environmental effects, and explaining the refined proposals for the
 project in some other areas. This document will also include the consultation questions and
 ways to respond.
 - A Newsletter summarising the updated aspects of the design of our highways proposals and the refined proposals for the project in some other areas. This document will also include the consultation questions and ways to respond. It will be distributed in hard copy to the targeted highways consultation area (shown in Figure 2.1 above) and available electronically.
 - An online Questionnaire which will be the main mechanism for collecting feedback.
- 2.3.2. All consultation documents will be available to download at the start of consultation from the Gatwick Northern Runway Project website (www.gatwickairport.com/futureplans) and on USB drives, which will be provided free of charge for personal use on request.
- 2.3.3. A hard copy of the consultation documents will be placed in two appropriate public buildings (such as local libraries, community centres or civic buildings) within the highways consultation area and maintained throughout the consultation period.

Project website

2.3.4. From the start of consultation, the project website (gatwickairport.com/futureplans) will host all of the consultation materials, information in alternative formats (such as a video fly-through of the highways proposals) and allow people to make appointments to speak to the team or request hard copy documents or USBs. Social media will be used to help advertise the consultation and encourage participation throughout the consultation period.

Telephone surgeries

2.3.5. During consultation we will run telephone surgeries to allow members of the public to speak to technical experts about the proposals. Bookings will be possible from the website, by emailing, or by calling the project hotline.



Virtual stakeholder briefings

2.3.6. We will seek to accommodate reasonable requests for virtual (Zoom, MS Teams etc.) presentations and briefings from stakeholder groups, for example, GATCOM, local authorities/parish councils, local community groups, residents' associations, MPs and others, during the consultation period.

Publicity and advertising

2.3.7. We will publicise the consultation and associated activities in local media and update local broadcast and print media channels on our activity during the consultation. A wide-reaching digital advertising campaign will also help to raise awareness of the consultation.

Social media

2.3.8. We will use social media to help publicise the consultation and encourage those with an interest to submit their feedback.

Consultation hotline and email address

- 2.3.9. For more information on the consultation, to request copies of documents and USBs, or to arrange to speak to a member of the team or to arrange a virtual briefing, people can contact us by calling the Northern Runway Project Hotline during normal business hours (Monday to Friday, 9am to 5.30pm). Outside of these hours, callers will be able to leave a message requesting a callback.
- 2.3.10. Alternatively, people will be able to email the project directly or from the Northern Runway Project website (www.gatwickairport.com/futureplans).



The Gatwick Northern Runway Project


We are proposing alterations to bring the existing Northern Runway into routine use alongside our main runway, enabling the dual operation of both runways. Departures would be shared between both runways with the Northern Runway used for smaller aircraft. All arrivals would continue to use the main runway.

It is anticipated that by 2038 these proposals could increase Gatwick's passenger throughput to approximately 75.6 million passengers per annum (mppa), compared to approximately 62.4 mppa which is where we would otherwise expect to grow to by 2038. This represents an anticipated increase in capacity of approximately 13.2 mppa.

The Northern Runway is expected to be operational by summer 2029. The majority of the construction works associated with the airfield are contained within the existing airport boundary.

The key elements of our proposals to enable dual runway operations and support increased passenger numbers at Gatwick include:

- > alterations to the existing northern runway, including repositioning its centreline 12 metres further north;
- > reconfiguration of taxiways to accommodate the changes being made to the northern runway and ensuring sufficient room for the safe manoeuvring of aircraft;
- > changes to some aircraft stands to improve the handling of different types of aircraft and a proposed new remote pier (Pier 7) that would serve both North and South Terminals;
- > reconfiguration of a number of airfield facilities to facilitate taxiway changes;
- > extensions to the North and South Terminal buildings to accommodate passenger growth, improve baggage handling, and enhance the experience of our customers;
- > provision of reconfigured car parking, including new surface and multi-storey car parks;
- > provision of additional hotels and office space;
- > surface access (highway) improvements;




- > reconfiguration of existing utilities, including surface water, foul drainage and power; and
- > landscape/ecological planting and environmental mitigation.

Flights departing from the Northern Runway will continue to use existing flightpaths.

The Planning Process

This level of passenger increase, along with the road improvements needed to support it, means the project is classed as a Nationally Significant Infrastructure Project and we will need to apply for a Development Consent Order (DCO) to build and operate it.
