
Figure	10.1	Archaeological Assets	4


Figure 10.1 Archaeological Assets



















Figure 10.2 Built Heritage Assets














Figure 10.3 Historic Landscape Assets




Figure 11.1 Highways Study Area




Figure 11.2 Baseline traffic counts currently available





Figure 11.3 Existing PRoW and cycling routes

Figure 12.1 Proposed baseline monitoring




Figure 12.2 Schools, hospitals and important areas




Figure 14.1 Study area




Figure 14.2 Agricultural Land Classification




Figure 14.3 Superfical geology




Figure 14.4 Bedrock geology




Figure 14.5 Potential contamination




Figure 15.1 Mineral safeguarding sites




Figure 18.1 Human Health Assessment Methodology


