A government plan to restore the globally rare chalk streams featured in Sir David Attenborough's *Wild Isles* programme has been quietly shelved by Labour.

Chalk streams, which Attenborough called "one of the rarest habitats on earth", are found only in England, northern France and Denmark. Many are in poor condition because of pollution and too much water being drawn from them.

Conservative ministers announced last year that they would create a "chalk stream recovery pack" to restore the cold, mineral-rich waters to their glory. They later promised that it would be published by summer this year.

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The Times understands that the plan was ready by the time the election was called. However, the ecologist tasked with producing the blueprint was told in September that it had been shelved. Officials told Charles Rangeley-Wilson there was no mandate for the plan

The country's 224 chalk streams stretch across a large strip of southeast England. At the western end, they include rivers such as the Test and Itchen, which Southern Water has been told to stop tapping during dry spells.

The streams generally overlap with some of the most heavily populated and developed parts of the country. Many have been modified and are subject to the pressure from sewage spills and sheer volume of
